## Senate approves alternative hotline

Student Senate approved a request Wednesday from the Resident Hall Association to allocate student fee monies for a campuswide hotline for Recognized Student Organizations to keep students aware of bar alternatives.

RHA member Brian Ream said the information hotline would provide RSOs opportunities to publicize their different programs and events to the student body.

All campus organizations and departments would have full access to the hotline, Ream said.

The hotline system would include three phone-lines: one line for athletic events, one for RHA programs and one open line for other organizations promoting programs.

Installation cost is \$86.40. Ream expects a four-month probationary period at a cost of \$10.32 per month. The main purpose of the probationary period would be to evaluate the system to determine if the hotline is being used properly, he said.

The hotline would operate 24 hours a day, including weekends.

Ream said RHA would take care of all costs to set up the hotline.

"It doesn't do much good to have bar alternatives and no communication on the alternatives, so I think the hotline is a great idea," said Jason Anselment, Student Senate member.

Senate member Glenn Fundator said even though the hotline is still in its "infancy stage," it's "a step in the right direction."

"Students who are 19 and 20 will almost be forced to use the hotline if the bar entry age increases to 21," Fundator said.

Also at the meeting, senate approved the changes for the May commencement. Amy Jobin, graduation council member, presented senate the proposal for three commencement ceremonies in May on the Library Quad. Ceremony times would be 9 a.m., 1 p.m. and 5 p.m., Jobin said.

Student Senate Speaker Bobby Smith said parking and motel accommodations would naturally be problem, but having three ceremonies is "definitely a positive move."

## WEIU staff submits requests

Student staff at WEIU-TV still unhappy with the joint-operating agreement between the station's newscast and Mid-Illinois Newspapers Inc. have presented a list of requests to officials asking that the station's newscast be returned to its previous format.

Three students will meet with the station's general manager, John Beabout, this afternoon and present a list of requests signed by 14 student employees of the station.

The petition, drafted by Patty Culhane, a reporter and producer for the station, calls for the newscast to be returned to a live format in a time slot not before 5 p.m. and no later than 6:30 p.m.

The students also want the program broadcast from the WEIU-TV studios in Buzzard Building, and produced, directed and anchored entirely by students.

Culhane, who organized the petition upon

## Enrollment at a high

Eastern's enrollment hit a record high this semester, totalling more than 10,000 students for the first spring semester in the university's history.

The current spring enrollment is 10,055 on-campus students, representing an increase of 95 students over spring 1993.

"The record enrollment for the spring semester is a further indication that Eastern is seen as one of the most desirable public institutions in the Midwest," said Eastern President David Jorns.

Vice president for Student Affairs Lou Hencken said the increase is important for the university.

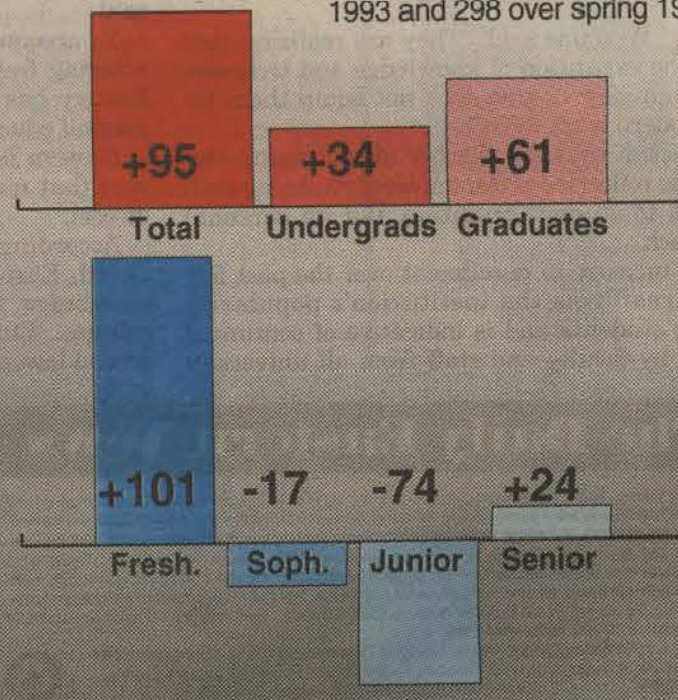
"It's important to note that our enrollment is up despite the fact that our fall graduating class was the largest in the history of the institution," he said. "Eastern appears to be resisting the national trend of declining enrollments."

Hencken said the most significant increase in the current enrollment is in the number of graduate students: 1,153, compared to 1,092 in 1993. He said many undergraduates who have not been able to find employment are opting to continue their education.

Graduate School Dean Larry Williams says he believes the increase in graduate students is a good sign.

### Spring enrollment reaches a record high for spring

The spring semester enrollment of 10,055 represents an increase of 95 students over spring 1993 and 298 over spring 1992.



"In a national survey of first-year students, 65 percent said they plan to attend graduate school," Williams said. "In general, students are realizing that a bachelor's degree at the entry level of a profession is not enough to be competitive."

Williams said the increase in graduate students has forced the Graduate School to offer more courses.

"As the number of graduate students increases, the

Graduate School will be forced to broaden their entity in terms of courses and programs that are appealing and popular to students," Williams said.

The increase in returning students could be traced to new technologies and a competitive job market, Williams said.

"Students are coming out of the work force to learn more current methodologies and

# Senate picks seven students to fill empty seats

Student Senate filled seven membership vacancies at Wednesday's senate meeting - one more than senate expected to fill.

Senate's vacancies went from six to seven when senate member Wendy Hausman submitted her resignation before Wednesday's senate meeting, senate speaker Bobby Smith said. Hausman's reasons for

resigning were unknown Wednesday night.

The new senate members are Jodi Chapman, Katherine Close, Chris Boyster, Kathleen Allen, Julie Proscia, Jim Bollou and Matthew Thrun.

Smith has said at least 12 students applied for the seats.

New members said they will work to improve student involvement on campus, as well as issues such as educating students about campus safety and date rape.

Proscia said she will try to be accessible to students and will also work to boost student involvement and understanding of campus issues.

"Everyday on campus you hear people say that they don't have a voice and they don't know how (they can) be represented," Proscia said.

Thrun, a freshman history major, said some of the students at Carman Hall, where he is a resident, thinks the senate is something that is very distant and elusive to

them. Thrun said he hopes to change these attitudes by more interaction among students and senate members.

"I just want to go out there and make a difference and be part of the team," he said.

The recent controversy concerning raising the Charleston bar-entry age is one issue Close says she tackle. Close, who is a junior political science major, said she thinks the current bar-entry age of 19 should not be changed.

She said she thinks many

of the bars are enforcing current laws on underage drinking and wonders what the students who are under 21 will go for entertainment the entry age is changed 21. Close said she will work on organizing bar alternatives if the entry age changed.

Allen said she will work motivating other student organizations to speak to students about rape, date rape and other safety issues that concern students.

returning to school this semester, said that besides scheduling the meeting with Beabout, she has already met with Terry Weidner, associate vice president for academic affairs and the overseer of WEIU operations.

"When I met with Weidner, he said he didn't think any of our demands were out of line and that's promising," Culhane said. "But, he added that the station doesn't answer to him except fiscally."

Culhane had also planned to meet with President David Jorns but said Jorns has postponed the two meetings previously scheduled.

Two students who signed the petition said the staff had expressed displeasure with News Scan's move to the newsroom of the Mattoon Journal Gazette and the decision to use Mid-Illinois reporters and editors as anchors.

Andy Bane, director and chief photographer at WEIU, and Jorie Novotny, a reporter for the station, said their

opinions were basically ignored.

"Sue Kaufman basically told us, 'If you don't like it, there's the door. No one's stopping you,'" Bane said.

"She told us if we didn't like it, we could leave and that none of us are irreplaceable," Novotny said. "She told us that the station was here for the public, not the students."

Kaufman, the station's news and public affairs director, is on sabbatical this semester and could not be reached for comment.

Bane and Novotny said students have wanted to do something about the merger since the beginning but didn't want to speak out, fearing it might damage their relations with station administrators.

"A lot of us wanted to do something but we were afraid to step on anyone's toes," Novotny said.

"John Beabout is a very influential man," Bane said. "It wouldn't be good if someone calls him and says, 'I have Andy Bane's resume in front of me,' and Beabout

says, 'He's a trouble-maker.'" Beabout was unavailable for comment Wednesday.

The students said they hope WEIU administrators will accept their requests.

"If he doesn't agree with us, he'll give us his reasoning, we'll give him ours and hopefully we can work out a compromise," Culhane said. "We'll just keep making our opinion public because we think what they did was wrong, and I think they know it was wrong."

"Hopefully he'll agree to our terms, if he doesn't, we'll have to go over his head," Bane said. "We'll let the public know what we feel."

Bane said one option would be to take their case to the Board of Governor's, because it holds the Federal Communications Commission license for WEIU.

Bane said he is glad Culhane decided to speak out.

"I'm glad Patty is back, she's the spark we needed," Bane said. "I've been wanting to say something for a long time, but I didn't know if I'd have the backing."

areas to recruit and retain students, Hencken said.

To accommodate the larger-than-anticipated entering freshman class that enrolled last fall, Eastern has increased the number of sections of general education courses offered this spring.

Eastern has consistently ranked well in surveys that measure a school's quality relative to its cost.

According to a 1993 survey by the College Board, Eastern's tuition and costs are 10 percent below the average for public residential colleges. Student room-and-board costs are the second lowest for Illinois public universities.

## Justice Department won't prosecute Commerce Secretary

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Justice Department found nothing to prosecute after a yearlong investigation into whether Commerce Secretary Ron Brown accepted \$700,000 to help lift the trade embargo against Vietnam.

"We have completed a thorough investigation and have concluded that the evidence does not substantiate the allegation that Mr. Brown entered into any such agreement," the department's criminal division wrote in a letter that Justice spokesman Carl Stern said was delivered to Brown's attorney Wednesday.

"No further investigation is warranted," said the letter, which was released by the Commerce Department. "Accordingly, we are closing the investigation. We appreciate Secretary Brown's cooperation with the investigation."

Brown, inspecting earthquake damage in California, said he was "very pleased" by the news. He had no further comment, but his staff released a written statement that said the Cabinet officer "is pleased that the inquiry has fully and fairly exonerated him of any wrongdoing."

The allegations were made by Binh T. Ly, a Vietnamese-American businessman. In September, Brown acknowledged meeting three times with a former Vietnamese government official, Nguyen Van Hao, whom Ly accused of arranging the

\$700,000 payment.

Brown denied receiving any money or having any kind of business relationship with Hao. The Vietnamese government also denied the allegations.

A U.S. government official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Tuesday that a federal grand jury in Miami found no wrongdoing by Brown.

His attorney, Reid Weingarten, confirmed receiving the letter, saying in a statement: "We have been advised that the Justice Department's investigation ... is completed and Secretary Brown has been completely exonerated."

"The investigation was thorough, fair and professional in every respect. The FBI went by the book; they turned over every rock, as we had expected, and found absolutely nothing to corroborate the allegations. Secretary Brown cooperates completely with the investigation," Weingarten added.

President Clinton publicly defended Brown last fall after two conservative Republican lawmakers asked for appointment of a special prosecutor to investigate the allegations. House Republican leaders later joined in that demand.

But Attorney General Janet Reno declined to appoint such an investigator on the ground that as a Cabinet colleague of Brown it might appear she had a conflict of interest.

# Cool air in halls unlikely

Although the Residence Hall Association is undertaking a study on the feasibility of equipping all residence halls with air conditioning, housing officials don't see the plan becoming a reality anytime soon.

Pemberton, and Douglas halls, International House and the Gregg Triad are currently without air conditioning.

However, Housing Director Kevin Cannon said his office doesn't have a plan to install air conditioning in those halls without it.

Cannon said changes in Eastern's academic calendar for next year would result in classes ending a week earlier in May. Cannon said finishing school a week earlier is one reason not to install air conditioning in those halls without it.

"If we're done in early May, there is no need for air," Cannon said. "To be honest, I don't think (the air-conditioning plan) is feasible."

RHA president Kris Potrafka says he realizes the air-conditioning project probably will not become a reality until at least next year, after RHA members have researched the cost and possible alternatives to the plan.

Potrafka said the issue of air conditioning in all the residence halls has been overlooked in previous years because of its cost.

Students have brought the air-conditioning issue to RHA in years past, Potrafka said, but usually their hopes dimmed because they expect immediate results.

"That won't happen, it's impossible," said Potrafka, adding the plan could take as long as 3 to 5 years to air-condition all the halls.

Several students living in halls without air conditioning said sizzling August days are just as unbearable as those in May.

# Casey suspects extradited

MARSHALL (AP) - The people accused in the shooting deaths of two workers at a hog farm last month were being held without bond Wednesday in the Clark County Jail.

Luther J. Sanders, 23, Victor D. Phillippi, 21, and Natasha A. Phillippi, all of Casey, were extradited to Illinois late Tuesday from Oklahoma, where they were arrested. They had waived extradition proceedings last week, but remained in

Oklahoma until weather conditions made the move possible.

Victor Phillippi has been charged with four counts of first-degree murder in the deaths of Wesley Allan Hall, 20, of Casey and Jerry Darling, 42, of Greenup. Sanders and Phillippi's wife, Natasha, each are charged with being accomplices to murder, according to Clark County State's Attorney David Lewis.

## University should make punishment fit the crimes

The pain she felt the night of her attack left her unable to walk, bleeding all night, and bruised and limping for days.

But to this student, additional anguish came from the punishment handed down by the university.

"Now I do wish I wouldn't have ever taken it there," she said. "It was all for nothing, that's how I feel."

**Editorial** That is a regrettable testimony about violent campus crimes, and the reason some victims may feel uneasy about reporting them.

An ex-boyfriend followed her and a friend home from a party, and the two got into a shouting match. He wanted her to go back to his apartment, and when she refused, he carried her to his car.

When he put her down, she ran away.

After a chase that lasted almost the length of two parking lots, she said he "full force tackled" her onto a parking lot so hard that her jeans tore open.

Unable to walk, she had her roommate carry her into her residence hall and back to her room.

"I have bruises and scars on my knees," she said. "I was bleeding, and it wasn't just my legs. I bled all night long."

At her Judicial Board hearing, she said she was crying and "pouring my heart out" to the five members. She said she felt cheated when the punishment, disciplinary probation, was announced.

Disciplinary probation bars the student from various student activities and student/faculty boards, may include expulsion from the residence halls, puts their current conduct under scrutiny for a period of time, and is the step before suspension.

"It should have been at a least a suspension. I was very, very upset with that and (the J-Board) knew it."

There have been no sexual assaults reported, despite the fact two counseling centers — one on campus and one in Charleston — claim to have handled several cases of sexual assault.

Police reports on violent campus crime are few and far between. But the only way more students will report these crimes are if they think appropriate action will be taken..0

On Jan. 17, in a fit of frustration, panic, exhaustion and anger, I drove to Champaign and made the second largest purchase of my life. When the dust cleared and I came to, I was on my back to Chucktown holding a receipt in the amount of \$2,418 and a credit agreement promising to pay an obscene 21 percent interest on a Best Buy (consumer electronics store) credit card. What was I thinking? As I peered through my rearview mirror I could see only large boxes marked computer and printer stacked in the back seat.

When I want to exercise my brain, well, I must be hyper-lilant to the operating schedule of the computer labs. Why the disparity? Good question. I'm sure it has to do with economics, budgets and the rest but that's not the argument. The argument is that the priorities of the school should be questioned when operating hours of a gymnasium exceed the open hours of those facilities that allow us to do what

we came here to do—get an education. Is the administration of this school tacitly saying they emphasize physical agility over mental agility?

I won't argue that a healthy body is contributory to a healthy mind. I won't argue that the gym provides a needed distraction from the often times seemingly insurmountable pressures of college life. I will argue that the college representatives in charge of such matters should review current operating hours and consider alternatives such as staggering hours between computer centers; or late hours during weeknights and heavy use times toward the end of the semester; or opening three or four nights a week during breaks. An undergraduate university began such measures the semester I was there. The downtown campus closed their computer center from 4 to 6 p.m. (those hours with the least amount of traffic), then utilized those hours by opening one hour earlier in the morning and staying open one hour later at night. I work unconventional hours (and will be working a lot more of them now) as do many other students. I am now fortunate. Most students do not have the luxury of a very fast, very large personal computer they can use anytime.

Our school does not have to spend more money, merely be a little more creative in their manipulation of resources. It's not an impossible task. Companies and institutions have been finding new and innovative solutions (job share, flex time and on-site day care to name a few) to meet the needs of those they serve for a decade and a half now.

Come on Eastern, it's 1994.

# BOG meeting agendas now available on computer system

The Board of Governors recently made news updates from its chancellor's office and five universities available to faculty, staff and students on the Educational Computing Network.

BOG spokeswoman Michelle Brazell said the new service will provide meeting agendas the week before board meetings. She said most members of the campus community never see a meeting agenda and are rarely aware of the board's business until after it has been conducted.

In addition to meeting agendas, the service will provide updates on PQP, budget recommendations, IBHE action, salary developments, legislation and collective bargaining. It will also carry announcements of awards and speakers.

"It is important for faculty and staff at our campuses to know what business is being conducted by their governing board," Brazell said.

Brazell said the electronic news updates are an attempt to have more frequent and better communication with faculty and staff on campus. The ECN service is more cost-effective than mailing a newsletter because it saves

postage and paper.

Brazell said the idea to provide news updates on ECN came from the faculty senates at the five universities, which have their own listing in ECN. She said she knows of no other governing boards or system administrations that provide this kind of service.

News about BOG policy-making and higher education issues can be accessed on the ECN Gopher system by selecting "Board of Governors Universities" from the main menu.

Subscription to the service may be obtained by sending an E-mail to "listserv@bgu.edu" containing the single line: "Subscribe bgunews" plus the user's first and last name. All news updates will then automatically be sent to the specified E-mail account.

The system, which has been running less than a month, has received a positive response, Brazell said.

"We are always open to suggestions on topics and ways of presentation," Brazell said. "We're hoping to get some feedback on this service."

Questions, concerns and requests for additional information can be forwarded to Brazell, whose E-mail address appears at the end of the message.

# Economy on five-month rise

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fresh reports reinforced rosy predictions for the reviving economy Wednesday. Home sales surged to an eight-year high and the government's forecasting gauge turned in its best five-month showing since the nation was pulling out of recession a decade ago.

Noting the reports came on Groundhog Day, Robert Derick of the Northern Trust Co. in Chicago said: "These statistics suggest that when the economists came out and looked at the numbers, they saw springtime. We aren't going to hit a brick wall, weather permitting."

The Commerce Department said its Index of Leading Economic Indicators rose for the fifth straight month, including a 0.7 percent advance in December.

The cumulative increase for the five months was 2.5 percent, the best showing since a 1.9 percent rise over seven months in 1983 when the nation was emerging from its worst slump since the Great Depression.

Three straight moves by the index in one direction are considered a good — though not foolproof — sign of where the economy will be moving in the next six to nine months.

While the latest index figures matched economists' projections, the figures for new home sales exceeded most forecasts.

The departments of Commerce and Housing and Urban Development said sales of new homes shot up 9.7 percent in 1993 and ended the year by jumping 11.4 percent in December to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 862,000. That rate was the best monthly showing since an 880,000 rate in March 1986.

Yearly sales totaled 669,000, highest since 676,000 in 1988.

Practically all of the economic news lately has been good.

Last week, the government reported the economy expanded in the last quarter of 1993 at a brisk 5.9 percent annual rate. Many analysts

predict the pace will slacken this year to the 3 percent range.

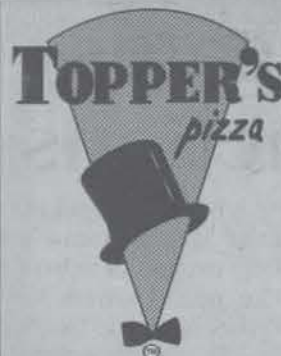
The Gross Domestic Product that measures all goods and services produced in the United States was up 2.9 percent for all of 1993, the strongest performance in five years.

There could be a pause in the advance because of the unusually harsh January weather and the California earthquake.

"But that shouldn't take away from the fact that the economy seems on much more solid footing now" than it was early in 1993, when growth came to a near standstill, said Laurence H. Meyer, head of a St. Louis economic forecasting service.

"We expect consumers to continue to be more upbeat and the labor market to continue to improve," said Merrill Lynch & Co.

Eight of the Commerce Department's forward-looking indicators rose in December, two fell and one was unchanged.



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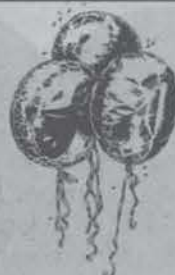

# U.S. investigates nuclear sanctions

WASHINGTON (AP) - The United States should pursue an aggressive diplomatic effort to avoid a "nightmare scenario" of nuclear war in Korea, William Perry told senators Wednesday at his confirmation hearing to be defense secretary.

International sanctions against North Korea could be around the corner, he said.

Perry answered queries ranging from billion-dollar military programs to hot spots around the globe during a cordial - and relatively brief - hearing. He won promises of quick approval from most members of the Senate Armed Services Committee.

Perry, whose soft-spoken demeanor has become a hallmark, evoked laughter from the panel when he quipped that he would "work very hard to overcome that problem."

Sen. Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., told him not to apologize, that "the reason you are going to get an overwhelming vote, if not a unanimous vote, is because of who you are."

"I can't think of anyone who's got the experience and temperament that you have for this job," said Sen. Carl Levin, D-Mich.

Perry, now the No. 2 official at the Pentagon, would replace Les Aspin, who resigned under pressure in December.

# Drug bust turns for worse

CHICAGO (AP) - The four-room apartment was littered with filth and crawling with cockroaches, its windows broken and covered with blankets that flapped in the wind. It was home to 19 children - the oldest 14 years old, the youngest just 1.

When police barged in on a drug raid, they found five of the children sleeping in their underwear on a bare floor. Others fought with a German shepherd dog for scraps of meat on bones scattered on the floor.

Six adult relatives of the children - four mothers, a father and an uncle - were charged with contributing to child neglect, a misdemeanor. Another mother of some of the children was in custody but had not been charged, police said.

"The only remorse they showed was they didn't want



to be arrested," said Maggie Gutierrez, one of the first police officers on the scene.

Police raided the West Side apartment late Tuesday after watching suspected drug dealers do business outside the building through the night. Instead of drugs they found, as one officer put it, "babies everywhere."

"The apartment was cold, the apartment was filthy," police officer Linda Burns said. "I'm talking feces, garbage, food on the floor. I don't even know how to describe it - it was just filth."

"They were eating food off the floor out the bowls the dogs were eating out of," said police Lt. Fred Bosse. "The

remaining food that was the floor was being fouled over by the dogs and the children."

Some of the children begged officers to be "my mommy," said police officer Patricia Warner.

One of the children, a year-old, was hospitalized in fair condition; the others were taken to a shelter for neglected children after being examined at hospital. One child had cigarette burns, cuts and bruises, police Sgt. Russell Mueller said, raising the possibility of abuse.

The children belonged to six different families, three of which had previously been reported to the state Department of Children and Family Services, said agency spokeswoman Martha Allen. Two of the families had substance-abuse problems, she said.

# Clinton urged to lift trade embargo against Vietnam

WASHINGTON (AP) - It is one of the quirks of history that it could fall to the president who came of age as a Vietnam war protester to undo a remnant of the war's legacy of distrust.

"This is an issue for the present day," President Clinton said Wednesday as he weighed recommendations to lift the U.S. trade embargo against Vietnam.

Aides said the president was preparing to lift the 19-year-old ban, urged on by U.S. businesses and encouraged by Vietnam's cooperation in helping resolve questions about unaccounted-for American soldiers.

Dogged during the presidential campaign by questions about how he avoided the Vietnam draft, and shadowed in office by strained relations with the military, Clinton would like nothing better than to put the war behind him.

He rejected suggestions that his past would make the decision politically more difficult, saying, "We just have to do what's right." Yet because of who he is - and was - the decision could carry special risks.

One administration official, speaking only on condition of anonymity, expressed a fear that "this issue's going

to eat us alive." Such concerns persist although the president got some political cover when the Senate voted last week to support lifting the embargo, still a step short of normalizing relations with Hanoi.

Just as the nation has spent decades coming to grips with its role in Vietnam, so has it been a long, difficult journey for Clinton, who in 1969 wrote to thank a ROTC recruiter "for saving me from the draft" by giving him a deferment.

In the same letter, Clinton sought understanding for those who had

come to find themselves still loving their country but loathing the military. Keenly aware that such a past placed him in a sensitive position on veterans issues, Clinton came into office talking tough on Vietnam.

He promised to make resolution of the POW-MIA issue "a national priority" by insisting on a full accounting of all those soldiers still listed as missing before normalizing relations with Vietnam.

On Memorial Day, he confronted detractors directly in a visit to the Vietnam War Memorial.

# U.N. forces may share blame in Somali deaths

MOGADISHU, Somalia (AP) - Evidence is emerging that the deaths of eight Somalis in a shootout involving U.S. Marines might not have happened except for the poor coordination among the 25,000 foreign soldiers in Somalia.

The Marines say their convoy was returning fire from snipers when it drove around a corner and encountered an unexpected crowd of people waiting for a food handout. They say some of those Somalis had rifles and also began firing.

Somali witnesses offered a different version of Monday's shooting. They said there were no snipers and that the Marines did not fire until they came upon the crowd and panicked after mistaking the people for a mob trying to waylay the convoy. They said some Somalis then shot in self-defense.

U.S. officials said the

Marines did not know Saudi peacekeepers were at an aid center handing out food, an event sure to draw a crowd in Somalia's war-wrecked capital. The convoy could have taken a different route through the area, which the Americans consider one of the most dangerous in Mogadishu.

Despite criticism from relief workers and other U.N. troops, Saudi soldiers often distribute free food without notifying the U.N. commander or relief agencies, said Uli Schmid, a supply officer for the World Food Program.

That is what happened Monday, when hundreds of people lined up in the street outside a distribution center waiting to get flour, sugar and dates.

The commander of Saudi Arabian troops in Somalia, Col. Ali Alghamdi, conceded Wednesday that a crowd

jammed the street outside the food center. But he scoffed at the idea the Saudis should warn other peacekeepers before giving out food.

"We've never had any problem doing this before, and I have never heard any complaints," he said in an interview.

Alghamdi also disputed reports from some Somali witnesses that armed men guarding the Saudi food trucks joined in the shooting after the Marines began firing machine guns and grenade launchers.

He said none of his soldiers or their Somali guards fired any shots.

No relief agency transports food in Mogadishu without hiring Somali guards with machine guns or being guarded by U.N. soldiers because the streets are full of bandits and other people with weapons.

# Leaders want end to war

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) - As Serbs fired from surrounding hills, Benazir Bhutto and Tansu Ciller - women who beat the odds to lead Muslim nations - came to Sarajevo Wednesday to comfort its besieged residents.

After a brief visit to the capital defended by Muslim-led forces, prime ministers Bhutto of Pakistan and Ciller of Turkey appealed to the world to act decisively to end the 21-month-old war.

Turkey and Pakistan have been among the strongest backers of Bosnia's Muslim-led government, whose troops are fighting a desperate battle against better-armed Bosnian Serbs and Bosnian Croats.

"Rarely in the annals of human history has a nation been subjected to such merciless savagery in the full view of the world," Mrs. Bhutto and Ms. Ciller said in a joint statement.

"We who live in peace take life and peace for granted," Mrs. Bhutto said later. "In Sarajevo, we saw shattered people, a shattered city and shattered lives."

Elsewhere in the city, at least five people were killed by Serb shelling Wednesday.

Mrs. Bhutto later called for air strikes against Bosnian Serbs and exempting the Slavic Muslim-led government from a U.N. arms embargo imposed on former Yugoslavia. She spoke in Zagreb, Croatia.

Bosnia's Muslim president, Alija Izetbegovic, said the two were ready to give material and other help to our country. I thank them for that." He was not specific.

The visit was welcomed by most Sarajevans, regardless of religion or nationality. Many Bosnian Croats and Serbs remain loyal to the Muslim-led government.

Sporadic gunfire sounded from the Serb-held hillsides surrounding the city as Mrs. Bhutto and Ms. Ciller arrived at the downtown Bosnian presidency building. A crowd of about 150 braved the dangers of the open street to cheer the two premiers and shout "Bosnia, Bosnia!"

"Turkey and Pakistan are our biggest friends," said Mustafa Jusufbegovic, 70, a Muslim in the crowd.

Two women burst into tears as they tried to get close to the entrance of the presidency building.

"I'm crying because I'm hungry, I'm on the street, I'm cold, and all I want is peace," said Rabija Besic.

The two visitors visited for four hours, but Mrs. Bhutto said the brief stay was "cruel" and left them "emotionally exhausted."

She said U.N. Secretary General Boutros Boutros-Ghali should approve air strikes against Bosnian Serbs defying U.N. aims - something that NATO says it's ready to do with U.N. approval.

She also urged Boutros-Ghali to exempt the Bosnian government from the arms embargo imposed on all warring parties, and said "the United States should take the lead in lifting of the embargo."

The United States favors lifting the embargo on the Muslims.

# U.S. Olympians say Harding situation will ease pressure

LILLEHAMMER, Norway (AP) — The first American athletes to arrive for the Winter Olympics say they could benefit from the courtroom drama swirling around teammates Tonya Harding and Nancy Kerrigan.

Fifteen athletes and three staff members of the men's and women's speedskating team landed in Oslo on Wednesday after a three-stop, 24-hour flight and said the attention on the rival figure skaters would lessen the pressure on even the best-known members of their crew.

"I think it's the best thing that can happen to Bonnie (Blair) and Dan (Jansen)," said Nathaniel Mills, a 1,500-meter racer from Evanston, Ill. "It's already in the media spotlight, everything's Tonya and Nancy, and it will probably stay that way."

Normally, Blair and Jansen could be expected to be the focus of Olympic attention.

Blair, a Champaign, Ill., native, can become the winningest U.S. woman in Olympic history if she sweeps the 500 and 1,000, as she did in Albertville, France, two years ago. That feat would give her five gold medals in all, one more than swimmer Janet Evans, diver Pat McCormick and sprinter Evelyn Ashford.

Jansen is in his fourth Winter Games and still searching for his first gold medal, the one championship in speedskating to elude him. His quest became a worldwide event in

1988 when he slipped and fell in both the 500 and 1,000, trying desperately to win a gold medal in memory of his sister, who died just before his first race.

Peter Mueller, the team's coach, sent Jansen to Norway a day early to try to gain an edge in preparations for the 500, held on the third day of the Winter Games Feb. 14.

He agreed that the focus on the Harding-Kerrigan saga could help his stars concentrate on skating as fast as they can.

"We don't talk much about it, but it does take the pressure off Dan," Mueller said.

Asked if the media maelstrom could spread so wide it would affect Jansen anyway, the coach replied: "I won't let the circus get to Dan. We'll do our own thing."

Mills, a theater major at Northwestern who also was a member of the 1992 Winter Olympic team, said the drama caused by the assault on Kerrigan and subsequent investigation that has implicated Harding's ex-husband and her bodyguard was unlikely to be felt by other athletes.

"When you're in the (Olympic) Village, it's pretty hard to be distracted," he said. "Personally, I wouldn't be distracted."

Mills said opinions among the speedskaters on whether Harding, who has been linked to the plot by former husband Jeff Gillooly, should remain on the Olympic team "are as varied as in the public at large."

Harding gave final approval by saying, "OK, let's do it."

Harding denies any involvement in the attack, in which two other men besides Gillooly and Eckardt have been charged.

Although Kerrigan could not skate at the championships in Detroit after the Jan. 6 attack in which her right leg was smashed with a collapsible baton, she was named with Harding to the U.S. Olympic team anyway — contingent upon Wednesday's evaluation of her skating.

"If there were any doubt or any questions about Nancy Kerrigan's skating condition, she answered them for us this afternoon," said Chuck Foster, secretary to the U.S. Olympic Committee and one of the four judges who watched Kerrigan perform at her practice rink. "We expect that she is going to do very well in Norway."

The judges, who watched Kerrigan Wednesday at a closed performance at Tony Kent Arena, said they were impressed by her stamina after she skated her long program twice, which Foster said "people in the best of conditions haven't done."

"We have given the green light for her to go to the Olympics," James Disbrow, chairman of the figure skating association's international committee, said from Minneapolis after speaking with the judges.

Kerrigan performed her long program, her free-skating program and her original program, executing jumps, spins, footwork and choreography to music, Kelly-Cutone said.

"What we saw was not only good physical condition with a high level of stamina, but her mental condition was very good," said another judge, Kathleen Kelly-Cutone, who was national collegiate champion in 1987, the year before Kerrigan.

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# Williams takes lie detector in defense of rape allegation

CINCINNATI (AP) - Relief pitcher Mitch Williams, who threw up the home run that won last year's World Series, said he took a lie detector test to support his denial of a woman's allegation that he raped her, his lawyer said Wednesday.

Cincinnati police said they were investigating the allegation by a northern Kentucky woman who said Williams raped her in September at a Cincinnati hotel. Williams has not been charged and no

warrants have been issued, police Sgt. Richard Newsom said.

"I am aware of the allegations against me and totally deny them. I am also aware of and welcome the investigation into these allegations," Williams said in a statement released by his lawyer, Martin Pinales. "I am totally cooperating with authorities. I have been asked and have taken and passed a lie detector test."

Williams made the state-

ment after Cincinnati television station WLWT reported that police were investigating the allegation, Pinales said.

Hamilton County Prosecutor Joseph Deters declined comment Wednesday through spokesman Steve Martin.

Williams pitched for the Philadelphia Phillies last season. He gave up a three-run homer to Joe Carter in the ninth inning of Game 6 that won the World Series for Toronto.

# Illinois gets Big Ten victory

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. (AP) - Deon Thomas, whose 11 first-half rebounds matched Penn State's totals, scored 18 points and finished with 14 rebounds Wednesday night as Illinois defeated the Nittany Lions 83-65.

There was no magic in Penn State's Recreation Hall, where the Lions (10-7, 3-5 in the Big Ten) had beaten two Top 25 opponents in a row. Illinois (12-5, 5-3) out-rebounded Penn State 46-32 and had 18 offensive rebounds.

"We felt we may be in trouble coming in," Illinois coach Lou Henson said. "When you knock off a couple of nationally ranked teams, your team is playing exceptional basketball."

But it was Illinois that was exceptional

Wednesday night. The Illini were already up 22-10 11 minutes into the game when the Lions' Michael Jennings left the game after being knocked to the floor, suffering a slight concussion.

With the Lions' shooting guard out, Illinois' lead climbed to 43-22 by halftime after pulling down 28 rebounds to Penn State's 11.

"They were impressive on the boards. They were impressive in every way tonight," Penn State coach Bruce Parkhill said.

Illinois pushed the lead only to 23 in the second half. Penn State rallied within 10, 75-65, after Steve Wydman hit his second consecutive 3-pointer with 2:14 left. The shots were Penn State's last points.

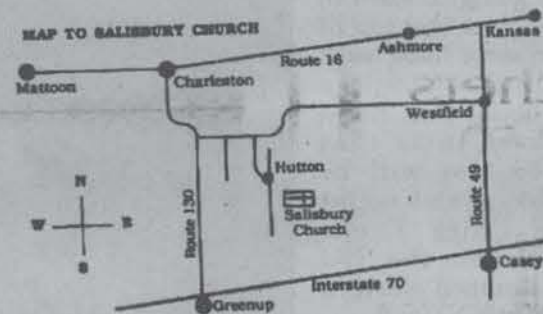
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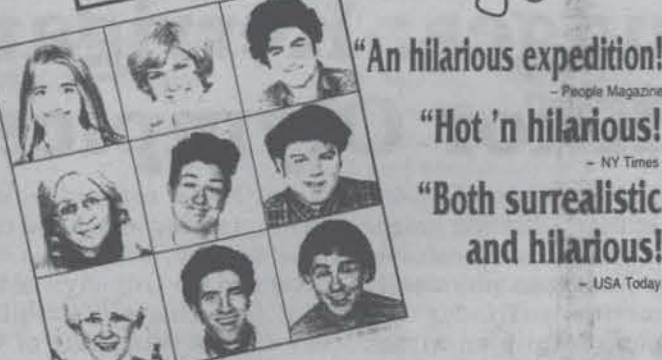

On the surface, it appears that John Klein has little to be optimistic about as his Lady Panthers prepare to tangle with Mid-Continent conference leader Northern Illinois at 7:30 p.m. tonight in Lantz Gym.

But the Eastern head coach said he has hopes that the Lady Panthers (2-14, 1-7) will be ready for the challenge against the Huskies if they come ready to play.

And that's the key according to Klein — if they come ready to play.

"We have to be ready to play a complete game," said Klein. "We haven't been able to finish off the games which we were given the opportunity to win."

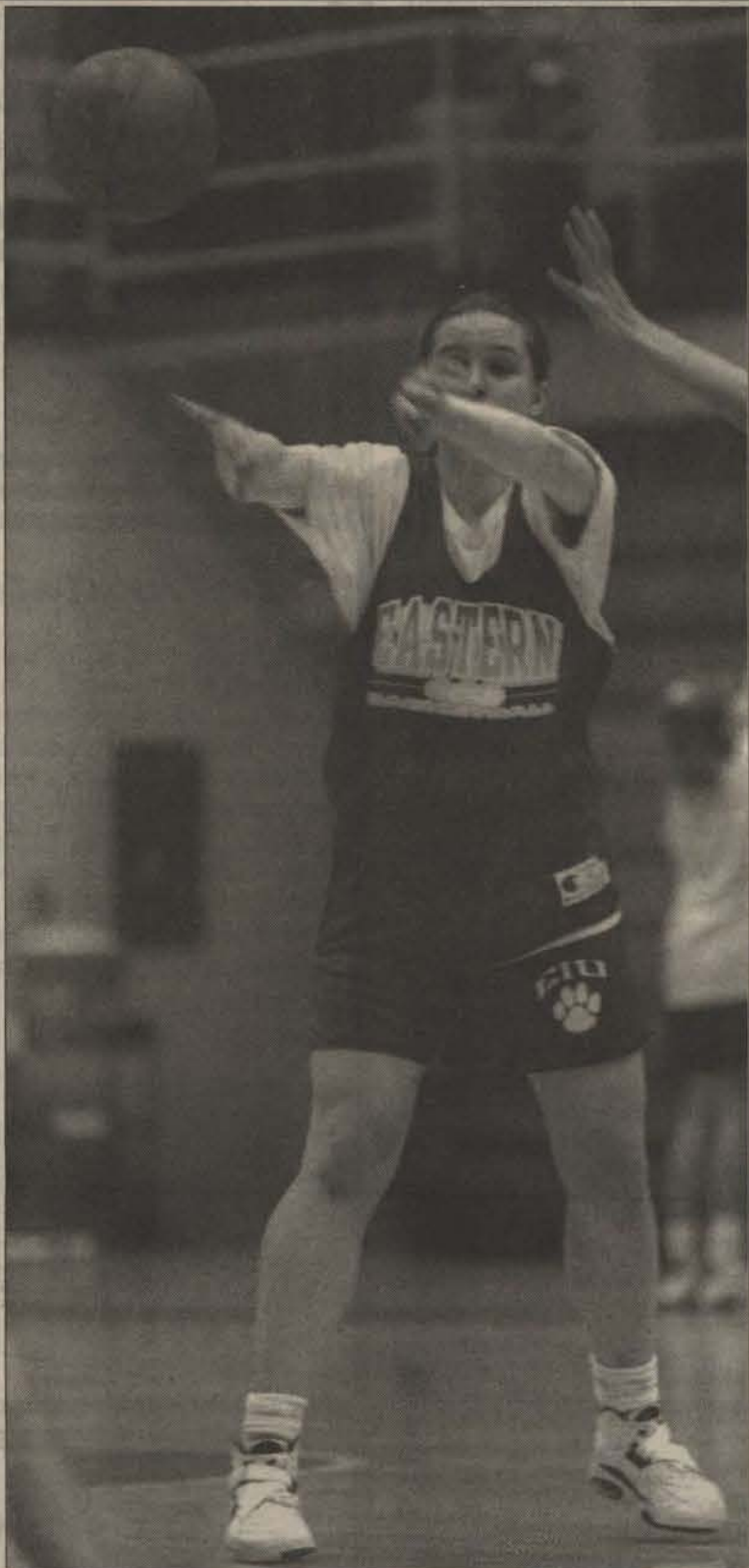
"It's going to take a supreme effort from us," he said. "We're going to have to be completely at the top of our game to even hang with them."

Another detail that Klein can take rest in is that tonight's contest will be played at Lantz and not at Northern's Chick Evans Fieldhouse, where the NIU (11-3, 9-0) stomped Eastern 96-61 last month.

"It's always nicer to play at home," he said. "No matter who you're playing, being home is always much better."

Leading the charge for Northern — who recently stunned No. 4 nationally ranked Iowa 59-56 — will be Mid-Con scoring leader E.C. Hill (22.4 points, five assists per game) and Angela Lockett (13.3 points, 8.7 rebounds per game).

For Eastern, one of Klein's concerns lately have been a lack of players scoring in double figures. But that was no concern in Saturday's Valparaiso contest, which

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## Football team signs recruits

Eastern's football program announced Wednesday the signings of 17 recruits who will continue their playing careers with the Panthers next fall.

Ten of the 17 are defensive players, which includes five defensive linemen, three defensive backs and two linebackers.

"We again knew we had to concentrate on defensive players and offensive linemen," said Panther coach Bob Spoo. "We needed to add depth in these areas, (and) I would describe the linemen and linebackers as very active, very physical players."

The most heralded recruit might be 6-5 quarterback Mark Swinning, a Second Team All-State pick from Waverly, Ohio, who threw for 4,300 yards and 36 touchdowns while guiding his school to a combined 16-3 record the past two years.

"He's the kind of kid who looks like a strong wind might knock him over," said Spoo, noting that Swinning weighs only 185 pounds. "(But) he's a good football player that's been lost in the shuffle. He has a nice touch, good feet, (and) an excellent follow-through."

"Mechanically, he's very sound. We're very excited about him."

Two all-upstate offensive linemen are also on Eastern's list of signees. Brian Ford (6-4, 250) is from Lake Park High and Ed Miquelon (6-3, 270) will graduate from Elgin Larkin.

The Panthers also signed Nazareth Academy's Gerald Anderson, who is perhaps the states' biggest offensive lineman at 6-6, 305.

"We have seven offensive linemen listed as seniors next fall," said Spoo, "so the offensive line will really be depleted and we'd really like to

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## Judges: Kerrigan OK for Olympics

DENNIS, Mass. (AP) — A panel of figure skating judges Wednesday pronounced Nancy Kerrigan physically and mentally fit for the Olympics, despite an attack last month that knocked her out of the national championships.

In Portland, Ore., Jeff Gillooly, the ex-husband of skating champion Tonya Harding, met with investigators at the FBI office one day after he pleaded guilty to racketeering in the attack on Kerrigan.

Multnomah County Deputy District Attorney

Norm Frink refused to disclose anything about the two-hour session, which also was attended by Gillooly's attorney, Ron Hoebet, except to say that it was "part of the ongoing investigation."

Under the plea bargain, Gillooly will be exempt from further charges in exchange for serving two years in prison, paying a \$100,000 fine, and giving further testimony in the case.

Gillooly said he gave Harding's bodyguard, Shawn Eckardt, \$2,000 cash to carry out the attack and afterward
