JOLIET WINNER OF ILLINI MEET

Charleston Wins 5 Points In a Field of Over 700 Contestants

Charleston high school won five points in the big field meet held at Urbana Saturday, when Bailey took second in the 100 yard dash, and Anderson who tied for second place, with two others, in the pole vault, drew third place. The pole vault went 12 feet, which is a new interscholastic record.

Over 700 athletes were entered in the meet.

Charleston high school students about 150 strong, paraded the business section Monday morning celebrating in honor of their winning athletes.

Here are the interscholastic champions of the state:

Class A: Joliet.

Class B: Harrisburg.

Class C: Evanston Academy.

For the first time since 1904 downstate schools flashed to victory in the University of Illinois classic.

Urbana, headed by Allman, its wonderful weightman, landed second place in Class A, while Jacksonville was the runnerup in Class B. Evanston was a wide margin ahead of Lake Forest, its nearest academy rival in the third division.

La Grange put up a sturdy fight and gained third place in Class A. Crane made the best showing of the Chicago schools.

Oak Park, another former champion, had to be content with 7 points. It was a hard day for the boys from the metropolis.

Harrisburg won the victory in the Class B division. The rest of the points were widely split up.

Evanston Academy made a runaway race for honors in the Class C division, in which there was scant competition.

Landers of Oregon was the only record breaker of the day. He pole vaulted 12 feet, making a new record. Last year Landers was a record breaker in the same sport. Stars of the meet included such men as Allman of Urbana, who won the discus and shot put; Gillfillan and Hargraves of Joliet; Cuthbertson of Harrisburg, and Powers of Decatur.

Nott of La Grange decisively won the mile in class A from a
