Senate execs oppose tuition hike

Two executive members of Student Government say they are against a proposed tuition increase for the 1994-95 academic year, and they want to send this message to the Board of Governors.

Senate Speaker Bobby Smith and Matt Giordano, Student Government chief of staff, have authored a resolu-

tion opposing the increase, saying it is not something Eastern students want.

"Our resolution says basically that we don't support any sort of tuition increase until we see some increases in services for students," Giordano said.

"The BOG hasn't given any indication that an increase in tuition would increase the amount of services it provides for students," he added. "And it hasn't served students in the past."

At a Sept. 23 BOG meeting, Chancellor Tom Layzell said he may propose a 5.5 percent tuition increase for the 1994-95 year. Layzell will not make a formal proposal until the Illinois Board of Higher Education's budget recommendations for BOG schools are released in December.

Eastern students currently pay \$1,848 in tuition per semester. If the 5.5 percent increase is approved, students would pay \$203 more in tuition

for the entire 1994-95 year.

Giordano said the BOG has not given any reasoning for the proposed increase. He said it has no real need for additional money and should be making cuts within its own organization before it asks students for any more money.

"We just had a tuition increase two

Mayor refuses street closure

Plans for an Eastern fraternity to hold its traditional fall fund-raiser were scrapped last month when Mayor Dan Cougill refused to approve a street closing request.

Members of Delta Tau Delta canceled their annual Big Wheel Race after Cougill declined to bring their request before the City Council. Cougill told organizers he didn't support closing a major street for the event and questioned the necessity of alcohol sales there.

Todd Berner, organizer of the event, said the fraternity will not be hosting the race ever again because the mayor and the fraternity could not come to agreement on where this year's race would be held.

The fraternity wanted to host the event on a hill in front of My Place Lounge on Seventh Street - the same

Moscow violence worst in years

MOSCOW (AP) - Thousands of anti-government protesters armed with rocks, clubs and machine guns smashed through troops besieging parliament Sunday, and sent police fleeing in battles across Moscow. It was the worst political violence in Moscow since the 1917 Bolshevik Revolution.

Authorities said at least 24 civilians and soldiers were reported killed, and

as many 100 were injured.

A column of 40 armored vehicles loyal to President Boris Yeltsin rolled into central Moscow early Monday, taking up positions outside the Kremlin and Defense Ministry. It was the army's first major show of force during the nearly 2-week-old crisis between the government and hard-line lawmakers barricaded in parliament.

Yeltsin, rushing back to the Kremlin by helicopter from his country home, declared a state of emergency. That gave police and troops wide power to crack down on the protesters, an odd mix of communists, fascists and extreme nationalists united by their opposition to Yeltsin.

Chicagoans 4 times more likely to be victims

CHICAGO (AP) - Chicagoans were four times more likely to be victims of violent crime last year than the average American, an analysis of new FBI statistics reveals.

The city's rate of violent crime eased slightly in 1992, compared with the year before, but the rate was still more than 50 percent higher than in 1985. It also was nine times higher than in the six surrounding suburban counties, according to a Chicago Tribune analysis in Sunday editions.

Chicago Police Superintendent Matt Rodriguez blamed the city's high level of

violence on the widespread sales of crack cocaine since 1988 and on warfare among

gangs over control of those sales.

"The natural occurrence in

the illicit market is that the most vicious, most criminal, the most well-armed and most ruthless succeed," he said.

The violent crime rate - 30.3 crimes per 1,000 residents - made Chicago the fourth most violent large city in the nation.

Atlanta was the most dangerous, with a violent crime rate of 40.2 per 1,000 residents, followed by Miami, with a 38.9 rate, and St. Louis, where the rate was 33.4.

First Lady reports on health care issue

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hillary Rodham Clinton's soothing testimony about health reform didn't lay to rest all the concerns of lawmakers about whether the White House prescription will really cure America's health problems.

Doubts persist about whether President Clinton will be able to deliver on his promise of big savings and expensive new health benefits for the young and old.

"We learned she's one helluva witness," said Rep. Pete Stark, D-Calif.,

the chairman of the Ways and Means health subcommittee.

"The president's goals are marvelous. But there's a long way between where this country is today and universal access and coverage." Many Republicans fear that the White House blueprint would only make matters worse in a country with 15 percent of its population uninsured despite spending \$900 billion a year on health care.

They question whether Clinton will really be able to find enough savings to

pay for such promises as prescription drugs for the elderly and an 80 percent government subsidy to provide fully health coverage for early retirees at age 55.

"What a bonanza!" Sen. John Chafee, R-R.I., told Mrs. Clinton at the Senate Finance Committee.

Mrs. Clinton assured him it would cost just \$4.5 billion and put American corporations now saddled with steep health bills for superannuated workers in a better position to compete against the Japanese and other rivals

overseas.

There have been other estimates that it might cost \$10 billion.

And a skeptical Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole of Kansas told the American Medical Association, "We get estimates as high as \$80 billion" for the cost of covering early retirees. How can the nation afford it, he asked.

Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., the chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, questioned whether the Clinton numbers could pass "a reality check."

years ago and we haven't seen any noticeable improvements since it went into effect," Giordano said. "The BOG doesn't support us and we shouldn't support it."

Giordano lobbied in Springfield to eliminate the BOG during the 1992-93

academic year.

Giordano said if the BOG needs additional money, it should begin by cutting its staff and operational costs.

"The BOG is operating out of 10 suites in the Hilton Hotel in Springfield, and it's costing us ridiculous amounts of money," Giordano said. "(Layzell) has more

associate chancellors than he really needs ... and the BOG just added more lobbyists last year, despite the fact that the BOG's lobbying efforts don't amount to crap and get next to no respect in Springfield.

"So far, (it) hasn't made any effort to make any cuts in spending," Giordano said.

The resolution will be submitted to the Student Senate at its regular Wednesday night meeting for approval.

If it is approved, it will be sent directly to the BOG and Layzell.

"I'm not sure how much effect it will have on the proceedings there, but at least they will know how we feel,"

Giordano said.

The resolution was originally scheduled to be presented to the senate last Wednesday, but was not as the discussion between the senate and Charleston Mayor Dan Cougill ran too long.

Smith was unavailable for comment Sunday night.

location for the event in the last two years.

Cougill wanted the event on Harrison Avenue near the Charleston High School football practice field.

Six to seven weeks ago, Berner said, he called Cougill to discuss the drafting of a resolution to authorize a street closing for the race. If approved by the City Council, it would have required the city to close streets around Seventh Street that would affect the race site.

In the past, street closing requests for most civic events, including the Big Wheel Race, have been routinely passed by the City Council, often in its "consent agenda," a catch-all portion of the meeting's list of topics to be covered.

The "consent agenda," which is

rarely debated, usually contains items such as city bills, meeting minutes and monthly budget reports.

According to Cougill, during that phone conversation, he told Berner it would be illogical to close a major city street for such a small event.

"My immediate concern with closing Seventh Street is that doing so impacts all the businesses in the uptown area," Cougill told The Daily Eastern News last week.

Berner said the mayor never told him anything about the event congesting city streets and instead gave the impression his reason for turning down the Seventh Street site was alcohol-related.

"Once he said 'no', it was sort of implied why he said it," Berner said. "I just knew why."

After denying the proposed site, Cougill suggested the Harrison

Avenue location to Berner.

Cougill told the News the Harrison Avenue site would have been perfect for the race because it was away from heavy traffic and would provide racers with a good-sized hill and parking.

Berner said without a tavern near the Harrison hill, it would be impossible for the fraternity to find someone to sell beer. He said the mayor knew that when he proposed the Harrison Avenue site.

"I told him we couldn't have an alternate site because we can't afford it financially," Berner said. "We need to sell alcohol."

"(Cougill) then said he did not want to have events (in Charleston) where the main attraction was alcohol."

The mayor said he did not scheme up a way to discourage the fraternity

from selling alcohol by giving them an alternate site. He said he didn't know the sale of alcohol was required until Berner told him.

Berner said he was confused by Cougill's lack of support for the Seventh Street location because the fraternity gave all the proceeds of the event to the city.

City records indicate the Parks and Recreation Department did receive \$600 from the fraternity for last year's race.

Though the mayor insists his decision to provide the fraternity with an alternate site was strictly for traffic concerns, he said he personally does not like the idea of the city getting money from events that serve alcohol.

"If I tell young people drinking is bad, then I'm being hypocritical buying swings and slides with alcohol money," Cougill said.

Thousands of unarmed Yeltsin supporters took to the streets to support the president, who dissolved parliament Sept. 21 in an effort to end his long power struggles with the Soviet-era parliament bent on hobbling his

reforms.

The anti-government protesters struck suddenly and fiercely Sunday, beating young riot police in vicious street fighting and seizing Moscow's headquarters of city government.

They attacked the country's main television complex

with rocket-propelled grenades. Government paratroopers in armored personnel carriers sprayed them with machine-gun fire. Three TV channels went off the air, and fighting raged Monday morning.

At least 20 civilians were killed and more than 100

were injured, excluding casualties from the broadcast station, said Igor Nadezhdin, an official with Moscow's main medical authority. In addition, fighting killed four soldiers and injured dozens, city officials said without elaboration. Exact figures were impossible to gather.

The Interfax news agency reported eight people were killed in fighting at the TV complex, but there was no immediate confirmation.

Hard-line lawmakers urged their triumphant followers to seize other installations and take control of the government.

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Indian army cracks down on post-quake looting

KILLARI, India (AP) - The Indian army cracked down on looting in the country's earthquake-stricken southwest on Sunday, taking control of police and civilian authorities and blocking outsiders from shattered villages.

Tremors continued to shudder through Maharashtra state, where as many as 30,000 people died in Thursday's earthquake.

In the days following the disaster, looters have slipped into villages in the guise of volunteers, stripping corpses of jewelry and wrecked homes of any valuables that could be carried away, relief workers said.

"I'm not allowing anyone today to work in the villages unless they are cleared by the army," said Col. S.K. Joshi, head of the relief effort for Killari and four surrounding villages. "We are allowing only genuine voluntary groups in. They are being issued identification cards to avoid the thieving which has been going on the last two days."

The army barricades brought more hardship to victims driven from their homes by the earthquake.

"I do not understand these men in uni-

forms. They won't even let me into my own house," said Jagannath Kumble, a 65-year-old farmer who was stopped from entering his village.

Helicopters dropped food in isolated villages, and medical teams began a massive operation to inoculate survivors against cholera.

Officials fear the disease may spread through water contaminated by the putrefying bodies of people and livestock.

Authorities decided to set up new townships for survivors, abandoning many devastated villages. New sites will be found within two weeks, said Anil Pawar, a local administrator.

Dozens of volunteer groups have arrived in Maharashtra state, bringing food, drinking water and temporary shelters to earthquake victims. But many remote villages off the main roads remain without aid, Army vehicles, private relief workers as tens of thousands of curiosity seekers jammed the region's roads. The heavy traffic combined with a steady rain to churn muddy streets into slippery slush.

Students, staff pleased with residence hall condom sales

Both students and university officials seem pleased with the sale of condoms in residence-hall vending machines.

Mark Shaklee, associate director of student housing, said that the only complaint he has received came from a student who had a moral problem with the university selling condoms.

He said faculty and staff have not expressed any problems or concerns with the sales other than keeping the machines stocked.

The sales, which were planned during the spring semester by Eastern's administration, drew some questions from students and faculty regarding whether the university should provide condoms in residence halls.

Kris Potrafka, president of the Residence Hall Association, said he has not seen

any problems develop in the program as of yet.

"(Eastern's RHA staff) seems pretty happy with the decision," Potrafka said. "The only concern we had was that the program didn't really include anything for off-campus students."

A major complaint from students living in residence halls is that, at different times during the week, the vending machines will be sold out of condoms.

"I knew they were sold in the machines, but every time I've been at one, they were completely out," said Keith Anderson, a junior industrial technology major who lives in Douglas Hall.

Freshman Jim Peterocelli, who lives in Carman Hall, said, "Every time I've looked in the machine, there weren't any (condoms) in there, so they either sell really fast or they're not putting any in there."

According to one student,

the early part of the week seems to be the time when condoms in the vending machines are the most scarce.

"I've noticed that after every weekend they were completely empty," said Nancy Craig, a junior psychology major.

Mathematics Professor Peter Andrews said, "I don't have a problem with it because I don't think it's going to influence student behavior one way or the other."

Shaklee said he has not heard of any problems regarding the supply keeping up with the demand.

CaterVend Inc. of Mattoon, the company that installs and stocks the vending machines, makes stops to residence hall machines two to three times a week, Shaklee said.

"(CaterVend) doesn't stock the condoms any differently than anything else," he said.

Being honest would help Cougill out

During the 1993 mayoral campaign, Dan Cougill ran on a platform of tough regulation of the bar-entry age while promising to work with the university to provide bar alternatives to students.

Now after his election, Cougill claims to have never said this. On Wednesday, he told the Student Senate that what he actually said was he would not change the bar-entry age until there were alternatives.

Cougill is speaking in half truths. Until he begins to be completely honest, both the students and the city will suffer.

On March 18, Cougill went before the Student Senate and said that he would work with the university to create alternatives, adding he considered many of the events at the university unattractive to students.

Cougill also said at the senate meeting that if the alternative events are eventually successful, he may consider raising the bar-entry age.

Then on April 13, Cougill told more than 100 area residents at a candidate forum at Charleston High School that the city needs more alternatives such as juice bars, coffee houses, comedy clubs and other non-alcoholic activities.

Cougill emphatically told the audience "I will not, not, not change the bar-entry age."

The mayor has done the same double-talking with his plans to eliminate quarter and nickel beer nights. After making statements that blatantly violated the Sherman Anti-trust Act, he said that he never intended to violate the law.

All Cougill has done since taking office is work on restrictions to drinking and he has spent little time on finding alternatives to the tavern scene. Even the new liquor task force has focused more on restrictions than alternatives.

Possibly Cougill has realized that creating alternatives is tougher than he thought and has opted to travel the easy road and duck one of his campaign promises. If this is the case, it is a bad decision.

The students at Eastern want nothing handed to them, Mayor Cougill. They only want what you promised - alternatives.

New Union rules slight black groups

The rule, under the heading of "Facility Usage Guidelines," states "canes, open flame or flammable materials" and other "potentially dangerous objects" are not allowed at dance events.

For some traditionally black fraternities and sororities, the canes are trademarks. They are comparable to sweatshirts with the group's greek letters.

Enacting a ban on canes is like telling white fraternities and sororities they can't wear sweatshirts at functions.

While canes can be dangerous weapons and sweatshirts can't, Eastern's dances have been for the most part free from violence. Enacting a ban at Northern Illinois or Southern Illinois at Carbondale where fights have occurred regularly is intelligent, but to do it at Eastern is baseless.

There are other rules that alienate the black community. One rule forbids people from playing over-loud music and chanting. Chanting is also a trademark used by black greeks.

Another rule requires advisers of the groups to attend the functions, but many of the advisers live in places such as Chicago and Springfield.

Oftentimes campus officials wonder why black students feel slighted by the school. But maybe if the university would have consulted the BGC before revising the rules, maybe there would be a change in feelings.

But judging from the community and the university's new policies, one would have to wonder why African-Americans even come here.

Minority affairs office services many

The director of Eastern's minority affairs says she wants her office's title changed from the Office of Minority Student Affairs to the Office of Minority Affairs because students are not the only individuals serviced by the office.

"It is a misnomer to have the word student in our title," said Johnetta Jones. "Changing the title would more accurately reflect what goes on here. We not only deal with minority student concerns, but also with faculty."

A change in the name of the office is not the only item on Jones' agenda. She says in or-

der for the office to run more efficiently and better serve the campus, it needs more staff and funding.

The idea to expand the office is outlined in the President Council's articulated plan, although a similar plan was outlined by the minority task force three years ago. The plan calls for the office's expansion in an effort to recruit and better serve minority students' needs at Eastern.

"What they are thinking about, I don't know," Jones said of the President Council's plan, which is being studied by President David Jorns' review committee. "All I am sure of is that part of the

strategic plan is to change the name from the Office of Minority Student Affairs to the Office of Minority Affairs."

If the expansion does occur, Jones said it would benefit Eastern's minority students and faculty in a number of ways.

Jones said she has several ideas she would like to see implemented if the expansion allows her office more staff, time and money.

There is one plan, called the triad system that Jones said has to be implemented in hopes of creating a better retention rate of minority faculty member, whom Jones said rarely feel comfortable when they begin at Eastern.

Implementing the triad system is something we just have to do," Jones said.

The triad system places them with two other faculty members who help them learn the "rules and (regulations)." One of the faculty members help the newcomer get acquainted socially and the other helps them get acquainted professionally.

"If you can accomplish better retention of minority faculty, it will help in the recruitment and retention of minority students," Jones said. "If you have positive role models on campus it makes a difference because it sends a silent but very loud signal that says that 'Hey, I am accepted.'"

Lou Hencken, vice president for student affairs, said most schools were in attendance at last year's ceremony. There were six nominees last year.

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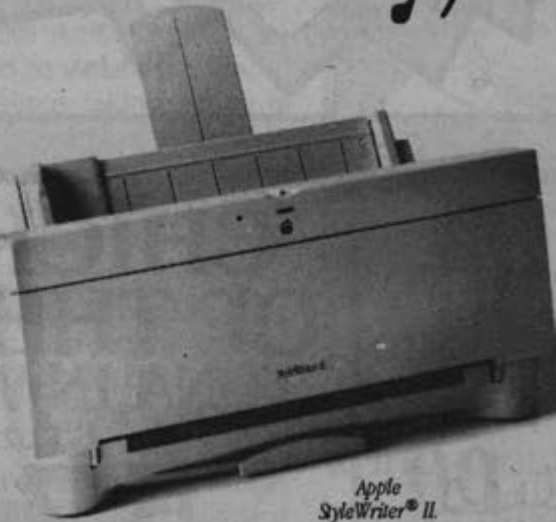
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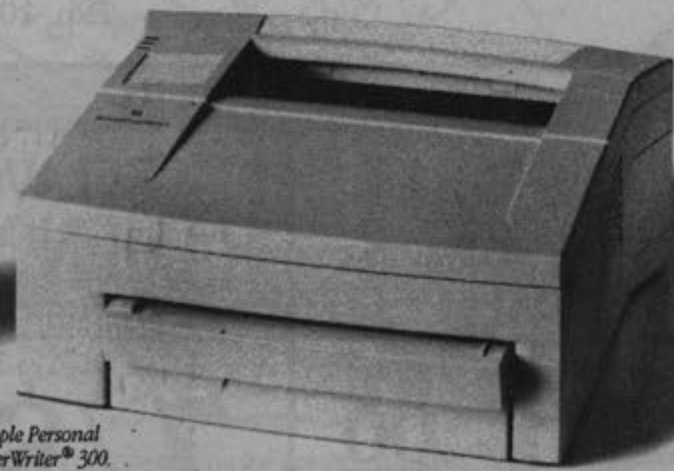
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Cable controversy ups antenna sales

WASHINGTON (AP) - The TV antenna business is booming as television viewers across the country prepare for the possible dumping of broadcast programming from local cable channels.

The new cable law says no cable company can carry a broadcast signal for free without the broadcaster's consent. The cable companies must decide by Wednesday whether to compensate the local broadcast stations or drop them.

Broadcasters and cable officials alike predict that the deadline will pass without any disruption in service.

But many consumers aren't taking any chances.

Neil Terk, president of Terk Technologies in Plainview,

N.Y., says business has grown 300 percent in the last four weeks for his advanced-technology indoor antenna.

David Christopher, executive vice president of Radio Shack, the nation's largest supplier of antennas, says his sales are up, too.

"We attribute a fair portion of that to the concern in the marketplace right now as to whether people will be able to get their favorite TV shows," he said.

While the affiliates have insisted most consumers subscribe to cable simply to improve broadcast reception, some cable companies are willing to test that contention by cutting the local stations free rather than compensate them.

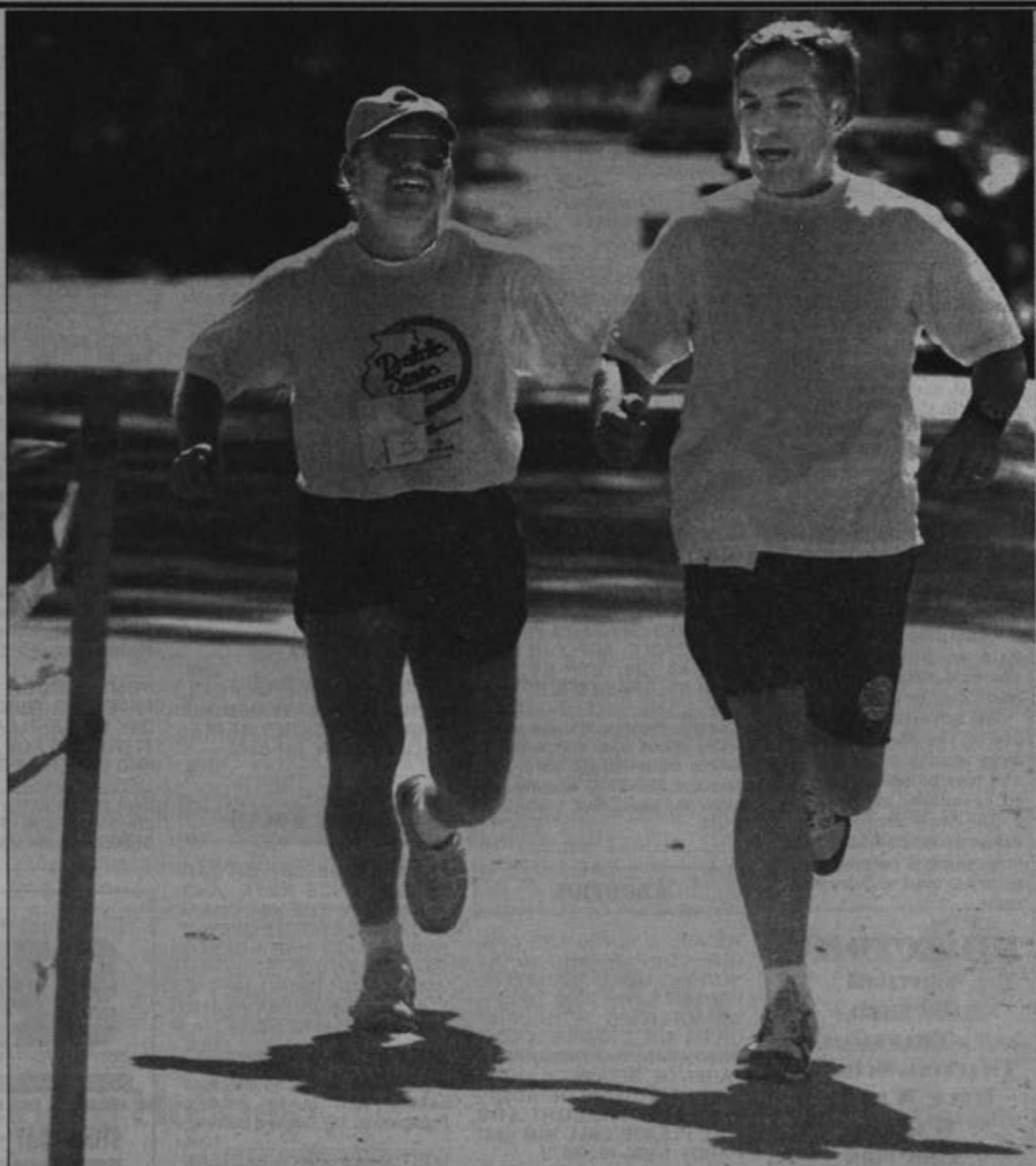
BGC to discuss new Union dance policy

The Union regulations were revised July 23, but the BGC and Black Student Union did not receive the proposed changes until last Monday.

Among the grievances BGC members said they will bring up at the meeting, include the policy that states the dance supervisor is responsible for locking all main entrances to the Union at midnight, at which time admittance to the building is prohibited.

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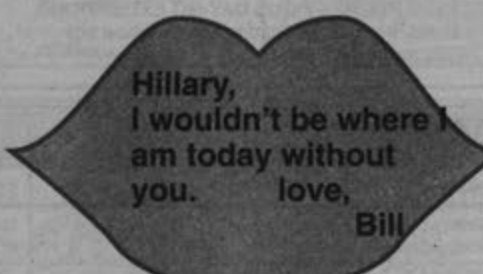
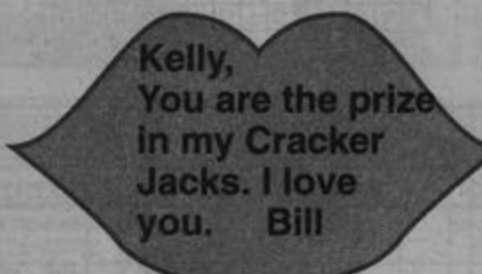

ATLANTA (AP) - After winning game No. 104, the Braves waited and watched. And, finally, on the last day of the best pennant race in years, the San Francisco Giants cracked.

The Braves won their third straight NL West title Sunday - but it didn't happen until three hours after their 5-3 victory over the Colorado Rockies.

With players watching on a big-screen television in the trainers' room, and about 8,000 fans watching on the scoreboard television in Atlanta Fulton-County Stadium, the title finally came when the Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Giants 12-1 a continent away.

Only then, after a marathon stretch drive that baseball will never forget, did the party finally began.

"Three in a row is great," manager Bobby Cox said in the midst of a boisterous

champagne celebration. "This was the toughest one."

We had to win so many games, it was unbelievable." Atlanta and San Francisco began the day in a tie for first, only the second time since divisional play began in 1969 that teams were even going into the final day. But the Braves made the Giants the first team since the 1954 New York Yankees to win 103 games and finish second.

"We showed character," said David Justice, who hit his 40th homer. "They showed a lot of character, too. It's unfortunate one of us had to go home. I'm just happy it's them."

The two-time NL champions needed a remarkable comeback to win the race. The Braves, in a hitting slump throughout the first half of the season, trailed the Giants by 9 1/2 games on Aug. 8.

"I definitely feel for those guys," Ron Gant said.

"It's tough to win 103 games and not win your division," Greg Maddux said. "It's just a bad break." The July 18 acquisition of Fred McGriff helped Atlanta's offense get going, and the Braves won 39 of their final 50 games.

Dodgers 12, Giants 1

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Three minutes before the first pitch Sunday, the San Francisco Giants knew exactly what they had to do. They didn't do it.

After the Braves beat the Colorado Rockies 5-3 in Atlanta, the Giants had to defeat their long-time rival to force a one-game playoff for the NL West title. Instead, their surprising season ended with a 12-1 loss to the Los Angeles Dodgers, giving the Braves

their third straight NL West title.

"They just beat our brains out today," Giants manager Dusty Baker said. "I'm proud of our guys. I have nothing to be ashamed of and none of our guys have anything to be ashamed of."

The Giants, who finished 103-59, became the first team since the 1954 New York Yankees to win this many games and finish second. It was only the eighth time in major league history - the first since 1980 - that a team with 100 wins didn't finish first.

"We won 103 games and came up one game short," Baker said.

"We've got to tip our hat to Atlanta; they won 104 and that's their all-time record, too. I am just sorry we are in the same division."

San Francisco, which recovered from an eight-game losing streak by win-

ning 14 of 16 before Sunday, staked its hopes on Salomon Torres, a 21-year-old rookie making his eighth big-league start.

Torres (3-5) watched the Braves' victory on television, but then couldn't get through the fourth inning, allowing three runs and five hits while walking five.

"I've learned in a short period of time not to second-guess myself," Baker said on his pitching decision. "We just ran out of pitching. Everybody was running on empty."

The Dodgers, who lost the first three games of the series, counted on Kevin Gross (13-13), a 32-year-old right-hander who hasn't had a winning record since 1985. Gross pitched a six-hitter for only his third complete game this year, and Mike Piazza homered twice and drove in four runs. Former Giant Cory Snyder also homered.

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Bears kick way to 2nd win

CHICAGO (AP) - In a game befitting the Year of the Kicker in the NFL, Kevin Butler accounted for the only points with field goals of 52 and 48 yards as the Chicago Bears hung on to beat the winless Atlanta Falcons 6-0 Sunday.

Butler's 52-yarder in the third quarter matched his career high, and put the Falcons (0-5) in a position of needing a touchdown to win in the final quarter.

And, with quarterback Billy Joe Tolliver filling in for the injured Bobby Hebert, they nearly got it.

Atlanta drove to the Chicago 8-yard line in the final minute, but lost the ball on downs with 1:25 to play. In the sixth game this season won by a team that did not score a touchdown, the Bears (2-2) took over and ran out the clock.

It was the first time Atlanta had been shut out since Oct. 9, 1988, against the Los Angeles Rams and the first shutout by the

Bears since Dec. 14, 1991, against Tampa Bay.

"Offensively we have work to do," said coach Dave Wannstedt.

"The players know it and we know it. But we didn't turn the ball over and that was a key.

"On the last drive, we challenged them with (Anthony) Blaylock and (Donnell) Woolford making plays. And the pressure was there and he (Tolliver) didn't have much time."

Tolliver thought his fourth-down pass to Andre Rison was a good play to get a first down but the measurement fell inches short.

"If they marked the ball where I put it down, it would have been a first down," said Rison. "But they marked it a full yard back."

Hebert left the game after three quarters because of an elbow injury. He completed 15 of 22 passes for 139 yards and two interceptions.

rusher for quarterbacks with 1,102 yards in his career.

Hennelly, though, had a tough time airing it out, as he completed just six of 13 passes for 63 yards, including a 4-yard scoring strike to Ben Wolfe. That connection extended the Sycamores lead to 13-0, and they never relinquished the lead until the last quarter.

With his hard-nose type of play, Hennelly is now having several people raising their brows.

"I know a lot of the Eastern players while having much respect for them," said the senior standout, who battled current Panther quarterback Jeff Thorne for the starting position in 1989. "I simply wanted to earn their respect."

To say the least, the Sycamore offensive attack had all the "Wright" stuff.

Wright used his lightning quick feet along with some "shake and bake" moves to squirm past the Panther defenders.

"He (Wright) played awfully well," ISU coach Dennis Raetz said. "He was a big factor, as he has great discipline and talent. He's a great football player, and if he continues work hard, there is no telling how good he could be."

Raetz said he was extremely proud of his players' never-say-die attitude.

"We did stay in there and fight it at the end," he said. "We didn't hang it up when Eastern went ahead. But Hennelly and Wright did a great job for us. They are two kids with character."

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

while hitting .429. Freshman Vanessa Wells led the Lady Panthers with 7 kills and 14 digs.

Eastern took a 13-10 lead late in the first game, and later had Northern at game point up 14-12, but four Lady Panther errors cost them as the Huskies took the opener 16-14.

The Lady Panthers opened game two with a quick 6-0 lead, but again could not hold it. Six more Eastern errors enabled Northern to reel off 11 unanswered points to take an 11-6 lead that they would never relinquish, winning 15-10.

The Huskies bolted out to a 11-0 lead in the third game and never looked back, ending the three-game match with a 15-1 blow-out victory.

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Sycamores hold off Panthers

Panthers' comeback stalls in 27-24 loss

TERRE HAUTE, Ind. — If Indiana State quarterback Kip Hennelly was looking for final revenge against Eastern Illinois Saturday, he got it.

After Eastern's Willie High scored on a 15-yard run with 2:13 remaining in the game to put the Panthers up 24-21, Hennelly engineered a Sycamore comeback and finished it off with an 11-yard touchdown scramble.

Hennelly's touchdown proved to be the winning score as the Sycamores defeated Eastern 27-24 in a Gateway Conference game at Memorial Stadium.

"It was an unbelievable game," said Indiana State coach Dennis Raetz, whose team improved to 1-1 in Gateway action and 1-3 overall. "It had every emotion you can possibly have. We needed a win. We were fortunate to get a win."

Raetz was fortunate, because a last-minute comeback bid by the Panthers fell short.

After a squib kick by Indiana State's Tom Allison, who failed to hit on the extra point after Hennelly's touchdown, was recovered by Eastern's Curt Ringhofer at the Panther 45-yard line, Panther quarterback Jeff Thorne marched the Panthers down to the Sycamore 9-yard line, completing three of four pass attempts.

Thorne scrambled on first down and was knocked back to the 12 yard line and followed that with incomplete tosses to Bill Korosec and Melvin Jackson, which set up

a fourth down and goal from the 12 with nine seconds left in the game.

Trailing by three points, Spoo opted to go for the touchdown and the victory instead of sending in kicker Steve Largent, who earlier kicked the second-longest field goal in Memorial Stadium history — a 52-yarder, to try for the tie.

"We were thinking about going for the tie, but we thought we could get it in," Spoo said. "They had been going with inside coverage so we thought we could get the corner route."

Thorne rolled out to the right and threw to wide receiver Pete Mauch. Mauch was pushed by Indiana State cornerback Michael Wilson and the ball fell incomplete without a pass interference call.

"The referees make the calls and we have to live with them," said Mauch. "It's not my place to decide if they are right or wrong."

Spoo said, "I thought he was bumped in the endzone, but we didn't get the call."

The loss dropped Eastern to 1-4 overall and to 0-2 in Gateway play. The Panthers have now lost four games in a row for the first time since 1977 when they lost their first 10 games of the season.

"I'm sure (the loss) is tough on those guys in (the locker room), they want to win badly," said Spoo.

One of the many keys to the Panthers' loss was the way Indiana State controlled the line of scrimmage on both offense and defense for much of the game.

NOTE SPECIAL HOURS: TTRS WILL BE OPERATING SUNDAY, JANUARY 9 FROM 8:00 A.M. UNTIL 5:00 P.M. ALSO, MONDAY - FRIDAY, JAN. 10 TILL JAN. 14 AT 8 P.M., TTRS WILL OPERATE 24 HRS./DAY WITH THE POSSIBLE EXCEPTIONS OF THESE TIMES: 10 P.M. - 2 A.M.; 7 A.M. - 8 A.M.

HINTS ABOUT CALLING IN: Be sure you have the dial tone before dialing. If the line continues to ring, the system is NOT available. If all 20 lines are busy, the queue function will place up to 30 calls on hold IN ORDER OF CALLING; while you wait for a line, you will hear music of various types. If you don't wish to wait, call again later in the day. The System begins to shut down 15 minutes before closing time; so you must call in AT LEAST 15 MINUTES before the system is scheduled to close, or you will not be able to call in on the system. We recommend that you do not wait until the last minute to call in—especially on a deadline—because IF THE SYSTEM SHOULD BE DOWN, you would not be able to make your transaction.

NOTE ALSO: The deadline for DROPPING a class (during the first ten class days) and receiving NO GRADE for the class is 4:00 P.M. (See the calendar for the deadline date.) There are no evening hours for TTRS on that day.

PREREQUISITES

Check the catalog for information about prerequisites. Also be aware of these general conditions:

1. Before registering for UPPER-LEVEL (3000- and 4000-level) courses in the COLLEGE OF BUSINESS (COB), a student must be admitted to the College of Business. Shortly before classes begin, a student with 60+ s.h. NOT admitted to the COB may request these courses. See calendar.
2. ONLY HONORS STUDENTS may request honors sections of courses.
3. UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS may not register in GRADUATE-LEVEL COURSES, except that seniors may, under certain conditions—see catalog for details.

All courses which have prerequisites have been identified in the schedule bulletin with an asterisk (*). Please check the course listings in the general catalog, or consult with your adviser, to be sure you meet all prerequisites for any course in which you enroll.

ACADEMIC LOAD

When registering, please observe the credit-hour limits as specified in the University catalog under the heading "Academic Load." Exceptions to the specified limits must be in the form of an approved waiver from the dean of the appropriate college and should be presented to the Dean, Student Academic Services, 116 Old Main, PRIOR to the beginning of the term for which the exception is to be granted. Waiver requests to exceed the 15-semester-hour limit for students on Academic Warning or Academic Probation will NOT be approved.

In the event of concurrent enrollment, students are cautioned that they must include all work at Eastern plus all work in which they are enrolled at other colleges or universities in determining class load. The total semester hours must not exceed the limits allowed at Eastern. Failure to abide by this regulation will result in the denial of credit for the transfer course or courses which, when added to the Eastern academic load, violate the prescribed load limits.

LOAD LIMIT

No student may register for more than 18 semester hours unless he is eligible for an overload.

A student eligible for an overload may register for no more than 21 semester hours.

An undergraduate student with a minimum of sophomore standing may register for up to and including 21 semester hours during the fall and spring semester providing he/she has earned the following cumulative grade-point average at E.I.U.:

A senior with less than 2.50 WITH PERMISSION of the dean of the appropriate college.

A graduate student may carry no more than 16 semester hours of graduate credit.

a. Courses numbered 3000-4999 in chemistry, foreign languages, mathematics, and military science may be taken by students who have prerequisites and permission of the department chairperson.

ORAL ENGLISH PROFICIENCY

Eastern Illinois University has adopted a program of Oral English Proficiency Assessment for all instructional staff. Students who have difficulty understanding an instructor should, if possible, first consult with the instructor. In the event that the difficulties are not resolved, the student should address his/her concerns to the Chair of the department in which the instructor is teaching. Subsequent appeals may also be possible through the Dean and then to the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs.

SENIORS IN EIU GRADUATE COURSES

Seniors at EIU wishing to enroll in courses numbered 5000 through 5499 for undergraduate credit must apply for permission at the Graduate School Office prior to enrollment. To be eligible, the student must have a cumulative EIU GPA of at least 2.75. During the final semester of residence in undergraduate work, or the penultimate semester of residence in undergraduate work if the final semester is to be spent in student teaching or internship, a senior with a cumulative EIU GPA of at least 2.75 may apply for permission to take graduate level courses numbered 4750 through 5499 for reserve graduate credit. Students wishing to elect this option must apply for permission at the Graduate School Office prior to enrollment. No undergraduate may enroll in courses numbered 5500 or above. Complete regulations governing reserve graduate credit may be found in the Graduate Catalog.

INDEPENDENT STUDY AND OTHER ARRANGED COURSES

A student registering for independent study, internship, field experience, problems courses, or thesis must contact the chairperson of the department offering the course in order to obtain approval from the appropriate Dean. IN ADDITION, the student must register for the course by touch-tone telephone, making sure to request the correct section for the number of credit hours to be earned. If it is closed, the student should wait-list the class.

ARRANGED COURSES

Students registering for courses with "Arranged" meeting times should contact the appropriate Department Chair during the first week of classes regarding class meeting times.

CREDIT/NO CREDIT GRADING STATUS

See catalog for full description of Credit/No Credit option regulations.

ABBREVIATED CONDITIONS FOR CREDIT/NO CREDIT

ELIGIBILITY: Sophomores, Juniors, and Seniors.
 COURSES EXCLUDED: General Education courses, required professional education courses (including teaching methods), senior seminars, and any courses which may count toward fulfillment of the major or minor, whether required or optional, may not be taken Credit/No Credit.
 LIMIT OF COURSES: A maximum of 12 semester hours with no more than one course in any single subject title and no more than one course in any single semester or term. For purposes of these regulations, Summer Intersession and regular Summer Term are considered a single term. Courses offered on Credit/No Credit option only and one one-hour PE service course per semester or term are not counted against the 12-semester-hour limit.

AUDIT GRADING STATUS

A student wanting to audit a course (in which the student is already enrolled) must obtain an audit card in the Registration Office, complete it AND have it signed by the instructor of the class. The completed audit card must be returned to the Registration Office by the deadline. See the calendar.

REGISTRATION = ADDS

Under touch-tone, registering = adding; to register, just add the classes.
 REGULAR CLASSES may be added through the third class day; drops may be made for these classes as indicated on calendar.
 WORKSHOPS may be added until they begin; if you drop a workshop before it begins, the class will not appear on your permanent record; if you drop a workshop after it begins but before it ends, the course will show on your record with a "W."
 SECOND-HALF-TERM courses may be added until they begin; if you drop one of these classes before it begins, the class will not appear on your permanent record; if you drop after the class begins but by the deadline, it will show on your record as a "W" drop.

SCHEDULE CHANGES (ADDS/DROPS)

Try to make all changes to your schedule before classes begin. You may call back any time after you initially register to make any change to your schedule, except during the published dormant periods. (See calendar.) If your record is unclear, you will not be able to add classes; you will, however, be able to drop classes.

REQUIREMENTS FOR REGISTERING BY TOUCH-TONE TELEPHONE

1. Must be a continuing student OR admitted or re-admitted to the University.
2. Must have paid at the Cashier Office, Old Main, OR mailed in the advance deposit of \$100 for Spring—payment must be accompanied by an advance deposit coupon; OR have submitted proof to the Registration Office of a FULL-PAY scholarship (a full-pay scholarship pays ALL tuition and fees); OR, if using co-op teacher waivers (graduate students only), have contacted the Student Teaching Office; OR, if faculty or staff at E.I.U., have contacted the Registration Office.
3. Must have seen adviser (if undergraduate student), and adviser must have set indicator in computer that student has been advised.
4. Must have a clear record with the University.
5. Must complete schedule worksheet, and have acceptable alternates readily available.
6. Must use a touch-tone telephone and E.I.U. instructions to register.
7. Must terminate registration call in prescribed manner.

CANCELLATION OF SMALL CLASSES

Classes with small enrollments are subject to cancellation.

REGISTRATION OFFICE

The Registration Office is located in the south basement of McAfee. Office hours are 8:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m., Monday - Friday. The telephone number is (217) 581-3831.

ALL STUDENTS

Be sure your name appears on the official tenth-day class roster for any class you attend. If your name does not appear on the tenth-day class roster, contact the Registration Office IMMEDIATELY.

OFFICIAL NOTICES

Read the "Official Notices" in THE DAILY EASTERN NEWS for important information throughout the term.

HELPFUL HINTS

CLOSED COURSES

When seats are unavailable due to course closures, the student should use the "I nnnn#" code to locate open sections of the class before trying to build a schedule over Touch-Tone. This will save much frustration when scheduling classes.

WAIT-LISTING

SOPHOMORES and above who need 3000-level (or higher) courses that are closed should use the wait-list function. This provides a means of telling the department chairperson exactly who and how many students need the course.

Be sure to follow the schedule listed at the front of this bulletin for calling to confirm your wait-listed course. If by the last date for confirming a wait-listed class you are not actually scheduled into the class, you then have two alternatives: (1) contact the department chairperson, or (2) choose another course.

CALL NUMBERS FOR COURSE/SECTION

Check carefully that you are entering the CALL NUMBER and NOT the COURSE NUMBER when entering information on Touch-Tone. These are two different numbers.

ACADEMIC DEPARTMENT NUMBERS

When using the "N ddd#" function to find courses added after schedule was printed, use the 3-digit NUMBER—not the department alphabetical abbreviation.

INQUIRY WITHOUT REGISTERING

A student who is interested in one particular course only is encouraged to use option 2# on touch-tone to determine seat availability BEFORE PAYING THE ADVANCE DEPOSIT.

PAYMENT OF FEES

You must RETURN the FEE PORTION of your unofficial schedule form to the cashier by the due date EVEN IF IT SHOWS "\$0.00" AMOUNT DUE. If you fail to return this to the cashier, your CLASSES WILL BE SUBJECT TO CANCELLATION.

TOUCH-TONE PROBLEMS

If you have problems with a specific request code, see the detailed explanation of that function.

PERSONAL ACCESS CODE (PAC)

When you register by touch-tone phone, you will need to create your own special 4-digit code (PERSONAL ACCESS CODE). Make this a number you will easily remember, and tell no one what it is. If the need arises to CHANGE your PAC, go to the Registration Office to do so. Your PAC is your security code. You establish your PAC on the first call you make for each term. You may use the same PAC every term, or you may use a different PAC every term—just be sure you can remember what PAC you use for a given term.

ACCURACY IN CALL NUMBERS

Be very careful to register for correct call numbers because the call number determines exactly which course/section you are in and whether the course is a course which continues all term, or is a half-term course.

TO CALL IN YOUR REGISTRATION

Only a touch-tone telephone can be used to make entries. A touch-tone telephone makes a different sound after each button is pressed.

A voice prompt will guide you after each entry. EACH ENTRY IS COMPLETED BY PUSHING THE # BUTTON. YOU MUST PAY THE ADVANCE DEPOSIT BEFORE CALLING. If you are an UNDERGRADUATE, your ADVISER must SET the INDICATOR in the COMPUTER.

1. Call the system number: (217) 581-6640. If you are calling on campus, dial only the last four digits. This is NOT a toll-free number. The system will be available from Monday through Thursday from 8:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. - 10:00 p.m.; Friday from 8:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. - 8:00 p.m.; and Saturday from 8:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m.
2. After the prompt, enter the appropriate term number followed by the appropriate year and the # sign:
1 = Fall 2 = Spring 3 = Summer
Use three digits to enter this information: Spring 1994 = 294.
For Spring 1994, enter 294#.
3. Select EITHER the option to make changes to your schedule (register) OR the option to inquire about course information only.
1 # = To make changes to your schedule—add, drop, request credit/no credit, etc., or to inquire about course information.
2 # = To inquire about course information only. ANY PERSON MAY USE THIS OPTION—EVEN IF NOT ADMITTED AS A STUDENT. If you choose this option, you may use these request codes only: N ddd#; I nnnn#; L nnnn#; and T#.

A STUDENT WHO IS INTERESTED IN ONE PARTICULAR COURSE ONLY IS ENCOURAGED TO USE OPTION 2# TO DETERMINE SEAT AVAILABILITY BEFORE PAYING THE ADVANCE DEPOSIT.

IF YOU SELECT OPTION 1# ABOVE:

4. After the prompt, enter your social security number followed by the # sign: xxx xx xxxx #
5. On the first call for a term, enter your birth date as MMDDYY#—six digits, using two digits each for month, date, and year—followed by the # sign.
6. After the prompt, enter your secret Personal Access Code (PAC) followed by the # sign: xxxx #
You establish your PAC when you call in for the first time for a given term; so you may use the same PAC each term, or a different PAC each term. Once you establish a PAC for a term, you must use that PAC each time you call in for that term. Make your PAC a special number so you will remember it; and remember to keep your PAC SECRET.
7. After the prompt, enter the proper request code and call number for each entry, followed by the # sign. Have alternate course information readily available.

NOTE: If the section you request is closed or causes a time conflict with your schedule, the computer will suggest another section that fits your schedule. Simply enter A# to select this section.

8. Terminate your call: T#

DETAILED DESCRIPTION OF REQUEST CODES

1. A nnnn# — ADD a course.

This function adds a course to your schedule, provided that there are seats available; that it does not conflict with another course; and that you meet ANY specified course requirements (such as being admitted to the College of Business, being admitted to the Honors program, being admitted to the Graduate School, being admitted to Teacher Education).

If the requested class is closed, the computer will search for an open section that will fit your schedule, and then suggest this section to you. To add the suggested section, enter A#.

2. D nnnn# — DROP a course.

This function allows you to drop a course from your schedule. Be sure you are aware of the different deadlines for different kinds of drops. (See calendar.)

3. W nnnn# — WAIT-LIST a course.

This function is available ONLY to students with classification of SOPHOMORE or HIGHER who are requesting 3000-level courses or higher. A student may wait-list ONLY ONE SECTION OF A PARTICULAR COURSE.

Wait-listing a class will cause that time-frame to be reserved in your schedule AND will add the credit hours into the total number of hours scheduled.

Each department will have the option of re-arranging priority of students on a wait-list. A department can also remove a name from the wait-list if the department determines that the student's need is not critical.

Periodically the computer will match the wait-list against available seats, and schedule students where possible, based on FI/FO (first in, first out—in other words, first-come, first-served)—unless the department re-arranges priority based on need.

The department MAY designate other sections to satisfy a given wait-list. A student waiting for a particular section may be placed in the newly-designated section, provided there is no time conflict with other scheduled classes.

It is suggested that a student waiting for a particular class call back using the "W#" transaction of TTR System to determine the result of the wait-list processing. There is a schedule of wait-list processing dates included in this schedule bulletin. Enter L# to verify that the course is now scheduled.

A student who does not obtain a wait-listed class on one processing date will automatically be forwarded to the next processing date.

All WAIT LISTS will be discontinued after the Wait-List Purge Date. After the Purge Date, the student must obtain special permission from the departmental chairperson in order to add a CLOSED class.

Be aware that departments may choose not to make certain classes available for wait-listing.

4. *W nnnn# — REMOVE COURSE from wait-list.

This function allows you to remove your name from a wait-list. Doing this will free up the reserved time-frame and credit hours on your schedule.

5. W# — INQUIRE into status of WAIT-LISTED courses.

This function allows you to inquire into the status of any wait-listed course(s) you had previously requested.

6. R nnnn# — REQUEST CREDIT/NO CREDIT grading status.

This function will allow you to select Credit/No Credit grading status for a course that is already scheduled.

The computer will check a dates table to ensure that the request is within the appropriate time period.

Freshmen may not request Credit/No Credit grading status.

Undergraduates may not request Credit/No Credit for any courses 5000-level and above.

Graduate students may not request Credit/No Credit for any courses 4750+.

7. *R nnnn# — REMOVE CREDIT/NO CREDIT grading status.

This function allows you to remove Credit/No Credit grading status from a course, leaving the course under regular grading status.

The computer will check the appropriate dates table to be sure the request is within the proper time period.

8. L# — LIST ALL COURSES on your schedule.

This function allows you to list your complete schedule over the phone, including all wait-listed courses.

The computer will give the following for each scheduled course:

- Call number
- Dept/Course/Section
- Meeting time and day
- Bldg/Room
- Credits
- Total credits

This function will also indicate Credit/No Credit, Audit and any W/WP/WF drops.

9. L nnnn# — LIST DETAILS of a SPECIFIC COURSE.

This function will allow you to find out specific information about a specific course.

The computer will give the following:

- Call number
- Dept/Course/Section
- Starting date (primarily used for second-half-term and Summer courses)
- Meeting time and day
- Bldg/Room
- Credits
- Open or closed

10. A# — ADD A PREVIOUSLY SUGGESTED CLASS.

This function allows you to add the previously suggested course to your schedule.

This entry must be used immediately after a course has been suggested by the computer—any other entry will negate this option.

11. I nnnn# — INQUIRE to find an OPEN SECTION.

This function allows you to find an open section of the specified course that meets at the same time. If there are no other sections at this time, then the computer will so indicate and will look for any openings at all.

If all sections are closed, the computer will so indicate.

The computer will give the following for the selected course(s):

- Call #
- Dept/Course/Section
- Meeting time and day and length
- Seats Remaining

A subsequent entry of "I#" will continue the search for a different section—if one exists. Use the "I" function to find sections added after the schedule was printed. If you have problems with closed classes, use the "I" to find out what sections are open before you schedule any classes.

12. N ddd# — List NEW COURSES ADDED for DEPARTMENT NUMBER.

Use this function to find any new courses—not sections—added since the publication of the class schedule bulletin. ddd = 3-digit academic department NUMBER.

13. T# — TERMINATE phone session.

The computer will give the total credit hours and any other important data, and then terminate the call.

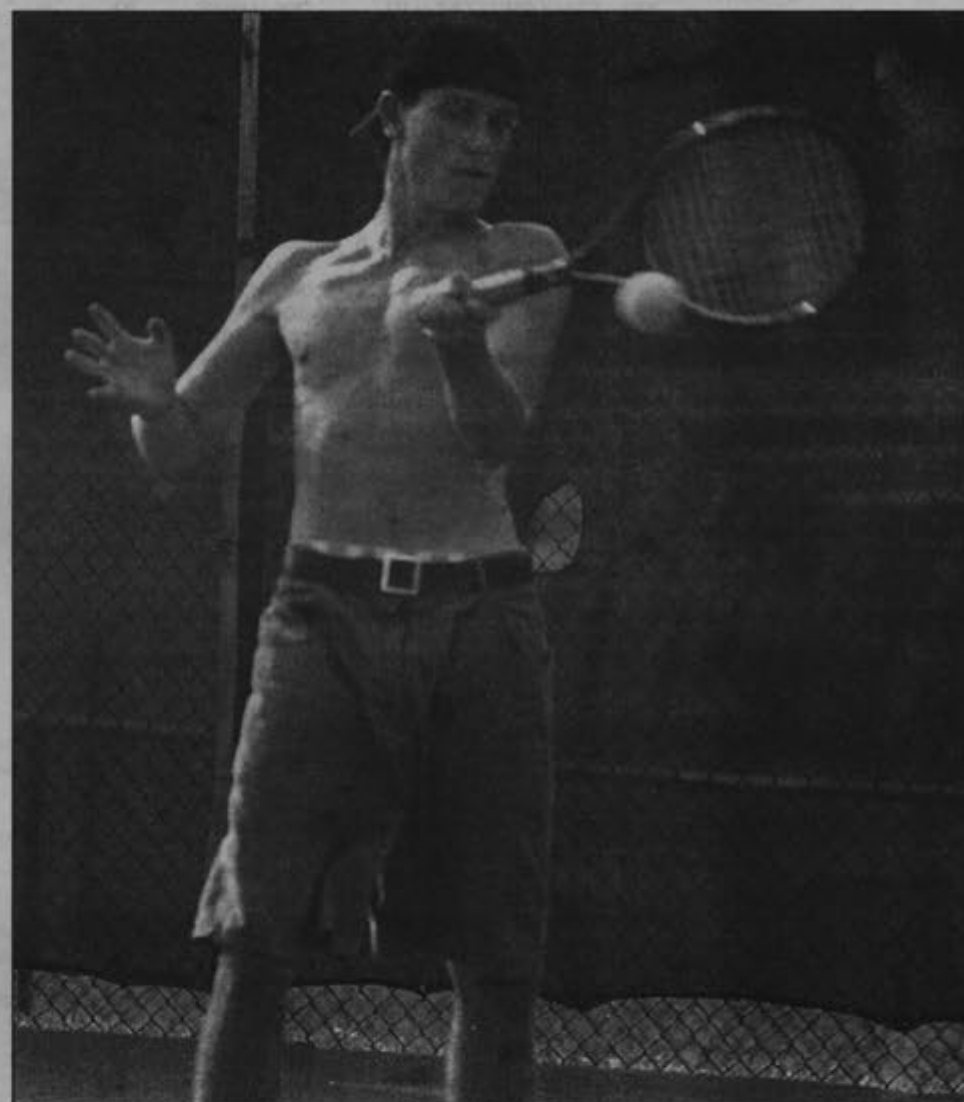

- Final examinations are scheduled on the basis of the first class hour meeting of the week irrespective of whether the first hour is classroom or laboratory activity.
- Final examinations for multiple-hour classes are scheduled on the basis of the first hour of the multiple-hour block.
- A M-, T-, W-, or R- prefix indicates whether the first class day of the week is Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday. For example, M-0800 indicated the scheduled time for the final examination in a class having its first class hour meeting of the week at 800 on Monday, R-1900 is a class having its first class hour meeting of the week at 1900 on Thursday, etc.
- Final examination periods indicated in the above schedule as "makeup / arranged" are to be used only in cases where:
 - The first class hour meeting of the week does not conform to one of these schedule patterns;
 - The meeting time of the class appears in the Semester Class Schedule as "ARR";
 - A student obtains an approved examination change.
- Final examinations in one semester hour courses may be given at the discretion of the instructor and, if given, should be scheduled for the last regular class meeting of the term.
- Final examinations in courses numbered 4750 or above may be given at the discretion of the instructor and, if given, are to conform to the schedule patterns established herein.
- Final examinations are to be given in all courses unless specifically exempted under the provisions of #5 and/or #6 above, or by departmental recommendation.
- Students may not deviate from the published final examination schedule without prior approval of the instructor in accordance with guidelines monitored by the Vice President for Academic Affairs.
- Instructors may not deviate from the published final examination schedule without written approval of the Department Chair and the Dean of the College in accordance with guidelines monitored by the Vice President for Academic Affairs.
