#### **a** COURSE DESCRIPTION

In *ENG 1002: Composition II*, you will focus on argumentation, as well as the critical inquiry and use of sources. Because our course is only 6 weeks, we will focus heavily on conducting scholarly research, as well as analyzing and connecting sources. You will begin by researching a social issue from multiple perspectives and then write an annotated bibliography and synthesis using those sources. In the process of conducting this project, you will arrive at an argument that you will put forth in a multimodal infographic. A multimodal text is simply a text that communicates its message through multiple modes of communication, like image, layout, gesture, sound, text, and more (think a webpage that includes text, links, images, and more). In addition to these projects, you will write weekly discussion board posts, respond to peer's posts, answer the question of the week, and reflect on the projects you craft in the course.

# **P** COURSE OBJECTIVES

After the successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Apply the principles of argument-claims, reasons, evidence, assumptions, counterarguments, and counter-argumentation-in written documents.

- 2. Produce cogent written arguments that consider ideas, issues, problems, and evidence from multiple perspectives.
- 3. Evaluate primary and secondary source evidence, including quantitative data, to determine its credibility, appropriateness, and relevance.
- 4. Integrate sources ethically, appropriately, and consistently in written documents
- 5. Use data and create graphical elements in their writing.
- 6. Recognize how to transfer their writing processes, understanding of rhetorical principles, genre awareness, understanding of argumentative principles, and the research process to other writing situations.
- 7. Craft arguments in different modalities (e.g. through visuals and oral presentation).
- 8. Craft purposeful adequately developed paragraphs and sentences that are direct, economical, free of ambiguity, and structurally appropriate for the content and audience.
- 9. Revise documents by participating in peer review workshops and writing conferences in order to create possible products for inclusion in the electronic writing portfolio.
- 10. Understand the role that argumentation and digital/media literacy has in civic engagement.

Assignments	To receive credit for the major projects you will need to complete each step of the process on time, according to specifications, and with your best effort. All the major assignments include a detailed rubric of expectations for the projects.				
Discussion Board Posts & Peer Responses	You will post to the discussion board once a week, and discussion board posts will be due on Friday every week unless indicated otherwise in the course schedule. Discussion board prompts can be found in the weekly folder in the week they are due, and your post should respond to the prompt. In addition, you will respond to two peer's posts by Sunday every week. Peer responses should be at least 3-4 sentences long, and you should engage with your peer's posts in thoughtful, genuine ways; say something more than, "I liked your post" or "good points."				
Question of the Week	In addition to writing a weekly discussion board post, you will also respond to a weekly question that asks you something about yourself or is just a silly, fun question to respond to; this a low stakes assignment that allows you to simultaneously earn an easy 10 points and to get to know your classmates.				
Turning in Assignments	You will turn all your major projects and process work, as well as all other course assignments through our D <sub>2</sub> L site. Your Project #1 should be turned in as a <u>Word Document</u> (.doc or .docx), while image files are acceptable for Project #2.
