TWO DEFEATS ONE VICTORY

Normal After Losing Two Games Come Back and Defeat Bradley Team

Decatur Herald: A serious slump in the work of Coach Wann's five, together with an unexpected exhibition of basket ball on the part of Eastern Illinois Normal came near costing Millikin a defeat in the game with the Charleston team Monday evening on the Millikin floor.

The final score, 30 to 22, does not indicate the relative strength of the two teams as shown in Monday nights contest, for the Millikin five was clearly outplayed during the major part of the battle, and only by occasional streaks of brilliant scoring managed to complete the game with an eight-point advantage. Overconfidence probably was the cause of the poor showing. The curtain-raiser game between the two second teams also was hard-fought, resulting in a score of 22 to 19 for Millikin.

The deficiency of the Millikin quintet in team play became evident at the very beginning of the game, but, owing to the inability of Coach Lantz's men to locate the hoop, the end of the period found the locals with the substantial lead of 15 to 5. Several spectacular tosses by Holcomb, Miller and Catlin were responsible for most of the scoring.

This advantage won in the opening period was responsible for the Blue and White victory, for shortly after the beginning of the second half, the visitors began to score consistently from all parts of the floor. Not until near the close of the half did Captain Miller and his five effect a rally which offset the Charleston rush, and, as it was, the visitors scored 17 points during the half to Millikin's 15.

Captain Anderson of the Eastern Illinois squad, was the star for the visitors. Although held to a single field goal during the first half, and missing many shots at the basket, he found the ring in the second period, and, getting about the floor so fast as to elude all of the Millikin guards, dropped the ball through five times. Three of the tosses were in quick succession from a considerable distance. He was well supported by Endsley and Markle

both of whom showed speed on the floor. Schmaelzle a center, six feet three inches, was one surprise sprung by Coach Lantz. Although taking the ball away from any of the Millikin players on a tipoff, he did not supplement the advantage of his height with handy playing, and was replaced by Markle in the second half.

The Y. W. C. A. met Friday evening in Pemberton Hall. This was one of the special meetings in celebration of the jubilee and was fairly well attended. Miss Ruth Peters led the meeting very nicely. Miss Flossie Wiley gave a sketch of Grace Dodge's Life and Work.

Grace Dodge, known as a friend of girls, did more for the organization of the Y. W. C. A. than anyone else. She devoted her whole life to helping and saving girls. She started the Travelers' Aid Association; founded the Working Girls Club and established Teacher's College at Columbia University, New York.

To carry on the work of the Association skilled women and secretaries must be paid and to meet this expense voluntary contributions have been collected each year. Miss Dodge felt that an endowment to cover this expense would establish financially the organization. Miss Dodge left the association half a million dollars, but half a million more is needed. Her friends and those who did not know her, but admire her work, wishing to express in permanent form their love and admiration, are raising an endowment fund.

It is requested that every girl bring something as an offering to next week's meeting, when a collection will be taken, as a testimony of our gratitude to Miss Dodge that she made it possible for our association to exist. To those who cannot contribute this week, let it be said that pledge cards are in the hand of the Jubilee Chairman which can be signed up for any amount to be paid by the second meeting in March.
