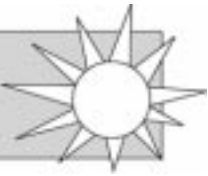

# In remembrance, education Foundation to be set up in the memory of meningitis victim

**B**eth Miller, a sophomore health studies major who died from meningitis March 12, is described by her roommates as a selfless person who always cared more about those around her than herself.

Studying to be a health counselor, Miss Miller's goals of helping others in her life will become a reality after her death as her family and friends work to organize a foundation in her honor, helping college campuses improve awareness of hidden diseases, such as meningitis.

"We want to make sure doctors are aware of all the diseases that are hard to diagnose," said Judy Miller, Beth's mother. "All the campuses need some kind of improvement, some kind of change. We need to coordinate (with other campuses)."

Miss Miller's goal was to help people in a family clinic after graduation. As a person who was plagued with health problems for most of her life, including having a pacemaker, asthma and frequent infections, Miss Miller wanted to help others.

"She wanted to be a health counselor for people with health disorders," said Melissa Malec, a sophomore elementary education major and Miss Miller's roommate.

Malec said because of her health problems, Miss Miller was planning to adopt children so as to not risk passing these problems on.

"She didn't want to see anyone go through what she went through," Malec said.

Although her roommates knew Miss Miller had health problems,

they said they never heard her complain and they thought of her as a healthy person.

"She never talked about it. We knew to be careful with her but we didn't know to what extent," said Erika Gadsby, a sophomore family and consumer science major and Miss Miller's roommate.

The week before her death, both Miss Miller and her roommate Laura Josephs, a family and consumer sciences

major, were sick with the flu. "We both had the flu and she (said) 'I'll make you chicken soup, Laura, because you're sicker than I am,'" Josephs said.

One of the goals of the foundation is to provide funding for the meningitis vaccine, Judy Miller said.

"If a student doesn't have finances to get immunized for meningitis, we're hoping the foundation will be able to fund some of that," Judy Miller said. "We want to do a scholarship, but we want to keep it local."

One of the main goals of the foundation is to make students aware of the symptoms so they can be aware if they begin to feel the symptoms.

"That's the main thing, the symp-

tomms will fool you, but they have to take into consideration the time of year," Judy Miller said.

Meningitis is most commonly seen between the months of January and May.

"There are so many things out there. The kids don't know. Her

"We have gone in and talked to classes that request it," Drake said. "We've never turned down an opportunity to go out and talk about it."

The parents of freshman and transfer students also are addressed at summer orientation so they are aware of

other vaccines by health services, Drake said few students take advantage of it. Three students came in before the case on campus and one came in right after. Since then, two or three students have come in for the vaccine, Drake said.

"I thought a few more people would be interested," she said.

The vaccine is one shot that costs \$70 and is thought to last three to four years, Drake said.

Judy Miller said it is important for students to be aware of the symptoms because if it is caught early enough, it is curable.

"That's the tricky part; being caught soon enough. Beth didn't necessarily catch it from somebody else. Almost everybody has this bacteria already in place. You build up a natural immunity to it," Judy Miller said. "Beth was prone to infection. She was really run down - she had been sick for two weeks prior. Her body became a breeding ground for the bacteria."

She said there is already a meningitis foundation, but they are trying not to be the same because they have different goals.

Judy Miller said organ donation also is something Miss Miller always wanted to do. She said when she heard stories about organ donation, Miss Miller would talk about it with her mother and said it was something she wanted to do.

The Miller family was notified Tuesday by the Regional Organ Bank of Illinois that three of Miss Miller's organs were successfully transplanted. A 32-year-old man, who is married and has a small

child, received a new liver. A 26-year-old woman received a pancreas and kidney making her no longer a diabetic and giving her the possibility to have children. A 48-year-old man received a kidney and will no longer need dialysis.

"I think even, being alive, if someone had needed a kidney, she would have done it," Judy Miller said. "She touched more people than I ever knew."

Miss Miller's roommates said she was interested in playing the piano, computers, animals, and Greenday music, which Josephs said is hard to listen to now.

"She was just so fun," Josephs said.

Malec also said Miss Miller was fun to be around.

"She used to throw coasters at the T.V. when she didn't like a show," Malec said. "When we first met her, she was the most quiet, shy person. She came out of her shell."

Josephs said during a snowstorm, while the four roommates were watching television, Miss Miller kept going outside to make snowballs to keep in the freezer. When asked what she was doing, Miss Miller said she was "making snowballs so we can have a snowball fight in the summer."

"We still have them in our freezer," Malec said.

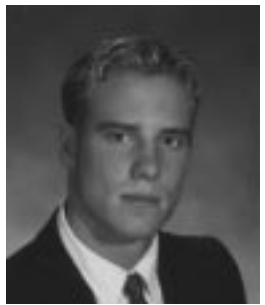

## Multicultural center needed on campus

Although we need more office space and parking lots, the master plan was a disappointment. Where are the plans for a new multicultural center? Eastern constantly re-affirms its commitment to recruiting, admitting, retaining and graduating minority students, but offers little else. All student groups must compete with faculty/staff committees, departments and off-campus groups for use of rooms in the Martin Luther King Jr. University Union. The Afro-American Culture Center is open to all groups, but has limited space. The third floor is used by LASO, a room on the second floor is used by the Muslim Student Association, another area of the second floor is unusable because of damage, thus leaving the first floor available for use by reservation by any group just as the Union does. Unfortunately, that area is small and cannot accommodate large groups.

A multicultural center would offer office space, meeting rooms, a common gathering area for the interaction of groups and send the message that Eastern backs what it says with action. Northwestern University, Western Illinois University and the University of Illinois-Champaign all offer culture centers with budgets and buildings. They offer office, meeting and work space for a number of student organizations that focus on ethnic and cultural issues. How can we hope to compete for minority students to attend Eastern when we have little to offer them? The administration needs to re-evaluate their commitment to, and the needs of, the students.

Phases one and two included development of more athletic areas. As with all schools, Eastern puts a lot of emphasis on sports when it needs to be focusing more on academics. Most employers hire you because of your education, not your athletic background. The land that is to be used for these areas would be put to better use by building classroom and office space, and a multicultural center.

Wouldn't it be more feasible to build a large parking garage than to continue creating haphazard parking lots here and there? It seems that it would be better to be able to park more cars on a smaller piece of land by building up, not out. Also, if the lots are pushed to the outside edges of the campus, will there be a shuttle service for staff; especially for those of us who cannot walk long distances or are disabled?





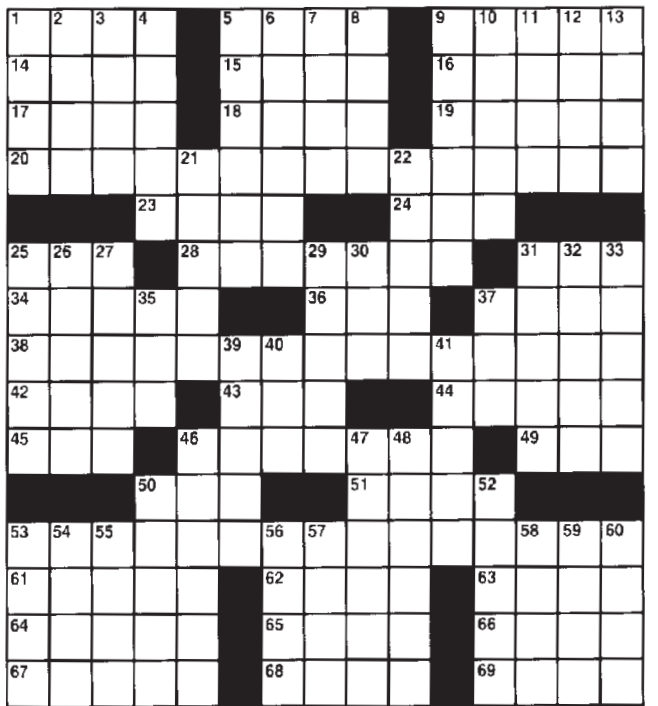

# Former Eastern student to be awarded honorary degree

An individual who graduated from Eastern in 1951 and received awards in 1973 and 1976 from the university will be honored by the university again on May 8.

Author Hughes Jr. of La Jolla, Calif., has been chosen as the recipient of 1999 Honorary Degree of Public Service. He will be awarded with the honorary degree during the 5 p.m. graduation ceremony.

Hughes, who is a native of Hoopeston, currently is the presi-

dent emeritus at the University of San Diego. Prior to that, Hughes taught at Eastern for three years, was dean of the school of business at Northern Arizona State University, was vice president for instruction at NASU and became president of the University of San Diego in 1971.

Ted Ivarie, dean of the Lumpkin College of Business, said in a written statement Hughes is deserving of the award. "Dr. Hughes has had a long and distinguished career of contribution and leadership in higher education," he said in the statement. "The honorary doctorate

soon to be bestowed on Dr. Hughes is an altogether fitting tribute to an outstanding educator and a fine individual." Ivarie also said in the statement Hughes wrote one of the early textbooks on data processing and influenced the improvement of education for business.

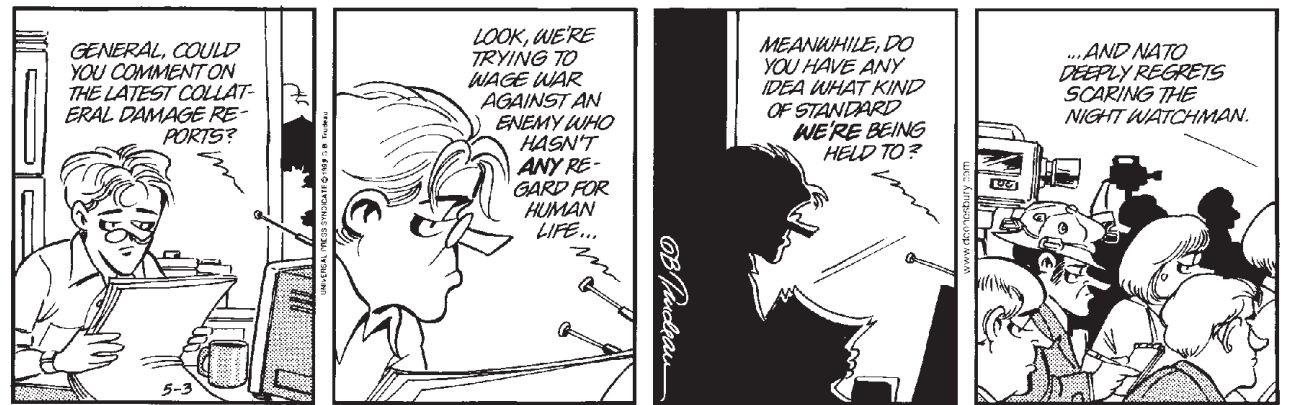
