## Eastern harriers grab NCAA II championship

OAK BROOK -- Eastern's cross country team grabbed an unprecedented six all-American places and rolled to a lopsided NCAA Division II championship at the Oak Brook Sports Core Saturday.

The top-ranked Panthers lived up to their billing by recording the second best point total and the second greatest victory margin ever recorded in the 20-year history of the Division II championship meet.

Eastern scored a low 37 points to overwhelm runnerup South Dakota's 151.

Twenty-three other teams were even further behind, including Southwest Missouri, the second-ranked team in the final coaches' association poll, which ended up a disappointing 11th with 293.

Only Southern Illinois-Carbondale's 33 points, scored against a much smaller field in 1961, topped the Panthers' point total, while only the 130 point margin scored in 1963 was more than Eastern's 124 point victory on Saturday.

"I've never seen anything like it," said an elated coach Tom Woodall. "Never has a team dominated a championship meet that I've seen where everyone was cheering 'We're No. 1' even before they posted the scores. But you didn't need a scorecard to see who won this one."

The Panthers put each of their five

scoring runners among the first 21 finishers and there was never any question to who had won the championship.

Eastern's only "loss" was in the race for the individual championship when Panther star Joe Sheeran was outkicked by North Dakota State's speedy Mike Bellmine.

Bellmine overcame an approximately 70 yard lead that Sheeran built up midway through the race and passed the Panther sophomore with about 150 yards remaining for the individual title.

Bellmine covered the 10,000 meter course in 30:08, while Sheeran finished in 30:10 and in second, still the best individual place ever by an Eastern runner in the national meet.

Sheeran, ninth in the nationals a year ago as a freshman, beat Bloomsburg State's Steve Echus, the meet's top returnee. Echus, eighth last year, finished it third in 30:26.

"Joe did everything that he had to do," Woodall said. "Bellmaine has run the equivalent to a 4:05 mile in the 1,500 meters in track and Joe just doesn't have that kind of speed for the last 150 yards."

"It wasn't like Joe faded at the end, Bellmine just took it to him," Woodall added.

## Coffey to run for re-election, not Congress

State Sen. Max Coffey, (R-Charleston), who earlier indicated he would seek the Republican nomination for Congress, will announce Monday his intent to run for re-election to the Illinois Senate.

Coffey said Sunday he will explain his reasons for running for re-election to the Illinois Senate instead of seeking the Republican nomination for the 22nd congressional seat currently held by George Shipley, an Olney Democrat.

"I would rather not say anything about it today. I will make it (the announcement) all at one time tomorrow (Monday) to give everyone a fair shake," Coffey said.

Coles County Republican chairperson Herb Brooks said Sunday he had some "speculations" why Coffey said he would not seek the nomination for Shipley's seat, but declined to elaborate.

## Sorority member warned about campaign

A sorority president said Friday that Panhellenic Council adviser Don Cook urged her to discontinue her participation in the student government election campaign because it could jeopardize her reputation as well as that of her sorority.

Karen Martin, president of Alpha Phi sorority, said Cook, who also is student government adviser, told her she and members of her sorority were potentially the objects of a smear campaign by person or persons involved in the student government campaign because of Martin's endorsement of one of the slates seeking executive office in the Nov. 16 election.

Cook confirmed Friday that he called Martin into his office Thursday to discuss the possibility that someone might attempt to injure her reputation because of her participation in the student government election.

Martin said in an interview Friday that Cook told her "they'll find something on you or they'll make something up."

She said Cook told her that "if I didn't keep my mouth shut, they'd find something to use against me."

She said Cook did not tell her who "they" were but that "a small little group didn't like it that I said something against one of the slates."

Concerning whom she believed "they" were, Martin said, "yes," she had an idea, "but I'm not going to say."

Cook said he called Martin into his office because of a controversy which arose after her name appeared on an ad in Monday's Eastern News.

The ad listed her as one of three people who paid for the ad which supported the slate of student senators Tom Holden, Don Dotzauer and Tom Dersch for executive offices.

Cook added that when he called Martin in "the only thing I was aware of is the dispute that happened, the phone call thing."

He said he knew of no improper campaign tactics being used.

Concerning her involvement, Martin said after the ad appeared, Chip Liczwek, a candidate for senate from the Greek District, talked to her on the telephone for about 45 minutes questioning why she supported the Holden, Dotzauer and Dersch slate rather than that of Karen Anderson, Steve Fears and Mark Petrus.

The Student Senate Elections Committee later reprimanded Liczwek for his actions.

Martin was quoted in Wednesday's Eastern News as an unidentified source, saying she was "harassed" by Liczwek during the telephone conversation.

Liczwek denied Wednesday any harassment of Martin.

Martin said she originally refused to be identified because, as president of a sorority, she felt "people will think it's the house's opinion. If I weren't president I would allow my name to be used."

Martin said that in her conversation with Cook she believed he was telling her to be cautious for her own good rather than to "warn her."

Martin said, "he was telling me for my own benefit. He wanted to make me aware of the situation."

Cook said he "advised her that as president of a sorority, that's where her first affiliations lie, rather than in dealing with campus politics."

## Byrd 'more favorable' of treaty

WASHINGTON(AP) - Senate Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd returned from Panama with a more favorable impression of the Panama Canal treaty, but his Republican counterpart, who didn't make the trip, remained uncommitted Sunday.

Senate Minority Leader Howard Baker of Tennessee said he needed more information before deciding whether to vote for the pact. Sens. Robert Dole, R-Kan., and Oliver P. Evans, R-N.Y., remained steadfast in their views.

Panamanian leader Omar Torrijos told the senators over the weekend he would not let human rights violations in Panama and said he would resign if the U.S. Senate rejected his regime was an obstacle to ratification of the treaty.

## PLO prepared to accept peace talks

TUNIS. Tunisia(AP) - The Palestine Liberation Organization said Sunday it is prepared to accept a renewed Middle East peace conference in Geneva if Palestinian participation is brought under United Nations auspices.

Said Kamel, head of the PLO delegation in Cairo, read a statement to reporters at the Arab foreign ministers' meeting here asserting that last month's Soviet-American declaration was acceptable to the PLO as the basis for a Geneva conference.

The Soviet-American document, issued in New York by Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko, called for resumption of Geneva talks before the end of the year with the participation of the Palestinian people.

## 44-day strikers come to agreement

NEW YORK(AP) - A tentative agreement to settle the 44-day strike of dock workers against containerhips at East and Gulf ports was announced Sunday after five months of bargaining and three days of intensive talks.

The tentative pact contained a wage-benefit boost of more than 30 percent over the next three years for 50,000 longshoremen.

The settlement was announced jointly here by the union and shippers.

## HEW computers making poor show

WASHINGTON(AP) - An internal HEW study says department computers holding sensitive information on millions of Americans don't come close to meeting minimum standards for protecting the information from unauthorized disclosure and use.

Because of the poor showing by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare's computers, there are indications HEW may lower its standards to improve its compliance ratings, says Rep. Richardson Preyer, D-N.C.

"Systems security in HEW was far from meeting minimum acceptable standards," the six-month audit said. "The average compliance with security standards was only 36.9 per cent."

## Low-tar cigarette market booming

NEW YORK(AP) - Health-conscious American smokers are switching in increasing numbers to low-tar cigarettes and tobacco companies are spending millions to promote a proliferation of new brands.

"The so-called low-tar market is growing extremely rapidly," says William Kuepfer, Jr., of The Tobacco Institute Inc., a trade organization. "It probably now exceeds 20 percent of the market."

There are about 60 low-tar cigarette brands on the market and still more are planned, he says. He likens the growth in low-tar cigarettes to the boom in filter-tipped cigarettes in the 1950's.

## Smog-producing agent discovered

WASHINGTON(AP) - Government scientists have discovered a new class of organic compounds that may be important in the formation of the unhealthy smog blanketing many cities.

The National Bureau of Standards announced Sunday that its scientists have isolated and confirmed a unique molecule called dioxirane, made up of carbon, oxygen and hydrogen atoms.

Dioxirane is formed and destroyed in a short time as part of an important smog-producing reaction involving ozone, one of the major pollutants in urban areas, and the carbon class of hydrocarbons from automobile exhausts.

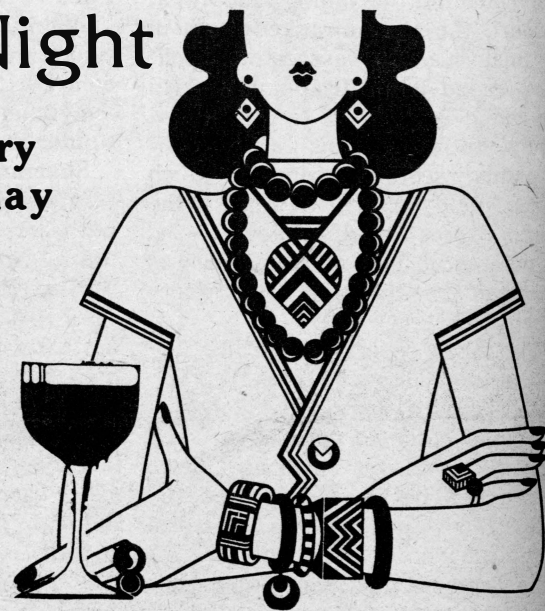

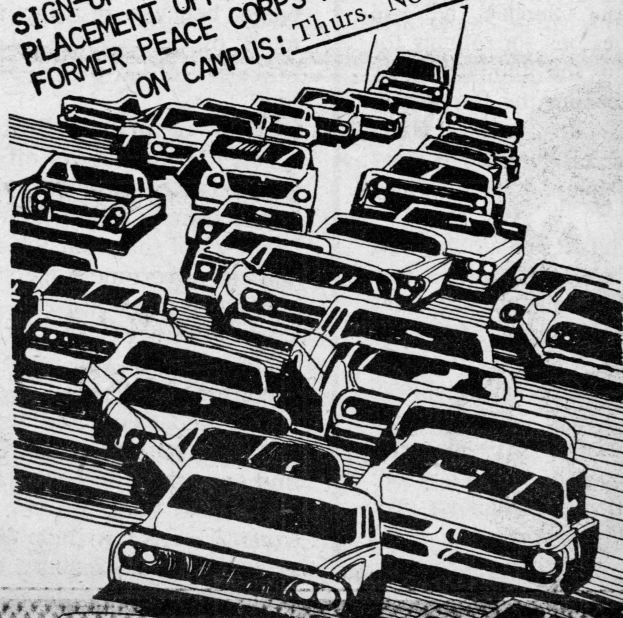

# First veep search candidate to meet students, faculty

Robert E. Collier, recent president of Northeastern Oklahoma State University in Tahlequah, arrived in Charleston Sunday and will spend a day and a half attending interviews and meetings.

David Buchanan, chairperson of the search committee, said there will not be a general coffee hour because of light turnouts in previous searches.

He added, however, that a number of the meetings with the campus groups will be open to faculty, students and staff.

The meetings which will be open on Monday will be with Student Government members from 11 a.m. to noon in the Union addition Student Government Office and with the Council on Academic Affairs-Council on Graduate

Studies-Council on Teacher Education from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. in the Union addition Charleston-Mattoon Room.

On Tuesday, the open meetings will be with the Faculty Senate, University Personnel Committee and Council of Faculties from 9:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. in the Union addition Tuscola-Arcola Room and with the department chairpersons from 10:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. in the Union Heritage Room.

In addition to these groups, Collier will talk with other persons and councils in meetings which are only open to members.

From 8:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. Monday, Collier will meet with the Vice Presidential Search Committee in the Union addition 1895 room and then with the Council of University Administrators

from 10 a.m. to 11 a.m. in the Vice President for Administrative Affairs Conference Room.

After having lunch with the Council of Vice Presidents, he will talk with the Council of Instructional officers from 1:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. in the President's Conference Room in Old Main.

On Tuesday, Collier will meet with President Daniel E. Marvin from 8:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. and will also have lunch with the search committee.

Collier, who is 51 and married with three children, is currently without employment although he was president of Northeastern from 1970 to this year.

From 1967 to 1970, he was vice-president for academic affairs and professor of Biology at East Texas State

University and from 1959 to 1967, he was at the University of Oklahoma.

At Oklahoma, Collier was assistant dean of the College of Arts and Sciences from 1962 to 1967 and Associate professor of Microbiology from 1959 to 1962.

Collier was a research bacteriologist and assistant to the director of laboratories for Swift and Company in Chicago from 1958 to 1959, instructor of Bacteriology at the University of Illinois (U of I) in 1957 and assistant professor of Biology and Chemistry at Phillips University from 1950 to 1953.

Collier received his Ph.D. in 1958 from the U. of I, his M.S. in 1950 from the University of Oklahoma and his B.S. in 1949, also from Oklahoma.

# Revised constitution approved

The Student Senate unanimously voted Thursday to re-approve revisions to the Student Government Constitution, including a re-districting plan defeated recently in a student referendum.

The redistricting plan would change the senate districts to 11 at-large senators, nine residence hall senators, nine off-campus senators and one senator from an organizational housing district.

The Organizational Housing district would be a new district that would represent members of recognized organizations living together in a house.

The revisions will be posted in the

Tuesday issue of the Eastern News, then voted on in the Wednesday student government elections, in accordance with the approval procedures set up in the student government constitution.

To be put into effect, the revisions need two-thirds approval of the student body voting on the proposal.

The 11-9-9-1 redistricting plan failed to receive the required number of votes for approval in a student body referendum held Oct. 26.

To allow "everybody in the old districts to serve out their terms," the spring senate elections will be altered, Murphy Hart, elections committee co-chairperson, said Thursday.

## Congrats to national champions

The Eastern News would like to offer its congratulations to the cross country team, which capped its highly successful season with an NCAA Division II championship Saturday.

Garnering six unprecedented All-American berths, the Panthers scored a low 37 point total, the second best score recorded in the meet's 20-year history.

Pacing the victory, as he has most of the season, was sophomore Joe Sheeran, whose second place was the best ever by an Eastern runner in the national meet.

Also gaining All-American status, which is accorded to the meet's top 25 finishers, were Casey Reinking in fifth place, John Christy in 12th, John McInerney in 14th, Duncan McHugh in 21st, and Bill Bandy in 24th.

But those were not the only contributors to the successful season by any means.

The All-Americans were pushed continually by several other capable runners who provided depth few squads in Division I could boast.

The team members who did not make the squad's first seven contingent for the nationals were all on the sidelines Saturday offering

moral support as were numerous other Eastern followers who made the trip to Oak Brook Saturday.

The Panthers supporters, probably outnumbering those from any other participating school by at least 2-1, gave Eastern the resemblance of a "home field advantage."

These fans also deserve kudos for their loyalty and for the way they backed their school with spirit that cross country teams from many schools do not receive.

However, perhaps the strongest driving force of all behind the national championship and the top contending teams of the past few years has been coach Tom Woodall.

Woodall, who should be a top contender for the NCAA's "coach of the year" honors, has helped maintain a strong cross country tradition built in the 1960's by former coach Pat O'Brien, a tradition that should continue for many years to come.

The cross country program is one of which Eastern can be very proud, and we salute them on their outstanding achievement.

## Election gripes

Some questions have come to our minds about the conduct of the elections officials and press during this election.

candidates in the At-Large district are Sigma Chi's?

Why has the Eastern News avoided announcing who Greek Caucus has decided to support?

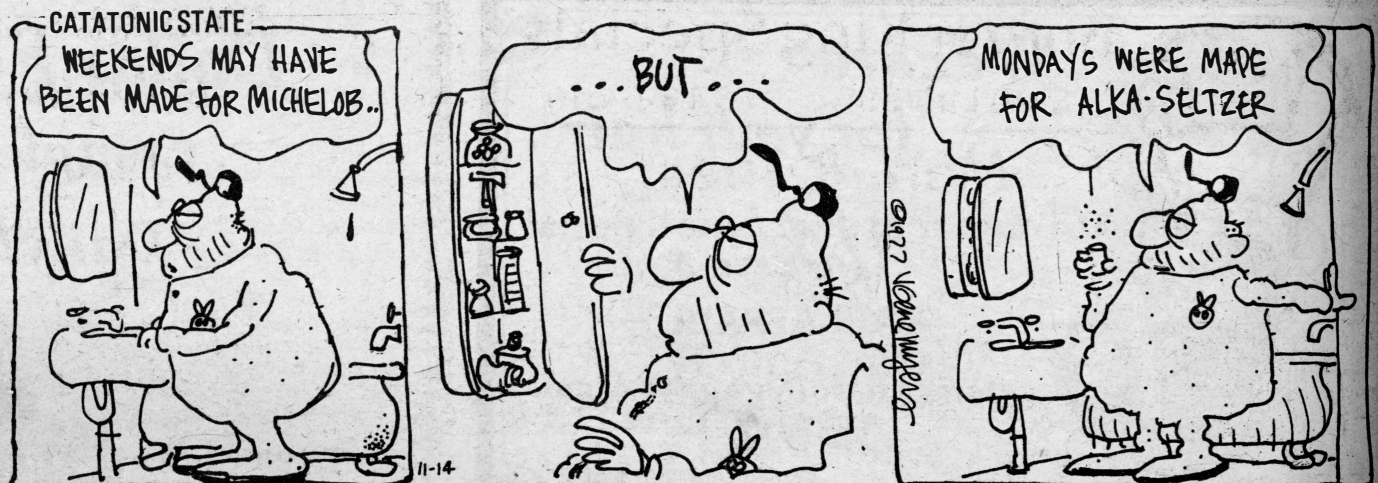

# Eastern student aids Chamber in 'City of the Year' victory . . .

A visit by Eastern student Vicki Pape to Corydon, Ind. helped bring back Charleston's first Lincoln Heritage Trail Foundation city of the year award.  
The award, which was presented to the city Nov. 4, is given to cities with a population of 10,000-50,000 for promotion of the city's project.

Pape, a speech-journalism major, served an internship with the Charleston Area Chamber of Commerce (CACC) over the summer and helped coordinate the city's participation in the contest.  
The contest was sponsored by the Lincoln Heritage Trail Foundation, which promotes tourism in Illinois, Kentucky and Indiana, and sponsored

awards for several different categories.  
"The biggest part of my job in the contest was contacting the people in charge of the projects we submitted and getting the projects ready for judging," Pape said.  
"The award places Charleston first among the cities of similar population entered in the contest for promoting the

community," she added.  
Pape said two projects entered in the historical preservation category were from the Charleston Women's Club for its attempts to save the old city jail and its tour of local historic homes.  
In the Lincolnian Heritage category, projects entered included a book and film on Abraham Lincoln by Eastern

Speech Department member Ralph McGinnis.  
In addition to McGinnis, Eastern's Dean of Fine Arts Vaughn Jaenike won merit for his "Celebration '77" and "Charleston Riots" projects.  
"Any of the projects not entered under specific categories were judged under the general category of 'City of the Year.'" Pape added.

# ... while Eastern instructor adds awards via Lincoln hobby

A multi-media study of President Abraham Lincoln is a hobby perhaps more time consuming than coin collecting, but for faculty member Ralph McGinnis, it is time well spent.  
Aside from teaching a full load in Eastern's Speech Department, McGinnis now spends "about half of my time studying Lincoln's works," he said.  
McGinnis has written a play and several books about Lincoln, about his famous quotations, reference data and an analysis of the Lincoln-Douglas debates.

Actor Robert Blake, a Lincoln look-alike who starred in McGinnis' one man play about Lincoln in 1975, portrayed Lincoln in the film.  
"He has got to be one of the best Lincoln actors today. There is a

remarkable resemblance," McGinnis said.  
The one-man play was presented at about 200 high schools and colleges under Eastern's name in 1975.  
McGinnis' most recent book, "Quotations from Abraham Lincoln," has just been printed by Nelson Hall and should be released in both paperback and hard cover in about two weeks.  
"It's mainly a trade book or a reference book," McGinnis said. "This kind of analysis had never been done before."  
McGinnis took quotations and categorized them into 10 concepts Lincoln stood for: truth, ethics, responsibility, logical thinking, government, economic enterprise, freedom, God and forgiveness.  
He analysed the quotations and described settings and backgrounds for each so that the reader can understand what Lincoln meant by the

quotes, McGinnis said.  
McGinnis also wrote "The Lincoln Douglas Debates."  
"In this book I boiled them down to brief accounts of the debates and added newspaper articles that were written about each one, mainly to show readers how violently biased the newspapers were."  
"The man's mind and his ideas is what I'm interested in," McGinnis said.  
McGinnis said the first time "I ever got my feet into Lincoln's work" was in fourth grade.  
Although he later used some of Lincoln's quotes while on the debate team at Kent State University, where he received his Bachelor's degree, he never got a real chance to know Lincoln until he worked on his master's thesis at Northwestern University.

McGinnis, a former Republican candidate for Congress, recently produced a film about Lincoln and wrote a book for which he earned recognition in Lincoln Heritage Trails Association competition dealing with contributions to Lincoln lore.  
The competition took place last weekend in Corydon, Ind. Charleston entered both McGinnis' book and film in the three-state competition, and won two merit awards and two first place awards in the category for cities with 10,000 to 50,000 population.  
One of the awards was an overall award for the best contributions to Lincoln history, McGinnis said.  
McGinnis also received an award from the Board of Governors about a month ago for the film, which was shot in the old State Capitol in Springfield.

It's just a crying shame, because Joe took the brunt of the race after about 2 1/4 miles and broke open a 70 yard lead," the coach continued. "But that's the only way he could have finished as high as he did."

Sheeran was followed by junior Casey Reinking, who after finishing only 41st a year ago, took fifth Saturday with a 30:31 run.

Both Sheeran and Reinking's finish among the top six qualified them to compete in the NCAA Division I finals on Nov. 21 at Spokane, Wash.

As superlative as Sheeran's and Reinking's performances were, the other five Panthers would have won the title without the dynamic duo Saturday.

That quintet was among the top 25 per cent of the 211 runners and four gained All-American laurels, given to the meet's first 25 finishers.

Senior John Christy closed out his career with his third straight All-American race, taking 12th in 30:48.

Junior John McInerney won his second straight All-American berth with his 30:50 and 14th place, while Duncan McHugh, 21st in 30:56, and junior Bill Bandy, 24th in 30:57, made the honored top 25 group for the first time.

While he passed out his usual kudos for his stellar trio of Sheeran, Reinking and Christy, who have led the team all year, Woodall offered extra praise for the other three All-Americans, who have been close behind most of the season.

"McInerney had just a beautiful race," the coach lauded. "You could see the fire in his eyes in the last mile and he probably passed 10 guys in that last mile."

"McInerney and McHugh worked together the whole race, and helped each other out because they were running so close," Woodall continued. "McHugh has to be the most unheralded kid we've got, and he just ran super for a 10,000 meter race when he's more of a miler."

"And Bill Bandy probably ran the most intelligent and most courageous race he's ever had," the coach added.

Although freshman Larry Schuldt faded in the last mile of his first attempt at 10,000 meters, he still finished a respectable 55th in the 211-man field.

"He felt pretty bad about it until I told him that he beat 75 per cent of the runners, and that guys like Mike Larson (a former Eastern standout) were about the same place their freshman year," Woodall said.

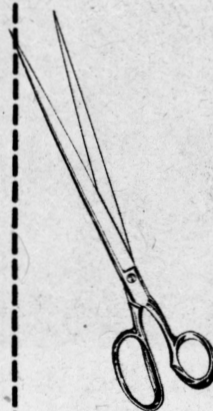

# Martin told participation in election could damage reputation

(Continued from page 1)

"I did not advise her to do anything or not to do anything. My purpose was to simply inform her of any type of situation which might harm her sorority in general," Cook said.

He said he felt the warning was necessary because "this political campaign is a very hotly contested one and Karen found herself unintentionally in the middle.

"In my capacity as Panhel adviser, I thought that I needed to talk to her about it," he said.

Cook added, however, that he "feels now my conversation with Karen was premature" and not based strongly enough on evidence.

Cook also maintained that when he called Martin into his office the "unidentifiable they" was a general term which referred to no one specifically.

As to who "they" were who might harm Martin, Cook said "they is like an entity meaning either side, they being people working for either slate. Again, I think she can pretty well feel where her pressures are coming from."

Cook added, "our conversation (be-

tween he and Martin) was a very, very general one which took in a lot of aspects of campaigning. If someone wants something bad enough, if they can't find anything, it's made up."

He added, "I don't know what either side is doing out there. I hope very strongly they are trying to present issues and keep the campaign on issues oriented to qualifications.

Cook added, he "never identified a 'they' to Karen. 'They' is not a person, it's like a lot of forces, 'they' being a combination of both sides in their desire to elect their respective candidates and they got Karen in the middle.

"If she (Martin) has any tangible 'they', then she should be the one to make the determination on that 'they'."

In the second conversation with Cook, he again said that the "theys" which might attempt to discredit Martin "can't be pinned down to one or two."

However, later in the same interview he admitted there were names behind the "theys."

Cook also said in the same inter-

view, "there are names, but I don't know if you can actually substantiate that. I have to have a long discussion with my superior (Bill Clark)."

He said, "when you talk about names, a lot of people would be mentioned. There are people on both sides who might be involved in unethical campaign practices. 'Theys' have to be dealing with people," he added.

Cook said he "strongly needed to consult with Bill Clark" about the situation since Clark, who is area head for the University Union and student activities and former student government adviser, "has gone through the campaigns before. It's best to consult with my superior."

Clark said Sunday he had spoken briefly with Cook Saturday, but would

not comment on the matter until he had spoken in greater depth with him Monday.

Cook said a meeting is scheduled for 4:30 p.m. Monday for executive office candidates, members of the Elections Committee as well as Cook and Clark, to discuss the election day process.

At that meeting, Cook said, "If we get into other areas, things may become relevant, then maybe a number of things might be discussed, including names."

# Basketball team eases past Czech team 89-61 in exhibition

The Eastern Panthers' basketball squad was a convincing winner Saturday night at Lantz Gym in a preseason warmup match against the Banik Ostrava Club, a national team from Czechoslovakia.

Despite playing without three key performers, the Panthers clawed and scratched to an 89-61 victory over a much larger and more experienced Czech team.

Going into the contest without three top frontline replacements, 6 foot 7 freshman Jeff Jacob, 6 foot 3 sophomore Jim Oldham and 6 foot 5 freshman Jim Williams, could have been difficult, coach Don Eddy said, "if our two big men (Craig) DeWitt and (Dennis) Mumphord had gotten into early foul trouble, we wouldn't of had anyone to go to."

The Banik Ostrava team, here participating in the Amateur Basketball Association's International Basketball Week, had to play without team leader Jiri Pospisil who was traveling with the Czechoslovakian national team which was playing at Bradley University Saturday night. Pospisil, the team's star forward, has represented Czechoslovakia in 1968 international games and was a member of their 1976 olympic team.

The Panthers, paced in the early going by the outside shooting of 6-2 senior guard Charlie Thomas, appeared to be breaking the game open with 8:20 left to play in the first half when they ran their lead to 10 points.

Prior to that the game had been even with Thomas and Pavel Skuta of

the Czech team exchanging outside baskets. Both players chipped in eight points respectively in the first five minutes of the contest.

The Czech team came back late in the first half on the scoring and rebounding of Martin Brazda, a 6-6 forward who finished the first half with 17 points.

Also, with five minutes left in the half both teams received their seventh foul, therefore putting each other into the bonus situation. The Czech's used this to their advantage outscoring Eastern 12-2 from the freethrow line and cut the Panther's large lead to 40-36 at the half.

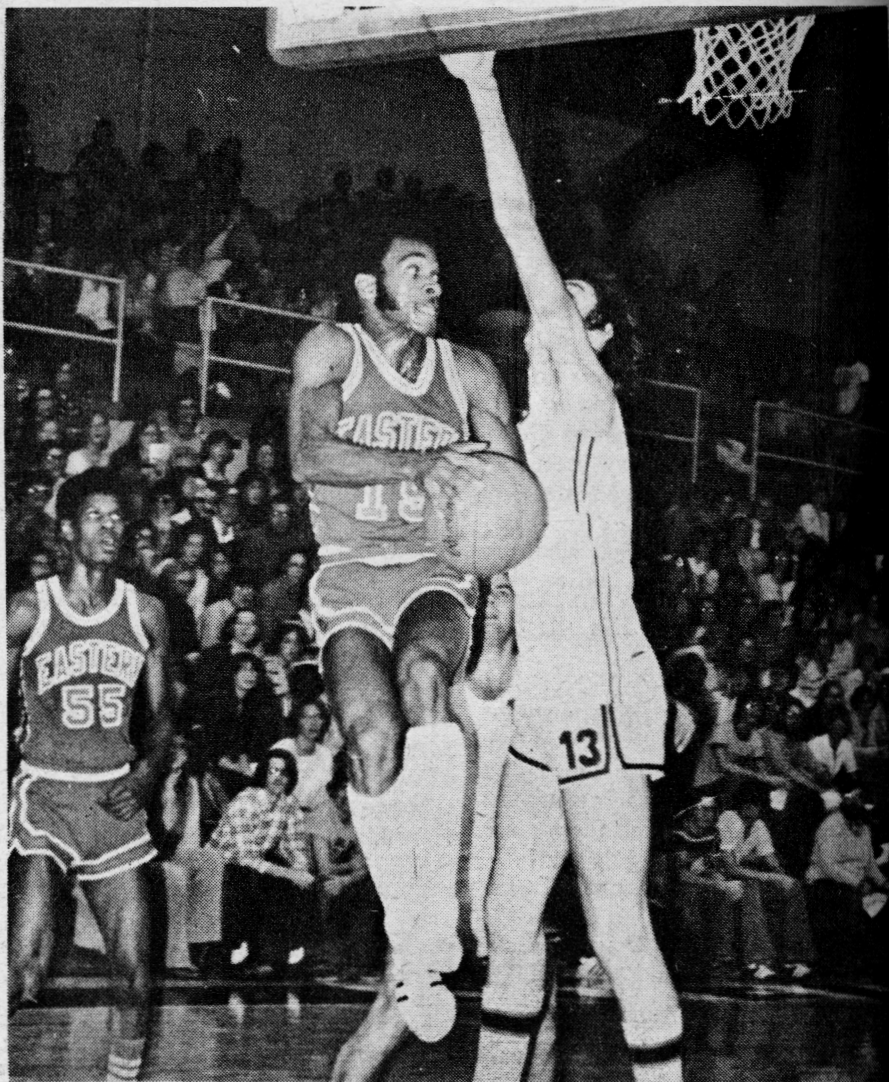
The Czechs tied the game in the first minute of play in the second half on two baskets by their 6-10 center Jan Blazek. It became clear though that this was to be the last remnants of a close game when the Panthers reeled off 11 unanswered points to regain the 10 point lead.

Brazda, of the Czech team scored twice and cut Eastern's lead to eight, but all hope was lost for the Czechs when the Panther's terrible twosome Bill Berndt and Lance Jones took control of the game scoring six points a piece to stretch the lead to 15 with 10:48 left to play.

Jones had a total of 16 points for the game scoring eight in each half, coming off the bench.

Eastern's lead was never again less than 12, while Eddy substituted freely using all 13 players on the bench.

In contrast, the Czechs used only five players in the first half and only six men during the entire game.

# Blair's goal pushes booters past UMSL 1-0

Eastern's booters made it clear Saturday that once is not enough as they reenacted its previous 1-0 victory over the University of Missouri St. Louis (UMSL) in their first game of the regional playoffs.

Miguel Blair, leading scorer for two consecutive seasons, made the only goal of the game with the exact same play that was used to beat UMSL in Eastern's second game of the season.

Just as before, Blair received an excellent cross from striker Ross Ongaro. Blair brought the goalie out and beat him one on one to score in the 11th minute of the second half.

"We used the same play to beat them just like before and that just killed them," coach Schellas Hyndman said. "They've never been beaten by Eastern once before this year, let alone twice in the same season."

Of the 16 shots on goal taken by Eastern, Blair totaled eight of them, shooting four in each half. "He did an excellent job, both with the ball and without it," Hyndman commented. "I think that's the best I've ever seen him play."

After the goal was scored the Panthers concentrated on defense and held UMSL's leading scorer, Jim Roth, to only one shot on goal for the entire game.

"We did what we wanted to do," Hyndman explained. "We knew Roth was the whole scoring for the team so we covered him closely and just played a hard defensive game."

Leading the defense at the sweeper position was co-captain and two time All-American George Gorleku. Pleased with an excellent performance, Hyndman said, "George is our free defender and we can always count on him to be involved wherever he is needed."

Taking over where George left off, midfielder Marcio Ferriera helped control the game from center and even moved up to help the attack, taking two shots on goal.

"That's great when a midfielder can get up there to score," Hyndman commented. "Marcio has that ability to improvise and change any situation to our benefit."

Another key player in Eastern's win was Owen Hylton at right wing. Hylton replaced David Hancock, a transfer student from the University of Alberta,

who was ineligible for post season play because of NCAA regulations for transfers.

"Owen did real well in the wing attack and helped to open up space," Hyndman said. "He never stopped running or pressurizing."

Pat Bruni, another ineligible transfer, was replaced at the left wing position by Joe Kearney, Roger Pires and Frank Antonucci, each alternating for 20 minute spans.

"It worked out real well," Hyndman said. "All three gave everything they had while they were in there."

"I'm super pleased," Hyndman commented. "Even though we were seeded fourth and had two ineligible players, we still beat UMSL. It was one of the best team efforts I've seen."

"You can see we're not being pushed around," Hyndman added. "The

time has come for Eastern to dominate St. Louis teams."

The Panthers will move to Wisconsin Saturday to challenge Wisconsin-Green Bay, who defeated Western 1-0 Saturday. The winner of that game will continue to Miami, Florida for the national title.

"We beat UMSL who was seeded number one and now we want to go to Wisconsin, who's number two, win that and go on to Florida," Hyndman said.

# Panther football team routed by Murray State 35-7 for 10th loss

Some of the players were changed but the script remained the same Saturday when the Panthers lost their 14th straight ball game to Murray State University 35-7.

Eastern now 0-10 on the year was hurt by the same second half ineffectiveness it has suffered from all year, not putting points on the scoreboard and its defense being unable to hold back the opponents offense.

Saturday, the Panthers had freshman Don Pittman at the signal calling spot for only his second start of the season, replacing Andy Vogl. He responded with 132 yards in 29 carries. Also Clifton Thurman, a sophomore, started along side Chris Cobb in the backfield but between the two of them they could only manage 56 yards.

Murray State, right from the outset of the game predicted what type of day the Panthers were in for. With Jeff Gossett punting from Eastern's 19 yard line, Murray State blocked the punt and recovered on the one-yard line.

Only two minutes had elapsed in the game and Murray State was on the scoreboard taking the ball over from the one on its first offensive play of the game.

Murray State kept the pressure on as they scored on its next series of plays going up 14-0 over the Panthers. Murray State drove 80 yards on eight plays capped by a 23-yard touchdown jaunt by halfback Tony Franklin.

Eastern got back into the ball game right at the end of the first half when it put together a 50-yard march after a 26-yard punt by Murray State.

The Panthers capitalizing on the short punt needed only five plays to score as Pittman romped for 26 yards and a touchdown with 55 seconds remaining in the half.

The rest of the afternoon belonged to Murray State as they racked up 21 second half points while completely shutting down the Panther offense.

Eastern was only able to run 25 offensive plays for a total of 38 yards in the last two quarters of play. Eastern had 228 yards for the game.

Meanwhile Murray State produced 481 yards of offense for the day and exploded for 301 of those yards in the second half.

The Racers scored on their first two offensive series of the final half with the latter score coming after recovering a Pittman fumble.

After scoring a touchdown at the 11:36 mark of the third quarter Murray State tried an onside kick which Eastern recovered on the Murray State 45 yard line.

Three plays later however, Pittman fumbled the ball away on the Racers 27 yard line.
