Senate kills discrimination hearings

The Student Senate voted 15-12 Thursday to order its Human Relations Committee to "cease and desist" its hearings into possible deiscriminatory practices by campus organizations.

The Human Relations Committee was told before it continues with hearings it must check federal laws, Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) guidelines, Eastern guidelines and the Student Governemnt constitution regarding discrimination.

The senate also informed the committee it must report the purposes and aims of any future discrimination hearing and receive the senate's okay before hodling them.

Student Body President Mick Chizmar and Senate Speaker Bill Scaggs were in favor of the committee ceasing its hearings.

Scaggs said the hearings should be stopped because "the Student Senate represents the students and the students don't want these hearings."

The hearings began Sept. 29 to investigate possible discriminatory practices by Eastern's Veterans Association and the Baptist Student Union.

Committee co-chairperson Phil Galanter had also said 40 constitutions of other campus organizations may be violating Eastern's Student Bill of Rights regarding discrimination.

Galanter investigated possible discrimination by campus groups during the spring and summer terms.

Based on his findings, he claimed some constitutions filed in the Student Activities and Organizations office may be in violation of Articles XVIII and XX of the Student Governement Constitution which prohibits

discrimination on the basis of sex, religion, race or military service.

The majority of the groups Galanter has claimed may be discriminating on the basis of sex are social and professional fraternities and soroties.

About 300 persons, mostly members of social fraternities and sororities attended the senate meeting in the Union addition Grand Ballroom, and applauded when the senate voted to stop the discrimination hearings.

The crowd at the meeting gave a standing ovation when Governance Committee Chairperson Barry Alexander said his committee interpreted the HEW guidelines as allowing sex discrimination in sororities and fraternities.

On Thursday, the Governance Committee okayed the constitutions of the Alpha Angels and the Phi Beta Sigma Silhouettes even though the constitutions restricted membership by sex.

At the meeting Galanter criticized the Eastern News, claiming it had sensationalized the hearings and misinformed its readers about the entire discrimination issue.

He said a Sept. 17 editorial "Galanter turns discrimination clames into joke" was "rapping" the purpose of the discrimination charges and was written because the editor, Jim Lynch, had nothing better to write about.

Senator Jeff Baker voted in favor of allowing the Human Relations Committee to continue its hearings, but said blaming the News for adverse publicity was a "cop out."

Galanter said Eastern's Veteran Association and

Baptist Student Union appeared before the committee at the discrimination hearings because the editorial had "dirtied" the groups' names and reputation and they wanted to clear themselves.

He also said rumors on campus also blew the intent of the hearing out of proportion.

He also said the committee itself is partly to blame for what has happened concerning the discrimination hearings.

"The committee should have communicated better," Galanter said. "Perhaps we were making a big deal about the hearings."

He also said that he wanted the meetings between the organizations to be discussions rather than hearings.

Galanter said the committee is not threatening to recommend to the senate not to recognize a group, but to talk over and settle discrimination problems if any exist.

The Student Governement Constitution gives the senate the power to refuse recognition of a group that discriminates on the basis of sex, race, religion or military service.

He said no formal complaints had been presented to the committee about anyone being discriminated against, but he said there is an "obvious" discrimination problem on campus.

In other senate business, the senate defeated a constitutional amendment to Article XX of the Student Governement Constitution which would have prohibited discrimination by "sexuality."

The senate voted 14-8 in favor of adding the word "sexuality" to the article, but two-thirds of the senate was needed to approve the proposed amendment.

FBI sent fake letters claiming socialist plots

WASHINGTON (AP) — The FBI mailed phony letters to top Michigan Democrats in a 1965 effort to persuade them that Socialists had infiltrated the Yound Democrats Club at Wayne State University, FBI documents made public Sunday show.

The documents also show the FBI told Cleveland school officials that a local music teacher was married to a Socialist Workers party activist.

The FBI claimed the action prompted the school board to fire the woman.

The documents were released by the Political Rights Defense Fund which represents the Socialist Workers in a \$27 million lawsuit accusing the FBI of unconstitutional harassment and disruption of legitimate political activity.

The FBI was required by a court order to turn over the secret files to the party.

Many files in the latest batch provided the party describe acts undertaken as part of the FBI's broad counterintelligence programs, known as Cointelpro, against the Socialist Workers and various political militants on the right and left.

But some of the documents show that the FBI was interviewing and keeping files on party members in 1972 and 1973. The FBI has said the formal Cointelpro operation ended in April 1971.

The defense fund described the Michigan incident as an attempt "to poison relations between the Michigan Democratic party and its youth affiliate" on the Detroit campus.

Fall blood drive may pass 1,000 goal, set new record

A total of 717 appointments have been made for the American Red Cross Blood Drive which starts Monday.

Karen Hinman, co-chairperson of the drive, said Friday that 367 appointments were arranged for Monday and 360 appointments were arranged for Wednesday.

Monday and Wednesday are appointment days, but donations will also be taken Tuesday and Thursday, which are walk-in days, Walter Lowell, co-chairperson, said.

The drive will be held from 1-5:45 p.m. Monday and 11 a.m.-4:15 p.m. Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday in the University Union west ballroom.

This fall's goal is 1,000 pints.

Hinman said on the walk-in days, "there is usually a combined total of 700 people."

"I am sure we will pass our goal and set a new record," Hinman said.

The record was set last fall when Eastern students and faculty donated a total of 1,158 pints of blood.

The process of donating blood includes registering and measuring blood pressure, pulse and temperature.

A brief medical history is taken and a drop of blood is used to measure red blood count.

The actual donation of blood takes about seven minutes.

A little less than a pint will be taken from each donor.

Watergate trials long over but fees going up due to defendants' appeals

WASHINGTON (AP) — The major Watergate trials are long over but the legal fees are still going up as the defendants battle to reverse their convictions.

In most cases, defense lawyers refuse to say what they charged the Watergate defendants.

But information from the few available records as well as from knowledgeable sources puts the total current figure at more than \$2 million.

In addition, salaries for lawyers in the special Watergate prosecutor's office since it was established in May 1973, have totaled about \$3 million.

Both figures still are going up.

With appeals yet to be argued, Atty. Gen. Edward H. Levi has announced his intention to keep the prosecutor's office

open with a reduced staff numbering not more than 15 people, including lawyers and secretaries.

This is about 10 per cent of the size of the staff at the peak of its investigations.

For the defendants, if their appeals go all the way to the Supreme Court, their bills are likely to increase at least another \$100,000 each.

Legal defense funds set up to help former White House aides H.R. Haldeman and John D. Ehrlichman paid only a fraction of their huge legal bills.

Ehrlichman, who was chief domestic adviser to former President Richard M. Nixon, stood trial and was convicted in both the White House Plumbers and the Watergate cover-up cases.

He has appealed both convictions.

Sources familiar with the Ehrlichman defense headed by Miami attorney William S. Frates said the former Nixon aide currently has legal expenses that top \$500,000.

David J. Williams, a Seattle attorney who headed the Ehrlichman defense fund, refused to say how much was collected but he indicated it fell far short of the total bill.

Haldeman, Nixon's chief of staff, was defended in the cover-up trial by John J. Wilson, a veteran Washington trial attorney whose services come high.

Most estimates put the bill to Haldeman at close to \$400,000. He has appealed his conviction in the cover-up trial.

Z. Wayne Griffin, of Los Angeles, a retired film producer, said the fund-raising effort he headed for Haldeman collected "nowhere near" \$400,000.

Williams to suggest trial period for fines

Glenn Williams, vice president for student affairs, said Friday that he will recommend to President Fite that the dorm fine system proposal be accepted for a trial period.

"It's my impression that I will recommend to the president that we have a trial period. I would give it (the

proposal) an opportunity for a trial before I would veto it," he said.

The proposal would set up a system under which violators of dorm policies and regulations may be fined up to \$10 by dorm student judicial boards.

Williams was undecided as to whether the proposed fine levels of \$5 for first offenses and \$10 for subsequent offenses

are too high or low.

"You can't tell yet; that's the reason I want a trial system," commented Williams.

Williams said that the money collected from the fines would be used to benefit the entire university.

"It will be put into Educational Development, where it will go for everybody, not just social funds or kegger funds, so that everybody can benefit from it," he said.

Dorm residents now pay a fee of \$25 to cover damages which they might inflict on university property, which would not be connected with the fine system.

Louis Hencken, acting director of housing, said that it would be up to the residence hall judicial board to decide if this fee is to be taken into account.

Hencken was interested in stabilizing the amount fined for violations in individual dorms, so that "there's not a fine of \$5 and there's not a fine of 25 cents" for the same offense in different dorms.

"I want to meet with the committee in charge of the proposal again to develop this," he added.

After Fite and Williams approve the proposal, they will consult a Board of Governors attorney.

CIA plotted, attempted to kill Castro through three presidencies—Church

WASHINGTON (AP) — There were both plots and attempts to kill Cuban Premier Fidel Castro by the Central Intelligence Agency over the span of three presidencies, the chairman of the Senate Intelligence committee said Sunday.

Appearing on ABC's "Issues and Answers," Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, said the plots and actual attempts on Castro stretched from the administration of Dwight Eisenhower through that of Lyndon B. Johnson, including President John F. Kennedy.

But Church said his committee has no hard evidence that the three presidents were aware of the attempts.

Earlier, CIA Director William E. Colby said that when Rep. Otis Pike, D-N.Y., challenged the agency to cite one time it

had warned the nation of possible attack, he had forgotten the Cuban Missile crisis.

Colby, appearing on CBS' "Face the Nation," repeated his disagreement with the statement by Pike last week that the intelligence community would not be able to warn the nation of impending attack because the information would not get passed through the upper levels.

That is the reason the CIA was created, Colby said, to coordinate the information collected by various agencies and to fit together the pieces of the puzzle.

Pike, who heads the House Intelligence Committee, had noted the the CIA erred in its prediction there would be no Middle East war in 1973.

Colby responded that the agency did make a mistake in that case, but noted that the CIA doesn't operate a crystal ball.

Eastern students charged with theft of Chamber flags

Two Eastern students were charged Friday with stealing five flags from along Charleston streets during Parents' Weekend.

Paul Hopkins, a freshman from Sparta, and Michael Deak, a sophomore from Harvey, were both charged with theft.

Deak was also charged with criminal damage to property for allegedly burning four of the flags. Deak allegedly burned the flags because he was afraid he might be caught with them.

A police department spokesperson said Sunday the two had been released on a notice to appear and court date was set for Oct. 23.

He said he was not sure if the two were charged with a felony or misdemeanor for the theft or if Deak was charged with a felony or misdemeanor for allegedly burning the flags.

The flags are expected to be flown 15 times a year. The next time they will be flown will be during Eastern's Homecoming.

Democrat appeal refused by Chicago court

The Sixth District U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals has refused to void the results of the November Coles County general elections.

The suit, which had been filed by the Coles County Democratic Party, asked the judges to declare the results of the elections null and void and to conduct new elections.

The appellate court upheld a ruling by Federal Court Judge Henry Wise of Danville.

On Jan. 2, Wise dismissed the suit and terminated a temporary restraining order which had barred the winners of the election from taking office.

The appellate court found there was nothing "clearly erroneous" in Wise's

decision.

The Democrats filed suit after the Nov. 5 elections - in which the Republicans won most of the county offices up for election - were marred by the loss of up to 1,300 votes by the Video-Voter voting machines.

The Democrats argued the malfunctioning of the machines caused those whose votes were lost to be disenfranchised.

However, the appellate court upheld that Wise's ruling, which said the mistakes that caused the loss of the votes were due primarily to human and not mechanical error and there was no reason to hold new elections.

Coles County Democratic Chairperson Joe Connelly said Sunday he was "very

disappointed" over the court's decision.

"The citizens of Coles County are going to be the losers in the end," Connelly said.

"The county will not be able to get out of its contract with the Frank Thornber Co. (the company which sold the county the Video-Voters.)"

"It was very expensive for the county to use the electronic voting machines. Also, I don't think the voters have confidence in the machines."

The Democratic party chief said he thought the county would have trouble with the machines in every election they were used.

"I'm not optimistic as far as the machines are concerned," he said.

Seven dorms to be polled this week on round-the-clock open house option

This week seven residence halls will conduct a survey that may decide which dorm will be considered for 24-hour, seven-day-a-week open house.

The survey, which originally consisted of eight questions asking the general opinion of open house, was reduced to one question at the Residence Hall Association (RHA) meeting Thursday.

Stevenson and Thomas, which already have the round-the-clock open house option, and Lawson, which defeated the option to have it, will be excluded from taking the survey.

East, Lincoln and McKinney Halls conducted their polls last week, but the results of the surveys will not be available until all have been submitted to RHA at

its next meeting.

The remainder of the dorms will conduct the polls this week outside the food service during meal hours.

Andrews and Ford Halls will take their poll on Monday, Taylor Hall sometime Monday or Tuesday, Pemberton and Weller on Tuesday, and Douglas and Carman Halls on Wednesday.

The survey question will ask if residents are in favor of the 24-hour, seven-day-a-week open house with results of the poll based on the percentage of residents who participated.

Ganier pleads guilty to forgery charges

Denise Ganier pleaded guilty Friday to felony charges of forgery stemming from a false check cashing scheme.

Ganier, a sophomore from Chicago, was sentenced to eight weekends in the Coles County Jail and two years probation. She was also ordered to make restitution for the checks cashed.

She was charged with cashing three checks from the account of Patricia Sellon on Aug. 5 and 6 and on Sept. 5.

The first two checks were cashed at the University Union check cashing window and the third was cashed at Benedict's on the square.

Why did Galanter wait so long to speak out?

There is a theory in journalism that if a reporter makes a mistake, he/she hears about it that day or the next.

It is highly unusual for the person or persons who are being written about to wait three or even two days to lodge a complaint about the quantity or accuracy of the coverage they are receiving and he/she/they definitely do not wait until three stories and an editorial have been written before making their feelings known.

However, Phil Galanter, faced by almost 300 social greeks, veterans and other members of the student body, tried Thursday to make the Eastern News a scapegoat in his mishandling of the discrimination hearings.

Galanter, in what seemed to be an obvious move to shift the blame over

the furor caused by the hearings, charged the paper with misinforming the students of the scope and intent of the hearings and sensationalizing the hearings themselves.

He accused the News of writing an editorial on Sept. 11 pointing out the weaknesses of the planned hearings simply because it had "nothing else to write about."

What the senator failed or refused to recognize was that his charging 42 groups on campus with possible discrimination was an issue of some consequence and it would have more effect on the student body than the rerouting of traffic around the Division Street bridge, the amount of power, gas and water used by Eastern in August or the possibility of some students

teaching in England.

Galanter also accused a member of the News with trying to make something out of nothing, yet it was Galanter himself who came to the paper to inform it that he had found that possibly 42 groups were guilty of discrimination.

The question here is why Galanter waited almost two weeks from the time the first story on his plans appeared (Sept. 16) until he first voiced his complaints in a conversation with the editor of the News in the Student Government office on Tuesday. During that time three stories appeared on Galanter and his Human Relations Committee and not once did he say a word.

It was at this time that Galanter was beginning to feel the pressure from all sides about what his committee was doing, about how it was alienating even some of the most ardent supporters of student government.

Galanter also claimed that the names Baptist Student Union and the Eastern Veterans Association had been "dirtied" by the Sept. 17 editorial, but the two groups never indicated to the News this was the case.

If Galanter felt the News was providing the wrong sort of coverage to his committee's hearings, he should have said so much earlier than he did. His actions Thursday in a public forum showed only that he was looking for a scapegoat for his own mistakes.

Other side corresponds with agents through a mother-in-law

'Discrimination,' like yelling 'fire,' guaranteed to elicit response

Cannabis does not lead to addiction

In light of the Jim Lynch article of Sept. 24, I would like to present a few facts and figures on marijuana. The following quotations and other data are from the report issued March, 1972 by the National Commission on Marijuana and Drug Abuse, Marijuana: A signal of Misunderstanding.

The thirteen member bi-partisan Commission, created by the Comprehensive Drug Abuse and Control Act of 1970 (Section 601, Public Law 91-513), consisted of nine persons appointed by President Nixon, two U.S. Senators and two members of the House of Representatives.

"No conclusive evidence exists of any physical damage, disturbances of bodily processes or proven human fatalities attributable solely to even very high doses of marijuana." (pp. 56-57)

"No objective evidence of specific pathology of brain tissue has been documented. This fact contrasts sharply with the well-established brain damage of chronic alcoholism." (p.85)

"In a word, cannabis does not lead to physical dependence." (p.87)

"Neither the marijuana user nor the drug itself can be said to constitute a danger to public safety." (p.78)

"The fact should be emphasized that the overwhelming majority of users do not progress to other drugs." (p.87)

Also, 26 million Americans, or 16 per cent of the adult population, have tried marijuana at least once. This represents an increase of 2 million people over 1971.

Edward Kennedy's retarded sister found after 5-hour disappearance

CHICAGO (AP)- The mentally retarded sister of Sen. Edward Kennedy was found "walking down the street looking in the windows" five hours after she disappeared from a downtown church.

Rosemary Kennedy, 55, who wandered away from St. Peter's Church after the 11 a.m. mass which she attended with Eunice Shriver, wife of Democratic presidential candidate Sargent Shriver, was picked up by a Chicago television reporter.

She was found on Michigan Avenue across the street from the Chicago Art Institute, about four blocks from St. Peter's.

Peter Nolan, the reporter who was covering Kennedy's disappearance for WBBM television, said, "She was just walking down the street looking in the windows."

Nolan said he was cruising in a car and happened to spot her. "I went over and asked her if she was looking for Eunice, and she said yes," he said.

The five-hour search for Kennedy, during which police put into effect an emergency plan, ended when she was taken to a downtown district station by

two patrolmen.

"She's fine. She was just walking," said a spokesman for Shriver.

The spokesman said Shriver was in Chicago to attend a charity function Saturday night.

Kennedy, a permanent resident at the St. Coletta Home in Jefferson, Wis., had traveled to Chicago to visit her sister for the day, he said.

Shriver was staying at a downtown hotel and the sisters had attended morning mass at St. Peter's, a cathedral located a block and a half from City Hall and frequently attended by Mayor Richard J. Daley, a longtime friend of the Kennedy family.

PAD enrollment hits total of 551 for fall session

A total of 551 persons have enrolled for the Personal Advanced Development (PAD) courses for the fall sessions, Mary Smith, administrative assistant of the Housing Office, said Friday.

The PAD courses, sponsored by the Housing Office, are non-credit courses offered to students at no expense.

Registration for the classes range from 76 students enrolled for an auto mechanics class to 4 students enrolled for a class discussion group that will deal with topics concerning the psychiatric hospital.

Smith said the yoga class was canceled because of a discrepancy with the instructor.

Also, a section was added to the transactional analysis class.

The courses, which begin Monday, "usually last four to six weeks," Smith said, but noted that some seminars last as long as eight weeks.

Smith said that she bases the success of a course on what students gain from it rather than on the number of students

enrolled in the class.

Instructors for the classes are mostly volunteers consisting of faculty members, students and persons from the Charleston community.

Because instructors are not paid for their services, students are offered the courses at no expense with the housing office paying various fees such as use of pool tables in the billiards course.

Smith said the instructors use their own teaching format; the only structure they are given is the time and place of the class.

The courses in the PAD program may eventually prompt the development of new course in university academics.

Smith said the Speech Pathology Department wanted one of its classes to take for credit the course in sign language offered through PAD.

One problem of the program is its loss of instructors due to other organizations offering pay. Last year, the Charleston Recreation Department hired the belly dancing instructor, Smith said.

Florida man dies after heart attack in Union

Kenneth Curry, 65, of Florida died Sunday following a heart attack in the University Union.

Mr. Curry, formerly of Alton, collapsed in the Union during a dinner engagement with friends from Mattoon and was taken to the Charleston Community Memorial Hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival at 12:22 p.m. Coroner Dick Lynch said.

Services will be held at Gent Funeral Home in Alton.

Sinai technicians on Congress' slate

WASHINGTON (AP) - The issue of placing American technicians in the Middle East and an attempt to override a veto of the child nutrition bill top this week's congressional agenda.

After a full week of debate no end appears in sight for the fight over federal controls on the price of natural gas at the well.

Both houses of Congress plan floor votes Wednesday on allowing the American monitors in Sinai.

The House International Relations Committee approved the technicians Friday, but the Senate Foreign Relations Committee has more hearings scheduled.

A public hearing was set for Monday following a committee decision Friday to declassify four documents spelling U.S. agreements to Israel and Egypt in their disengagement.

And Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger and Secretary of Defense James R. Schlesinger are to appear Tuesday for questioning.

The Senate committee may vote late Tuesday on the monitors.

The House resolution requires that the Americans be civilian volunteers and that they be withdrawn immediately in case of a new war and places other conditions on them.

Linked hands to cross U.S.

ROSEMONT, Ill. (AP) - More than 40 persons from across the nation met here Sunday to forge the first major link in a plan to mark the July 4th Bicentennial with a "hands across America" celebration.

The meeting drew consensus on a tentative East-to-West route by which persons would hold hand in a human chain across the United States on the

nation's 200th birthday next year.

Attending were representatives of some national civic organizations as well as individuals and an observer from the American Revolutionary Bicentennial Administration ARBA.

Chicago attorney Marvin Rosenblum, who conceived the plan earlier this year, said, "You can't photograph linked spirits ...so you have to go for the next best thing - linked hands."

The tentative route, which Rosenblum emphasized is flexible and subject to deviations, would begin in Boston.

The Minnie Riperton concert, scheduled for Oct. 17 at Illinois State University, has been cancelled, an ISU box office spokesperson said Sunday.

No information was available Sunday concerning ticket refunds for the concert, which was advertised Friday in the Eastern News.

Five million dollar 'garage sale' to support abandoned dogs

MADISON, N.J. (AP) — A collection of everything from precious jewels to junk, amassed over 91 years by the late Geraldine Rockefeller Dodge, goes on sale this week.

It's expected to raise over \$5 million - most of it for a bunch of dogs.

The series of auctions begin Tuesday at her 550-acre estate "Giralda" and will continue throughout the fall and winter at the Sotheby Parke Bernet galleries in New York.

Among the spectators will be Bert, a pointer, the last survivor of the 169 dogs Dodge had when she gave up control of her estate 12 years ago.

Most of the money raised in the

auction is earmarked for a foundation to support abandoned dogs.

Bert and her other dogs, in rotated shifts of 12 to avoid jealousy, slept in Mrs. Dodge's second floor bedroom with her until she died.

There was - and still is - an inclined runway from a bedroom window to a fenced-in enclosure for their convenience.

She also kept a \$12 million house and garden empty on the corner of Fifth Avenue and 61st Street in Manhattan in case she ever had to bring any of her dogs to town.

That house is for sale privately, but this Jersey mansion isn't, although disposal of the contents is already being

called the doggondest garage sale in history.

Parke Bernet said that in sheer numbers the Dodge collection is the largest ever auctioned.

Included among the 2,000 objects going are 19th century paintings primarily of animals, bronzes, silver, oriental rugs, carriages - and a 1936 Ford in mint condition.

On sale in New York are her pigeon blood rubies, called the finest to come to market in 20 years, estimated at \$390,000, and a 26.6 carat diamond pendant estimated at \$325,000.

Dodge was born in New York, the daughter of financier William Rockefeller,

brother of John D. Rockefeller Sr.

When she was married in 1907 to Marcellus Hartley Dodge, heir to the Remington Arms fortune, a newspaper called them "the richest couple in the city."

Dodge died Aug. 13, 1973, just 10 years after she had been declared mentally incompetent.

Her testamentary dispositions - will is much too simple a term for the reams of written instructions she left behind - have since been the subject of litigation.

In a settlement worked out in New Jersey Superior Court on March 12, 1974, the Fidelity Union Trust Co. of Newark was named executor.

Pass defense collapses to give CMSU win

WARRENSBURG, Mo. — Eastern's pass defense suffered a complete collapse Saturday night, allowing the Central Missouri State Mules to stage a comeback win over the Panthers, 23-18.

Wasted in the effort was a 126 yard rushing performance by fullback Mark Stettner as the Panthers dropped to an 0-3-1 season record.

Eastern had a 10 point lead late in the fourth quarter but second string Central Missouri quarterback Ray Miller picked the Panther defense apart, passing for one touchdown, a two point conversion and to set up another score.

The first touchdown on the Mules' way back to victory was a one yard run by fullback Dane Henningsen with 5:06 left in the game. The score cut Eastern's lead to four points, and that quickly evaporated to two when the Mules successfully passed for the two point conversion.

The scoring drive covered 43 yards in nine plays with Miller hitting on four of five pass attempts. Most of the completions were for eight to 10 yards to wide open receivers.

Miller found his favorite target of the night, Henry Mason, all alone in the corner of the end zone for the conversion a few seconds later. Eastern got the ball back on the kickoff but had to give it up when they couldn't get a first down.

Dave Hoover punted and the Mules started their drive to the winning tally from their own 38.

Miller passed on every play of the drive, hitting on seven of eight with the

scoring toss being a five-yarder to Mason.

Once again, Miller picked apart the Eastern defense for eight to 10 yards at a time and once again the defenders made it easy by not being there when the receiver was.

Eastern got the ball back with 1:08 left on the clock but lost four yards in four plays to kill any chance for recovery.

Miller was promoted to starting Mule quarterback last week after he had started the season there and played himself out of the job.

John Thompson, who replaced Miller in Central's opening game and was slated to start against Eastern, separated his shoulder with ten minutes left in practice Tuesday.

Central sports information director Jack Barrows said Miller had been replaced for failing to "move the team". He apparently overcame that problem Saturday night.

The Panthers' scoring came on a Jeff Sanders field goal and extra point kick, a run by Kevin Hussey and a run and two point conversion by Stettner.

The first Eastern score was set up on a pass interception by Tom Quinkert, who filched a Miller pass midway through the first quarter and returned it to the Central two yard line.

Quinkert had a good night as he also helped block a field goal attempt and was in on some sackings of Miller.

It took the Panthers four plays to get the ball in but Stettner finally came through from the one foot line.

A trick play by Eastern gave the Panthers a two point conversion and an

8-0 lead.

The center, holder and kicker lined up in the usual formation while the rest of the team set up on the left hashmark.

While the Mules conferred on what to do to block the kick, the ball was snapped to Hussey who was positioned as the holder and he tossed to Stettner on the left and the sophomore fullback carried it in unmolested.

Central answered, though, with a 68 yard drive for a touchdown and a two point conversion of their own.

Miller found Mason wide open for a 29 yard score and let Henningsen carry it in for the conversion.

Sanders booted a three pointer from 27 yards out to give the Panthers an 11-8 lead at the half.

Sanders, who missed two field goals in the fourth quarter of last week's game against Southwest Missouri, had two more go awry Saturday as he missed attempts of 37 and 42 yards.

Eastern had another excellent scoring opportunity early in the game but fumbled it away.

On the first play from scrimmage, Tommy Meeks took the option pitch from Hussey and went outside for 38 yards to the Central 36.

On the next play, however, there was an apparent mix-up as Hussey collided with a teammate and fumbled the ball.

Meeks never got a chance to build up his rushing yardage, despite the good start, because he was injured shortly afterwards. Konstantinos said after the game he didn't know how bad the injury was.

Freshman Brian Leonard picked up his first bits of experience as he filled in for Meeks.

Statistically, the styles of the two teams' game plans were graphically illustrated.

Eastern rushed for 217 yards while passing for only five. On the other hand, Central rushed for 27 yards and passed for 237.

A distraught coach John Konstantinos blamed the loss on mental and physical mistakes by the Panthers.

"We were hurt by screens and passes to the tight end," he said. "Those plays shouldn't be worth a nickel."

Konstantinos said the team isn't making the same mistakes over and over again but that they "seem to find new mistakes."

He said he'd have to look at the game films before he knew what happened to the pass defense but he did say "the pass defense is only as good as the pressure and we didn't put too much pressure on the quarterback in the second half."

"I don't know if it's a lack of poise or what," the head mentor said, "but we continue to do dumb things."

He said he's not ready to write this season off yet but added that they have made some changes and are going to make some more.

Booters suffer 1-0 setback to 2nd ranked Quincy Hawks

A goal with less than 10 minutes remaining in the game shattered the Eastern soccer team's hopes of knocking off Quincy, the second-ranked team in the nation, Saturday.

Quincy's fullback McDonnell at the 37:20 mark of the second half gave the Hawks the 1-0 victory and their seventh straight victory.

McDonnell's goal came on a high kick into the right corner of the Panther net as he and Eastern center fullback George Gorleku both fought for possession and ended up sprawled out in the net after the goal was scored.

"We made a mistake and they capitalized on it," Panther coach Fritz Teller said after the heartbreaking setback.

"It was a tough one to lose," the obviously disappointed coach remarked.

The game was not the only thing the Panthers lost, however, as standout Siggy Eichhorst will be lost to the Panthers for the remainder of the season. He suffered a broken ankle midway through the first half of play.

The junior rightwinger from Edmonton, Canada, was carried from the field on a stretcher and taken immediately by ambulance to the hospital.

Teller said, "No doubt about it—it's broken."

Eichhorst drew nothing but praise from Teller who said, "He (Eichhorst) was our best winger."

"His loss has got to hurt us. It would have been a different kind of game if he had been there," Teller remarked.

"He was a constant threat at wing. We'll feel the impact (of his loss) the rest of the season."

Eastern graduate assistant coach Joe Petrone reemphasized Teller's favorable comments about the fine rightwinger as he added, "He was one of our key men."

"His loss has got to affect us. He was going to be an All-American," Petrone said about Eichhorst, who was responsible for generating many Panther

scoring drives in both the past two seasons as well as in this young season.

The game was a very defense-oriented one with primary concentration on defense and not nearly as much on offense.

Any scoring thrusts started by either team were broken up before they could materialize into a significant shot.

Officially, the Hawks had eight shots on goal while the Panthers picked up five shots.

The majority of the Hawks' shots were right at Panther goalie John Baretta.

Neither team dominated play in the first half as both defenses responded well, but the Panthers did not look as sharp as they did in the second half.

Coming into Saturday's game, Quincy

had been scored on only once, that being in their 4-1 win over the University of Missouri—St. Louis, while they had tallied 29 goals in six games.

In the second half, Eastern began pressuring the Hawks early.

The Panthers missed a great scoring opportunity five minutes into the second half when center forward Mike Alhassen's shot on a penalty kick just caught the crossbar on the net and bounded away.

Less than a minute later, Delabar made a fine diving stop on a shot by Eastern's Arturo Galvin.

In addition to losing Eichhorst, Miguel Blair, who scored three goals in the Panthers 5-3 win over Lewis University Sept. 27, was ejected from the games around the 30 minute mark of the second

half.

Blair became involved in an altercation with a member of the Quincy club when the man grabbed Blair's leg.

Blair made a kick at the Quincy man and as is nearly always the case, Blair was caught and consequently thrown out much to the distaste of the Panther bench.

The Quincy man was not penalized.

The loss of Blair in the lineup was the turning point of the game, Teller said afterward.

"We had the offensive thrust, but when Miguel was tossed out, that took it away."

Also injured in the game was Leonard Mason, Eastern's left inside forward.

He sustained a leg injury in the first part of the second half.

He returned to the lineup later in the half, but was replaced soon as it was apparent that he had not fully recovered from the injury.
