Summer graduation scheduled for Sunday

Almost 400 students will receive degrees Sunday during Eastern's summer graduation ceremony.

Faculty Marshal L.M. Hamand said Wednesday that Acting President Stanley Rives will give his "charge to the class" at the ceremony.

"This is where he tells the students to go get jobs and things like that,"

Hamand said.

Student Body President John Cole and John Heath of the Alumni Association will also address the graduates, Hamand added.

Lawrence Rigenberg, former vice-president for academic affairs will introduce candidates for degree at the ceremony.

The invocation will be given by

Father Dean Probst of the Newman Center, Hamand said.

In addition, the Mattoon High School Band, directed by Jon Gilliland, will perform at the ceremony, he said.

Hamand said he has been marshal for the last 26 years.

He said he is uncertain of how many

students he has brought through the graduation ceremony.

"I'm sure there is a number," Hamand said. "Someday I will try to count how many."

The ceremony will begin at 6 p.m. in the Library Quad. The rain location of the ceremony is the McAfee south gymnasium, Hamand said.

Administrative aide for presidents graduating after 40 years of study

To some college students, attending college four years to earn a bachelor's degree seems like a long, long stretch.

But Norma Winkleblack, administrative assistant to Eastern's president, will receive a bachelor of arts degree Sunday, nearly 40 years after she began studying at Eastern.

"I came to EIU as a freshman (in 1944) and did two years of work in business education. I was going to be a teacher," Winkleblack said.

But Winkleblack left Eastern to marry. Throughout the years she took occasional courses to finish her degree work, she said.

Winkleblack said she managed being a wife, mother, employee and student because "you find the time to do what you want to do."

Since 1952, when she began working in the president's office, Winkleblack has served every Eastern president except the first, Livingston Lord.

She was transferred to the president's office and made a secretary six months after she began working as a clerk-stenographer at Eastern. In November 1981, during former President Daniel E. Marvin's term, she was appointed administrative assistant to the president.

"I found it difficult to get appropriate courses so I wouldn't have to be gone from work, so I didn't have much luck completing the requirements," she said.

For more two years Winkleblack has been studying under the Board of Governors degree program, she said.

"The BOG degree program is much more flexible because you don't have to meet requirements in a major area of study, although there are requirements in general studies," Winkleblack added.

Much of the work for her BOG degree was done in the business area, however, she said her college work wasn't done to enhance her university position.

"I did it for the personal satisfaction of completing the degree," she said.

"I'm pleased that I've managed to do it. And, yes, I'm going through the ceremony," she added.

Publication stops, resumes Aug. 22

Today's edition of the *Summer Eastern News* marks the end of this summer's publication.

Editor in chief Erin Donohue said Thursday's issue did not have an opinion and commentary page because Page Four was needed for news.

The *News* and Student Publications office will be open for business during the break before fall semester.

Editor in chief of the 1983-84 *News* Steve Binder said he encourages students who would like to work for the paper to stop by the *News* office during the first weeks of classes.

"I would like to invite anyone who would like to write, draw cartoons or take photographs for the paper to come and talk to me," Binder added.

Off-campus students may claim more expenses on Pell grants

Students residing in off-campus housing, other than with their parents, may claim an additional \$1,000 for living expenses when applying for Pell Grants for the 1985-86 academic year, Associate Financial Aid Director John Flynn said.

Also, the U.S. House Committee on Education and Labor approved a bill to boost the allowance \$500 for the 1984-85 school year.

Marilyn McAdams, spokesman for the House Subcommittee on Post-secondary Education, said the actions are "catch-up measures," since the

current \$1,100 living allowance had not been increased since 1972, when the Pell Grant program first began.

Currently, Flynn said several costs are taken into consideration for off-campus students applying for the federal grant.

The expenses include tuition and fees, \$1,100 for living expenses and \$400 for miscellaneous expenses, he said. The allowances for students living on campus are identical to off-campus students with the \$1,000 substituted with residence hall expenses.

True Value construction will double store's size

Ground-breaking ceremonies Friday for a new True Value Hardware Store in the Wilb Walker Shopping Center will be the first step in the store's construction.

True Value Assistant Manager Jerry Cole said Tuesday that the hardware store will be expanding its area and inventory with the new store.

The new store will be about 11,000 square feet, while the current store is only 5,500 square feet, Cole said.

"We will also be expanding our inventory of hardware, plumbing and electrical supplies," he said.

Even though the store is moving, it will still be located in the Wilb Walker Shopping Center, he added.

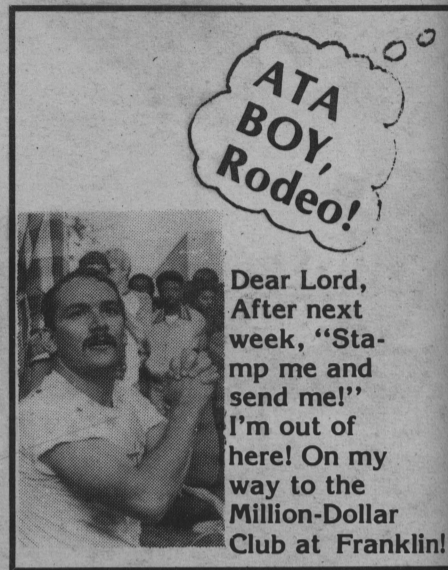
The new store will be located north of the Ben Franklin Discount Store, he said.

McQueen Construction Co. of Oakland will be doing the work, Cole said. He added that he hopes the project will be completed by Thanksgiving.

Cole said the current store space will be used by the Wilb Walker Supermarket for expansion.

However, Wilb Walker Manager Joe Ethridge said there are no "firm" plans for the expansion into the space currently occupied by True Value.

Tom Micheal, Charleston Building Codes and Zoning commissioner, said the ground-breaking ceremony will begin at 10 a.m. Friday at the construction site.

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Local AFL-CIO protests at Wal-Mart site

The construction of Charleston's Wal-Mart began Monday with the objections of local construction workers.

Members of the AFL-CIO affiliate labor local 171 are quietly protesting the construction of the new department store because the workers for the project are from out of town, local 171 Business Manager Bill Richey said Tuesday.

Members of the local stood near the construction site at the corner of the east entrance to the Eisner-Osco shopping center wearing signs of protest.

The sign states, "Notice to Public: Bland Const. does not employ members of Labor Local #171. Employees of other employers are requested not to refrain from work."

The general contractor for the job is Col Con Corp. of Sullivan.

Richey said, "We just want people to know what is going on. The workers now come from Pana and Sullivan."

Local 171 member Glenn Logan said he did not think it was fair for a local job to be done by out-of-town workers.

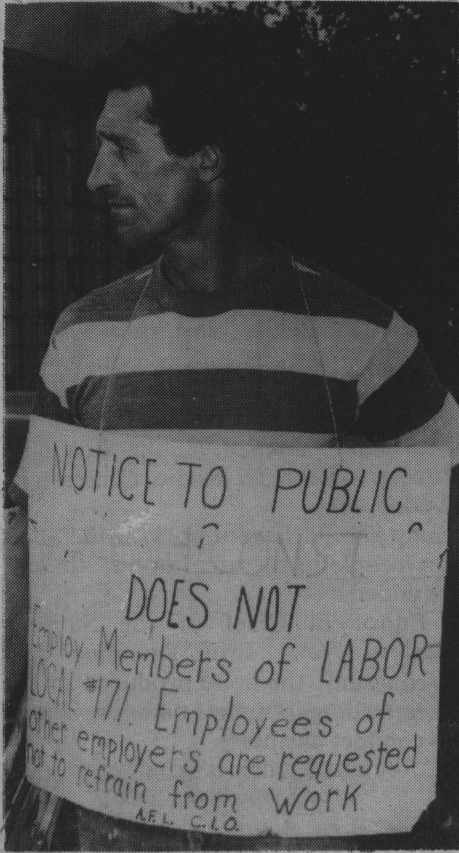
Richey said, "We just want jobs for our people."

Bill Burich, job superintendent for the Wal-Mart project, said although Col Con is the general contractor for the project, there will be many subcontractors for the job.

"We'll have other people coming in to lay the tile and do some other things, but we'll be here the whole time supervising things and doing some of our own work," he said.

Burich said the protest is nothing new for his workers.

"It's just a sign of the times. This happens to us on most of the projects we do," he said. He added that about six people are working on the project

but as many as 20-30 people will be working on the project soon.

"The pickets are just a part of our job. It's their legal right to picket," Burich said.

"They don't bother us, so we just come in and do our job. We are not going to change our plans because of the picket," he added.

Burich said cited reasons why Col Con Corp. was employed to construct

the new Wal-Mart.

"This is our sixth Wal-Mart project. I guess you could say we are Wal-Mart specialists," he said.

Col Con constructed the Mattoon Wal-Mart and recently completed a Wal-Mart in Muskatlen, Ky. They are currently working on other Wal-Mart stores in Booneville, Ind. and Marshalltown, Iowa, Burich said.

Another reason for Col Con handling the project is because the corporation uses non-unionized labor.

"Wal-Mart is a non-union company, so they use non-union labor for their construction jobs," he said.

The foundation work is being done now, he said. The foundation work began Monday, but the work on the site began two weeks ago, he added.

Concrete work on the project will begin in two to three weeks, Burich said.

John Young, Wal-Mart developer, was unavailable for comment this week.

Tom Michael, Charleston Building Codes and Zoning commissioner, said the Wal-Mart should be completed by the first of the year.

The money for the project was raised through \$1.81 million of industrial revenue bonds. The Charleston City Council approved the issuing of the bonds on May 17.

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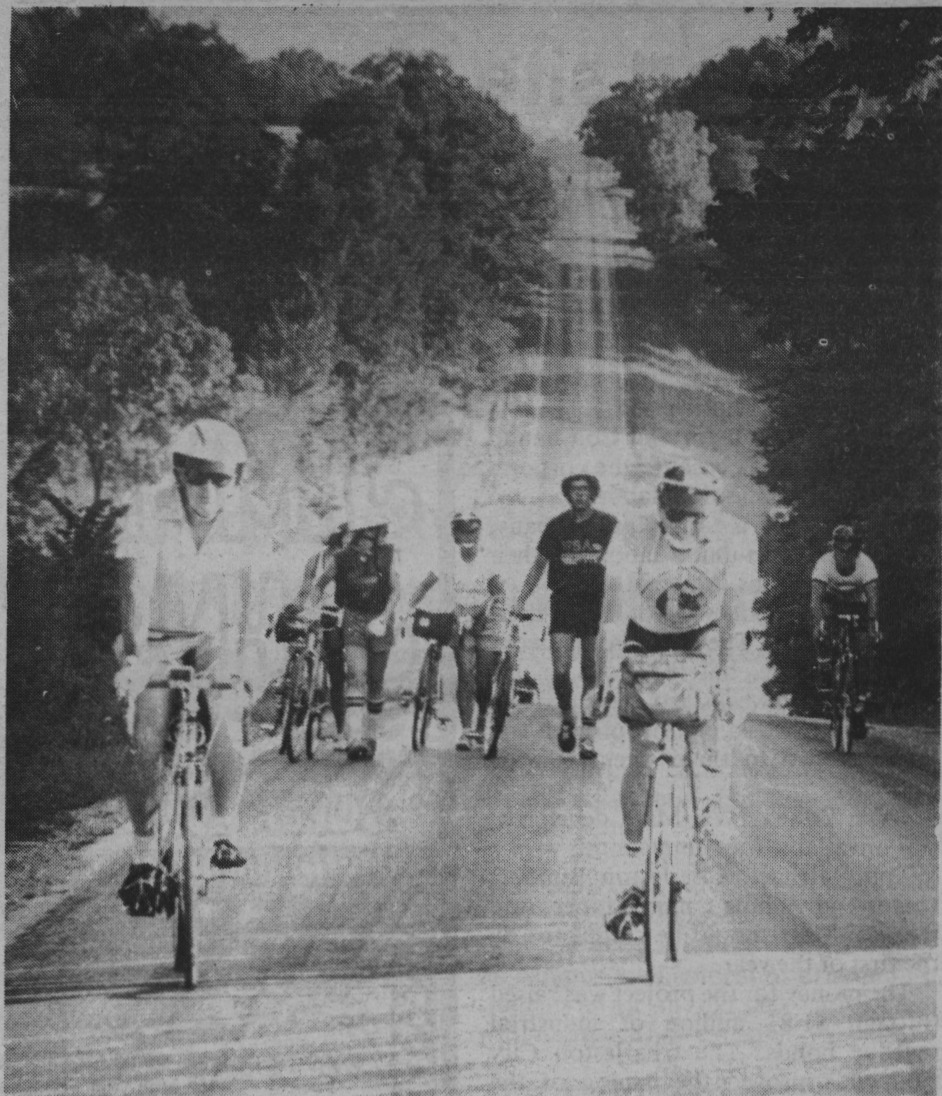

Council raises parking fines, increases reserved space rates

The Charleston City Council Tuesday unanimously approved two ordinances relating to the city's parking system.

One of the ordinances raised the fines for city parking violations. Currently the minimum fine is \$1.

The minimum fine has been raised to \$3. If a violator does not pay the fine within 48 hours the fine will be \$4. Fines not paid within 96 hours will be \$5. Any fine left unpaid after four days will be \$10.

The other ordinance raised the rent for all of the city's reserved parking spaces to \$10 a month. Spaces were previously \$6, \$8 and \$10.

Both ordinances will go into effect Sept. 1.

In addition, Mayor Clancy Pfeiffer announced that the city has delayed action on revoking the Liberty Cable Television franchise. Pfeiffer said the franchise has been sold to Telecommunications, Inc., which promises to correct any problems.

In other business, the council sent two ordinances relating to Plan Unit Development work by local contractor Steve Drake back to the Board of Zoning Appeals and Planning for further review.

Commissioner John Beusch presented information from an examination that had been done on the plans by Robert Tesk Associates in Evanston.

At their last meeting, the council agreed to have the plans examined by a professional firm to insure that the plans were within regulations. At Tuesday's meeting, Beusch said the job was normally done by the city planner.

Beusch said he contacted the firm before the meeting to obtain some specifics to present to the council.

"There are some rather major considerations that need adjusting before

this is approved," he said.

The report stated there were eight technical and administrative problems, 10 "serious plan considerations" and three legal considerations, he added.

Beusch said the council should be cautious in considering approval of the subdivision so a mistake is not made. He said the city is still paying for improvements to bring Stoner Estates up to zoning standards.

Beusch added he believes waiting to take action on the project would help protect Drake in case problems arose later.

"We don't want to find out later that you're (Drake) not in compliance (with zoning regulations). If we do, it will be more expensive for you then," he said.

Mayor Clancy Pfeiffer told Drake, "There is something wrong here. I think you might have just been misled."

"It may be better to correct it now. The adjoining property has caused the city heartache so we need to do this one right," he added.

Beusch said, "We are not going to run this city in an unprofessional manner."

Commissioner Wayne Lanman said the BZAP should meet as quickly as possible to correct the situation.

Stoner Estates resident Vince Gutowski said all of the residents in the subdivision, which adjoins the Drake property, are opposed to the development.

The council approved returning the preliminary plan back to BZAP, but Commissioner Olga Durham voted against returning the final plan.

"The second one is a starting stage of seven lots. There is no conflict in the character of the zoning, so I think he (Drake) should be allowed to get started," she said.

Cheerleading campers disrupt media production

A cheerleading camp utilizing the Buzzard gymnasium has been disrupting operations at two Eastern media centers this week.

The volume of sound created by the Dynamic Cheerleading camp has disrupted production at Eastern's Radio-TV Center and the *Summer Eastern News*, officials of both operations said.

"When we are in production we need sound control," John Beabout, director of the TV-Radio Center said Wednesday.

The camp should have more consideration for people in the area around them," he added.

Editor in Chief of the *Summer Eastern News* Erin Donohue said Wednesday, the noise produced by the cheerleading camp has made it difficult to conduct business.

"We are a business, like any other

business on campus," Donohue said. "No one would expect an office in Old Main to try to conduct business with this noise level, and we shouldn't be expected to either."

Director of Camps and Conferences John Beusch said a "lack of communication" on the part of the Dynamic Cheerleaders is the reason they are practicing in the gym.

The officials with the camp did not communicate they wanted the facility at all times, Beusch said.

Dorothy Hart, assistant dean of health, recreation and physical education, said she was informed the gym would be used only in case of rain and then only between noon and 7 p.m.

Beusch said he did not inform the office of recreation that the camp would be occupying the gym, from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily, because there were no groups scheduled to use the gym this week.

Cook takes additional director job

Don Cook, director of student activities, will be "laterally transferred" from his position to director of arrangements, Union Area Head Bill Clark said Wednesday.

Cook will serve as the director of both areas until a new director of student activities is selected, Clark said.

Union officials have been seeking a new director of arrangements since October 1982 when former Director of Arrangements Dale Tuttle resigned to

take a position at Marquette University in Wisconsin, Clark said.

"In the past two weeks three individuals were interviewed for the position," Clark said. "Two turned the position down, and the third was not acceptable."

The director of arrangements role is to supervise non-academic scheduling and the maintenance of the Union.

A search committee to find a new director of student activities has been formed, he said.

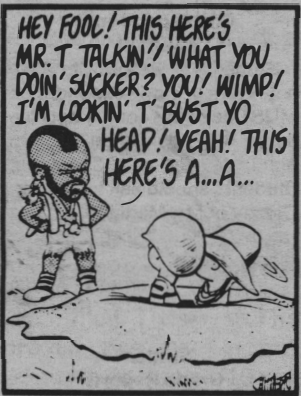

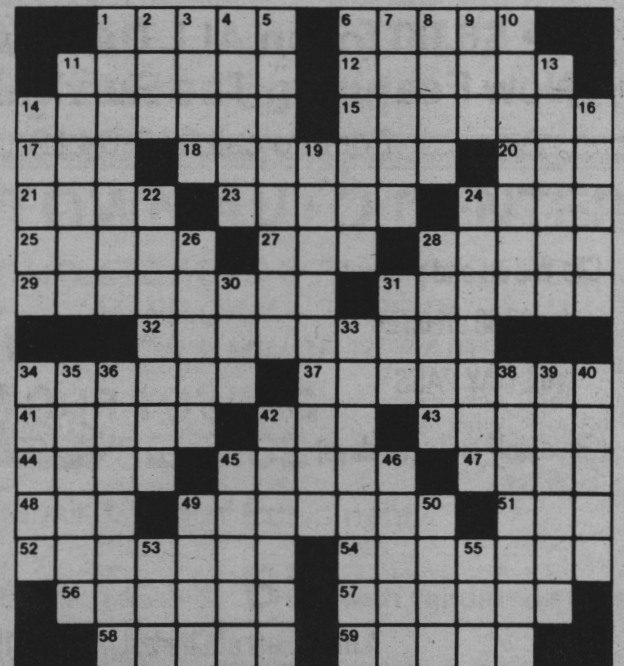

Ralston replaces Gruber as head volleyball coach

Betty Ralston has been hired as Eastern's new head volleyball coach, Athletic Director R.C. Johnson said recently.

Ralston replaces Carol Gruber, who left Eastern to pursue a doctorate degree in sports psychology.

Ralston said she is looking forward to coaching her first Division I team.

"I'm very happy to be given the chance to coach at the Division I level," Ralston said. "I'm also very anxious to meet the team and get things started."

"It will be nice to have some control over the program and know who my players are before the first day of practice," Ralston said. "When I was coaching at Division III, I didn't know who was playing on the team until the first day of practice."

Ralston will inherit a team that finished with a 36-14 record last year under Gruber.

"I know the team did well, but I have not seen any of the players, so I have no idea what I'm inheriting," Ralston said. "But I'd like to think

that we will be able to repeat last year's performance."

Ralston is no newcomer to the game of volleyball. She held several coaching positions before coming to Eastern.

Ralston was the head volleyball and softball coach at University of Wisconsin-Osh Kosh for two years prior to coming to Eastern.

In addition, Ralston was the head volleyball coach at State University of New York-Plattsburgh from 1979 to 1981.

During her two seasons at Wisconsin, Ralston led her squad to the Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championship in 1982 and was named the leagues 'Coach of the Year'.

Ralston was the volleyball coach at Mount Assumption Institute in Pittsburgh from 1976 to 1981, where she led her team to the league and sectional championships five consecutive years.

In addition, Ralston participated in a volleyball clinic in Russia in 1978.

Ralston was also the head volleyball coach for the women's open division at New York's 1979 Empire State Games.

New wrestling coach hired

Ralph McCausland has been named Eastern's new head wrestling coach, Eastern's Athletic Director R.C. Johnson said recently.

McCausland, who could not be reached for comment Wednesday, was an All-American wrestler for Eastern in the late 1970's. While at Eastern he earned three letters and won the NCAA Division II national championship for the 142 weight class in 1978.

McCausland finished the 1978 season with a 30-5 record.

As a sophomore at Eastern, McCausland was sixth in the nation. As a

senior, he placed fourth in the nation in Division II.

McCausland finished his career at Eastern with a life-time record of 98-25-2, making him No. 7 on the Panther's all-time victory list.

In addition, McCausland represented the United States on a NCAA Division II all-star team competing in Mexico.

McCausland was an assistant coach at Wheaton Central High School and Downers Grove North High School prior to his appointment at Eastern.

Steriotti is a 5-foot-11, 170 pound infielder who hit .349 for Joliet Catholic last season.

"Rick is an excellent glove man who is capable of playing second, short or third base. He's got a lot of baseball savvy," McDevitt said.

Goodhue, who is 6-foot-1 and 185 pounds, is the only pitcher McDevitt has recruited for next season.

Goodhue is also capable of playing infield or the outfield, McDevitt said.

"His real potential is pitching," McDevitt said. "He can throw the ball in the mid-80's and has good control."

Goodhue is a three-time all-area choice. He had an earned run average of 1.24 last season and struck out 81 batters.

Tim Parker and Terry McDevitt, coach McDevitt's son, are the two

junior college transfers recruited for next season. Both transferred in from Lake Land Community College.

Parker, a 5-foot-nine, 165 pound outfielder batted .336 for Lake Land last season with 11 doubles, seven homeruns and 33 runs batted in.

"Tim's a good left-handed hitting outfielder with decent speed, McDevitt said. "He's got some power for his size and is capable of hitting the ball out of the park."

Terry McDevitt, a 5-foot-9 160 pound infielder, played just one year at Lake Land and will have three years of eligibility at Eastern.

McDevitt batted .370 with 10 doubles and 36 rbi's to earn him All-Area honors last season.

"Terry has good hands and a good bat and we're hoping he can fill a gap in our infield," McDevitt said.
