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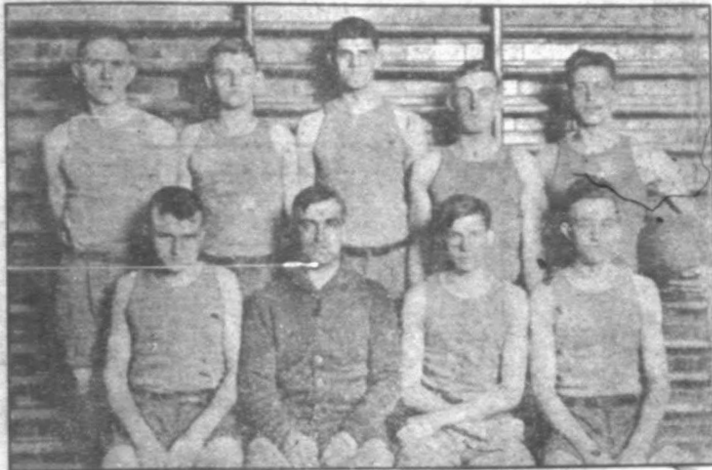

NORMAL WINS FIFTH PLACE AT BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

Capt. Anderson was the high scorer of the tournament, scoring 97 points in four and a half games. Miller, of Millikin, was second with 88 points in six and a half games. Lidle of Bradley, Coleman of Hedding, Mee of William and Vashti, and Gaylord of Illinois, follow in the order named. Anderson wins a fine pair of basketball shoes besides having the honor of being the best point maker in the conference.

Well, the boys are back from Bloomington and with fifth place in their belts. Although they did not come back with a first or second place, they may compliment themselves that they did something which upset the dope prepared by the dopsters.

After the boys had won three games, they lost to William and Vashti by one point, and then to their ancient foes, the Millikinites. By comparative scores we should have second place for we came nearer beating William and Vashti than any other school and we did beat Millikin, the holder of second place.

The big tournament held in the gymnasium of the Young Men's Christian association at Bloomington opened Wednesday night. The first game of the evening, Millikin vs. Blackburn, was easily won by Millikin by a score of 36 to 14. Millikin used her second team half of the game.

The big game of the evening, for Charleston at least, was between the Eastern Illinois Normal school and Lombard college of Monmouth. The pedagogues easily won the game by a score of 49 to 16.

The star of the game was Captain Anderson, he making 33 of the total, 49. Turner also played well and there were no slouches in the whole team. The score:

Charleston Normal won from Shortleff Thursday afternoon 36 to 30 but the Baptists gave the tribe of Lantz a better tussle than they were counting on. Lantz started his entire second team but came across with Captain Anderson in the last half and that brilliant individual more than lived up to all advance notices being in the thick of the fight at all times. Elden Moore, the veteran Shortleff player who has also been acting as coach this year played with the Baptists yesterday.

This victory gave Charleston the right to play Millikin Friday morning.

The Charleston scrubs led 11-10 the first half and the second period was largely a repetition of the first. The score was tied at sixteen all when Anderson came to the rescue with a pretty basket, batted in from under the goal. From then on Charleston pulled away. "Andy" got eight baskets in the twenty minutes he performed.
