forming great deeds and dying nobly.

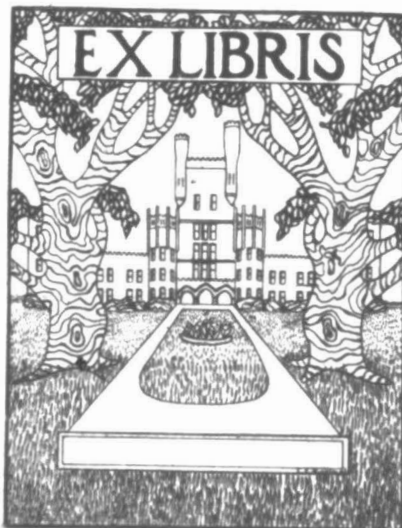
