#### III. Academic Biographies of Panelists:

Aras Coskuntuncel is a PhD candidate and teaching assistant in the School of Communication at American University. He focuses on the political economy of media, internet governance, and surveillance.

Carey Hatch is currently the Interim Senior Associate Provost for Academic Services at the State University of New York, System Administration. In this role, Mr. Hatch oversees Open SUNY, the Universities initiative to take online learning to scale, the SUNY Connect cooperative library program, University wide student recruitment and application processing. Carey Hatch received his MLS from the University at Maryland at College Park, and his BA in Philosophy from the State University College of New York at Brockport.

Nimit Mehrotra, Senior Manager, Higher Education Global Support, Ernst & Young, LLP. In his current role in EY's Global Support Services area, Nimit advises numerous universities with activities abroad. Nimit joined the EY global support team from Carnegie Mellon University (CMU), where he helped lead their International Operations group and had oversight over the University's international activities for over 10 years. Nimit helped design a full suite of operational policies and procedures, including travel, procurement, HR & global mobility policies, compensation, tax and payroll requirements in order to promote University global tax and labor law compliance in connection with their extensive international footprint. He was involved with the establishment of CMU's international campuses and led a team to research and access local market regulations in areas such as tax, banking and labor laws. Prior to Carnegie Mellon University, Nimit spent several years at another big-4 firm in their International Assignment Services group, advising multi-national organizations and their senior executives on financial, tax and human resource implications of global personnel deployment, and developed

and implemented strategies for minimizing costs of cross-border employee movement. Nimit received his MBA from the Tepper Business School at CMU.

#### IV. Panel/Workshop Descriptions:

Research Panel: Assigned Leaders in Unionized Environments--Strategies for Change in Academic Libraries. Despite the fact that the rate of unionism has grown in institutions of higher education over the past several decades, few research studies exist in the literature of library and information science about the changes that have occurred in unionized academic libraries and in their assigned leaders' ability to transform their organizations. Dr Lim will on his paper which begins to fill the void by reporting on a multiple-case study of four large academic libraries, where the perspectives of university and library administrators were considered in relation to: changes occurring in unionized libraries as a result of the continued societal disinvestment in public higher education; the benefits and constraints that library administrators encounter as a result of working within unionized contexts; and the strategies used for handling changes in unionized, financially stressed environments. A panel of library administrators and union member librarians will offer commentary and discussion on this important topic.

Is Unionization Just What the Doctor Ordered? Collective Bargaining for Doctors, Nurses, and Lawyers. This panel will include presentations relating to unionization and collective bargaining with respect to professionals including doctors and nurses in Oregon, and doctors and lawyers in Ontario. One of the first units of Oregon hospital physicians to successfully bargain an initial contract occurred in 2016. This unit, and other physician and nurse units, provides an excellent case study of what aspects of health care professionals' work environment can be successfully bargained and where the line is between a physician's professional judgment and management's right to direct its workforce. In Ontario, doctors and lawyers have secured collective bargaining despite their exclusion from provincial labor law.


