## Senate ERA vote doubtful

SPRINGFIELD (AP) - Supporters of the federal Equal Rights Amendment said Monday they no longer expect to call the ERA for a vote in the Illinois Senate this month, in what may be a major setback for ERA prospects in Illinois for the next two years.

"We do not expect a vote on Wednesday," said Diane Monk, a spokeswoman for Senate President Thomas C. Hynes, who two weeks ago said he hoped the amendment would be called Wednesday in the votes were there to pass it.

"Support has increased, but the consensus of all supporting groups is that it probably would be more prudent to wait until the new session," said Ms. Monk.

## Official gives guilty plea

CHICAGO (AP) - A Joliet cement union official pleaded guilty Monday to taking \$9,300 in payoffs from construction companies.

Theodore W. Petro, 51, entered the plea in U.S. District Court before Judge John F. Grady to one count of racketeering for engaging in a pattern of corrupt activity and one count of income tax evasion for failing to report the payoffs. Grady set Jan. 17 for sentencing.

Mary Stowell, assistant U.S. attorney, told Grady that Petro received 31 payments ranging from \$50 to \$3,000 between 1969 and 1975 while he was the business representative for Cement Masons Union Local 161 in Joliet.

## **Explosions start oil fires**

SALISBURY, Rhodesia (AP) - A huge fire broke out Monday night after a series of explosions at the main storage depot of four major oil companies about five miles from the center of Salisbury.

The fire began at about 9:15 p.m. local time - 2:15 p.m. EST - and was still burning 90 minutes later. There were no immediate reports of casualties.

A police spokesman said the fire started after a small explosion that was followed by other explosions. The fire raised suspicions of sabotage by black nationalist guerrillas who are stepping up their six-year war against the Salisbury government. Police and fire officials refused comment.

# Body thieves plead guilty

VEVEY, Switzerland (AP) - Two men told a court Monday they acted alone to steal the body of Charlie Chaplin. But a judge hinted the body snatchers might be protecting someone in the bungled ransom plot.

Roman Wardas, 24, of Poland, and Bulgarian-born Gancho Ganev, 38, admitted their guilt in the macabre scheme, saying they felt the March 1 theft would earn them a share of the reported \$100 million the world-famous comedian left his family. The refugees insisted no one else was involved.

Wardas said he was the man who called the Chaplin family home and family attorneys over a 10-week period to negotiate a ransom. He was arrested in a telephone booth while making a ransom call.

# 'Stupid' shootings occur

A cat-and-mouse chase between two cars on an interstate highway boiled into anger and before it was over gunshots were fired and two men lay seriously wounded.

In a separate incident, a motorist was killed by gunshots after his stalled vehicle blocked traffic on an icy street on the South Side of Chicago.

"The whole thing was just...stupid," said Elgin Police Lt. J.W. Smith, describing an incident Sunday night which began on Interstate 90 and ended in the parking lot of an Elgin restaurant.

Verlyn Saylors, 27, of Carpentersville, and Charles Foland, 46, of East Dundee who is Saylors' father-in-law, were each shot in the stomach in the parking lot.

# Kennedy hires expert, heightens speculation

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, who insists he's not running for president, has hired a young political expert in yet another move bound to heighten speculation about his 1980 presidential intentions. Is he running or isn't he?

Even his wife says she doesn't know for sure.

"I have no idea, but every time I pick up a newspaper he's on page one," Joan Kennedy said Monday. "I talk to him all the time, but not about that."

Even though Kennedy keeps denying he's a presidential candidate, he does things candidates are expected to do.

By hiring the political expert, Carl Wagner, Kennedy is getting a man weil-known as a liberal. Wagner's friends say he also was sought by the Carter White House.

Tom Southwick, Kennedy's press secretary, said Wagner, 33, will join the senator's staff next week "to keep track of governors and other out-ofstate officials, as well as help the senator with his speaking schedule."



## 'Freaks'

The Eastern Film Society will present "Freaks," at 5, 7, and 9 p.m. Tuesday in the Buzzard Education Building Auditorium.

"Freaks" is a melodrama classic created by Tod Browning in 1932, and features the lives and abnormalities of the people in the circus sideshows. Admission is \$1. Kennedy hasn't had such an aide since before the 1976 presidential elections. "It was a matter of finding the right person," Southwick siad.

If he's not running for president, why does the Massachusetts Democrat need a \$40,000-a-year political expert to help him keep in touch with out-of-state politicians?

"Because," Southwick said, "there are many things we're involved with legislatively, like welfare and national health insurance, that involve these people."

Southwick said hiring Wagner has nothing to do with any presidential campaign.

Wagner also discounted speculation that he will help Kennedy run for president in the next election.

"I have no expectation that I'll be doing anything regarding 1980."

# Paper storage only bad point in good text plan

We agree that the proposed increase in Textbook Library fees is a relatively inexpensive solution to the library's financial problems.

The preservation of the Textbook Library, although it will require a fee increase, is much less costly to students than a sudden switch to a purchase system as most universities use.

And we are glad a new Textbook Library will be built to accommodate the heavy load which now is placing dangerous stress on the present library.

However, we think administrators-particularly Vice President for Student Affairs Glenn Williams, who proposed the fee increase-should have consulted with student publication leaders before deciding to store newsprint in the new library.

While storage space is desperately needed for the half-ton rolls of paper used to print the Eastern News and other campus publications, such space must be carefully chosen to insure that the paper can be moved easily to the press.

Both Dan Thornburgh, journalism department chairman, and David Reed, student publications adviser, last week pointed out that the feasibility of storing paper in the new Textbook Library has not been adequately considered.

But except for that oversight, we think Williams' proposal to increase fees by \$3 a semester for library operations and between \$2.25 and \$3.65 a year to build the new structure is sound.

As mentioned above, the fee to build the new library is necessary since the present edifice cannot safely handle the number of books stored between semesters.

The increase in operational fees will alleviate the textbook moratorium imposed late last spring because the library had run out of funds to purchase new books.

Although the moratorium was necessary, we agree with students and faculty that any lid on buying new books must be temporary at best.

We are also glad that Williams and President Daniel E. Marvin have consulted with student and faculty leaders in the process of making a decision.

The Textbook Library is one of many good reasons to attend school at Eastern and we applaud student leaders and administrators for their efforts to keep the rental system at a relatively low cost.

The audience had been suitably warmed up by one of the local favorites, Appaloosa.


The crowd appreciated the bouncy country displayed by the group which often appears at Ted's Warehouse. After all, they were there to hear country music.


Daniels' six square dancers also swung around and do-si-doed for the second time making the crowd even wilder.

# Foreman memorial formed for daughters

A memorial fund is being formed for the daughters of a former Charleston High School teacher and coach who was killed along with his wife in a car accident over the Thanksgiving weekend.

The fund will be used to help send the daughters of the late Paul and Doris Foreman to "the college of their choice," Sue O'Brien, an organizer of the fund, said recently.

Three daughters survived the

Foremans. They are Sherri, 19, Cathy, 17, and Christie, 11.

The other sponsors of the fund are Kansas City Royals pitcher Marty Pattin and Red Freeland, owner of Freeland Chevrolet, O'Brien said. All three of the organizers were

friends of Foreman. Foreman, who received a bachelor's, master's and a specialist's degree from Eastern, was principal at Harrisburg High School at the time of his death, O'Brien said.

While at Harrisburg, Foreman was Association and a member of the North Central Committee.

Before Foreman took his job at Harrisburg, he taught and coached at Charleston High School, where Pattin played baseball under him.

"I was very fond of him," Pattin said, "He was my first high school baseball coach and taught me a lot of things that have stayed with me throughout my career."

O'Brien added, "He helped a lot of president of the Illinois Principals kids in student teaching and in getting jobs. He was really a big booster for Eastern."

O'Brien said there is now about \$300 in the fund and that anyone interested in donating to the fund can send his check, made out to the "Foreman Memorial Fund", to the Charleston National Bank.

"Any contribution, great or small, will be appreciated," O'Brien added.

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





Chris Woods, a Thomas Hal executive council member, said Friday the majority of the residents ar pleased with the disco room and knew of only a few objections.







# Tankers beat Missouri-Rolla and ISU

Eastern's men's swim team chalked up two impressive dual meet wins over. Missouri-Rolla and Illinois State on Saturday.

Fridav's meet with Missouri-Rolla was cancelled due to the bad weather. However, since both squads had scheduled meets on Saturday it was decided that the times for each meet would count for Friday's postponed meet. The results were called in over the telephone with the teams comparing times.

The Panthers completely overwhelmed Rolla by a score of 73 to 40 in Saturday's meet at the Lantz pool. In the meet with Illinois State the Panthers dominated once again as they handed the Redbirds a 67 to 45 defeat.

In the meet with ISU Eastern had some outstanding individual per-formances. Senior All-American Dave Watson set a new team and pool record in the 50-yard freestyle with a time of 21.6. In the process Watson qualified

for the nationals with his superb performance. He also added a first in the 100 yard freestyle to his list of accomplishments.

"It was the outstanding swim of the day," head coach Ray Padovan said of Watson's feat.

The 400 yard medley relay team of Bill Spangler, Steve Boone, Tim Bird, and Tim Ward took top honors in that event.

Another senior, all-american Joe Nitch won the 1000-yard freestyle while taking second place in the 500 yard freestyle.

Other first place finishers in the meet were freshman Dave Gibson in the 200yard butterfly, Tom Hussey in the 200 yard backstroke, and Mike Roessler in the 200 yard breastroke.

Eastern's Al Cymbal took first place in the one meter diving competition.

The Panthers also had many second place finishes led by Boone and Spangler in individual events. Boone placed in the 200 yard breastroke while Spangler finished in the backstroke.

Also taking seconds were Eric Swanson in the one- and three-meter diving competition and Mike Foley in the 200 vard freestyle.

Padovan was understandably pleased after the strong showing by his tankers.

'We had some real good swims," he said. "Our young people did an excellent job.

"I thought it was going to be a real, real close meet," Padovan said. "We haven't beaten ISU in three years."

Padovan wasn't clear on how his team defeated the Redbirds so soundly but did offer an explanation.

"I think it was a combination of us being better and them just not being as good as they usually are," he said.

The swimmers will not be in action again until January 12th, when they compete in the Illinois Intercollegiate in Chicago.

NCAA title special to Panthers' Norris

Throughout the entire football season, the Panthers had been overlooked and a statement from recently-fired Western Illinois University head coach Bill Shanahan didn't give Eastern a chance against Delaware either.

Shanahan not only predicted a Panther loss in the title matchup, but the former head mentor also discouraged Eastern's Norris from directing his service to the Leatherneck football program.

"He (Shanahan) told me I wouldn't be able to play for him until I was at least a junior," Norris said. "He didn't think I was good enough."

Norris' visited WIU's campus last January during the recruiting season after narrowing his choices to two schools-Eastern and Western. Besides a scholarship offer, his decision dealt with the opportunity to play.

"Shanahan thought overall I hadn't

Redbirds of Illinois State at 5 p.m. Friday in Normal.


"I'm pretty sure they will play us in a man to man defense so we have a lot of work ahead," Fisher said.





# Warring tabbed by AP for All-American honor

Eastern split end James Warring received another football honor Monday being named to the Associated Press College Division All-American team.

Warring was also named to the Kodak All-American team last week.

The team was picked by various AP sportswriters from around the country, which included the 6-4, 195 pound Warring from Miami, Fla.

Warring caught 81 passes on the season for 1,201 yards and 15 touchdowns. Included in those impressive statistics were six receptions for 82 yards in the Panthers 10-9 NCAA II championship win over the University of Delaware Saturday in Longview, Texas.

"I feel glad and very proud about being named to the team, but I also feel disappointed that none of the offensive linemen were named to the team too," Warring said Monday.

"This offensive line of our's is one of the best in the country. Without those guys the offensive can't do a thing," Warring added.

One week earlier in the semi-final win over Youngstown State, Warring caught 10 passes for 107 yards, being named the "Offensive Player of the Game" by ABC-television.

During the season he was also named Mid-Continent Conference Offensive Player of the Week twice, averaging 15.8 yards per catcn.

Panther runningback Poke Cobb was also honored, being named to the

All-American second team.

Other players named to the first team All-America team included Delaware quarterback Jeff Komlo who was also named to the Kodak All American team with Warring a week ago.

On the season, Komlo threw for 2,675 yards and 20 touchdowns including a 21 for 35 afternoon for 250 yards against Eastern in the championship game.

# Eastern surges past Cheyney State 66-59

The Eastern Panthers put together two big surges in the second half and came from behind to topple the defending NCAA Division II national champion Cheyney State 66-59 Monday at Lantz Gym.

The Panthers trailed 49-47 with 7:40 remaining in the contest, but then ran off nine straight unanswered points to take a 56-49 lead. Mike Pickens scored six points in the stretch to bring Eastern from behind.

After William Sloan hit from outside, and Charles Murphy connected on two free throws, the Wolves trailed by only 56-53.

Eastern then went on a 10-2 spree which salted the game away. Jim Williams tipped in a miss, and then Lance Jones and Pickens scored at the front end of fast breaks to clich the win for the Panthers, now 4-2 on the season.

There were a number of contributing factors to the victory, among the most notable individual performances was Williams' 17 rebounds to go with his 11 points, and James Oldham's 15 points off the bench.

Oldham led the Panthers in scoring, followed closely by Jones who turned in his best performance of the season with 14 points.

Jones added six assists and played an range. errorless floor game.

"I thought all the guards played really well," head coach Don Eddy said. "Lance and Jimi had exceptional games, and Pickens did a real good job when he came back in."

"We have a lot of confidence in our bench," Eddy said. "Craig doesn't play, and Dennis gets into foul problems, and we still beat a really good team.'


The Panthers also corrected the season long problem of turnovers, committing only 15 in the game.
