

County clerk's office can register student voters

Students wanting to vote in the upcoming Charleston election have until Jan. 30 to register, according to Coles County Clerk Betty Coffrin:

Monday was the last day to register with a deputy registrar but our office will register people until the 30th," Coffrin said,

Students who registered to vote in Coles County for the November election do not need

to register again. However, if students have moved they must register again since they have a new address, Coffrin said.

Election day, Feb. 28, is a primary election in which the mayor will be elected. Also, all four commissioner posts are open, and voters will vote for eight in the primary and four in the general election to be held on April 4, said City Clerk Patsy

Heise, who is actively lobbying for more state funding for Eastern, said he would step up his efforts if elected mayor.

"I will work with the University administration seeking additional funds for this important institution of higher learning, and

assist in making the students feel a part of our community," he said.

Heise, who is a member of the Charleston Zoning Board of Appeals, said he would "seek fairness but a more rigorous enforcement of Charleston building and zoning codes to ensure the safety of our renting citizens."

Heise, who admits that Charleston's building inspector can't handle the job alone, said he would consider using the fire department when its not fighting fires, to inspect buildings and make sure the fire code is not being violated.

Heise said he would support the establishment of a new city plan, based on the most current data, which will provide a blue print for economic and community development.

He also would explore the establishment of a permanent seat on the City Council to focus specifically on economic development and community relations. Heise said the position would probably be an elected position.

Fair share fight gains momentum

The fight to end fair share payments by-non-union faculty at the five Board of Governors universities is gaining momentum.

The fair share provision, which requires non-union faculty members to pay a portion of union dues to cover the costs of collective bargaining, is a part of the contract proposed by the BOG in August and ratified by the University Professionals of Illinois in October.

Ron Perkovich, executive director of the Illinois Education Labor Relations Board, said Monday that more than 150 BOG employees have filed complaints about the fair share provision. Chicago State University, Northeastern Illinois University, Governors State University, Western Illinois University and Eastern are all part of the BOG

Perkovich said since the U.S. Suprème Court has ruled the fair share concept constituitional, the complaints can only be filed on basis of what dollar amount the fair share is. "The amount is what most of these people are protesting," he said.

But JoAnn Hummers, UPI's chief negotiater, said the fair share was determined by an audit of the union's books and reflects only collective bargaining costs. Nonunion employees are currently paying 83.95 percent of the union dues, which vary according to different salaries.

Larry Janes, an educational administration professor at Eastern, is just one of the 150 employees who has filed a complaint against fair share. He said at Eastern alone, more than 80 employees have expressed interest in reversing the fair share decision. "Obviously not all of those have filed formal complaints," he

e late 70s Eastern began to uildings to determine how accessible they were to handicapped students. These checks are now made every summer to improve the facilities.

Elevators were an option for improving access at Eastern. However, the cost of placing elevators in the buildings would cost the university a lot of money. Moore said they checked into installing an elevator in the Student Services Building, but decided against it because it would cost \$775,000.

Director of Housing Lou Hencken said it would cost \$130,000 to replace the elevators in Lawson Hall to accommodate the disabled.

An alternative to elevators are portable lifts, which are designed specifically for wheelchairs but are slower, Hencken said.

Hencken said Eastern is doing more to make the campus convenient to students with disabilities. A ramp was added to the outside of Thomas Hall. Ford Hall will have a laundry facility suited for wheelchairs, he added.

The administration has problems accommodating handicapped students in Pemberton, Lincoln, Stevenson and Douglas Halls due to their architecture.

In order to make the Stevenson Tower lobby accessible to students with disabilities he hopes to have lifts installed in the halls by fall of 1989.

Moore said some of the academic buildings have elevators, but the university often has problems with the elevators breaking

However, the biggest problem right now is with parking, Moore

There are not enough parking spaces reserved for the handicapped in front of academic buildings.

Three handicapped students have classes in Buzzard Building at the same time, but only two handicapped spaces are available. Moore said, "We don't have everything solved."

Sometimes it even comes down to switching the rooms where classes are held to make it more convenient for students with disabilities, Moore said.



Bush favors abortion reversal

WASHINGTON -President Bush told tens of thousands of demonstrators Monday that abortion on demand is an "American tragedy" and said he favors reversal of the landmark Supreme Court decision legalizing it.

Speaking by telephone hookup to activists gathered near the White House on the 16th anniversary of the historic Roe vs. Wade decision, Bush said he believes that ruling "was wrong and should be overturned."

The new president made the call shortly after Vice President Dan Quayle also assured anti-abortion leaders that the new administration supports their cause.

I wanted to share with you my deep personal concern about our American tragedy abortion on demand," Bush said.

"I think America needs a human life amendment," he said.

die in Argentina uprising

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)-Armed civilians seized a small military base near the capital on Monday, and up to 24 people were killed or wounded before soldiers firing tank shells, mortars and machine guns retook most of the base, news reports and officials said.

The civilian attackers who stormed the base carried pamphlets supporting officers who have led three previous uprisings, the private news agency Diario y Noticias said.

"Militarily, the situation at the 3rd Infantry Regiment at La Tablada is dominated," the secretary for state intelligence, Facundo Suarez, told the government news agency Telam about 10 hours after the incident began.

He admitted, however, that some civilian attackers remained inside, and gunfire could be heard coming from the base as he spoke on the radio.

DyN quoted a military source it did not identify as saying at least 20 of the estimated 50 civilian attackers were killed or wounded during fighting.

Hospital officials said at least four soldiers were killed or wounded in the fighting, along with one reporter.

Nervous traders told to be calm

CHICAGO (AP)-Officials at one of the nation's largest futures exchanges asked nervous traders Monday not to overreact to a sweeping federal probe of fraud in the markets, but warned "we will deal harshly with violators."

The Board of Governors of the Chicago Mercantile Exchange met Monday morning to discuss the two-year federal investigation and issued the letter, urging traders to be calm.

The letter came days after revelations that federal authorities have been investigating the Merc and the Chicago Board of Trade for two years on allegations that as many as 100 brokers and traders systematically cheated customers out of millions of dol-

Undercover FBI agents posing as traders recorded conversations

about the alleged fraud, which led to subpoenas of traders and records. The investigation became public last week, sparking panic in trading circles and sales of seats on the exchanges.

Commodities exchanges are market places in which buyers and sellers essentially bet milions of dollars on the future prices of goods ranging from gold to Treasury bills.

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



Counselor training open for volunteers

They're looking for a few good people.

They are the Sexual Assault and Counseling Information Service (SACIS) and the few good people being looked for are volunteers who want to become sexual assault counselors.

On Feb. 5 the center will begin training for counselor certification.

SACIS Director Bonnie Buckley said, "We're looking for people interested in social work and people who want to make a difference."

A minimum of 40 hours training is required by an Illinois Confidentiality Act for rape crisis counseling.

The six-week long classes will meet on Sundays from 1 to 5 p.m. and on Mondays from 7 to 10 p.m., which totals 42 hours

All classes meet in the ground floor classroom of the Sarah Bush Lincoln Health Center, Route 16 near Charleston.

Buckley said the college-age counselor is an invaluable asset because high school and college-age victims relate more readily to someone their own age.

SACIS operates locally out of Lawson Hall, but the service is for the entire Coles County area. "We work closely with Coles County Mental Health and we try to offer victims some choices," Buckley said.

Buckley said she thinks the service helps the victims and gives an alternative to "someone who is experiencing a terrible time in their life."

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

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

Off-campus education still a priority

Unlike Gov. James R. Thompson and Illinois House Speaker Michael J. Madigan, Eastern has not turned its back on educating the community.

Despite the fact that Congress has targeted Chanute Air Force Base in Rantoul as one of 86 military bases that may be closed as early

as 1990, Eastern will continue to find a new home for its offcampus education programs there.

For more than 15 years, Eastern has been offering educational programs to the Rantoul community, including extension courses, continuing education courses and several master's degree programs.

Two undergraduate degrees, the Board of Governors degree and a career occupations degree, are available to Rantoul area residents

About 400 students are enrolled in Eastern courses at Chanute this semester, two-thirds of which are military personnel and their dependents.

Jim Good, the coordinator of on-base continuing education courses at Chanute, said the continuing education program is popular among millions of military personnel because it allows them to start earning college credit while they are serving time in the armed forces.

Although Chanute may close and military personnel may not have the opportunity to enroll in classes there, Eastern is still searching for another home to continue offering extension programs and continuing education classes for residents of the Rantoul community.

William Hine, dean of adult and continuing education, said Eastern is looking for alternative sites in the Champaign County area to continue its committment to providing off-campus education outside of the Coles County area.

Eastern's committment to providing educational opportunities to the Rantoul community of 20,700 is optimistic despite the possibility of the closure of Chanute Air Force

Hopefully, Eastern's attitude toward providing a good education to everyone will carry on to our legislators in Springfield.

House, Madigan calls the
shots. What he says usually
goes.



And to be blunt, funding for education is not one of his top priorities.

As most of you already know, the state of Illinois is really hurting for cash to fund education from preschool through the college levels. For three years, school districts across the state have been crying for more money to pay their teachers and maintain quality educational programs.

This year, things haven't changed.

Gov. James R. Thompson, has twice asked the state legislature to approve an income tax increase to restore funding to the state education budget. In 1987, he proposed a state budget that called for a 20 percent income tax increase. But lawmakers, led by Madigan, rejected the idea.

Then in 1988, Thompson proposed a 40 percent income tax increase in the final weeks of the legislative session. This time, Thompson had the support of three of the four key leaders in the Illinois General Assembly. Only Madigan remained totally opposed to an income tax increase and Thompson's second attempt for a tax increase collapsed.

Meanwhile, college professors across the state left Illinois to take better paying jobs at other universities and the Board of Governors, Eastern's governing body, targeted students for a tuition increase or two.

Now, in 1989, when the need for an income tax increase is especially vital, Thompson announced he was not going to actively pursue an income tax increase largely because he feared Madigan would only thwart his efforts once again.

So who do we turn to now?

In the case of higher education, since the BOG couldn't get extra funding from the state through tax increases, it came to us for the money – twice. In the spring of 1988, it increased tuition by \$96. This spring the BOG pinched students for another \$120.

But we can't blame the BOG, it really didn't have much of a choice. If you're going to blame anybody,

blame Mike Madigan.

And if the state cash flow continues to dwindle, Eastern President Stan Rives has announced he will cut the enrollment of the university by 1,000 students over a five-year period. For each year over the next five years, 200 students will not be admitted to Eastern. It wouldn't be fair to admit them anyway because they wouldn't get the kind of education they paid for.

But Madigan says the picture isn't as bleak as Thompson, the State Board of Education, the BOG and Eastern administrators are painting it. In a statement, Madigan said he didn't think Illinois was suffering from any ''calamities' because he had blocked three attempts at a tax increase.

Madigan obviously is not concerned with the fact that although Illinois is one of the wealthiest states in the nation, it ranks close to dead last in per-student funding for higher education. And he's not worried that college tuition in Illinois has jumped 140 percent over the past eight years.

Madigan is not concerned that if Illinois can't properly educate its students today, it won't stand a chance in tomorrow's industry.


What Madigan is concerned about though, is himself.

An editorial in the *Chicago Tribune* reported that Madigan's Chicago law firm just made \$5 million by convincing Chicago Mayor Eugene Sawyer and 31 other Chicago alderman into approving a land deal at O'Hare Airport that will rob Chicago taxpayers of at least \$100 million.

He is building personal wealth at the taxpayers expense while at the same time, turning his back on education.

There's nothing like having a man in office who knows what's best for the people.

"The university is attempting to get this planning together so they can determine what kind of money will be needed for the long term changes," Gruber said.

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

Perkovich said all of the fair share complaints will be consolidated and a hearing will be scheduled for the spring. In the meantime, he said fair share dues are being deducted from the paychecks of non-union employees and placed in an escrow account until a decision is reached.



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

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

Rives names athletic director search committee

Eastern President Stan Rives announced Monday the members of the committee that will conduct a nationwide search to replace former athletic director R.C. Johnson.

Last month Johnson accepted the athletic director position at Miami (Ohio) University.

Robert Saltmarsh will head the 12-person committee that includes: Barbara Richter, dean of the College of Applied Sciences; Mike Riordan, student body president; J.W. Oglesby, Charleston businessman and member of the Panther Club Board of Directors; Roger Dettro, Mattoon mayor and Panther Club board member;

Larry Ankenbrand, associate dean of the College of Health, Physical Education and Recreation; Gary Foster, Faculty Senate president; John North, chair of the secondary education and foundations department; and Lou Hencken, director of housing.

Three ex-officio members were included: Judy Anderson, director of affirmative action; Ron Paap, associate athletic director; and Charles Colbert, associate vice-president for academic affairs.

Rives said the committee was formed with representatives from the whole university.

"What you have is as wide range (of representation) as possible," Rives said.

Rives said the committee would devise its own procedure to narrow the field to 3-5

finalists.

"I don't get involved until the final number," Rives said.

Although the search will be nationwide, the committee would also consider local candidates in its search, Rives said.

Interim athletic director Joan Schmidt has indicated she would apply for the position.

Rives said the final candidates should be "quite serious in their committment to NCAA rules and regulations, the graduation rate of the student athletes and operating the budget in the black."

Oglesby also served on the committee that chose Johnson for the position in 1980.

"We would look for the same qualities that we did with R.C.," Oglesby said. "Education would be a main requirement

of the candidates. The student-athlete getting an education is important.".

The cost of the search is unknown. Rives said. "It depends on where the (final) candidates are coming in from."

Rives estimated the cost to be around \$5,000, "which would not be unusual for a search for any department head."

An off-campus interview committee consisting of people from area communities will be included in the interviewing of the final candidates, Rives said in a present release.

"The target date for a new athletic director being on duty is July 1, 1989 ... soone if the search can be completed, and a recommended candidate is available," River said.

Taylor time

antz scoring mark shattered in 106-87 win

Forget about the Bud Light Daredevils; Jay Taylor put on the best show Monday at Lantz Gym.

Taylor scored a Lantz Gymrecord 47 points to lead Eastern (3-10) past Chicago State 106-87. But Taylor wouldn't take all the credit, and it showed in the lesson he gave after the game.

"My high school coach taught me something," he said, holding up his closed right hand. "When you've got the fist, you've got unity. When you've got an open palm, you've got nothing. We had unity tonight."

Taylor's 47 points was also a personal high and an Association of Mid-Continent Universities record. But more importantly for the Panthers, that unity produced a win and some newfound confidence.

"We're improved in two areas," Samuels said. "We're able to maintain our intensity, and we're doing a better job of taking care of the ball."

But the night still belonged to Taylor.

Eastern had trouble pulling away from the Cougars in the

first half, and the Panthers led only 48-42 at the intermission. The Bud Light halftime show must have been the opening act because Taylor was the main event once play resumed.

Taylor scored Eastern's first 11 points of the second half, and the Panthers extended their lead to 59-48 with 17:13 remaining.

"The thing is he scored 47 points and only took 22 shots," Samuels said. "The three-point shot helps. He got 18 from three-point range."

Taylor's six three-pointers and the team's 11 were both school records.

And on the bench, his teammates were tabulating the points as Taylor approached the Lantz scoring mark of 35.

"We were kind of counting his points. We were excited about that," said Eastern forward Joe Hamilton, who had a game-high eight rebounds, including seven on the offensive end. "Tonight he played like an All-American. The guys on Chicago State couldn't hold him."

But Samuels had a greater concern when he removed Taylor with 1:19 left, and the fans – a season-high 5,101 – chanted,

"We want 50!"

"I wasn't sure of his total when I took him out," Samuels said. "I knew he had the Lantz Gym record. I also knew I didn't want to gamble on him getting hurt. It was getting rough inside."

But the Panthers were appreciative of the boisterous crowd on hand

"The crowd got behind us tonight," Hamilton said. "We need that. The crowd can really get us going."

The all-time Eastern record for points in one game is 56, set by B.J. Smith in 1959.



"This is very disappointing because we were really looking for some good competition, and it was very spotty," Eastern coach Neil Moore said. "As far as fielding a full team here, I don't see why they couldn't have."

In the 200-meter dash, Thompson won again, with junior Greg Heggs taking second. Freshman Eric Baron won the 3000-meter run, while freshman Rob Dowell came in second.

Eastern teams won both the mile and two-mile relays.

"There were a lot of people that should be commended," Moore said. "Don Glover looked very good in the high hurdles. It's the best high hurdles race that I've ever seen him run. Jared Thompson won the 55, 200 and took third in the long jump. Both should be commended."
