## Mayor needs council vote to up age

Charleston Mayor Clancy Pfeiffer said he cannot raise the bar entry age to 21 without bringing the proposal to the city council for vote.

Pfeiffer, who also serves as Charleston's liquor commissioner, said he contacted Illinois Liquor Commission attorney Mort Siegel Friday to learn whether or not he could raise the age without council approval.

Siegel told Charleston City Attorney Tony Zimmerman that as liquor commissioner, Pfeiffer could raise the entry age to 21 "tomorrow" if he wanted. However, when Siegel was first questioned he was unaware of a city ordinance which allows 19 and 20-year-olds to enter bars.

Pfeiffer said he informed Siegel of the ordinance

during their conversation Friday and the lawyer explained that the ordinance could not be changed without a council vote.

Also, according to the Charleston City Code, the liquor commissioner has the power to revoke or suspend any licenses for retail sale of alcoholic liquor and request police to patrol drinking establishments. However, the code does not state that the liquor commissioner has the power to raise the bar entry age.

Pfeiffer previously said he would raise the entry age to bars to 21 or older because of complaints of vandalism from Charleston residents and police.

Although Pfeiffer has not placed the proposal to raise the entry age before the council, he said if he does, he hopes the other commissioners would "go along" with his decision.

## City bars stop drink specials

Most Charleston bars will no longer offer drink specials following a meeting Saturday with Mayor Clancy Pfeiffer.

Several city bar owners met with the mayor to present proposals to help dispel the image that persons under 21 can drink in Charleston bars, John Ward, owner of Roc's said Sunday.

"It was kind of the consensus that specials were detrimental," Ward said. "Everyone seemingly agreed, except Mike (Saathoff, owner of Mike's Place), that it was allowing people to consume an amount of alcohol that they may not be able to responsibly handle, causing an image problem between the public and retail establishments."

Pfeiffer said the owners' proposals included: discontinuing drink specials, enforcing the city ordinance requiring persons to be 19 to enter bars and self-patrolling of drinking establishments by their operators.

Saathoff refused to go along with the owners' proposals and said he viewed the move as a violation of free competition.

"The stopping of specials is just like making it equally fair that grocery stores stop specials," Saathoff said. "It's like telling Eisner's that they can't sell chicken for 49 cents a pound because Wilb Walker's is selling it for 69 cents per pound."

Although Mike's Place will continue to feature drink specials, Saathoff said he began a policy on Friday which requires persons to be 21 years of age before being allowed to enter his tavern.

Saathoff said he believed continuing to run specials at Mike's Place while enforcing 21-year-old entry would help his business. "It's just like shopping for groceries—people go where the specials are," he added.

Ward said he did not expect his business to be adversely affected by the changes, adding that Roc's will continue its policy of carding persons at the door. In addition, Ward said, "We will discontinue advertising specials and discontinue certain specials such as quarter beers and all you can drink."

"I would say that if these situations do not improve public relations or whatever, I have all the faith in the world that other decisions will be made," Ward said.

He added that among "other decisions" could be a request by Pfeiffer that only those 21 or older be allowed to enter the city's bars. "All he has to do is ask," Ward said.

Ted Bertuca of Ted's Warehouse, Dean Franz of Sporty's and Mike Knoop of the Uptowner and Cellar were not available for comment Sunday.

## BOG approves room, board rates, student fee hikes

SPRINGFIELD—Although Eastern's tuition for the year 1984 has not been determined, Thursday the Board of Governors approved room and board rates and student fees.

The BOG unanimously approved a \$56-per-year room and board increase and four student fee increases.

Off-campus students will pay \$1,986 next year for room and board. The 2.9-percent increase would be the lowest room and board rate hike at Eastern in 10 years.

Also, the BOG approved a \$5.20 increase in the transcript revenue fee which brings the fee to \$55.25 per transcript.

Many of the buildings on Eastern's campus, including residence halls and gymnasiums, are funded by the bond revenue building budget.

Each student will pay \$110.40 next year to create the bond revenue budget. State law prohibits the use of bond funds to construct or maintain non-academic or institutionally orientated buildings.

The approved was an \$1.70-per-semester increase

in the health insurance fee. Student health insurance, which is required by the BOG, is designed to help students pay for medical treatment.

However, an insurance refund may be obtained by students who are covered by a comparable or better health insurance policy.

The board also approved a 50 cent-per-semester grants-in-aid fee increase. Currently, Eastern students pay \$18 per semester for GIA's.

Student fees help support needy or talented Eastern students through the GIA's and the Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Student programs.

Students will pay \$2 next year for transcripts.

The \$1 increase in the fee for transcripts was approved to defer cost increases in supplies and services.

Although the majority of the approved budget requests called for increases, the BOG approved a 7-per-semester decrease in the textbook rental fee.

Next year students will pay \$33 per semester for textbook rental. Currently, students pay \$40 per semester.

The textbook rental fees help maintain the textbook rental system which allows Eastern students to borrow rather than purchase textbooks.

The fee was decreased because the Textbook Rental Service has built-up a sufficient surplus of funds.

## Crew relaxes after space voyage

SPACE CENTER, Houston—The men of Challenger, back from a five-day, 2.1 million-mile voyage, relaxed at home Sunday while technicians in California prepared the space shuttle for its flight back to Kennedy Space Center.

Astronauts Paul J. Weitz and Karol Bobko guided the spacecraft to a picturebook landing on a concrete runway at Edwards Air Force Base on Saturday, ending the maiden voyage of the second ship in America's shuttle fleet.

Story Musgrave and Donald Peterson, the astronauts who conducted a three-hour, 47-minute spacewalk on Thursday, rode as passengers during Challenger's halfway-around-the-world dive from orbit through clear skies to the desert landing at Edwards.

## Mother murders children at U of I

URBANA—A 22-year-old woman was charged with murder Sunday in the stabbing deaths of her two young children at a University of Illinois housing complex, officials said.

Champaign County State's Attorney Thomas Difanis said Kathleen Johnson was charged with murder in the deaths of her children, Jeremiah, 3, and Michael, 2.

A public defender was appointed to defend Mrs. Johnson, who will undergo psychiatric examinations, Difanis said. She is being held without bond at the Adolph Meyer Zone Center, a mental health facility in Decatur, he said.

Officials said the children were killed at the University of Illinois married student housing complex, Orchard Downs.

U of I spokesman Fred Mohn said Friday that the children's father notified police.

Orace Johnson, the children's grandfather, is a U of I accounting professor.

# Middle East peace plan set back

AMMAN, Jordan (AP)—King Hussein on Sunday scrapped negotiations with PLO chief Yasser Arafat for a joint approach toward talks with Israel and said he would not enter the talks independently, dealing a crippling setback to President Reagan's Middle East peace plan.

In a statement issued by the government news agency Petra, Hussein announced that after several days of talks with the chairman of the Palestine Liberation Organization, he decided his country would "neither act separately nor in lieu of anyone in Middle East peace negotiations."

Well-informed PLO sources, who declined to be identified, said Hussein was angry that Arafat had reneged on a tentative agreement to sign a joint communique that would have embraced the Reagan plan as a basis for negotiating with

Israel. The sources said the communique would also have carried an implicit recognition of the Jewish state.

In Washington, State Department officials were studying the text of Hussein's announcement and had no immediate comment.

Hussein's decision was a severe setback for the Reagan plan, which calls for Palestinian autonomy in the Israeli-occupied West Bank of the Jordan River and Gaza Strip in close association with Jordan.

Although Israel has rejected the Reagan plan, U.S. officials have said they believed the Israelis might compromise if Hussein and non-PLO Palestinians offered to negotiate in lieu of guerrilla organization. Both the United States and Israel will not deal with the PLO directly.

# Democrats fear mayoral results

CHICAGO (AP)—Democrats are keeping a nervous watch on Chicago's bitter mayoral campaign, fearful that defeat for Harold Washington on Tuesday could drain away vital black support for their 1984 presidential nominee.

Some democrats already are speaking of betrayal and disciplinary measures against Chicago ward bosses who are backing Republican Bernard Epton against the 60-year-old congressman campaigning to be the city's first black mayor.

Some black leaders, meanwhile, say the party must be held to account if it can't deliver white votes. Some predict a Washington defeat would discourage blacks, the party's most reliable sup-

porters, from turning out in 1984.

"They see that Democrats are going into the Republican Party in Chicago in droves, which makes it seem that the real party is a white citizens party and not a Democratic Party," says the Rev. Jesse L. Jackson, head of the Chicago-based self-help group Operation PUSH.

The Rev. Joseph Lowery, president of the Atlanta-based Southern Christian Leadership Conference, says it would be hard to separate Chicago's Democrats from those nationwide "because Chicago has been the most Democratic city."

If Washington loses, black voters are likely "to ask some questions," says the Democratic candidate's pollster, Pat Cadell.

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

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# BOG official to help create campus search committee

Sheila Billerbeck, executive director, will meet with faculty and student leaders Monday in order to begin establishing a campus advisory search committee.

Walters, also BOG presidential search committee advisor, will meet with Faculty Senate and student government leaders to discuss the selection process of the campus advisory search committee, which will help the search committee select Eastern President Daniel E. Marvin's replacement.

Walters will be there to provide background information to the groups and tell them about the board's intentions of their purpose," Walters said.

Walters said the campus advisory search committee will allow Eastern and the Charleston community to participate as an advisory group in the selection of Eastern's new president.

"We will be working with this advisory committee towards a common goal to find the best president possible for Eastern," Walters said.

The campus search committee will consist of 17 members, including a representative from Faculty Senate, six student members, one of Eastern's vice presidents, a dean, a professional non-student administrator, a department chairman, three students, two civil servants and Eastern's Alumni Association president.

Walters said he hopes to establish the campus advisory search committee by May 2.

Student Body President Terry Teele,

Executive Vice President Tony Parascondola and Student Senate Speaker Glenn Good will meet with Walters to discuss the committee's student representatives.

Teele said Walters asked him to nominate three students and the Student Senate to nominate three students for the campus advisory search committee.

Eastern students will then vote on three of the six students to be on the campus advisory search committee, Teele said.

Teele said he hopes to "tie in the committee selection elections with the Student Senate elections."

"I really wish we could have more students on the committee," Teele said. "But, I believe that three students can still have an impact on the decision, though."

However, Good said he feels "three students is definitely an adequate amount."

"We usually have had only two student representatives on previous search committees," Good said. "This will be a good opportunity for the students to voice who they prefer for the next president."

Also, Walters said he will meet with Faculty Senate leaders. However, Faculty Senate Chairman Jeffrey Lynch could not be reached for comment Sunday.

Faculty and student leaders will meet with Walters at 2:30 p.m. Monday in the President's Conference Room on the first floor of Old Main.

# Bar owners could be hurt if entry age is increased

The financial impact on Charleston "could be substantial" if Mayor Clancy Pfeiffer raises the bar entry age to 21, a Charleston Area Chamber of Commerce official said Sunday.

Martin Owens, executive vice president of the Chamber, said the impact on bar owners financially "could be substantial based on frequent visits by college students."

Results of a recent economic impact study conducted by Robert Meier of Eastern's marketing department showed that the average amount spent by each student on entertainment per month is \$25. The study also reports that the total monthly expenditures on entertainment by students is \$352,525.

Meier was unavailable for comment Sunday.

Owens said the figures "prove how substantial the impact could be." He added, "A couple of restaurant/tavern types indicated that it (the higher entry age) could

close them up."

Owens said the financial impact could also be felt by the students who are under 21 and working in the bars.

"From the chamber's viewpoint, it is important to have the business and it also provides jobs for students," he said.

Owens added, "I overheard some students talking who apparently work in bars. They said they may have to go to another school if the entry age would not allow them to work in the bars."

However, the Charleston Municipal Code states that a person may be 18 and serve liquor. Specifically, "It shall be unlawful for any licensee to permit or to employ any person under the age of 18 years of age to serve alcoholic liquor."

Owens said he believes that "self-policing by the owners will work in improving the situation of underage drinkers. It will work well because it has in other states."

## Correction

It was incorrectly reported in Friday's edition of the *Daily Eastern News* that Council on Academic Affairs Chairman David Buchanan said the credit-no credit proposal must be

approved by Eastern President Daniel E. Marvin and the Board of Governors. The proposal only needs Marvin's approval before being implemented.

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## Please do not support credit-no credit option

Dear President Marvin:

I believe you should veto the Council on Academic Affairs' proposed credit-no credit option.

The proposal should be vetoed because the student body has expressed its disapproval of the plan which would eliminate credit given to students who earn a D in a class they chose to take under the option.

I agree with the arguments presented by student government members that the CAA, by adopting this proposal, is changing the whole concept of grades and their worth and is thus altering the definition of a D.

The credit-no credit option has been proposed to replace Eastern's current pass-fail option. The pass-fail option is designed to allow students to take classes outside their majors without fear of being penalized for doing poorly in an unfamiliar subject.

Sharon Bartling, author of the credit-no credit proposal, has said the plan would not hurt anyone. However, according to her own statistics, 18 percent of the students enrolled in pass-fail classes receive D's. If the proposal is passed, that 18 percent of the student population would receive no credit for their class work.

A strong argument exists that students will be wary of taking elective classes in unfamiliar areas because they will have to devote too much time to that class to receive a C and, consequently, credit.

This wariness could hurt Eastern students' ability to obtain a

broad education. Students may choose not to take classes outside their major for fear their work will not earn them credit.

Bartling has also stated a CR (credit) instead of P (pass) on students' transcripts would enhance employment opportunities.

It seems more likely that future employers would be most interested in hiring employees with broad educations. And, if that is the case, instituting a credit-no credit option—that inhibits students from taking classes outside their major—would hinder employment opportunities.

The CAA has said there is evidence that students and faculty at Eastern favor the credit-no credit proposal, but as of yet that evidence has not been presented.

However, evidence supporting an extension of the current pass-fail application deadline, in the form of a petition signed by 900 students, has been presented to the CAA by the Student Senate.

The CAA consistently ignored student pleas to drop consideration of the credit-no credit proposal even though they were presented with arguments against the plan and petitions favoring a slight alteration of the existing pass-fail option.

I believe the credit-no credit option can only hurt students. When deciding the fate of the proposal, please keep in mind my interests and opinions.

# AB approves FY 84 group budgets totaling \$623,012

The Apportionment Board voted Thursday to accept final fiscal year 84 budgets for all student fee-funded campus groups totaling \$623,012.

Of the total figure, \$274,398 will be provided by student fee money. The groups supported by student fees include AB, Art Board, Players, Student Publications, Student Senate, Sports and Recreation, campus radio station WELH and the University Board.

If the proposed FY 84 budgets are given final approval by Eastern administrators, all but one of the groups will receive an increase in their student funding. The Student Publications proposed fee funding remains at the 1983 level.

Also at the meeting, board members agreed to submit the budget requests for the *Daily Eastern News* and the *Warbler* as one package. In the past, a

separate budget for each publication was submitted under the Student Publications total request.

Financial Vice President John Cole said he discussed the change of condensing budget requests into one package with several Eastern administrators including President Daniel E. Marvin and Vice President for Administration and Finance George Miller.

Cole explained the change would make publications budgeting easier.

## Traffic lights repaired on Lincoln

The traffic lights located at the intersection of Lincoln Avenue and University Drive were repaired Friday after malfunctioning for three weeks, Engineer Buddy Reed said Sun-

Streets and Public Improvement Commissioner Wayne Lanman said the malfunctioning light did cause problems when students returned to Charleston after spring break, as well as the Easter holiday traffic.

"A police officer should have been directing traffic when students were returning over spring break," Lanman said.

Lanman also said that the light, which has broken down about twice a year for the past ten years, has been "one big pain in the neck."

Gretchen Righter, police records clerk, said no accidents have occurred because of the malfunctioning light.

However, Lanman said that a street-improvement program now being finalized by the Illinois Department of Transportation, should bring the modernization of the present traffic lights, along with other improvements of Lincoln Avenue, Lanman said.

Lanman said construction is expected to begin this summer and with "a little luck" could be finished in the early fall.

Reed said because the city does not have the means to repair the light, the malfunctioning interior module of the traffic controller was sent to a Texas company for repairs. The company returned the module Wednesday.

Although the repaired part was recalled Wednesday night, Reed said the repair was apparently faulty because the light continued to malfunction.

However, approval from the Illinois Department of Transportation was obtained last week to purchase a spare module for the light in case any problems should arise.

This spare was put to use when electricians discovered that one of the modules was not working correctly. The faulty module has been returned to the firm for further repairs.

"Since most of the work on the *Warbler* is done outside the university, it's almost like a supplement to the *Eastern News*," he added.

In addition, AB members reviewed budget changes made at earlier meetings and made several minor adjustments to the requests of some groups.

The travel line item request was eliminated from the Sports and Recreation budget, as well as \$350 which would have been used to purchase key chains for participants in special events.

Also, \$550 for the purchase of a camera was deleted from the Players

budget, while the Human Potential UB budget request to provide funds for a band appearance was reduced from \$1,550 to \$800.

Cole said he will submit all the groups' budgets to the Student Senate for approval at its Wednesday meeting. After the senate's okay, the budgets will be sent to Vice President for Student Affairs Glenn Williams by Friday, the deadline for submission of the fee-funded group requests.

Although it has passed each of next year's budgets it must consider, Cole said the board will meet again Thursday to discuss a \$500 shortfall in this year's WELH budget.

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# Students speak out against possible tuition increase

Eastern students interviewed recently said they believe that if a 62.7 percent tuition increase was to be implemented for fiscal year 1984, it could seriously effect them.

Freshman Betsy Scott said, "For students who are putting themselves through school, financing will be even harder for next year."

Gov. Jim Thompson has proposed a \$1.2 billion higher education budget for 1984, which is \$87 million below this year's level and calls for a \$500 tuition increase.

Under Thompson's proposed budget, Eastern would receive \$17.7 million in general revenue funds. The allocation would require Eastern to

generate \$12.6 million through tuition and fees.

Eastern students would then face a 62.7 percent tuition increase.

"I think it is lousy," freshman Tim Shannon said. "The government is spending all this money on military when they should be spending it on education."

Shannon added students will need to find "a higher paying job" in order to return to Eastern next year.

Junior Kay Pierce said, "I think they are asking too much."

"I had trouble getting money to go to Eastern this year, so this will make it even rougher for next year," Pierce said.

"With this increase, my student

teaching may have to be done in my home town in order to be able to meet the financial needs," Pierce said.

Sophomore Barry Rogers said the proposed tuition increase will "make it hard to return next year" to Eastern.

"I think this will hurt the school in the long run," Rogers added. "People won't be able to return."

Sophomore Michele Schwaab said she believes the tuition increase will "have a tremendous affect on the university."

"Many students will return home to find jobs and decide to further their education through junior colleges," Schwaab said.

"This will enable them to earn money and get an education at the

same time," Schwaab added.

Freshman Julie Bizer said, "I think it's too bad it had to happen, but it was bound to with the economy the way it is today."

"I feel the government should take money from other areas rather than education," Bizer added. "Education is very important."

Junior Mark Dudley said he believes Thompson should cut back in other areas with "education being cut farth down the line."

Freshman Jim Watkins said, "The main reason I came to Eastern was because of low-costing tuition."

Watkins added he will more than likely be able to return but his "parents will not be happy with the situation."

# Student Senate delays action on liquor issue

 The Student Senate Wednesday decided not to take action on Charleston Mayor Clancy Pfeiffer's recent threat to prohibit anyone under the age of 21 from entering Charleston bars.

A resolution "opposing any change in the current policy until we have had an adequate chance to discuss this policy with Mayor Pfeiffer" was introduced at Wednesday's meeting by student senators Phil Montgomery and Bill Redeker.

A current city ordinance permits 19- and 20-year-olds to enter the Charleston bars.

Student Body President Terry Teele said he was in favor of what the resolution stated, but asked the senate to wait to take action until he speaks with Pfeiffer on Wednesday.

However, Montgomery and Redeker eventually withdrew their resolution.

Montgomery said, "We don't want to throw any wrong signals to the mayor by voting on something before it takes specific action."

Some senators opposed to the resolution said it would contradict Teele's suggestion to hold off action. The senator said the resolution could upset Pfeiffer.

Montgomery said he and Redeker need to make the resolution "as neutral as possible so we wouldn't offend anybody."

Before the withdrawal of the resolution, Teele said, "If we pass this or not pass this, it's not going to make any difference. A resolution is not an action. It only recognizes a concern."

In other action, the senate discussed upcoming student protests against a possible tuition increase.

Senate Speaker Glenn Good announced that students will conduct a "peaceful demonstration" during Celebration '83 to show support for a tuition, rather than tuition, increase next year.

Teele said that another protest against possible tuition increases will be sponsored by the Illinois Student Association April 19 in Springfield.

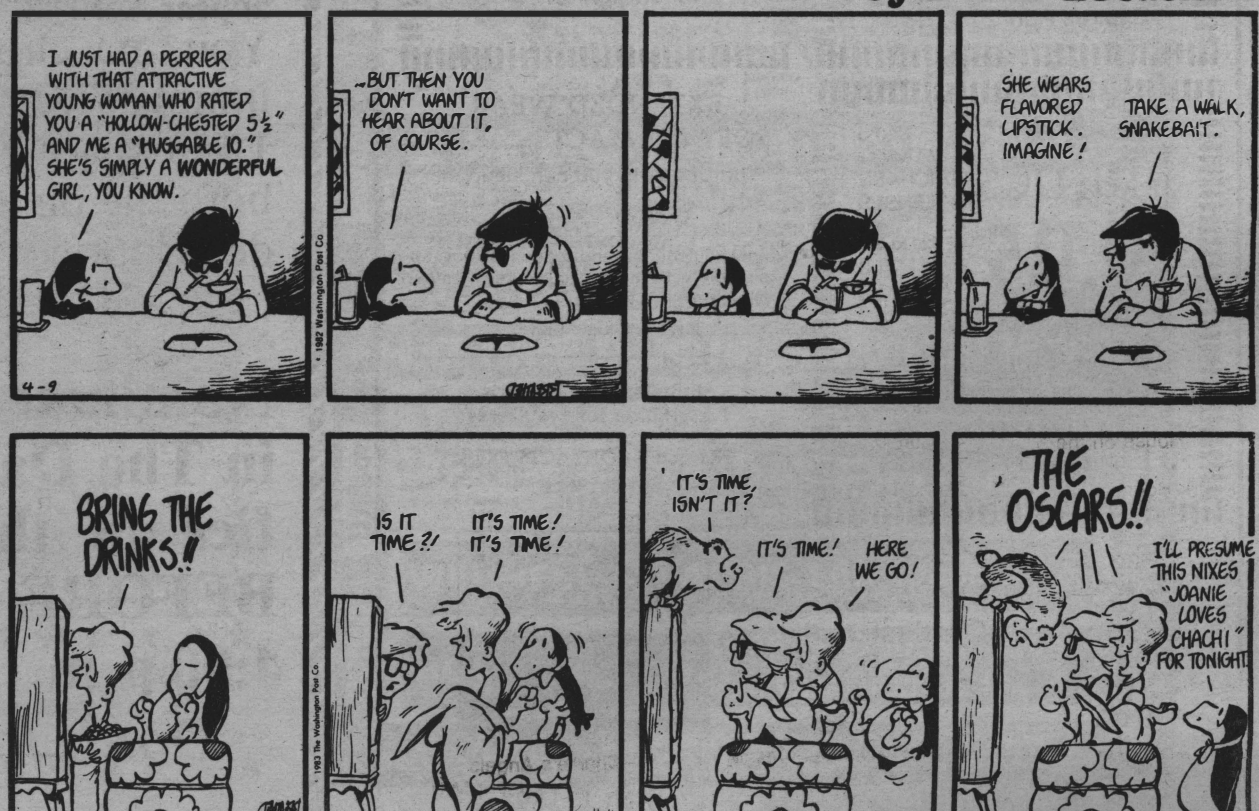

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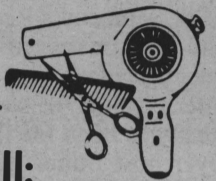
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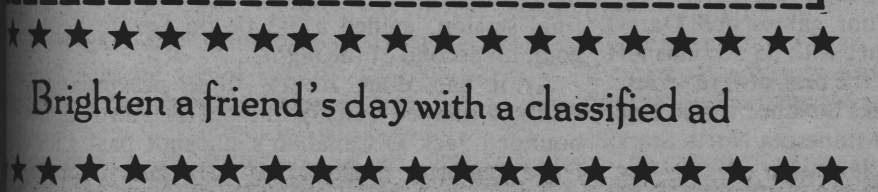
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## Softball team breezes past tourney foes

Eastern rolled to a 9-4 victory over St. Louis University to open the first round and recorded a 3-1 win over host Illinois State before tournament play was canceled.

"I was very pleased with our play this weekend," Eastern head coach Deanna D'Abbraccio said. "I think we proved that we are a quality Division I team."

"We did a good job of hitting, especially against Illinois State," D'Abbraccio continued. "We executed the best we have offensively this season."

Eastern (4-3) smashed out 10 hits against Illinois State to register what D'Abbraccio deemed "their best performance of the season, offensively."

## Wilson sparks Panther trackmen

Cornell Wilson registered two of Eastern's four first place finishes Saturday to spark the Panthers to a respectable showing at the 16 team non-scoring EIU Relays.

Wilson claimed his first title in outlasting Western Illinois' Calvin Horton in the 110-meter high hurdles final, and posted his second title in running a leg in the 330-meter high hurdle shuttle relay.

Wilson's initial title came when the junior edged out Horton by .01 of a second. Wilson finished with a 14.42 time.

The junior hurdler ran a 14.5 split in anchoring Eastern's championship 330-meter high hurdle shuttle relay team.

"He (Wilson) really ran well and was our outstanding performer in the meet," Eastern Assistant coach Tom Akers said.

Panthers Mike Weber and Craig DeWall teamed up with Wilson to notch a 44.96 total time and defeat second-place University of Wisconsin.

Wisconsin finished with a 46.47 total time, while Danville Community College (50.34) followed in third place.

Panther Roxy Wood vaulted 15 feet and recorded fewer misses to defeat Indiana State's Chris Butler in the six-man pole vault title field to give Eastern its third championship.

The Panther 6400-meter relay team of John Gassmann, Tim Warneke, Gary Hudson, and Drew Geisler out ran Bradley University to claim Eastern's fourth title Saturday.

Eastern head coach Neil Moore said in addition to the Panthers' four championships many runners turned in good efforts which contributed to the Panthers' respectable showing.

"We had a good team performance, and we're satisfied with their efforts," Moore said. "Cornell (Wilson) was the highlight of the meet while Paul West and Gary Hudson had very good meets."

West finished the 1500-meter run with a personal-best time of 3:55.91 to chip in one of Eastern's three second-place races.

Joel McKinney and Bob Mazanke placed second in the 3000-meter run (9:17.8) and the discus (157-11 1/2) respectively, to lead Eastern.

Distance runner Warneke was Eastern's lone individual third place finisher Saturday in the 3000-meter run. The Panther distance medley team of Dave Houston, West, Hudson, and McKinney also placed third.

Eastern concluded Saturday's meet with two fourth-place relay teams and three individual fourth-place races.

Gassmann and DeWall placed fourth in the 3000-meter run and 400-meter intermediate hurdles respectively, while Larry Thoennissen placed fourth in the hammer throw.

Eastern's 400-meter relay and sprint relay teams rounded out the Panther team races.

In addition to the 16-teams on hand Saturday, the EIU Relays also featured five track clubs.

Eastern's track club posted second place finishes from Jim Lail and Rick Francis in the shot put and hammer throw respectively.

## Hawks move on, dump St. Louis 5-3

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Rookie Steve Larmer rifled in a slapshot on a power play with 10:21 remaining to snap a tie and give the Chicago Black Hawks a series-clinching 5-3 victory Sunday night over the St. Louis Blues in the National Hockey League playoffs.

Larmer's second goal in four games and Darryl Sutter's score into an empty net with 35 seconds left gave Chicago a 3-1 triumph in the best-of-five series.

By winning, the Black Hawks advance to the Norris Division finals against the Minnesota North Stars, winners over the Toronto Maple Leafs.

St. Louis captain Brian Sutter, whose power play goal in the first period had produced a 2-2 tie, was

off the ice for interference when Larmer connected from 15 feet to the left of Blues goalie Mike Liut.

Rookie Steve Ludzik's backhand shot earlier provided Chicago a 3-2 edge in the middle period. But the Blues, after stymied in the opening minutes of the final session, gained a 3-3 tie on Bernie Federko's goal, his second of the night.

As it had done in the three previous games, Chicago jumped quickly in front as Tim Higgins rebounded Jack O'Callahan's slapshot past Liut and Dave Feamster made it 2-0 on a pass from Denis Savard.
