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Rives discloses how budget cuts concern Eastern

President Stanley Rives disclosed budget reductions and other deferrals and cuts Wednesday which will affect Eastern this year.

Eastern's total fiscal year 88 appropriation as approved by Gov. James R. Thompson is \$39,567,900, which is \$305,000, or .77 percent, less than the FY87 appropriation of \$39,873,100.

Appropriations to Eastern are grouped into two areas, Rives said.

"First, there is the general revenue fund which is made up of tax dollars.

"Secondly, there is the income fund which is primarily, but not exclusively, made up of tuition revenue," he said.

"Last year, we had nearly \$30 million in tax support. However, this year's tax support will come to only \$27 million, a \$1.8 million, or 6.5 percent decline in tax dollar support," Rives said.

Consequently, the Board of Governors, Eastern's governing body, has recommended a tuition increase for as early as January.

"I have mixed emotions about that," Rives said. "We have not yet developed a recommendation.

"The chancellor (Thomas D. Layzell) and the presidents will be developing a recommendation. However, I don't know what Eastern's will be at this time.

"I expect it to be minimal," Rives said.

Rives confirmed that a 9 to 11 percent increase would be necessary to put the FY88 budget at last year's levels.

"I don't expect that large of an increase for two reasons," Rives said.

"First, the BOG isn't inclined to approve a large increase, and secondly we've got to make the sure the quality of education is adequate.

"However, with fewer dollars this year, I'm sure that the quality will suffer.

"Students will have more difficulty getting the classes they want or need, especially in the spring," he said.

In addition to several reductions, the proposed Coleman Hall Annex project, which would house part of Eastern's business school, has been deferred.

"While the Coleman Hall project has been approved by the General Assembly and the Illinois Board of Higher Education, it has been deferred until next year, Rives said.

"I think that in all probability, funding for the building will be found next year. However, the loss of a year is a very real loss, he continued.

"We are now looking at FY89," he said.

Among the specific effects of the budget reductions are: The inability to protect the quality of the on-campus programs, the inability to fill vacant positions, a reduction of off-campus courses, a reduction of departmental operating budgets and an inability to purchase equipment such as computers and technological equipment.

"However, no lay-offs are planned at Eastern," Rives said.

The highest priority has been given to the protection of on-campus instructional programs, he said.

While the impact of the budget reductions are not expected to be felt until spring, Rives is not optimistic for an overriding action by the legislature this fall.

"I think that will be more of an issue during the spring session," he said.

"I am disappointed that the legislature and the governor couldn't agree on a modest tax increase," Rives said. "Until they realize the need for a tax increase, it will be difficult to keep the quality of education high here at Eastern."

On a positive note, Rives stated that Eastern is the most cost efficient educational institution in the state and that Eastern's FY88 budget has a \$450,000 budget adjustment in recognition of its cost effectiveness.

Salary freeze talks underway UPI says it will offer best protection possible

The University Professionals of Illinois, a union representing teaching faculty in Illinois, has started negotiations with the Board of Governors over a possible salary freeze for fiscal year 88.

BOG Chief Negotiator Elizabeth Murray explained in a recent release that Gov. James R. Thomson's budget cuts in the wake of the legislature's failure to pass a tax increase have reduced this year's appropriation for BOG schools by \$3.5 million.

Thus, the board can't afford any salary increases and has proposed a salary freeze.

Murray was not available for direct comment Wednesday.

James P. Perez, assistant vice chancellor for public affairs and development, confirmed that negotiations over the salary problem were underway.

"We are always in contact with the UPI. We are the only governing system that negotiates with faculty," he said.

Perez would not comment further on the subject.

In the same release, UPI Chief Negotiator Jo Ann

Hummers stressed that the UPI will fight hard to protect the jobs and to win the best salary package possible under the circumstances.

Basically, the BOG wants to freeze the salaries for 1988 at the 1987 level. The BOG is not proposing any salary cuts.

Eastern President Stanley Rives said that no lay-offs are planned at Eastern as a result of the budget reduction.

"Salary negotiations are always a matter with the UPI," Rives said. "However, we have said all we can.

"The appropriation as approved by Thompson doesn't allow for a salary increase for FY88.

"I'm not happy about this. The faculty and other employees are living with two things," Rives said.

"One being inflation, the other is that they are not paid as well as they should be.

"This has been recognized by the administration," he said.

While no lay-offs are planned, positions that are currently vacant will not be filled, Rives added.

"The 110 positions to be cut by the BOG will not come in the form of lay-offs. They will come in the form of attrition by not filling open positions," he said.

Meese defends Iran questioning

WASHINGTON (AP)—Attorney General Edwin Meese III, confronted by skeptical lawmakers, unflinchingly defended his inquiry into the Iran-Contra affair Wednesday and said he took offense at suggestions it was less than thorough.

Several senators on the Iran-Contra committees said Meese's questioning of CIA Director William J. Casey and National Security Adviser John Poindexter in November was too general and thus failed to elicit important information about their involvement.

Meese handled most of the interrogation calmly on his second and last day as a witness, but he bristled when Sen. George Mitchell, D-Maine, said he found it "difficult to accept" some of Meese's actions.

"It may be strange to you," the attorney general responded. "It may strike you that truth being

stranger than fiction but I take offense at the idea that it's hard to accept, because what I told you is the absolute truth of what happened. And if there is any question in your mind, I want to get that settled right now."

"Well, no, as I just said, it's hard to accept," Mitchell said.

He also questioned Meese's failure to quickly seal and guard records in Lt. Col. Oliver North's office and thereby prevent document-shredding that North has testified he did later.

Sen. Daniel K. Inouye, D-Hawaii, asked why Meese didn't ask "the \$64,000 question"—about diversion of Iranian arms-sales profits to the Nicaraguan Contras—when he interviewed Casey on Nov. 22, hours after Justice Department investigators had found a memo that described the diversion.

Greenpeace protests landfill

CHICAGO—Ten members of the environmental activist group Greenpeace International chained themselves to the gate of a hazardous-waste landfill Wednesday to protest the licensing of the landfill and a nearby incinerator.

The protesters, bound by a 50-foot chain and accompanied by more than 100 sympathizers from local citizens' groups, were trying to stop waste-hauling trucks from entering the landfill on the city's Far South Side, said Greenpeace spokesman Andrew Tonachel.

Chernobyl officials found guilty

CHERNOBYL, U.S.S.R.—The three officials in charge of the Chernobyl plant during history's worst nuclear accident were convicted of gross negligence Wednesday and sentenced to 10 years' hard labor.

Three subordinates received lesser sentences in what were believed to be the first criminal convictions anywhere of nuclear power plant officials who failed to ensure safety standards.

Summing up evidence presented at the three-week trial, Judge Raimond K. Brize said no one appeared to be in charge at Chernobyl, where "people played cards and dominoes and wrote letters while they were on shift."

Farmers urged to plant trees

CHAMPAIGN—The government is making slow but steady progress in its effort to get farmers to replace corn and soybeans with grass and trees on land with high rates of soil erosion.

"Soil conservation does pay, but it is a long-term benefit," Illinois state conservationist John Eckes said Wednesday. "If a farmer has cash-flow problems, it is hard to convince him to spend money on conservation or take land out of production."

But the current picture in some fields is not a pretty one: a brown slurry rushing down hillsides is a heavy rain; a gray cloud sweeping over roads in a strong wind.

Rough waters hinder loading of Bridgeton; await calmer weather

KUWAIT (AP)—High winds and waves forced a delay Wednesday in loading the cargo of crude oil the Kuwaiti supertanker Bridgeton will carry back down the Persian Gulf with an escort of American warships shipping sources reported.

The Bridgeton was damaged by a mine on the voyage north last week, and U.S. Navy specialists were hunting for other mines along the return route. Defense Department sources in Washington said seven mines had been found.

Pentagon officials said Defense Secretary Casper W. Weinberger ordered eight minesweeping helicopters sent to the gulf to operate from a Navy helicopter carrier now in the Indian Ocean. They said the shipment was "imminent."

France sent an aircraft carrier and three

support ships to the Middle East, where it already stations three or four warships, and Britain said it would consider sending minesweepers. West Germany said it would not dispatch its own ships out but might have them assume the European duties of U.S. vessels that could be reassigned.

In London, the International Association of Independent Tanker Owners urged major world powers Wednesday to form a multinational force to protect commercial shipping in the gulf, where Iran and Iraq have been at war since September 1980.

Nine-foot waves and 20-knot winds pushed the 401,382-ton Bridgeton away from the Sea Island deep-water terminal Wednesday, snapping its steel-and-nylon mooring ropes, the shipping sources reported.

National debt increase approved

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress passed an emergency increase in the national debt limit on Wednesday, averting what the Treasury chief said would be a "global economic and financial crisis."

The swift action came as progress was reported in bipartisan talks on reviving the Gramm-Rudman budget balancing law.

The House, by 263-155, approved a bill increasing the national debt limit to \$2.32 trillion through Aug. 6. The Senate followed suit Wednesday evening by voice vote, allowing the Treasury to borrow for the first time since July 17, when an earlier temporary debt law expired.

The Treasury has been paying its bills in cash,

but Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III warned that the coffers would be empty by Friday and the government would be in default for the first time in its history.

"Default would produce global economic and financial crisis of major proportion," Baker said in a letter to Congress.

The interim debt bill was designed to keep the government solvent until lawmakers reach agreement on a long-term debt bill. In anticipation of the stopgap borrowing authority, the Treasury on Wednesday tentatively scheduled two securities actions for Thursday and a third on Friday.

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Helpline closing; others pick up the slack

The 14-year-old Coles County Help Line phone service will be closing August 1.

The Help Line offered an ear to anyone who might be considering suicide or injury to others. It also referred people to other social agencies in the area which might offer more long-term help.

"There are several reasons why the phone service is being closed," said Virginia Davis, Help Line coordinator. These reasons include not having any volunteers for this summer to run the phone service, not being able to continue the training needed for the volunteers and "the funds from the United Way can be better put to use in other areas that offer similar help," Davis said.

"We are just not getting the bulk of the calls we used to. People know of

other agencies in the area and are calling them direct," Davis said.

"If it weren't for Eastern students we wouldn't have existed too long," Davis said.

About three-fourths of the estimated 2,000 volunteers that served during the 14 years were Eastern students, Davis said.

Although the Help Line is closing, Davis will continue to receive calls in her home. "I still intend to be there for anyone who needs my help," Davis said.

"Fourteen years ago I decided to start getting involved and attended the first training sessions that started the Help Line," Davis said.

Previous to her work with Help Line, Davis had worked with the area Boy Scouts and other youth organizations.

Davis plans on continuing her volunteer work once the Help Line

closes. She would like to spend more hours with the Christians Upholding Prison Program (CUP) which helps prisoners to make a new start by helping them locate housing and get an education among other things. Davis would also like to work more with the Charleston Civic Association which puts emphasis on getting people into educational programs by helping people go through the steps of enrolling in a school.

The Help Line which has taken over 17,000 calls since it began started because of the concerns of people in the community.

There was a need for some place where kids could call to just talk about their problems, Davis said.

Adults are more aware of the help that is available to them in the area, Davis said.

Although adults seem to know where to find help, teenagers don't.

"They are afraid to reach out for help," Davis said.

Davis continued, saying teenagers need more discussion groups of which there are several in the area available to them.

When the Help Line first began, it set out to accomplish several goals.

It was to make available a crisis information center where it was needed, to have volunteers trained enough to know who to refer a caller in a crisis to and to be able to screen and train our volunteers to better enhance our service, said Rebecca Block, the first Help Line coordinator.

When Block began her work with the Help Line, she was a graduate student in clinical psychology. Her work with the Help Line was an extension of her interest in psychology and a chance for community involvement, said Block, who is currently an attorney in Charleston.

Lecture given on violence and prostitution

Dr. Kathleen Barry delivered her lecture entitled "International Feminism: Human Rights and Female Sexual Slavery" to a receptive crowd of both men and women Tuesday night in Coleman Lecture Hall.

The focus of Barry's lecture was structured around her landmark study on prostitution and violence against women, "Female Sexual Slavery," and her subsequent work in forming an international feminist network to combat the problem.

Barry, an assistant professor of sociology at Brandeis University, has worked closely with the United Nations and UNESCO in developing new public policy to deal with female sexual slavery at the international level.

Prostitutes were looked at in the 19th Century as a necessary evil to diffuse social tension and protect other women from rape, Barry said. They were thought to keep the rate of rape low.

Prostitution itself was viewed as sex between consenting adults. It was no one else's business. Prostitutes were considered folk heroes and sexual outlaws who possessed a skill that could be sold on the market for a higher price than other women's skills, she continued.

Society made a distinction between the international traffic in women and local street brothels. International prostitution was considered to be forced slavery, while local street walking was viewed as voluntary, Barry said.

Through her research, Barry has discovered that in actuality there is no difference between street prostitution and international traffic in women. Nearly all city prostitutes are marketed by pimps who take the money they earn, perhaps leaving them with enough for an evening meal.

This destroyed the myth that prostitutes sell their bodies for money. Another myth, that street prostitution is voluntary, was also proven to be false. In fact, it is nearly impossible and highly dangerous to go out on the streets without being pimp-controlled. And it is deadly to try to escape from pimp-controlled prostitution, Barry said.

After 10 years of being subjected to feminist critique, prostitution is now viewed as a consequence of patriarchal domination. "Prostitution is interconnected to the condition of all women," Barry said.

"Prostitution is a way of protecting the labor market from fully employing women," Barry explained. "Prostitution is functional to the labor market. Women in prostitution make no employment demands and are not counted in unemployment figures."

Most prostitutes are not deviant in character as 19th century society depicted them, but are usually runaways from middle class homes who have been victimized by incest or sexual abuse.

Even pimps recognize this today and train themselves to identify this vulnerability in young women. When arrested, the pimps say you should go after the fathers that got the girls started. They assess that young women who are victims of incest are already ready for prostitution.

"A year ago," Barry said, "experts met in Spain to formulate proposals for the U.N. to deal with prostitution. They identified the affect of incest assault and sexual violence against women in prostitution."

The effect causes a splitting in the self. The reaction of an incest victim is not different from that of a rape victim. She disassociates part of her self from the part being violated.

Barry read the poignant account of a former prostitute reliving her "first time." The woman escaped back into time. She found herself for a few brief moments playing hopscotch on the church playground, until her eyes opened. "The reality nearly blinds you," the prostitute wrote.

Barry said that the recommendations before the U.N. are, "to move past distinctions and work with the identification of prostitution as a crime against women; to make being the customer a crime as well as the pimp, but not the woman who has been a victim all along."

Barry defined female sexual slavery as, "Any situation a woman is in which she cannot get out of regardless of how she got in the situation and where she is physically assaulted or sexually abused."

Barry concluded saying, "Any movement focusing on human liberation must be able to visualize the future free of domination."

"In a patriarchal dominant society, it is assumed that men must always be satisfied. I am considered absolutely stark raving mad because I have not yet conceived of a society where men will not have access to the service simply because they have always had access to this service."

Asbestos removal begins at library

The continuing process of campus asbestos removal moved to Booth Library on Wednesday.

"Sentury Asbestos Abatement Co. of Fisher bid \$59,447 and was awarded a contract to do the library work," said Verna Armstrong, vice president for administration and finance.

The asbestos removal is being done in the library's mechanical equipment rooms and not in any areas or rooms open to the public, Armstrong said.

Armstrong said the removal will be done in three stages in three different areas of the library. Periodically, the air conditioning in one of the three areas will have to be turned off while work is being done.

"We're working to get some extra fans that can be moved in to those areas for the short periods when there will be no air conditioning," she said.

Armstrong said the air conditioning has to be shut down in the areas where the work is being done because the rooms have to be sealed off and the air conditioning would create a circulation of air.

Asbestos removal in the library should be completed in three weeks, Armstrong said.

Currently, asbestos is also being removed from heating ducts and pipes in the basement of the Booth House on Fourth Street and in the Custodial House on Seventh Street.

Asbestos removal on campus has been going on for several years. When the problem was first identified, the projects were prioritized, Armstrong said.

"All the projects that were given high priority have been completed," she said. This includes asbestos removal from residence hall rooms and areas open to the public.

Several summer asbestos removal projects have already been completed. A water heater in Taylor Hall food service had to be replaced and the asbestos insulation on the old water heater's jacket had to be removed before that could be done, Armstrong said.

"Asbestos was also removed from mechanical rooms in Lincoln and Douglas halls and in the Triad," she said.

Liberty TCI problems resolved soon

Billing problems at Liberty Telecommunications, Charleston's cable TV firm, will be solved by next month, company officials said.

The problems of overcharging and double-billing have several causes, said Teresa Moore, office manager.

"I am not sure why they resigned," Moore said.

"People should pay what they think they owe on their bills and disregard the disconnection notices. Hopefully we will be caught up by the time the September bills are printed in late August."

Eastern's second game was played in Effingham on Thanksgiving day against Austin College. The game was played in an area that was too small for a football field. To score a touchdown, players had to cross a street which had ditches on both sides.

The second season was better. Eastern ended up 3-6. This is how Coleman described one of the games that year.

"A dramatic incident of that season was the game with Sullivan High School. It was reported that the Sullivan team included a number of men who had been hired to play and were not students. When the Eastern team arrived they asked to see the usual list certifying that the players were all students. This was refused and the Eastern boys were of a mind to go home, but a large and aggressive crowd threatened to assault them if they left, and the game went on.

"Despite an impressive number of victories by the Sullivan team, Eastern won, 6 to 0. A fight broke out after the game during which one Eastern player, George McMichael, while trying to restrain an Eastern teammate, was knocked unconscious by a Sullivan policeman. Four stitches were necessary to sew up his scalp.

"The Sullivan team had badly defeated the Mattoon High School team and was scheduled to play Mattoon a second time. Some of the Eastern players, eager for revenge for the attack upon them after the Sullivan game, proposed to 'substitute' for Mattoon players. They were going to really 'work over' the Sullivan players.

"The Mattoon players accepted the proposal with enthusiasm, but Mr. Lord (Eastern's first president) got wind of it and promptly and decisively vetoed the unorthodox suggestion."

Now that is how the game should be played—like the old days. Those "Eastern boys" of 1900, now they were ballplayers.

Rao said he has not decided if he will apply for the permanent position. He said there may not even be an opening because Robert Kindrick, vice president for academic affairs, has asked Luquire to change his resignation to academic leave.

Kindrick is out of the country, and was unavailable for comment.

In addition to degrees received in India, Rao earned his masters from the University of Illinois in 1968 and his doctorate from Southern Illinois University in 1986.

He received his certificate in data processing in 1981 from the Institute for Certification of Computer Professionals, a degree Rao takes pride in because he acquired his knowledge of computers on the job.

"Eastern has been awfully good to

me and that's the reason I have stayed as long as I have," Rao said, explaining his 19-year stint at Eastern.

Rao is concerned about the effects the recent state budget cuts will have on Library Services.

Although he has received no specific figure on how much his budget will be cut, he expects it to be about 5 percent.

This cut is "particularly difficult for us, because the prices of books and magazines rise approximately 10 percent each year." Since "costs are continuously going up, we might wind up with a 15 percent cut in some instances," Rao said.

Rao has appointed Birdina Gregg, Linda Spangler and John Looby to an election committee for the support staff.

This committee will conduct an election which will result in two members of the support staff joining Delores McNutt, office supervisor, on a newly created support staff advisory committee.

The purpose of the advisory committee is to discuss and help solve problems that arise within the support staff at the library.

Gregg, chairperson of the election committee, said she hopes to hold the election this week because Rao wants

the advisory committee selected by Aug. 1.

Gregg said she was "extremely pleased" with the appointment of Rao as acting dean.

"I am personally very pleased with the appointment of Dr. Rao," McNutt said. "He is very understanding and he wants to solve problems before they happen."

Overall, McNutt said, the staff is happy about the appointment of Rao.

Rao said he hopes to begin plans to obtain a "small special collection" to bring Eastern's library national recognition.

What this collection will be is currently being considered by Rao and his staff.

Rao would also like to see plans for a new library building put into motion because it usually takes "five to seven years before you get an answer."

A new building is needed, he said, because space is limited and some students want a facility that can be kept open 24 hours a day.

It is impossible to keep part of the current library open 24 hours because "this building has to be all open or all closed," Rao said.

Rao will hold the position of acting dean until Dec. 31 or until a new dean is selected.

Peggy Kapolnek, 18, of Elk Grove Village, is participating in an innovative music education program held annually at the Magic Kingdom in Anaheim, Calif.

The program, known as the Disney Entertainment Work Experience Program, offers college students the opportunity to perform in a professional atmosphere while accumulating college credit at the same time.

Kapolnek, a music education major and mellophonist (marching French horn player), first became aware of the program through posters hanging in the hallways of the music building. From there, she made arrangements for a pre-audition. She was then asked to come back to audition for the real thing.

"I wanted to do it for the experience, and I wanted to do it so much. I was really looking forward to it," she said.

Kapolnek was informed in February about being selected to play in the band, and, needless to say, she was excited about the decision.

"I was amazed," she said. "They called me in my dorm room before dinner and I began jumping all over the place."

While participating in the 11-week program, Kapolnek will attend classes five days a week for two-and-a-half hours per day. In these classes, she receives instructions from professionals in the entertainment industry. They help develop personal and professional skills, and teach musical arrangement, choreography and stage and screen performance techniques.

After classes, Kapolnek plays in the All-American College Marching Band, which is a band made up of 20 musicians and two dancers who perform for Disneyland visitors. The band plays musical selections from jazz, updated classics, pop tunes and marches.

"We perform seven times nightly from 4-9 p.m. at seven different locations," she said. "We play 20-30-minute sets" at each location.

Kapolnek, who is planning on teaching music and


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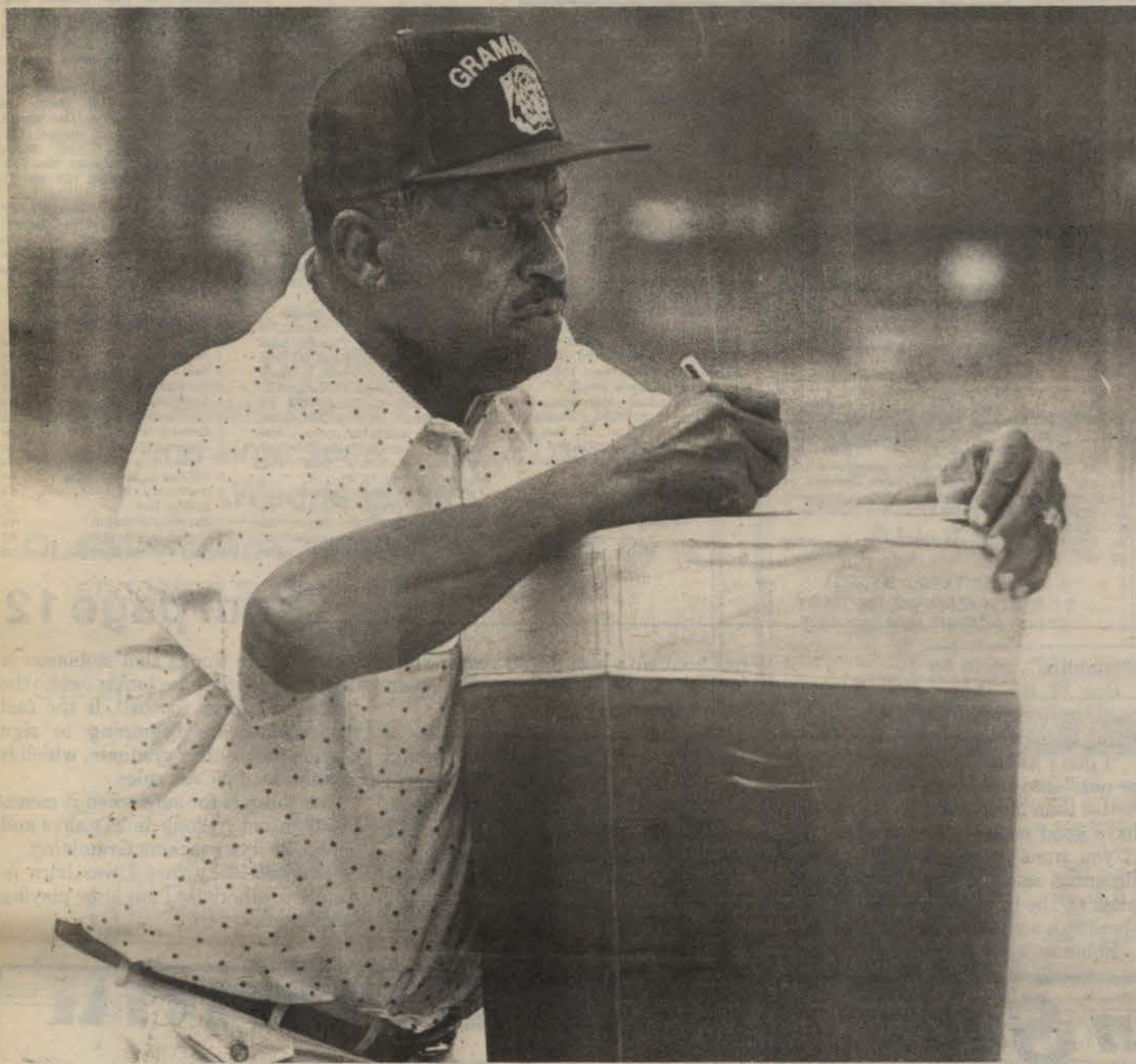

Legendary coach visits Cards camp

Eastern was graced with the presence of a living legend on Wednesday as the winningest coach in the history of college football visited EIU. Grambling head coach Eddie Robinson, who has a total of 337 wins, visited the St. Louis Cardinal training camp as part of an invitation by the National Football League for Robinson to view various training camps.

Robinson and a crew of his assistant coaches came to the Cardinal training camp to witness different facets of practices that they might be able to use at Grambling.

"I've been following (Cardinal Head) Coach (Gene) Stallings since he was the defensive back coach at Dallas, and we've been friends ever since," said Robinson. "Stallings helped me out a lot when we went to Dallas, and he's been good to us ever since."

One of the reasons that Robinson reserves a special feeling for Stallings is the fact that Stallings played for, and coached under one of Robinson's best friends and college coaching legend, the late Paul "Bear" Bryant. It was Bryant's record that Robinson broke to achieve the most victories as a coach.

"Coach Bryant and I were good friends," said Robinson. "I first started following Coach Bryant when he was at Kentucky. That is when the story came that he wrestled a bear, which is where he got his nickname. He didn't actually wrestle a bear, it's just a story."

Robinson then began to form a very good friendship.

"Coach Bryant would come to Grambling to speak to our players, speak at the awards banquet," Robinson said. "Coach Bryant would also have me come to Texas A&M, or Alabama to speak there too. We would always talk on the telephone."

"This is the first time that I came to a camp with Coach Stallings as the head coach," said Robinson. "It's just what I expected. Stallings organization is just tremendous, and he works the players hard."

"You can tell that Coach Stallings worked with Coach Bryant and Tom Landry (Head Coach of the Dallas Cowboys), said Robinson. "His organization is just like that of Dallas, and Coach Bryant. He even talks like Bryant and has the same mannerisms as Bryant had."

Stallings was rather pleased to be honored with a visit by Robinson.

"If the players are not in awe of him then there is something wrong," said Stallings. "The players should be...I'm awed by him."

One of the things that Robinson and his coaches are doing in their study of the Cardinals camp is to attend the various meetings the assistant coaches have with the players, and then interview the assistant coaches.

"What we have to figure out is if a certain play or certain defense will work in our system," said Robinson. "I will sit down after we interview the

Cubs lose

CHICAGO (AP)—Bryn Smith enjoys having an early lead playing in Wrigley Field.

"I've pitched in games where 15 runs wasn't enough," Smith said Wednesday after pitching a six-hitter over seven innings and leading Montreal over the Chicago Cubs 11-3. "But it helps to have an early lead because if you make a mistake it doesn't hurt you so much."

Smith, 7-4, struck out four and did not walk a batter before Randy St. Claire pitched the final two innings.

The Expos, who had 15 hits off four pitchers and scored in every inning except the fourth and ninth, took advantage of Cubs errors to give Smith an early lead.

Casey Candaele singled to lead off the first, moved to third on a throwing error by Greg Maddux, 6-9, and later scored on a wild pitch.

A throwing error by catcher Jody Davis in the second preceeded Smith's run-scoring suicide squeeze.

"I'm not that great of a hitter," Smith said. "I know that if you can handle a bat you can get yourself a couple a wins."

Montreal increased its lead to 5-0 in the third on an RBI groundout by Hubie Brooks and a two-run double by Tim Foley.

Redbirds lose five in a row; Montreal gaining ground

ST. LOUIS (AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals had just dropped their fifth game in a row, a now-you're-ahead, now-you're-not loss to Eastern Division rival New York, but Cardinals catcher Tony Pena wasn't fretting.

"We were bound for one of these streaks sooner or later," Pena said.

He probably was right. The Cardinals hadn't lost more than three games in a row and that was only once, in May—until last weekend. They had won 15 of 18 before the losing streak began against San Francisco Friday.

Despite the slide, nobody seemed ready to panic. At least that's what they were indicating Tuesday night, after the Cardinals lost 6-4 to the Mets. Despite the defeats, the Cardinals still led the division by comfortable margins over the second-place Montreal Expos and third-place Mets.

"This is probably a big boost to them (the Mets), but it should make us more hungry and more aggressive," right fielder Curt Ford said. "Being ahead six games doesn't mean we can relax, especially against these guys. We're not down. Tomorrow we'll be busting tail."

So, the big question for the Cardinals was how to get turned back in the right direction. Shortstop Ozzie

Smith, who sustained what appeared to be a minor sprained ankle Tuesday night, said, "The only thing we have to do is go out and play like we have the majority of our games."

And that means the heart of the team's batting order has to start producing again. Second baseman Tommy Herr, who bats third, is 0-11 and 1-18. The fifth man in the lineup, Willie McGee is 0-9.

Herr said he feels that he has hit bottom and is ready to begin climbing back toward the .300 mark.

"But I thought that when I was at .290 and then .280 and then .270," Herr said. "Now that I'm at .260, I don't know what to think. Even my good at-bats aren't productive at-bats. I'm getting good swings, but I'm missing pitches I should hit."

Mets Manager Davey Johnson apparently is going to try to take advantage of the Cardinals' problems at the plate. He has moved hard-throwing Dwight Gooden's next start up to Thursday's game against St. Louis. Gooden wasn't scheduled to go again until Saturday against the Expos in Montreal.

"The reasons aren't important," Johnson said. "I could give you a hundred to do it plus a few not to do it. But we're 7 1/2 back, and it's imperative that we give it our best shot."

The maximum load for graduate students is 16 semester hours.

SENIORS AT EIU IN GRADUATE COURSES

Seniors at EIU wishing to enroll in courses numbered 5000 through 5499 for undergraduate credit must apply for permission at the Graduate School Office prior to enrollment. To be eligible, the student must have a cumulative EIU GPA of at least 2.75. During the final semester of residence in undergraduate work, or the penultimate semester of residence in undergraduate work, if the final semester is to be spent in student teaching or internship, a senior with a cumulative EIU GPA of at least 2.75 may apply for permission to take graduate level courses numbered 4750 through 5499 for reserve graduate credit. Student wishing to elect this option must apply for permission at the Graduate School Office prior to enrollment. No undergraduate may enroll in courses numbered 5500 or above. Complete regulations governing reserve graduate credit may be found in the Graduate Catalog.

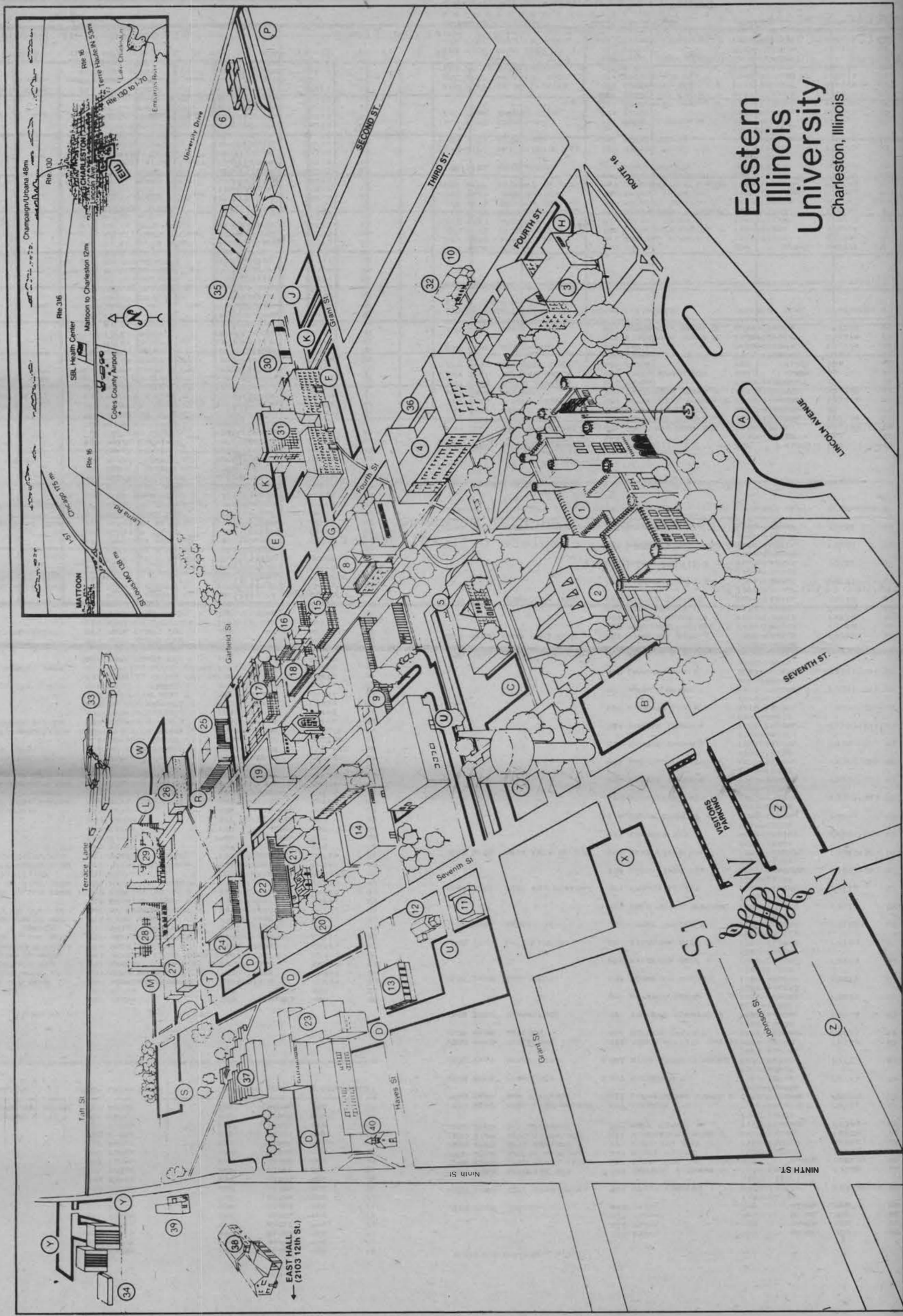
