HIV/PEER EDUCATION AND INSTRUCTOR TRAINING WORKSHOP

CHARLESTON -- An HIV/Peer Education and Instructor Training three-day workshop will be held on the Eastern Illinois University campus Jan. 24-26.

The workshop focuses on transmission, prevention, cultural sensitivity, treatments and what's new concerning a vaccine.

Sessions will be held from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. with an hour break for lunch on all three days.

The American Red Cross will conduct an instructional training and introduction of new facts on Friday, Jan. 24. Sessions on Saturday, Jan. 25, and Sunday, Jan. 26, will cover the history of HIV and AIDS, new facts, and how to teach the information. Instructors include staff from Southern Illinois University's Medical School in Springfield.
