Monday, Weidner said he will give the committee's recommendations to BOG Executive Officer Donald Walters who will be on campus for a legislative dinner.

The BOG search committee will then review these candidates and recommend three of them to the full BOG for final consideration

Weidner said the three candidates will probably be chosen and contacted this week.

The full BOG is scheduled to announce the president at its Nov. 30 meeting.

The campus committee, which was

originally scheduled to recommend five finalists to the BOG in early October, had to extend the search when it was unable to agree on five names.

Weidner said the committee's inability to choose five was not caused by a lack of five good candidates but by the fact that some candidates were so much better than the others.

"The problem was not that we didn't have good people but that some of the people were outstanding and the committee felt uneasy including good people with outstanding ones," he said.

Reflecting back over the seven-month search while thinking forward to future searches, Weidner cited a number of difficulties they had and some improvements that could be made.

He said that joint meetings of the Eastern and BOG search committees were important and that if the search were to be done again, it would work better if the local committee would help decide which candidates would come for on-campus interviews.

## Fear of water contamination forces 2 day ban

Fear of contamination caused a ban on drinking water in the Charleston area for 48 hours after a break in a six inch water line on 7th Street north of Harrison occurred Friday.

Robert Montz, Charleston superintendent of water, said Sunday "There was a chance of contamination" but he really didn't think there had been.

"Whenever there's a break in a line and you lose water pressure there's some backup in the system and this more often than not causes some contamination," he "This was a safety precaution we had to take," Montz said referring to the 48 hour ban on drinking water from the Charleston water supply without boiling it first.

The break occurred "right at 4 p.m. Friday" Montz said. "It took about 1½ hours to fix the line under pressure to lessen the chance of contamination.

"About 20 or 30 thousand gallons were lost because of the break Friday but there was no chance of the water problem (the water shortage that has plagued Charleston city council since the summer months) becoming worse," Montz said.

Dr. Mack Hollowell, city health officer, said "The sewers and water mains run together in some areas so that whenever there's a break there's a chance of contamination."

system has flushed itself out by then," Hollowell added.

Hollowell said he had not received any reports of people becoming ill from consuming contaminated water.

"I got a call back today (Sunday) from the lab saying the water was okay and not contaminated," he said.

members, and consequently, most of the student body could become informed.

A similar system could be used to better inform students on the issues that affect them, such as collective bargaining, by sending them information defining the problem, and suggesting possible solutions.

"I want to get a lot of people involved" in student government," Fowler said.

He said he would try to hold accountability sessions each month to better relations with students and to provide "an open student government.

"There are a lot of things going on now that people should know exactly what we're doing about," Fowler continued.

On the possibility of having a lawyer specifically for students, he explained he feels Eastern needs "some kind of a student attorney."

He said he is not sure whether the position would be a full-time one, or just part-time, but added that such a lawyer could aid in a tenant's union.

If a tenant's union is established, Fowler said he would "set it up separate from senate" because "a senate committee could not do it justice."

"With the overcrowding getting worse and worse, freshmen (who cannot get into a dormitory) are signing anything they can," he added.

Concerning funding a tenant's union, he said the money would come out of the student government budget.

Another issue, the possibility of a tuition hike, was termed "inevitable, it's going to go up," by Fowler, although he said he and Rick Ingram, who is running on the same slate for financial vice president, "know everybody who was elected (to the state legislature)," and could have some influence with them.

Fowler said he is in favor of keeping the current admission policy the way it stands now, since the purpose of a university is to educate everyone who wants it.

# Donley's aim: regain respect for senate

Renewing student interest and input and regaining respect for Student Senate are changes Student Senator Don Donley would implement as student body president.

Donley said Thursday that he would "like to see changes in the amount of student input in the student board committees," explaining that there needs to be greater input.

He said that reasons for the lack of student input and respect is because of current President Mick Chizmar's absence from campus and that "Dan Fowler hasn't produced anything as speaker of the senate."

He added that senate only approved a revised student conduct policy and the grade appeals proposal.

He also added that constitutional changes are needed. "It's an internal thing that needs to take up little time — not as much as it has (in the past)," he continued.

Donley views the role of student body president as being both "independent of the student senate," and representative of the student body.

"The student body president can go out and do things independent of what the senate does" citing the example of "going to the community and trying to get candidates to endorse things beneficial to students at Eastern."

As a member of the Council on University Planning, Donley believed that he "has had influence" on it, adding that "I think I can have influence with the new president."

Enjoying a working relationship with Acting President Martin Shaeffer and Vice President for Student Affairs Glenn Williams, Donley said that one must respect the office they hold but one must be

representative of the student also."

He said that a student body president must "have a good stand on student rights."

He explained that a student representative must inform administrators on what does or does not constitute student interest.

Donley mentioned that he would appoint an assistant if elected, "but he would not have as much power as Chizmar delegated to his assistant."

He said further that the assistant's duties would be in the areas of "fact finding and information gathering."

Donley said that in the presidential election, "performance not qualifications" should play the greater role. Referring to candidate Dan Fowler's position as senate speaker.

"I've produced more as a housing representative in student government — that and representation to the students," he explained.

As co-chairperson of the senate housing committee and, he along with Senator Pete Matuecci, is a coordinator of an active tenant union at Eastern. Donley said that he will continue to attempt to set up a tenant union regardless of election.

"The biggest thing (for the tenant union to achieve) is to make people...look at their contracts and read them," to help provide legal advice and to serve as a lobbying group for price freezes in Charleston.

In regard to a student lawyer, Donley said that "off-campus people need legal advice and service — it's the same way with on-campus."

After speaking to several Charleston lawyers, Donley said he advocates a lawyer on retainer in which a lawyer still conducts a private law practice but his initial priority is to the students.

In regard to the admissions policy, Donley said that "Admission standards should be lowered.

"Any person in Illinois who wants to try to further his education should be allowed

Gaining student input on collective bargaining would be one of David Pinaire's priorities if he is elected, he said Thursday.

A transfer student from Illinois State University, Pinaire is one of two juniors running for the position of collective bargfaining representative.

"I don't see any student input," he said, and added he would possibly use question aires to get students feedback on what type of things he should push for as their representative

"There is a definite need for student government to inform students," particularly on collective bargaining, he said.

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Lashbrook, currently a sophomore, said the grade appeals plan had been, "tossed around. It was a big issue last year. I'd like to see something done.

Regarding classroom attendance, he said the 25 per cent plan currently under consideration was, "not right."

Lashbrook said to fight this he would pass a petition around, talk to administrators, and work with the student body president in hoping to get through the various proposals

However, he added, "What power does the senate really have? They can reason with university officials, but they can't do anything about it."

He also said polling places should remain in neutral places, not in the dorms, and the current system of putting polling places in the Union and Coleman hall, should be kept."

In addition, he said he would also see that all student organizations would be informed when positions in student government become vacant and on the issues concerning them.

He said he feels most of a proposal by current Executive Vice President Randy Kob that would combine most of the student-faculty boards into one is a good

idea.
"The board system is very very seldom," ineffective because it meets very seldom, Murray said.

Refering to Kob's proposal, he said "I don't know if all of the SAAB (Student Activities Administration Board) is okay, but the thrust is good.'

Five of the eight boards, the Communications-Media, Model UN - Debate, the Performing and Visual arts, the Sports and Recreation and the University Board,

would be amalgamated into the SAAB under Kob's proposal.


On each of the boards, both students and faculty have a voting role, although under Kob's proposal, no faculty would be able to vote.

"I don't think having faculty as ex-officio (Non-voters) is that bad after what they did on CAA (Council on Academic Affairs)," Murray said, referring to the mandatory attendance policy recently passed by the CAA.

Concerning membership on his combined board, he said "I could see them elected," although he said he prefers having them appointed to insure that qualified members would be on it.

On the possibility of having a lawyer for students, Murray said "I don't know if we need it, but legal services can be obtained within the current fee system.

# We pick Ingram, Murray, Anderson and neither

The Eastern News this year presents its endorsements in the order of importance we feel each office and candidate deserves.

For the office of financial vice president, the News wholeheartedly supports Rick Ingram for the post, on the basis of his experience, independence and the intelligence he has shown in student government to date.

We feel the financial vice president is the most important office in student government because it entails the most responsibility in its handling of student fees.

A weak officer in this post would damage all activities and the students involved.

Ingram has shown an honesty and forthrightness we find refreshing in student government, and while we do not always agree with his stands, we admire the fairminded and intelligent approach he takes.

His opponent, Patrick Boylan, seems uninformed and less motivated compared to Ingram and, certainly does not have Ingram's experience.

We found Ingram to be the strongest candidate running in this election, and we urge his election to the financial vice presidency.

The executive vice president deals with several areas directly important to the students, such as academics and governance of activities.

For this post, we endorse Steve Murray who has displayed a positive, confident grasp of the

duties of the office.

Murray seems to have an open mind, and has shown he has studied the issues which would come under his jurisdiction.

We also find it encouraging that Murray will bring new ideas into student government, such as his proposal for an ombudsman for students, without being encumbered by the politics sometimes found in student government.

Neither of his opponents have shown an awareness of what the job of the executive vice president involves.

The office of collective bargaining representative requires someone who is well informed on the issues and familiar with bargaining procedures.

We support Karen Anderson over her opponent Dave Pinaire for this post, although we feel Pinaire shows good desire and would be an asset in student government.

Anderson, however, has more experience to her credit and is extremely well informed on collective bargaining.

We also favor her views that students should be kept informed and involved on bargaining, as it will strongly affect their academic lives.

For the office of student body president, to News found it hard to give unqualified support to either candidate.

We found it disappointing that a greater choice or better quality of candidates was no offered to students, and we found it necessary to select on the basis of whom we could be with, and not whom we support.

Therefore, for this office we favor lu Fowler, because he has shown a less political more open-minded attitude in student government.

Both Fowler and Donley have shown flash of irresponsibility, as in the theft of the Eastern News last spring, which leads us to that perhaps neither was the best the study body had to offer.

Both have shown that they can be be workers, yet Fowler has not inspired many his leadership position as speaker of the send and Donley is too often erratic, unpredictable in his stands on campus issues and perhaps at out of political motivation rather the responsibility to the students on occasion.

So we cannot "endorse" either, because are unable to truthfully say we want either as student body president. However, of the choices — and even this is not a unanimo decision — we find Fowler to be the best candidate.

## Board hears case involving candidate

One of the candidates for student body president said Saturday he appeared before his residence hall judicial board for allegedly smoking marijuana.

Dan Fowler, speaker of the student senate, said he and two other Douglas Hall residents appeared before the j-board Thursday evening concerning an incident which occurred Nov. 5.

At 10 p.m. Nov. 5, campus security officers Bill Davis and Carl Gilbert were summoned to Douglas Hall by a Resident Assistant (RA) and, "The occupants opened the door but refused to allow the officers in," Security Chief John Pauley

Pauley added the officers, "could smell what they thought to be pot.'

The three occupants were then written up by the RA and were ordered to appear before the j-board Thursday where a decision was reached concerning the incident.


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



For the fourth straight year Eastern finished in third place at the Division II national championships held in Springfield, Mo., Saturday.

The University of California Irvine captured their second straight national championship, totaling 50 points.

Three runners tied for first, pacing Cal-Irvine to their victory.

Defending champion sophomore Ralph Serna, freshman Eric Hulst, and sophomore Steve Scott all were clocked in with times of 29:42 minutes.

"This was a much tougher field than last coach Tom Woodall said. "We vear. could have gotten Southwest if we could have had some better performances.

The coach was quite pleased with Sheeran's performance, however. "Sheeran ran an outstanding race," Woodall remarked.

"I don't know if there has ever been a freshman finish in the top ten besides Serna and Hulst." If there ever has, you

Reo Rorem finished 37th in 31:03 for Eastern, and Casey Reinking clocked 31:09 to place 45th.

Bill Bandy nabbed 52nd place in 31:17, and Ken Englert notched 65th, clocking

"Rorem did not run well," Woodall commented. "He really had to hang on for the place he got."

It was very easy to slip back but he hung in there with a courageous effort," the mentor added.

Woodall also had words of praise for McInerney. "If he ever ran a perfect race, this was it," Woodall said.

"He got in good position early, and just

# Field hockey team nabs 3d in regional tourney

Eastern whipped Northern Michigan 3-1 to grab third place in the U.S. Field Hockey Association Midwest Region 5 tournament, held Friday and Saturday at Lantz.

Central Michigan, the top seed, repeated as champion, nipping Ohio State 2-1 in the final. Both teams advance to the national finals Nov. 23-26 in Philadelphia,

The Panther women opened the tourney with a 3-2 victory over previously unbeaten Davis-Elkins. Central Michigan bounced Eastern 2-0, though, to put the Panthers in the third-place contest.

Panther coach Helen Riley was extremely pleased with Eastern's showing in the tournament, and particularly in the thirdplace game.

"I really think that was our best game of the year," Riley said. "We really rose to the occasion."

Eastern scored the last three goals of the game to outdistance an early Northern Michigan goal. Northern scored in the first half on a penalty stroke, "a beutiful shot flicked over our goalie," Riley said.

The Panthers tied the score at 1-1 on Marie Mejia's first goal of the season. "That goal gave us enough incentive to win," Riley said.

Eastern broke away in the final half on goals by Nancy Theis and Gerry Reuss. Theis scored after contributing passes by Mejia and Reuss.

Reuss beat the Northern Michigan goalie on a penalty stroke to add the decisive tally. It placed Eastern's final season log at 8-8-4.

Reuss and Theis tallied in the first half as Eastern pulled to a 2-1 lead over Davis-Elkins in the opener. Reuss scored again in the second half on a short shot from the left side to hand Davis-Elkins a first loss in 12 contests.

"She (Reuss) just happened to be there to pop it in," Riley noted.

Davis-Elkins came back to grab the consolation championship, ekeing out a 2-1 victory over Southern Illinois-Carbondale (SIU-C). SIU-C lost in the opening round to Ohio State.

Central Michigan stopped the Panther attack in Eastern's next game on Saturday, though. "We couldn't generate an offense

# Butler aerial display deals gridders 28-27 loss

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. - Quarterback Bill Lynch tossed four touchdown passes and connected on the winning extra point conversion pass, as Butler upended Eastern's football team 28-27 Saturday.

Lynch and Karl Rothhaar teamed up for both of Butler's second half scores, and also collaborated on the extra point

The victory enabled Butler to close the season with a 6-4 record. Eastern's loss, the fifth in the last six games, put the Panthers' season log at 5-5 with one game remaining.

Eastern will conclude the season Saturday. hosting Illinois State at O'Brien Field.

Butler's decisive tally came with 13:08 remaining in the game on a 35-yard pass from Lynch to Rothhaar. Butler faked the conversion kick and Lynch, the holder, hit Rothhaar in the corner of the end zone.

The Butler aerial circus overshadowed a 2.30-yard two touchdown performance by Panther freshman running back Chris Cobb. Cobb scored on runs of three and 23 yards, and had a 54-yard touchdown jaunt nullified by a penalty.

The afternoon propelled Cobb over the 1,000 yard mark in rushing. The freshman has accumulated 1,027 yards in 172 carries with 12 rushing touchdowns, good for a 5.9 average.

was just as effective. Lynch shredded the Eastern defense with 16 completions in 33 attempts for 228 yards, and was not bothered by the Panther defensive rush all afternoon.

Rothhaar nabbed four tosses for 90 yards. Mike Chrobot caught five passes and scored once, and Bill Ginn grabbed four tosses and was the recipient of the other touchdown pass.

"We had no pressure up front," lamented losing coach John Konstantinos. "That made it very difficult to cover the

Lynch's touchdown passes gave him 60 for his career. "He's a very fine quarterback, but he had a lot of time to throw," Konstantinos said.

Despite the excellence of Lynch, the Panthers outgained Butler 510 to 421 in total yardage in the freewheeling offensive

Included in the total was a season-high 367 yards rushing. Mark Stettner complemented Cobb's performance with 128 yards in 24 carries.

The Panthers started freshman walk-on Chuck Wright, with starter Russ Zonca sidelined because of injured ribs. Wright completed six of 11 passes for 143 yards in his first varsity start, and heaved a touchdown pass.

But the inexperienced Wright made two key errors in the defeat.

On their first possession of the game, Eastern drove to the one, but on fourth down Wright fumbled the center snap to muff the chance. On the Panthers' only scoring opportunity of the fourth period, an awry Wright pitch ended the threat.

As Butler's ball control offense took over, Eastern got the ball for only six more scrimmage plays after the error. Butler ate up the final 4:30 minutes

The Panthers finally broke on top 7-0 at the outset of the second quarter after cornerback Andre Phillips broke through untouched to block a punt at the Butler 26.

A host of Panthers led by Percell Reed and Ray Kemezys, pounced on the ball at the Butler three, and Cobb ripped over the right side on the next play, with 12:31 to

The lead was lengthened to 14-0 on a 56-yard bomb from Wright to tight end Doug Hiatt less than a minute later after a McDevitt fumble. It came with 11:45 left.

But Butler came roaring back to knot the score at 14-14. A 25-yard heave from Lynch to Ginn with nine minutes remaining capped an eight-play 68-yard drive.

With 1:05 left, Lynch struck again, this time lofting a 20-yard pass to Chrobot.
