## MILLIKIN U. 40 E. I. NORMAL 0

Millikin removed all doubts to their championship claim when Wann's eleven defeated the Charleston players Thanksgiving day by the score of 40 to 0.

Millikin's huskies proved too strong for the Eastern Normal team, and while the Blue and Grey fought hard they were overwhelmed in the last half. Moran, Markle, Cook and Hood were forced to retire from the game, and at no time afterward were Coach Lantz's men able to put the old time "pep" into the game.

Rooters accompanying the team accuse the Millikin team of using unfair methods, but if such was the case, the blame should be placed where it belongs, on the shoulders of the officials. However many things that appear unfair to enthusiastic rooters are in reality not so bad as they look. We wish no alibi for our team. They were out of luck just as Millikin has been for years past. Let us then give to them all the honor and enjoyment that they can get from our defeat and hope that at our next meeting we may be the lucky ones.

The foot ball season is now past and Coach Lantz has been able to make a much better team from a group of players largely inexperienced, than most critics thought possible. Captain Schahrer too, deserves praise for his persistent work. "Cap" has played his last game on the varsity and his place on next year's team will be hard to fill.

### THE EXCURSION

A large crowd of students, townspeople and faculty accompanied the team to Decatur on Thanksgiving day. The Charleston band furnished music for the occasion. Concerts were given in Charleston, Mattoon and Decatur. Special Interurban cars conveyed the crowd to Mattoon where a special train was chartered for the rest of the trip. After the game the team and many of the rooters went to the hotel Orlando where reservation for a six o'clock dinner had been made. The return trip was made in good time, the train arriving in Charleston about 9:30, after which the band played Home Sweet Home, and the crowd separated.
