Storm causes \$3,000 damage to radio console

In the midst of Sunday night's raging storm, a Coles County Sheriff's department radio console was struck by lightning resulting in approximately \$3,000 damage.

The storm, which boasted up to 40-mph winds and dropped temperatures to as low as 67 degrees, according to Local Weather Observer Dallias Price, raged through town at approximately 3:45 a.m. Monday.

Lt. Phil Eppinette, a corrections operations supervisor at the Coles County Sheriff's Department, said, "This morning we suffered some by lightning.

"It hit our antenna line and came in on our transmitters. Our radio console, which is connected to the transmitters, received some extensive damage."

The storm left the department with limited radio use throughout the day.

At present, the monetary value of the damage has not been determined.

Eppinette said he estimated the damage in the \$3,000 range.

Relatively speaking, however, he said, \$3,000 is not a lot since just the communications portion of the radio console has an aggregate value of approximately \$18,000.

Eppinette said it should take three to five days for repairs "before we're back in working order."

The damaged console is used to coordinate police activities.

Eppinette said the only other reported damage was a tree hit by lightning near Jaynesville south of Charleston.

Price said the storm was actually a squall line, which is a line of thunderstorms at the front of a frontal system.

"The storm moved down a northeast to

southeast line from Moline.

"It came in across Iowa," he said.

The storm sprinkled 93 hundredths of an inch of rain across town, providing a momentary relief from the recent scorching temperatures.

"It developed into a very strong storm. It was almost continuous lightning. Fortunately most of the lightning and thunder was in the air," Price said.

Heavier rainfalls occurred in Western Illinois, where Springfield reported approximately 2 inches.

Temperatures are expected to range in the lower 90s throughout the rest of the week, he said.

"It looks as though the rest of the week is going to be pretty sultry," he said.

A midweek afternoon thunderstorm is predicted but it is expected to be brief and will offer little relief from high temperatures, according to Price.

Price labeled the weather an "extended heat

derstorm. The storm dropped 93 one-hundredths inches of rain on the area providing little relief from the hot temperatures.

spell," saying temperatures were not quite hot enough to be considered a "heat wave."

"We've got more hot weather in store," he said.

In the long range forecast, students can expect slowly falling temperatures as summer slips into autumn.

By September, Price said temperatures should have cooled off enough to be considered quite pleasant.

Price said the average highest temperature of the year generally hits on July 20, the midpoint of summer. After that, temperatures begin falling.

Days have already shortened by about 45 minutes from peak daylight time.

On the bright side, for those who enjoy basking in the sun, they have a while longer to bask.

For those who are already suffering from the incredible heat, it will be a while longer before relief is found, outdoors at least.

Frat 'stereotype' hampers move—Madigan

The chances for a Taco Bell restaurant moving to the present site of the Delta Tau Delta fraternity have all but evaporated.

Student Body President, and active Delta Tau Delta member, Mike Madigan said Monday he doesn't expect the variance to pass.

"There's no way it will pass," Madigan said. "It's a shame."

Madigan said the city council is making a mistake by passing up the tax revenue the restaurant would have generated. The council will vote on the issue at their Tuesday meeting.

"They've cut everywhere they could and they still have their deficit," Madigan said.

Madigan said residents have

stereotyped fraternities.

"Sure, the two lifestyles are different, but I don't see them as incompatible. There are parties, but it's a small part of the fraternity."

City Public Works Commissioner Wayne Lanman said Monday that he expects the council to vote unanimously against approving the variance which requests a zoning change in order for the fraternity house to move.

"I think there will be a 5-0 vote to turn down the Opperman's original request currently on file," Lanman said. "My understanding is they will try to take other measures on the matter." Lanman mentioned the possibility of litigation or a second location for the Taco Bell.

The council will meet at 7:30 p.m. in

the city council chambers located at 520 Jackson Ave.

At issue is the request by Champaign couple Gillbert and Molley Opperman and Robert Carlisle for a zoning variance to allow the fraternity to move from its present location at the southeast corner of Lincoln Avenue and Division Street to a location three lots south.

In order for the move to take place, the new lot must be rezoned from an R-3 limited multi-family residential to an R-4 multi-family residential tract. The fraternity's present lot would be sold to the Oppermans who would build the restaurant there.

Madigan said the move would have given the fraternity more parking space and allowed them to move off Lincoln Avenue.

"I don't see what the major concern is," Madigan said. "We would only move one lot down—skip over to the lot on the other side of the house next to us. We haven't had any complaints so far—we haven't been corrupting any children."

He said he was disappointed that no residents approached the fraternity to discuss the issue.

"We would have been more than willing to make a deal, but we were never approached."

"Our national governing body adopted a policy against fraternities buying liquor," Madigan said. "We don't have after-bars like a lot of other frats." Madigan said liability concerns have forced Delta Tau Delta to hold "pretty much all" of their out-of-house parties at the Dynasty Inn.

Soviets pull Afghanistan troops

MOSCOW—Kremlin leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev announced the first Soviet troop withdrawals from Afghanistan on Monday, but he tempered the gesture with a stern warning that Moscow won't quit the 6½-year-old war until "outside interference" stops.

Gorbachev said in a televised address that the Soviets would pull out six regiments by the end of the year to stimulate talks aimed at ending the fighting in Afghanistan.

He did not give a specific timetable or say how many of the Red Army's estimated 115,000 soldiers in Afghanistan were involved. But Western diplomatic sources estimated there were 5,900 to 10,000 soldiers in the six units.

Titanic reported 'unsalvageable'

WOODS HOLE, Mass.—Scientists who explored the Titanic returned to port Monday convinced the liner is unsalvageable and totting 57,000 photos and more than 50 hours of videotape of the wreckage of the world's most famous disaster.

"I hope that through the efforts that we accomplished in last few weeks that it will satisfy the curiosity of everyone... and that there will be no real reason or need to go back, and that the Titanic can finally rest in peace," said chief scientist Robert Ballard.

Ballard, who also led the expedition that found the ship at a depth of 2½ miles last summer, 74 years after it sank with a loss of 1,513 people, said he had no desire to return to it.

Ballard told about 500 friends, relatives, reporters and colleagues from the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution that the team's 11 dives to the Titanic made it clear the ship can never be raised.

Shuttle crew aware of blast

SPACE CENTER, Houston—Space shuttle Challenger Pilot Michael J. Smith exclaimed "Uh-oh!" at the moment the spacecraft exploded, and some of the crew apparently lived long enough to turn on emergency air packs, NASA said Monday.

Smith's remark, heard on a tape of the shuttle's intercom system, was the first indication that any of the seven astronauts killed may have been aware of the Jan. 28 disaster, the worst in the history of space exploration.

The astronauts probably survived the explosion and breakup of the shuttle orbiter and could have had 6 to 15 seconds of "useful consciousness" inside the crew compartment after the blast, said Dr. Joseph Kerwin, an astronaut-physician who investigated the cause of death for the crew.

Judge rules against LaRouchies

CHICAGO—A judge Monday rejected an attempt by two Lyndon LaRouche disciples to force the state Democratic Party to support their candidacies, saying their primary victories entitled them only to places on the November ballot.

"I thought we abolished the monarchy," Mark Fairchild, the LaRouche follower who won the Democratic nomination for the lieutenant governor, said after the ruling.

Fairchild and Janice Hart, the nominee for secretary of state, had sought an injunction to prevent action detrimental to their candidacies by Vince Demuzio, chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee.

Car bomb rips rush-hour Beirut, blast is worst of seven this year

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—A car packed with a quarter ton of explosives blew up in a Christian residential district during morning rush hour Monday, killing 32 people, wounding 140 and wrecking dozens of buildings, police reported.

The blast tore balconies off high-rise apartment houses and set seven of them ablaze. Rescues using metal ladders and forklifts saved more than 50 people trapped on rooftops and the remaining.

Ambulances raced in and out of the stricken area. Radio stations broadcast urgent appeals for blood donations.

It was the worst of the seven car bombings this year in Lebanon, whose 11-year-old sectarian civil war has taken more than 100,000 lives.

No one has taken responsibility for any of the attacks, six of them in Christian east Beirut and one in the southern port city of Sidon, a Moslem stronghold. A total of 98 people have been killed

and 580 wounded.

"My brothers! My two brothers!" Josiane Azar screamed. She fainted when firefighters pulled two bodies from the rubble of a clothing store owned by her brothers Joseph and Wadih.

Many victims were burned beyond identification. The explosion of the white Mercedes gouged a crater more than six feet deep in Wadih Naim street near the Star cinema in Ein Rummaneh district of Christian east Beirut.

Firefighters and civil defense squads spent eight hours in rescue operations.

Police said up to 550 pounds of TNT was packed into the car, which exploded at 8:28 a.m. when Eoin Rummaneh's Snoubra neighborhood was jammed with traffic.

Shattered power cables dangled into the streets from gaping windows in the smoke-blackened apartment buildings. The streets were awash with water from fire hoses.

Stockman cited as 'babysitter'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Before he was a member of Congress, before his stormy tenure as President Reagan's budget director, before he wrote a tell-all book about it all and left town to become a financier in Manhattan, David Stockman was a babysitter for the family of Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y.

This fact was discussed on the Senate floor last week. But Sen. Ernest F. Hollings, D-S.C., was emphatically not impressed.

Hollings, the No. 3 co-author of the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings deficit reduction act, said he would trust Stockman with neither his baby nor the federal budget.

Hollings had been waxing furious about detractors of Gramm-Rudman-Hollings, contending their arguments had no substance.

"When they talk about monsters and madness, manipulation, rogue elephants, scene of the crime, cutting by anonymous consent," believe me they know better than that," Hollings said.

"I ran for president myself," he said. "I know if you can get these clever phrases in and

some journalist picks it up it will be a colorful story. It will be quoted."

And then he turned to Stockman, who Moynihan had cited for his alleged willingness as budget director to "dismantle the domestic side of government" to balance the budget.

"I can only remind the distinguished senator from New York that Stockman was his student, not mine; I never did believe him," Hollings said.

Moynihan sprang to his feet, on a "point of personal privilege," to set the record straight.

"Mr. Stockman was my babysitter, not my student," he declared. "There is no need to make a personal privilege about it," Hollings said. "The senator is the one who told me about his relationship with Mr. Stockman, I am not making it up."

"No," said Moynihan, Stockman was not his student. "He lived with us. I was very happy to have him, in return for living quarters, his principal responsibilities were, to do babysitting occasionally."

Tears, hugs, kisses greet Jenco

WEISBADEN, West Germany (AP)—The Rev. Lawrence Martin Jenco greeted his kin with hugs, tears and kisses Monday and called it "a dream come true" to be free after 19 months of captivity in Lebanon, his family said.

The 51-year-old, bearded Roman Catholic priest from Joliet, Ill., planned to visit the pope in Rome and prayed for the release of three other Americans he knows to be still held hostage in Lebanon.

Ten members of Jenco's family—three brothers, three sisters, a nephew and three in-laws—flew from the United States to greet him in West Germany after his extremist Shiite Moslem kidnappers freed him last Saturday in

eastern Lebanon's Bekaa Valley.

"It was very emotional 10 minutes of hugs, kisses and a lot of tears," nephew Andrew Mihelich told reporters near the U.S. Air Force hospital in Wiesbaden.

In New York, friends and Catholic Relief Services coworkers of the Jenco gave thanks for answered prayers Monday with a Mass of Celebration for his safe release.

"Let this be another lesson on how powerful prayers can be," the principal celebrant, Archbishop Theodore McCarrick of Newark, told the group of about 200 well-wishers at the noontime Mass.



BOG raises paycheck

The Board of Governors Thursday approved an increase in the salaries for the chancellor and presidents of the five BOG schools including Eastern President Stanley Rives.

The board gave both the presidents and the chancellors a 7 percent raise. Last year, the two positions received an 8 percent increase.

The board, which met at the Charleston Inn, is the governing body for Eastern, Western, Northeastern Illinois, Chicago State and Governors State.

Pamela Meyer, spokesman for the BOG, said last Wednesday the smaller increases would probably be in accordance with the smaller education budget allocated by Illinois Gov. James Thompson.

The raise increased the president's salaries from \$76,000 to \$81,000, while the chancellor's salary went from \$86,400 to \$92,000.

Meyer said the raises will be effective for fiscal year 1987.

The board also approved the purchase of a new police car for Eastern, the purchase of new computers and the approval of a new president for Northeastern University.

The BOG approved the purchase of a 1986 Chevrolet Caprice for Eastern's University Police Department.

On May 8, 1986, the board approved the purchase of a 1986 Caprice Classic from Rost Chevrolet in Hammond at a price of \$7,696. But Rost and the second lowest bidder Louis Lakis Ford Inc., Galesburg, were not able to deliver a car that was wanted.

But the third lowest bidder, Mitchell Chevrolet of Greenup, was able to

deliver the vehicle.

Mitchell Chevrolet bided a net price of \$8,325. But, with the extra features needed for police duty, the total cost will be \$8,880.

The trade-in value of the University Police Citation was listed at \$4,000.

Rives said that he wasn't "comfortable" with the current police car, a 1984 citation with over 74,000 miles on it, because of the age and the miles on the vehicle.

The car should be delivered by the start of the fall semester, Rives added.

The board also approved the purchase of 25 Zenith Microcomputers to replace obsolete computer equipment. The total cost of the purchase was listed at \$29,975.

The BOG also approved the selection of Gordon H. Lamb as the president of Northeastern University in Chicago.

Lamb, who served as vice president of academic affairs at the University of Texas at San Antonio, becomes the fourth president of Northeastern since it opened in 1961.

Lamb was selected from a field of 116 candidates. The position has been vacant since the death of Northeastern President, Ronald Williams, in December of 1985.

President Rives also introduced Eastern's "newest graduate," Joan Embery, to the BOG.

Embery, international goodwill ambassador and official hostess for the San Diego Zoo, participated in the BOG bachelor of arts degree program.

Embery, who started at San Diego State University 18 years ago, said the flexibility of the program allowed her to complete her degree.

'Little' cause for Caesar's name change

A familiar name in town will change next month.

Caesar's Pizza, located on the corner of Fourth Street and Lincoln Avenue, will be changing its name because of trademark confusion with Little Caesars, Caesar's owner Jerry Myerscough said.

The confusion started when Little Caesars opened in Charleston last spring. "We received a letter from their lawyers requesting us to send all pertinent information about our name to them," Myerscough said.

"My brother and I registered for a state trademark in 1978 when we opened Caesar's. He had a Caesar's in Mattoon and I had one in Charleston. I eventually bought him out."

Little Caesars registered for a national trademark in 1965, Myer-

scough said. Little Caesars didn't need to register for a state trademark.

"Little Caesars demanded we change our name," Myerscough said.

"So I decided not to take the issue to court because I didn't want to take the chance of losing," Myerscough said.

"If I lost I would be liable for royalties and residuals. All this would cost in the neighborhood of \$30-40,000," Myerscough added.

Myerscough said he thought it was more "prudent" to change the name. "We agreed to change our name by Sept. 1."

The similarity in names also caused confusion for customers. Myerscough said customers would come into Caesar's trying to redeem Little Caesars coupons. Customers also would order pizzas from Little Caesars and come to Caesar's to pick them up.

Caesar's is holding a drawing to

change its name, Carol Myerscough, co-owner said. The winner and new name will be announced Aug. 1.

The winner will receive \$100 of free food from Caesar's, Carol said.

Myerscough said he felt the name change will be confusing for his customers for a year or two.

"It will be expensive because we have to buy new menus, a new sign and repaint our delivery trucks," he added. All the changes should cost about \$2,000 but would be a lot cheaper than \$30,000, Myerscough said.

Jerry said the problem with Little Caesars is ironic. He owned another pizza place named Pizza Joe's and had to change the name when Joe Adducci, whom Myerscough had bought the restaurant from, came back to town.

"Ironically, I chose the name Caesar's to avoid a conflict in 1978," Jerry said.

NBC wants 52 week season

LOS ANGELES (AP)—What NBC's Brandon Tartikoff has in mind is eventually extending the television season to 52 weeks a year.

That may be the reality of the future, considering the networks' tough competition from cable, independent stations, videocassettes, direct satellite broadcasting and Fox Broadcasting's upcoming fourth network.

"We're trying some original summer programming and we want to see how much we'll be supported in our efforts," said Tartikoff, president of NBC Entertainment.

"I've found in part that if you do a summer series the advertisers want a rate comparable to reruns.

Apartheid policy 5 years of nothing; all talk, no action

In the wake of last week's speech by President Reagan following a week-long review of the administration's South African policy, we have to ask what the purpose was.

Nothing changed concerning the United States' constructive engagement approach towards an end to the apartheid system of government in South Africa—a policy which has proven to be all talk and no action.

Economic sanctions proposed by Congress were denounced as ultimately damaging to blacks in the country as well as the white minority-controlled government. In fact, the president urged "deeper involvement" by Western businesses to promote change.

For 5½ years, the Reagan administration's stand has promoted no change—the country's blacks continue to be oppressed and the death tolls, black and white, continue to rise.

Once again, we call on the EIU Foundation to take a bold stand on the issue if the government won't. Divestment of the Foundation's \$486,834 (at last report in June) holdings in 14 American companies which do business in South Africa would be a step in that direction—a step many colleges and other organizations have already taken.

A slight policy change last month by the Foundation not to invest in companies which are making little progress adhering to the Sullivan Principles was encouraging. But, even the Rev. Leon Sullivan, who drew up the plan, has said as the situation worsens that the principles don't go far enough.

The current violence in South Africa is only a foreshadowing of an all-out revolution by blacks in the country—it's only a matter of time. Western companies would not be spared in such a revolution. Moderate black leader Bishop Desmond Tutu has already told the West to "go to hell."

From a human rights standpoint, the United States is failing. Continued investment in South Africa supports that failure.

The time is now to put human lives and civil rights ahead of money and politics.

Carl made a great contribution to Eastern. He took a flagging men's tennis program and built it into an excellent one. He was the player's best model, and until his untimely, fatal illness took firm hold, he could hold his own on the court with the best of them.

Active though he was, Carl did not die with the suddenness of Jim Fixx, although Carl was also an avid jogger. Instead he and his family endured a long, agonizing diagnosis. It was months before they pinpointed the cancer site. Then more months of painful treatment. Finally came the medical world's solemn pronouncement; his condition was terminal. So they sent him home to die.

He fought his malignant intruder to the end, accepting the growing restrictions with courage and dignity. Sunday, July 20, the battle ended.

The standing-room only crowd at his funeral July 22 was a testament of the high regard in which he was held both at Eastern and the community.

Those of us who knew and loved Carl can only say "death be not proud." Carl fought the good

fight and left us with a multitude of fine memories. Even death cannot erase those.

Editor:


The campus police department must distribute parking permits faster, sell them in a more convenient location, and give students more time before issuing tickets.

Court lets couple keep winnings—Indiana

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—Indiana courts cannot force a St. John couple to turn over a winning Illinois lottery ticket worth almost \$1.7 million to the man who paid for it, the Indiana Court of Appeals ruled Monday.

In a 2-1 ruling, the appeals panel reversed a Porter Superior Court jury's verdict awarding the disputed April 1984 ticket to Richard Zientara of Dyer.

The appeals court said that because Indiana law prohibits lotteries and gambling, the ticket-purchase

agreement between Zientara and Chester and Bernice Kaszuba of St. John was illegal and thus unenforceable in Hoosier courts.

"The established rule in Indiana denies citizens the use of Indiana courts to enforce contracts which are illegal," Judge George B. Hoffman Jr.

"The fact that this refusal to assist either party may result in what appears to be an inequitable conclusion whereby one party receives a windfall, is a fact on which the judiciary cannot focus."

ISSC faces cuts like last spring's reduction of \$50

A less-than-expected increase in Illinois State Scholarship funding may cause students to see a cut in their grants similar to last semester when the state cut \$50 from all awards.

John Flynn, Eastern's financial aid director, said he does not expect a cut to be "any greater" than last spring, when the ISSC cut the \$50 from all awards because a high number of late applications cut into its budget.

The ISSC requested \$162.4 million for the 1986 Monetary Award Program, while Gov. James Thompson approved only \$132.1 million for the program.

Of the ISSC's request, \$12.6 million was to cover an estimated 7 percent tuition increase for state colleges and universities. However, the amount approved is only 12.3 million over last year's appropriation of \$122.5 million.

ISSC spokesman Bob Clement said Monday the board is considering several options, including cutting the amount of the award or moving the spring award application deadline from its current March 15 date. The deadline for fall ISSC applications was June 1, Clement said.

"We don't know yet what the maximum award will be, so we can't make any projections about what will happen," Clement said.

However, he did say the \$12.3 million increase could mean an increase in a maximum award bill awaiting Thompson's signature.

Moving the deadline would mean fewer students would apply leaving more money for others, Clement said.

The board will meet Aug. 11, after Thompson is expected to sign the bill setting the maximum award, Clement said. The current maximum award is \$2,850.

Former cheerleader faces theft charges

Junior Mike Weber, 21, a former Eastern cheerleader, will appear in court Tuesday at 9:30 a.m. to issue a plea on charges of retail theft.

Weber was arrested June 9 on suspicion of shoplifting two packages of sliced cheese from Wilb Walker's, 505 W. Lincoln.

He was charged with retail theft and, after paying 10 percent of the \$3,000 bail bond, was released on his own recognizance.

Weber's appearance in court tomorrow will not be a trial, said Assistant State's Attorney Richard J. Nickola.

"I believe it will be negotiated, but I won't know for sure until 9:30 a.m. tomorrow," Nickola said.

Weber was previously convicted of retail theft in October 1983. After one conviction, retail theft, a misdemeanor, is considered a Class III felony.

Lucky camper may be named 'Miss All Star'

Cooperation is the key, said Melinda Boyce, camp coordinator for the All Star Cheerleader conference.

The conference, on campus July 28 through 31, emphasizes working together, she said.

"The best thing about the camp is friendship, for one, learning to cooperate with each other. Cooperation is the big one.

"It is also learning to work together. A lot of the girls are working together for the first time and working out their kinks. It's a good time for the teams to get to know each other," she said.

The campers will begin their day at 9 a.m. with a warm-up session. Although it usually will features an aerobic session, stretching may also be done.

The campers will then continue their day by learning cheers, dances, mounts, jumps and other new techniques.

Each day is then capped off with the instructors evaluating the students.

"We don't stress competition amongst each other (the girls). We stress the evaluations," Boyce said.

"We like to work with the individual rather than the group. It makes the girls want to learn more. They get more out of it this way," she said.

A "spirit star" is given at the end of each night for the most spirited quad.

At the end of the week the campers vote on who the most spirited squad of the week was and a most spirited squad award is given.

Awards are also given for the most improved squad and for "Miss All Star."

Boyce said the Miss All Star award is for "one girl who really stands out, really shines. You can just tell she is the best. Usually that girl is then recommended for a staff position.

The Miss All Star award is not given out at every camp, but only when the instructors feel they have someone special and deserving enough to receive the award.

Only about 3 or 4 girls a week are chosen from the average 8 camps a week held.

A Grand Champion award is also given to the overall best squad at the end of the week.

"It's for the squad that really stood out," Boyce said.

Wednesday night is skit night.

"All the girls have prepared some original and creative pep rally skits for a few points. It is very low pressure and lots of fun. It gives the girls a little time to relax," Boyce said.

"Afterwards we usually hold a watermelon or pizza party."

Bicyclers travel across 'magnificent Illinois'

A group of 500 bicyclers will spend the night on campus August 5 as they "Bicycle Across the Magnificent Miles in Illinois (BAMMI).

The BAMMI trip, sponsored by the Chicago Lung Association, takes seven days to complete and spans across 450 miles of Illinois.

The association raised \$105,000 last year and hope to top the figure this year.

The cyclers take off from Buckingham Fountain in Chicago and end up at "Touch of Nature," which is part of the Southern Illinois University campus in Carbondale.

The seven stops include Kankakee, Rantoul, Charleston, Lawrenceville, Carmi, Golconda and Carbondale.

The \$130 registration fee the cyclers must pay includes breakfast, dinner and two rest stops with food per day.

The overnight stays are at universities, YMCAs, park districts and high schools.

"Any place that has a shower," said Mary Jo Pryble, director of BAMMI and director of all of the Chicago Lung Association's special events.

Pryble said she starts planning the trip in October, 10 months in advance.

Before the trip begins, riders get people to pledge so much money per mile. All the money raised goes to lung disease research on lung cancer, emphysema, chronic bronchitis and asthma.

The trip is restricted to 500 people and Pryble said the organization has had to turn people down in the past.

Although there is no age limit to participants, children under 18 years old must be accompanied by an adult.

On this particular trip, the youngest participant is 8, while the oldest is 76.

Most participants range between 40 and 50 years old. The majority of last year's participants ranged between 20 and 30 years old.

Pryble accredits the shift in age to the increased interest in cycling in

America.

Riders must sign a medical waiver form before starting out, though she said there have been no problems in the past.

"We also print newsletters on when to drink and eat and things like that," she said.

Although the trip is restricted to Illinois, those taking part are from all over the United States—some as far away as California, Arizona, Michigan, New Jersey, Wisconsin, Maryland and New York.

Some advertising is done in the Cook County newspapers, but, Pryble said, most is done simply by word of mouth.

The only equipment a person needs to participate is a bike, she said.

"Most of the bikes are 12 to 15 speed touring bikes. They're generally very expensive bikes," she said.

Each rider also takes a duffle bag to carry clothes and sun tan lotion in.

Residence hall rules, guidelines


Please be aware of the following policies and regulations of the residence halls.

- 4) Each person will be required to complete "Return Side of Linen Card" when returning dirty linens to desk at completion of camp.
- 5) Each person will be assessed for missing linens at the cost of:

Blankets are available from the desk (limited amount per hall) for persons requiring one.

Want to know more about Eastern? Admission information is available

Dale Wolf, director of admissions, said potential Eastern students can receive admission information and applications for entry into Eastern by contacting the Office of Admissions.

When receiving an application, it is best to wait until the early fall of a student's senior year in high school to apply, according to Wolf.

There is no fee for applying and applications are processed immediately after they are received from the student.

Guaranteed admission into Eastern does not mean that on-campus housing is guaranteed, he said.

He advised students to apply for housing well before applying for admission.

To be eligible for entry into Eastern, some academic requirements must be met.

To be admitted to the university, candidates must:

- Fall Semester—**
1. rank in the upper half of their high school class based on six or more semesters,
 2. or achieve an ACT composite score of 19 (SAT of

820).

Spring Semester or Summer Terms—

1. rank in the upper two-thirds of their high school based on six or more semesters,
2. or achieve an ACT composite score of 17 (SAT 760).

Wolf noted that beginning freshman, however, who could not meet regular admission requirements have the chance of entering Eastern through the Prescriptive Curriculum Admissions Program.

The PCAP is not remedial or conditional—it includes only regularly offered University courses—and the number of students accepted into the program is limited by available resources.



CAA revises PED courses

When students return to Eastern this fall, they will find changes in the curriculum requirements for the bachelor of science major in physical education.

The Council on Academic Affairs Thursday, gave unanimous approval for a change in the curriculum changes in the business, history and physical education departments.

According to the physical education plan, PED 4750, "Measurement and Evaluation in Physical Education," will be dropped as a required elective for the major along with PED 1520, "Theory of Motor Learning," PED 2230 "Techniques in Modern Dance."

According to Larry Ankenbrand, physical education department chairman, the courses will be changed from a required course to an elective.

Ankenbrand said Health Education 3199, "Utilization of Microcomputers," and PED 4275, "Field Experience," were added to the required curriculum for physical education majors.

Under the new format, the required 12 semester hours of physical education class electives will be changed to 12 semester hours of any Health, Physical Education and Recreation electives.

The CAA also made adjustments in the curriculum for the business education requirements.

The business education department received the approval to add BED 3110, "Electronic Office Procedures," BED 3120, "Administrative Systems Personnel," and BED 3402, "Methods of Teaching Basic Business and Accounting."

The history department was also given the approval for HIS 3280 to be added to the department's curriculum.

According to history instructor Lawrence R. Nichols, the course, "United States, Caribbean, and Central America," was added to give the students a bigger perspective of the "United States' policy on the communist challenge in the Caribbean region."

Nichols said the course will feature a two to three week introduction on the Caribbean. The course will then travel up to the present day situations in the Caribbean and Central America regions.

The course topics include the Bay of Pigs, Grenada, El Salvador, the Cuban Missile Crisis, etc., Nichols added.

The course will require a great deal of reading and an extra-credit term paper due at the end of the course, Nichols said.

The course should attract many students because it will not be taught like a traditional history course which deals with just certain countries. It will deal with the whole areas of Central and Latin America with a great deal of class participation, he said.





McInerney returns for victory in annual pant

The 21st annual Panther Pant and the 4th annual Short Pant were held Saturday at Eastern with a total of 79 runners participating in one of the two races.

Former Eastern track and cross country all-American, John McInerney, won the 12.5-mile (20 kilometer) Panther Pant with a time of 1:08:41.2.

McInerney, 28, of McHenry, averaged 5:32 a mile to defeat Scott Colver, 21, of Danville, finished second with a time of 1:09:30.8.

Teri Wiser, 20, of Marshall, and Kelly Brough, 21, of McHenry, were the only two women to finish the Panther Pant as they crossed the finish line together to take 31st and 32nd respectively. Wiser's official time was 1:31:25.8, with Brough right behind with a time of 1:31:26.2.

The Short Pant was won by Eastern track and cross country runner Jim Maton, 19, of Shelbyville.

Maton, a junior at Eastern, had a time of 22:14.1 for the 4.1-mile race with an average mile time of 5:26.

Stephen Conlon, 18, of Wheeling, finished second in the Short Pant with a time of 22:25.6.

Margaret Brown, 22, of Bolingbrook, was the first women to cross the finish line for the Short Pant as she came in 25th with a time of 28:18.9.

Event coordinator, Thomas Woodall, who has been in charge of the Panther Pant during its 21-year history, said he was very pleased with the way the two races were run this year.

"This is the most organized we've ever been," Woodall said. "The officials of the races did a very nice job today."

Woodall said that even though the two races have had faster times and a larger field in the past, the Panther Pant and the Short Pant were still very competitive.

"It was nice to see so many former Eastern runners doing so well," Woodall said.

McInerney has run the Pant every year but one since 1976.

"I wasn't planning on anything

super fast," McInerney said. "I was just trying to hold on to the lead."

One of the reasons McInerney likes to come back to Eastern to run the Pant is the race itself.

"It's nice to run on the country roads down here," McInerney said.

Maton had another reason for running in the event; to get in shape for the upcoming Eastern cross country season.

"This is my only off-season race and the competition is pretty good for the middle of July," Maton said.

The first ten runners who finished the Panther Pant received leather goods.

For runners of the Short Pant, special awards were given to the top two male and female finishers in four different age groups: 17 and under, 18-25, 26-35 and 36 and older.

For the women 17 and under; Lisa Wiser, 15, of Marshall, who finished 29th, took the top award with a time

29:56. She was the only woman entry 17 and under for the Short Pant.

For the men 17 and under; Trevor Gilbert, 14, of Charleston, took the top award with a time of 25:27 as he finished 11th. Rob Murphy, 15, of Olney, took second prize with a time of 26:02 in 15th.

In the women's 18-25 age group, Margaret Brown, 22, of Bolingbrook, took the top award with a time of 28:18 (25th). Denyse Stephenson, 20, of Olney, took second prize with a time of 34:42 (45th).

In the men's 18-25 age group, first place finisher Jim Maton took the top award with his 22:14 time, with second place finisher Stephen Conlon taking second prize with a time of 22:25.

In the women's 26-35 age group, Kay Richards, 29, of Charleston, took the top award with a time of 28:50 (27th). Heidi Reible, 32, of Charleston, took second prize with a time of 31:24

(36th).

In the men's 26-35 age group, Terry Diss, 31, of Charleston, took top award with a time of 23:14 (fifth). Howard Black, 35, of Charleston, took second prize with a time of 24:35 (seventh).

In the women's 36 and older age group, Sarah Mueller, 41, of Orland Park, took top award with a time of 34:15 as she finished 41st. Jeanette Woolen, 39, of Charleston, took second with a time of 34:55 and a 46th finish.

And in the men's 36 and older age group, Dick Jackson, 45, of Johnson City, Tennessee, took top award with a time of 23:43 and a sixth-place finish. Roger Darding, 43, of Charleston, took second place with a time of 24:52 and an eighth-place finish.

Finishers of both races received a Panther Pant pen as a participation prize.


