Small Crowd Out to See Normal Defeat Blackburn Saturday

Normal school fans received a scare last Saturday when early in the game Blackburn succeeded in skirting left end for a touchdown. However the blue clad warriors braced and at no other time during the game was there much danger of the Presbyterians attacking proving serious.

The feature of the game was the line plunges of the Normal school backs who seldom failed to make downs. Waible played by far his best game last Saturday, running low and hard. The first line of defense could not stop his ferocious attacks and usually the second line were thrown back. Schahrer was back in the game and needless to say, no gains were to be made around Normal right end. Cook, at quarter, proved himself valuable in running with the ball, and with a year's experience will prove valuable in any back field position. Markle, with his ability to place the pass with rifle shot accuracy, stood out in several plays. Slim can carry the ball, and skirted the ends consistently. Highsmith, Jones, Baker, Barkley, Talbott, Hood, and Noakes all played in a manner that proved their knowledge of the game. Edgington, at full back, failed to star only because he was not given a chance, being called very few times during the game. The crowd wondered why he failed to show up. M. Turner made several brilliant end runs.

The supporters of the Blue and Gray are looking forward to the game with Carbondale next Saturday. The Southerners are said to be a husky bunch and have only been beaten by the University of St. Louis, and that by the small score of 7 to 0. However, it is expected that everyone of Coach Lantz's men will be in the game home coming day. Moran, Hampton and Hawkins, who were out of the game last Saturday on account of injuries, will be out this week. With plenty of back field men for Saturday's game, and Moran at the pivot position, our team should prove a hard

hard proposition to the down-staters.
