1916 FOOT BALL CAPTAINS  
Many of the colleges have selected their foot ball captains for the next year. Among them are the following:

Macomber, the star half-back of Illinois, will lead the Orange and Blue next year.

Clinton R. Black will lead the Yale eleven in 1916.

"Teddy" Baer, who played tackle on the year's Miami eleven has been elected to lead the Red team next year.

Phillbrick Jackson has been elected 1916 captain for Chicago.

F. P. Woolley, right tackle, will captain the Trinity College eleven next fall.

Peck, all-American center, will captain the University of Pittsburg team in 1916.

John Manlbeth, all-Western and second all-American half back this year, was elected captain of the Michigan 1916 team.

McIntosh, full back on this year's Indiana University eleven will head the team next year.

Cofall, star half back on the Notre Dame team, will captain the eleven next year.

John Foote, end on the 1915 DePauw eleven, will captain the team in 1916.


**ALL-STAR TEAM ORGANIZED**
