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IBHE to keep fighting for its original budget

Although the Illinois Board of Higher Education approved Gov. James Thompson's allocations to a stringent \$1.23 billion higher education budget Tuesday, an IBHE member said the board will continue to fight for its original \$1.28 billion budget proposal for next year.

IBHE Vice Chairman Diego Redondo said the board must comply with statutes requiring it to draw up a budget within the governor's recommendations, but he added that board members will continue to

support their original funding request.

In January, the IBHE proposed a \$1.28 billion budget for higher education next year, asking the governor to grant higher education a \$108 million increase from the state's general revenue funds.

In mid-February, the governor released his own fiscal 1982 budget, allotting an increase of only \$60 million in general revenue funds to higher education for a \$1.23 billion total budget.

The general revenue portion of the higher education budget proposed by

the governor, represents 15 percent of the \$400 million in new revenues which Thompson has said will be available to the state in fiscal year 1982.

The governor has indicated that \$200 million will be used to support the state's welfare program, \$90 million has been designated for elementary and secondary education, and \$50 billion will go to support other state programs.

Redondo said the legislature will begin considering college and university funding this week when the IBHE's original \$1.28 billion

appropriations bill begins legislative hearings.

Redondo said the IBHE received numerous letters from individual university governing boards and the Illinois teacher union suggesting that Thompson's "priorities aren't in order" and that the IBHE should stick to its original budget suggestions and not prepare a second budget for the governor.

Redondo said if the IBHE failed to draw up a budget for the governor, "the governor's people would be forced to draw up their own budget."

'SCORE II' proposal set for Senate review

A revised Students Coordinating Optional Referendum Efforts proposal, dubbed "SCORE II," will be presented to the Student Senate Wednesday.

According to the proposal's author, Student Senator Jim Kaestner, Eastern President Daniel E. Marvin would be obligated—like the earlier SCORE proposal stated—to take results of referendums to Eastern's governing board, the Board of Governors, even if he does not approve of the results.

However, the main difference between SCORE II and the earlier proposal is that Marvin would be able to express his views to the BOG on the issue, which means that if Marvin did not approve of the referendum results he could tell the board so.

The first SCORE proposal, which was approved by students in a November referendum but vetoed by Marvin, would have allowed student government to bypass Marvin completely and take results of student referendums asking for a change in student fees directly to the BOG.

The original SCORE proposed made a referendum mandatory for all student activity fees, however, SCORE II narrows down those student activity fees which would require a mandatory referendum to those categorized as program and service fees.

The narrowing down of the student activity fees which would require a referendum was done in an attempt to clear up vague portions of the original SCORE proposal which were

Newhouse says Moonie church feared visits to home

(In part two of the four-part series on a former Eastern student's involvement with the Unification Church, Kay Newhouse reveals some of the details of her deepening involvement with the Moonies.)

Kay Newhouse's decision to become a member of the Unification Church interfered in her plans to return to Charleston for Christmas 1979.

The 21-day workshop in Colorado ended right before Christmas, at which time Kay decided she to wanted to spend the holidays at home.

Kay's mother notes, "Kay wanted very badly to come home for Christmas and had some difficulty getting here. At this point we did not know anything about her involvement with the Moonies."

Kay said she wanted to come home for Christmas of 1979 "to touch base—get some time to think."

She added she had no trouble leaving Colorado, but "the organization was afraid I would go back to Ohio to my boyfriend."

The church's fears stemmed from two reasons: first, if she went back to live with her boyfriend she would be going against doctrine prohibiting couples from living together before marriage; and second, if she went back to live with him she would not move into the CARP center.

CARP is the Collegiate Association for Research of Principles. It is the college base for the Unification Church, although it is totally self-sufficient from the church.

Steve Goldstein, assistant director for the Unification Church in Champaign-Urbana, said a person who joins the church is not required to live at the CARP Center.

Kay did return to Charleston for Christmas despite the church's concerns.

During her stay, her parents noticed she was

"jumpy and talked a great deal about nothing," Mrs. Newhouse said.

"This was not unlike Kay, but it was an exaggeration of her," she added.

Kay did not tell her parents about her involvement with the Moonies, because "they wouldn't understand and I hadn't committed to anything."

But while at home, Kay contacted an old high school friend and persuaded him to return to Ohio with her and join the Moonies. This was her first recruit, she said.

Kay's parents had left for a vacation, and upon returning home they received a phone call from the parents of the boy Kay had recruited.

This was the first the Newhouses learned of Kay's involvement with the Moonies.

They then called Kay's twin to see if she knew anything about Kay's involvement with the Moonies. Indeed, Kay had revealed her involvement to her sister.

But her parents made no move to get her out of the church; and after Christmas, Kay moved to the CARP center.

However, her first recruit returned home after a few days.

Kay said she still was not committed to the movement at this point.

"In the workshop I accepted the philosophy, but from January until March I was waiting to see if I

could adjust to the lifestyle," Kay said.

During this time, Kay said she was "incredibly depressed," and being involved in CARP was making her feel useful.

"The seminars were highly structured, which is what a depressed person needs," she added.

The structured atmosphere allows the Moonie to avoid decision-making.

The Moonie doctrine looked "tailor made" for Kay, she said, although she only accepted about 90 percent of the doctrine.

Kay explained she does not accept anything 100 percent—"that's just the way I am," she added.

She said at the CARP center she was "fed reasonably good meals, and most of us had good clothes—but not a lot of money."

Every Saturday Moonies were required to go fundraising, but sometimes Kay would not feel up to it and would spend the day in a pinball arcade without the knowledge of her superiors, she said.

Kay kept in touch with her parents by telephone and letter, but she did not see them from Christmas to Aug. 31.

During that time there were three "critical illnesses" in the family and one death.

"All matters for which, under ordinary circumstances, she would come home," Mrs. Newhouse said.

Kay was notified in each case and her initial response was that she would come home. But the next day she would call back and say she had good reasons for not coming home at the time, Mrs. Newhouse said.

Kay said one reason for not coming home during the illnesses was CARP did not have the funds to send members home.

Salvadorean military claims 'cleanup' of leftist outposts

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador—Soldiers and anti-junta guerrillas were locked in gun battles in the northeast Tuesday in what the military claimed was a "cleanup" of leftist strongholds.

In Washington, the Reagan administration waged a closed-door campaign for congressional support for tripling military aid to the convulsed Central American nation.

"The Salvadoran army has succeeded in its objective of bringing peace to the nation with only the help of the people," proclaimed Defense Minister Jose Guillermo Garcia. He said the left had been "smothered" and "every day the situation tends to improve."

Military commanders gave no casualty figures, but said there was fighting in Zacatecoluca and San Esteban Caterina, some 35 miles north of here, and farther north at Arcatao. National police said 16 people were found dead in the capital.

Garcia refused comment on junta President Jose Napoleon Duarte's announcement Monday that he would meet with the Socialist International, and international group espousing non-violent revolution that has offered to be an intermediary in attempts at a political settlement.

Thompson names Werries new agriculture secretary

SPRINGFIELD, Ill.—Morgan County hog farmer Larry A. Werries was named Tuesday as the new Illinois agriculture director and vowed to continue the policies of his predecessor, new U.S. Agriculture Secretary John R. Block.

The 40-year-old Werries, a 1962 graduate of the University of Illinois, was named by Gov. James R. Thompson to the \$43,000-a-year post. The appointment requires confirmation by the Illinois Senate.

Physical, biographical, professional and geographical similarities between Werries and the 45-year-old Block prompted reporters to ask Werries: "Are you a clone of John Block?"

"I could do worse," replied Werries with a smile. "I don't think so. I owe no allegiance to any major farm organizations or commodity groups. I stand on my own two feet."

Asked if he and Block differed on any major agricultural issues, Werries replied: "None that I know of."


Brezhnev re-elected by Communist Congress

MOSCOW—Leonid Brezhnev's aging leadership team, keeping a firm hold on Kremlin power, was re-elected Tuesday to the ruling Politburo at the close of the 26th Soviet Communist Party Congress. In a brief speech, Brezhnev predicted victory for world revolution but stressed a commitment to detente.

The 74-year-old Brezhnev announced the unchanged leadership lineup amid shouts of "hurrah" from 5,000 delegates at the Kremlin Palace of Congresses after a secret vote by the party's Central Committee.

The secretive Kremlin policy-making board retained all 14 members, whose average age is just over 69, and Brezhnev remained its effective head as party general-secretary.

Brezhnev, reportedly in ill health and seemingly strained at times during the nine-day congress, also serves as Soviet president. His leadership role goes back to 1964, when Nikita Khrushchev was ousted as party boss and head of government.




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Student Senate to vote on grade appeals policy

The Student Senate will vote Wednesday on whether to approve a revised grade appeals policy which would provide more student input into the process.

The policy, which was presented to the Senate last week by Student Body Executive Vice President Dan Hunnicutt, would provide more student input because of a five-person appeals board, three of whom would be faculty and the other two students.

One of the board members would be the executive vice president.

The current board includes four faculty members and the executive vice president, who acts in an advisory capacity only.

Secondly, Hunnicutt proposed that at the end of each appeal session, a decision would be released either calling for no action on the appeal or a re-grading of specific areas of the student's work.

Also the faculty member could be instructed to grade the student's work again and recommend to the academic dean and vice president for academic affairs that the grade be changed.

Faculty Senate suggests creation of TBL task force

The Faculty Senate voted Tuesday to recommend that President Daniel E. Marvin appoint a committee to study the "textbook library crisis."

Senator Scott Smith said the committee should be composed primarily of teaching faculty who would study and recommend a solution to textbook library problems such as placing moratoriums on the textbooks replacements.

Smith said moratoriums "indicate a defect in the current system which will not be solved by student referenda and periodic fee increases."

The Senate also voted to endorse the Council on Academic Affairs recent resolution which stated that the academic quality of Eastern's programs should take precedence over

other factors involved in the Textbook Library issue.

In other business, June Johnson, chairman of the Senate's summer school committee, said she would like more information on the proposed change in summer school to two five-week sessions.

Johnson said the Senate should support the change because it would allow each faculty member to have a 10-month contract.

The Senate also received a memo from Marvin noting that the Senate's constitution had been approved by the Board of Governors and now needs to be reviewed by the Senate before going back to BOG for final approval.

The Senate directed the memo to its constitution committee.

WATS lines installed to cut telephone costs

Monday marked the institution of a new telephone system at Eastern that is expected to save departments 10 to 15 percent in the cost of long-distance calls within the state.

All in-state toll calls from Eastern can now be made on a Wide Area Telephone System (WATS) line.

Although actual costs of a WATS call will vary depending on monthly line usage, the price will never exceed the cost of a regular access code "1" call.

Eastern treasurer Jake Zane, said that there have been four WATS lines at Eastern in the past for the use of four separate areas, but a survey taken by the Illinois Consolidated Telephone Company showed that maximum use was not being made of the lines.

The areas which have had previous use of WATS lines are Admissions, Computer Services, the College of Arts and Sciences and the School of Education.

Vice President for Administration and Finance George Miller said the purpose of expanding the use of WATS lines is to "get the entire university interested in using WATS lines."

Miller said the university pays a fixed amount for the use of the WATS lines, and that each individual call will be charged to the department making it.

Miller stressed that the WATS lines are "nothing more than a trial on a proposal."

Zane said that departmental fiscal agents will be responsible for helping to evaluate the WATS lines.

"If the data doesn't show this is a reasonable thing to do, we'll change it," Miller said.

To place a call on a WATS line, the access code "8" is used rather than the usual access code of "1" when dialing.

If all WATS lines are busy at the time a call is made, the call will be automatically rerouted over a regular line.

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Appeal policy should be passed

A new grade appeals policy featuring real student input on a grade appeals board should be approved by the Student Senate as soon as possible.

Student Body Executive Vice President Dan Hunnicutt has proposed a departmental grade appeals committee consisting of three faculty members and two students, one of whom would be the Student Body vice president.

The current grade appeals board consists of four faculty members and the student body president, who serves in an advisory capacity only.

The policy would make for a much more democratic grade appeals process.

The new grade appeals board would provide an effective student voice in an area where student representation has been conspicuously omitted.

The proposed grade appeals changes would also clearly outline measures a student could take if he or she is unsatisfied with a decision made anywhere in the appeals process.

Another major change in the committee would be an amendment that allows for an

appeal of an unfavorable decision to the academic dean.

If the dean's decision is not agreeable to both student and instructor, an appeal could be made to Vice President for Academic Affairs Glenn Williams, who would have authority to make a final decision.

The departmental grade appeals committee would become involved only after a written appeal is filed and only after a solution could not be reached with the instructor or in a conference between the student, instructor and department chairman.

With the addition of two students on the departmental grade appeals committee, students would be assured that their views are considered by the three faculty members of the committee before a decision is reached.

The Senate's approval is needed to demonstrate to the faculty and administration that the students are determined to have a voice in a matter that affects them most directly—the report card.

We urge the Student Senate to approve Hunnicutt's proposal soon so the policy can be implemented quickly.

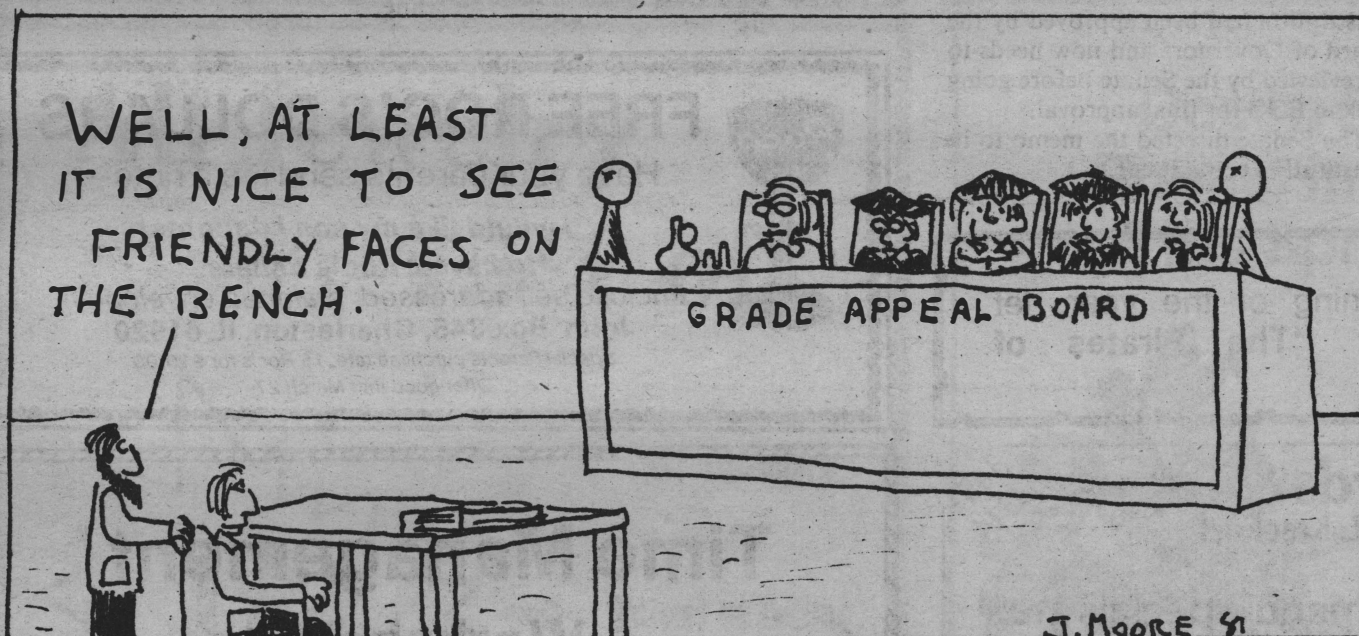

'Colored Girls' reveals women's soul

Seven women. All it took was seven women to explain the plights and joys of any American woman—liberated or not.

The Daedulas Production of "For Colored Girls who have Considered Suicide/When the Rainbow is Enuf" is a unique set of poems about women, men, but not necessarily for women.

The production is unique, because of its presentation of some 20 poems, compiled by Ntozake Shange. Each of the women was not molded into a character, but in their recitation of the poems, they became characters of the lines.

Although somewhat confusing to the near end—the attempt to blend the poems into one single statement partly fails—the clear, strong voices of the seven black women illustrate the intensity of the poems' messages.

The women portrayed in the poems are not feminists, mind you. They come from every corner of the United States. From a welfare mother losing her children, to a maniacal boyfriend, to an eight-year-old girl discovering St. Louis and her heritage; the women are not crying for equal pay, equal work or even the passage of ERA. They are turning their souls inside out for the audience to analyze.

I was surprised at the non-feminist nature of the production itself. This could have been an excellent opportunity for controversy, but I'm glad they didn't take

it. It was more or less taken as a bit of understanding the American woman, which can be interpreted as an indirect notion by the playwrights to promote harmony.

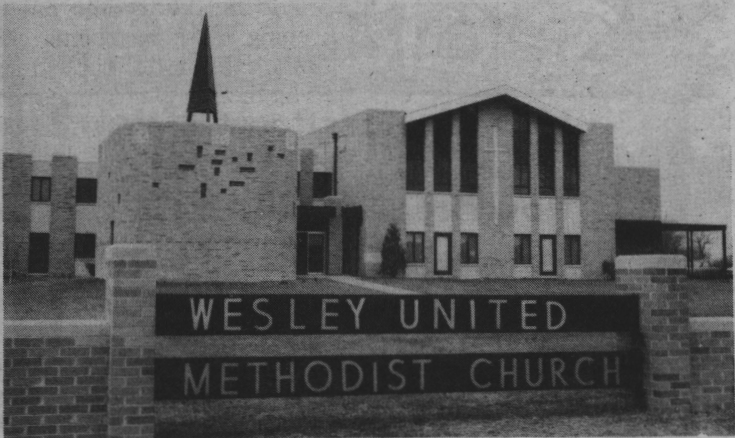
I was especially touched by the crispness of the poems. Each was different in nature—ranging from a narration to a monologue—which brought a range of diversity to the production.

The effect of the play could not be judged following the standing ovation by the 650 patrons of the University Board-sponsored event which capped off Black History Month. I felt the message while walking out of the Grand Ballroom as I talked to a friend.

When asked what I thought of it, I really couldn't answer. But silently, it made me think—think about how many different kinds of women make it through life under the most trying conditions, and how I would react to any of the situations described in the one and one-half hour play.

Perhaps the mere fact that I tried to put myself in the characters' place conveyed a message of understanding. That's what the audience got out of it.

"As for the death, they would let you go home if it were someone in the immediate family, but as it was they did not see a need to let me go to the funeral of my 70-year-old aunt."

"The organization teaches that God comes first, CARP comes second, and the family comes last," so they did not want to see someone run home to her family each time something happened, she said.

Kay said the leaders would tell you to "have faith and everything will be all right. There is nothing you can do there."

As it turned out, in each case of illness all three recovered. This only strengthened Kay's faith.

Mrs. Newhouse said Kay was never forbidden to come home, but was "counciled out of it."

Kay said conflicts with her parents and psychological problems kept her from fighting the CARP vetoes of her trips home.

unacceptable to Marvin, Kaestner said.

In the proposal, programs and services are defined as student legal service, grants—in aid, Union operations, pharmacy, socio-economically disadvantaged student, textbook rental system, and any new fee approved by referendum.

Under the new proposal, Marvin would be required to present results of referendums to the BOG for further consideration.

"The main thing I think this is doing is setting up a line of communication between the students and the Board of Governors," Kaestner said.

Vice President for Student Affairs Glenn Williams said Tuesday he had not heard of the SCORE II proposal and as far as he knew neither had anyone else in the administration.

After vetoing the first SCORE proposal in January, Marvin said he did so because the implementation of SCORE would create "instability" for current student fee-supported activities because of the possibility of funds being reduced.

Kaestner said the new proposal is a

"compromise" intended to clear up the vagueness of the earlier proposal.

"We're not getting all we want," Kaestner said. "But if he (Marvin) accepts this, the students have won a right to insure participation."

Senate Speaker Natalie Scott said the proposal will be automatically tabled for review until next week's meeting.

Games to lecture on chemical 'fates'

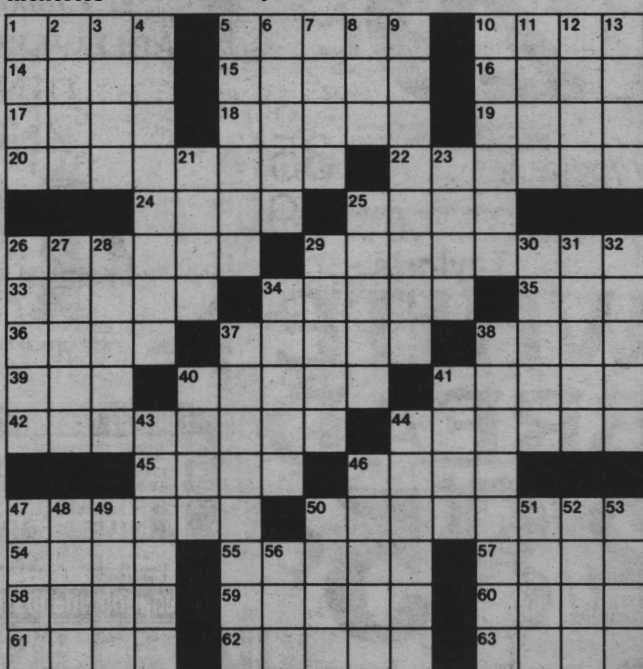

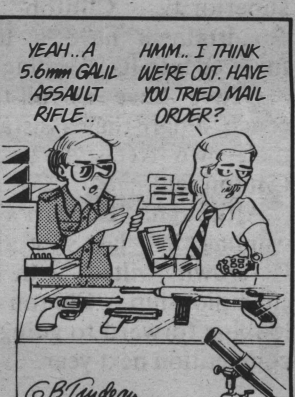
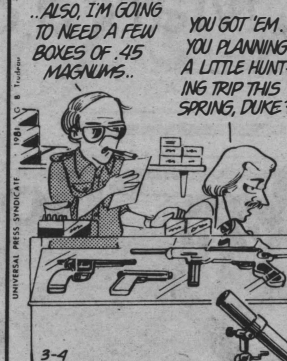

Even Williams' 9 year-old-son Travis knows that, because when Williams informed Travis of his move to Eastern, Travis replied, "At least Eastern wins at football," Williams said.

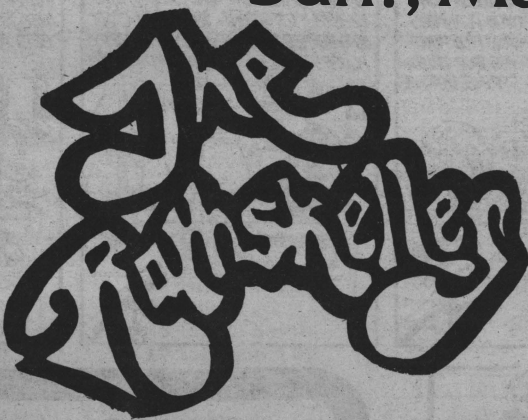

Mike Williams, former Western Illinois University offensive running back coach, has been appointed as Eastern's offensive back coach, Williams said Tuesday.

Williams will direct the Panthers' offensive running backs for the 1981 season.

"I think that this will be an excellent move for myself and my family," Williams said.

While Williams will coach Eastern's offensive backs, Chuck Budde, who was offensive back coach last year for the Panthers, has been shifted to help coach quarterbacks and wide receivers.

"I will help coach the quarterbacks and wide receivers," Budde said. "And that's fine with me, because I got a good chance to look at our offense at a different angle."

Williams, a native of Muse, Penn., graduated from Iowa State in 1977 while starring as a Cyclone running back for two years before a knee injury sidelined him his senior year.

In high school, Williams achieved All-State honors in football and also received letters in track and basketball.

As a coach, Williams comes from Western with high appraisal.

"Mike is an outstanding coach and I'm sure he will be able to contribute greatly to the Eastern program," Western Athletic Director Gil Peterson said.

Williams' job was made possible by the January departure of offensive line coach, Ray Ogas.

"Mike's move is mainly one of a financial and monetary difference," Peterson said. "He was under a half-time position here (Western) and

eventually he could not make it on a half-time position. We assisted him any way we could in finding a full-time job, and as I understand it, he will be making about double what he was making here."

Williams said Panther head coach Darrel Mudra contacted him on Feb. 22 and offered him the job.

"I talked to him on Monday night (Feb. 23) and accepted the job," Williams said.

Williams exudes confidence about coming to Eastern and said, "I think I'll be able to add some things from an offensive stand-point. I know I'll be able to contribute to the program. If I couldn't I wouldn't be here."

"I think I have an ability to get along with people which helps. I know I'm going to do well here," Williams (See WIU, page 10)

Reduced tracksters finish 2nd

Despite the fact that only eight of its team members competed in the meet, Eastern women's track team finished second to the University of Kentucky in the Lady Panther Invitational at Lantz Fieldhouse Saturday.

Leading Eastern's performances was freshman Mona Fowler in the 60-yard hurdles.

Fowler established a school and a freshman record in the event with a time of 8.08.

Gina Sperry also established a school record in the mile with a second place time of 5:02.86.

Other top performances for Eastern came from the 4 x 220 and the mile relay teams.

The 4 x 220 relay team's second place time of 1:40.93 established a school record, and it again met the AIAW qualifying standard.

The mile relay team finished second to Arkansas with a time of 3:54.75, even though one of the usual runners, Renee Johnson, could not run because of an injury.

Eastern coach John Craft said he felt the mile relay team is capable of running under 3:50 with Johnson.

"Our mile relay team ran well below

Clinton satisfied with grapplers' showing

Eastern's wrestling team walked away from last weekend's NCAA Division II national tournament at Davis, Cal., with seven All-Americans, and by doing so, left the grappler's coach Ron Clinton very pleased.

Eastern's All-Americans included two national champions, Mark Gronowski at the 167-pound weight class and Geno Savegnago at 190.

The grapplers also managed two second place finishers—Mike Polz at 158 and Dennis McCormick at 177.

The other All-Americans included Derek Porter's fourth place finish at 126, and sixth place finishes by Bryan Murphy at 118 and Doug Schafer at 134.

Yet, despite Eastern's fine showing, the Panthers could not overcome the dominance of California State-Bakersfield as the perennial power captured the division crown.

But nonetheless, Clinton was happy with the overall showing the Panthers made.

"I thought our people did very well in the tournament," Clinton said. "It was a very impressive performance."

Clinton was very happy with Murphy and Porter's performances at 118 and 126.

"Murphy did a real good job, and Porter got beat in the quarterfinals by the person who was voted the outstanding wrestler of the tournament," Clinton said.

Eastern's wrestler at 134, Schafer, had to default his match because of an injury, but he still ended up in sixth place. Clinton was also pleased with Polz at 158 and Gronowski at 167.

"I'm very pleased with Polz, as he made it to the final match at 158," Clinton said. "Gronowski did the job he was supposed to do."

Clinton said if the Panther's grappler at 177,

McCormick, could have stayed healthy, he might have been the national champion.

"McCormick still finished runner-up, even though he only wrestled in seven matches this season," Clinton said.

Savegnago's opponent defaulted because of an injury.

"They didn't tell us anything about his opponent's injury until Savegnago stepped out on the mat to wrestle."

Savegnago, Gronowski, Polz and McCormick will be traveling to the NCAA Division I national tournament March 12 at Princeton University.

"I think all of our wrestlers have a good chance of upsetting some people at the Division I tournament," Clinton said.

While Clinton is looking forward to the upcoming Division I tourney, he said the NCAA Division II (See CLINTON, page 10)
