## E. I. 54, KANSAS IND. 6

After defeating Sparks at Shelbyville, the Kansas Ind. journeyed to E. I. last Thursday and took the very small end of a 54-6 score. Kansas was plainly baffled by the locals' five-men defense.

### Weather Forecast

Thursday, Friday, and Saturday seventeen high schools will battle for first place in the district tournament, the winner of which will go to compete in the sectional tournament. According to the record made by the individual teams throughout the season, Kansas and Charleston are expected to meet again in the finals Saturday night. The honors between these two teams are about equal, each losing a game to the other. Judging from comparative scores Kansas has the edge on Charleston. They have only lost three games, one to Charleston by one point, 23-22; one to Casey, 23-20; and one to Sullivan 27-26. In the return games on their own floor Kansas won from each of these teams by a wide margin. Their hardest game, before the finals, will be with Sidell.

The game with the winner of the Hume-Hindsboro game will not be an easy one. Both these teams have made creditable showings. Hume is not as strong as they were last year, but have a team that will require good basketball to beat.

An interesting incident in the drawing for the tournament is the placing of the five weakest teams so that they will play against one another during the preliminary games. One of these fives will play in the finals, and hold fourth place.

In this group Strasburg and Stewardson are the two strongest teams; but Windsor (who is not classed as being very strong) has won games from both of them.

In the A division, Charleston and Paris stand out as two of the strongest contestants. Charleston has won games from every team that she will meet in the tournament, and is expecting an easy time until she will probably meet Paris, Saturday afternoon. Since she has won two games, by a large margin, from Paris, Charleston confidently expects to play in the finals.

Although dope says that Kansas and Charleston will meet in the finals, Paris, Hume, Hindsboro, Sidell, the Charleston T. C. and Mattoon may figure highly in upsetting all the dope. These teams will be represented by strong fives.

The Charleston T. C. (although this is their first year of basketball) has a good team, and every advantage of playing on their home floor.

Paris expects to carry away the "bacon," while Sidell thinks

she can beat Kansas on a neutral floor.

Charleston should land the district honors. They have lost but two games and made an impressive showing after a reorganization of the mid-season. In Muchmore, Foreman, and Brainard they have a remarkable scoring combination. Bisson and Cochran, two new guards, have stepped into first team suits and played surprisingly good ball. Charleston's ability to come back and turn a defeat into victory is well known. The dope favors either Charleston or Kansas.

### Girls' Tournament

Six games will be played to decide the champion of the girls' basketball class teams. Four of the games will be played the first week in the new term; and two the second week. Each one of the four teams will play the other three. The championship will be decided on the percentage basis.

After the tournament, Miss Stewart is planning to have an exhibition game played by two picked teams.

### E. I. Club Elects Officers

The E. I. club at Champaign held a meeting last week and elected new officers. Edgar Leach was elected president, Charles Allen, secretary, and Horace Gray, treasurer. They are planning to have a dance soon. This was the first meeting that the club has had this year. Part of the time was spent in discussing whether the name of the club should be changed to The Teachers College Club of the University of Illinois, or remain The Normal School Club. There are about 65 former members of E. I. teaching at or attending the University of Illinois.

The winter term closes Thursday at four o'clock. The spring term will start Tuesday of next week. All the students now in school that are coming back next term registered last week. The paying of fees and drawing out of new books should be done Monday.

### Brocton

The Brocton High School Basketball team will enter, for the first time, the district tournament, to be held at Charleston on Mar. 23 and 4. The team contains only five veterans from last year's squad. However, they feel that their progress has been sufficient to warrant a chance for victory in the coming tournament.
