

Professors make a move

Doudna's construction moves some faculty, professors across campus

John Sigler woke up extra early this morning.

He, among others, had five hours of moving personal items, desks, tables, bookcases and filing cabinets ahead of him.

"Today we moved faculty from the Study Abroad program offices and the international programs offices to the first floor, lower level of Booth Library," said Sigler, the supervisor of the crew who moved faculty and professors from the Clinical Services building. "It went quite well, though.

Everyone was well-prepared."

The reconstruction of the Doudna Fine Arts Center will leave Seventh Street closed and will result in the destruction of the Clinical Services building, which will have all asbestos removed from it beginning March 21, said Sigler. Also on March 21, the demolition of the existing Doudna building will take place.

Though the move was tedious and time consuming for faculty members, some kept a positive attitude by looking ahead to the day they could move back into their previous home, Blair Hall.

BOT votes on new parking lot

Eastern's Board of Trustees will vote on the leasing of property for a new parking lot across from Pemberton Hall today.

The property, 1532 Fourth St., would be used as additional parking for faculty, staff, students and guests.

Eastern will pay \$59,700 for the three-year lease with an option to buy the property for \$147,900 at the end of the lease period.

It will also cost \$11,335 to clear the lot and make it ready for parking, which will bring the total cost of the project to \$218,935.

The board also needs to approve the contracts to install sprinkler systems in the two towers of Carman Hall. The state's Dormitory Sprinklers Act requires all residence halls to have sprinklers installed by 2013.

"We've been putting sprinkler systems in our residential system environments since 1999; this (project) is just the next phase," said Mark Hudson, director of housing and dining. "It just happens to coincide with a new law."

The new sprinkler system will also be linked with the security systems in the halls.

"The stairwell doors will be rewired so that when the fire alarm goes off, they (the doors) automatically unlock, and people can get into any floor," Hudson said.

"We've been putting sprinkler systems in our residential system environments since 1999; this (project) is just the next phase."

The board will also vote on approximately \$6 million in spending on the Blair Hall reconstruction.

The money, which will be partially repaid by the university's insurance policy on the building, will pay for general construction costs as well as plumbing, heating, ventilation, electrical and sprinkler systems.

"That's (the \$6 million) just for the reconstruction to put it back together; the roof and the design are separate contracts," said Jeff Cooley, vice president for business affairs.

The reconstruction of Blair Hall will include a small addition to the building, which is why the money won't be entirely reimbursed.

"We're adding about 4,800 square feet, and that's something we'll be paying for ourselves," Cooley said.

The meeting will be held by conference call 8 a.m. Friday.

SOUTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY State lawmakers try to raise bar-entry age

(U-WIRE) CARBONDALE—For the second time in two years, state lawmakers are trying to raise the bar-entry age to 21 across Illinois, but once again it doesn't look like the proposal will pass.

Individual municipalities or counties determine entry age, but supporters of a new house bill want to prohibit people under 21 from entering premises where alcohol is sold, given or delivered. However, the bill's main supporter, Rep. Paul Froehlich, R-Schaumburg, said the bill will most likely not pass again this year.

The bill would allow for some entry exceptions, most notably for establishment employees, who must be 18. If no action is taken on the bill, as Froehlich expects, he said he is unsure if he will push the issue again next year.

ILLINOIS STATE UNIVERSITY Exam adds writing section

(U-WIRE) NORMAL—While other high school juniors and seniors may be filled with anxiety about the new four-hour SAT, prospective Illinois State University students can relax.

A new mandatory writing portion of the SAT is being added to the exam this March along with slightly more difficult math questions, more critical reading questions and the elimination of analogies.

The class of 2006 will be the first class to take the new SAT for college admissions.

In contrast to the mandatory writing portion of the SAT, the ACT writing portion is optional.

The Office of Admissions does not require the ACT writing portion. Consequently, when converting SAT scores to the ACT equivalent, the SAT writing portion has no effect on admission, Arnold said.


NORTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY Illinois governor receives low rating

(U-WIRE) DEKALB—A report on the country's governors by the libertarian Cato Institute has given Gov. Rod Blagojevich a below average rating for his fiscal policies.

The Washington-based think tank's "Fiscal Policy Report Card on America's Governors: 2004" criticized the governor for proposing tax increases and what they said was a lack of focus on curbing state spending.

Illinois Republicans blasted Blagojevich over the report. Andy McKenna, chairman of the Illinois Republican Party, said the governor's handling of state finances was "reckless" and "irresponsible" in a press release, saying he increased state spending by over \$2.2 billion.

Cat shoots it's owner

BATES TOWNSHIP, Mich. (AP) - A man cooking in his kitchen was shot after one of his cats knocked his 9mm handgun onto the floor, discharging the weapon, Michigan State Police said.

Joseph Stanton, 29, of Bates Township in Iron County, was shot in his lower torso around 6 p.m. Tuesday, the state police post in Iron River reported. He was transported to Iron County Community Hospital.

Michelle Sand, a spokeswoman at the Iron River hospital, said Stanton was treated there before being transferred to Marquette General Hospital for further treatment. But Marcie Miller, a representative of the Marquette facility, said there was no record of the hospital receiving a patient by that name.

State police said he was cooking at his stove when the cat knocked the loaded gun off the kitchen counter behind him.

Tara Reid lets it hang out

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Tara Reid sued the owners of a Las Vegas condominium project Thursday for using her name in an ad that appears to be a reference to the accidental exposure of her breast last year as she posed on the red carpet.

Reid has said she had no idea she was flashing the paparazzi when the strap of her dress slipped off her left shoulder as she walked the red carpet at Sean "P. Diddy" Combs' 35th birthday party.

The lawsuit, filed in Los Angeles Superior Court, claims that Reid's reputation was damaged by an advertisement for Sky Las Vegas Condominiums published on Feb. 1 that reads, "Dear Tara Reid. Come let it all hang out."

The lawsuit alleges the ad implies that Reid, 29, intentionally let her dress strap slip and that Sky Las Vegas is capitalizing on her misfortune by misrepresenting her as "sexually lewd or immoral."

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Learning to Lead

Delegates from Student Senate attended workshops and participated in round-table discussions at Texas A&M University's Conference on Student Government Affairs from Feb. 26 to March 1.

Instead of the usual three, Student Government chose to send a fourth member this year to the conference in College Station, Texas.

"This gave us the opportunity to go to more areas we could improve on in order to make Eastern better," said senate member Jill David, the fourth selected delegate.

Each member attended three workshops and participated in three round-table discussions.

David said she wants to create a training program for new members of Student Government after attending the "Fish Aides" workshop, which covered the skills needed to foster leadership roles within Student Government.

"This workshop really hit home with me because it is something I can really relate to," David said. "It took me almost a full semester to figure out what I was doing because the Student Government does not have a structured training program."

Many changes would have to be made to "Fish Aides" to make it adaptable to Eastern, David said, but it could be done.

The program "Officer Transition" addressed how to inform senate members who will take on a committee chair position, said Senate Speaker Ryan Berger.

Berger said he will implement this project this semester and will be making changes to better inform new committee chairmen about past projects to make senate's goals more efficient.

"Compared to other (Student Governments),

we have many areas of success, but many areas do need improvement," Berger said. "The only way to know this is by going to these conferences."

Internal affairs, external affairs and media relations were the topics discussed at the round tables by senate members from various universities.

"I think those discussions were the most valuable learning experience," said senate member Andrew Berger.

The round-table discussions gave Student Government members the opportunity to network with other universities and discuss what they do, said Student Executive Vice President Adam Howell.

"It allowed us to collaborate with other students across the country on what can and cannot work and how they can help us, as well as how we can help them," Howell said.

Andrew Berger also took a Student Government Effectiveness Test at a workshop designed to find the strengths and weaknesses within student governments.

"It really opened my eyes to a new aspect of the Student Government that could really be improved," Andrew Berger said.

"Pride and Ownership on Campus," "Ethical Election," "How to Schedule a Lobby Date" and "Technology and Student Government" were some of the other workshops Eastern's Student Government representatives attended at the conference.

"The conference went very well," David said. "It was very beneficial for everyone who went and for the Student Government to learn from."

The four senate members presented their information and ideas at the senate's meeting at 7 p.m. Wednesday in the Arcola-Tuscola Room of the Martin Luther King Jr University Union.

"One of our faculty members had said 'it will be the biggest party Eastern has ever had once we go back to Blair Hall,'" Sigler said.

Stephen Shrake, facilities planning and management coordinator, said the Clinical Services building will probably be demolished by May.

"It will take 30-45 days to clear the Clinical Services building of asbestos," Shrake said.

The Clinical Services building contains many materials that need to be cleared of asbestos, Shrake said. The floor tile, carpet adhesive, pipe insulation and possibly the plaster all need to be removed of asbestos, he said. Shrake said he and others have been organizing off and on for a couple of months for faculty to move from the Clinical Services building.

Some changes have been made in Pemberton Hall, Booth Library and 9th Street Hall to accommodate the moving faculty, he said.

Scott Turnbull, project manager for Core Construction, said his company, which is involved with the reconstruction of Doudna, will begin constructing fencing next week.

"Around 100 people will probably be working during the peak of construction, but we're still in the early parts of planning for now," Turnbull said.

Gary Foster, chair of the sociology and anthropology departments, said he and his staff were hoping to stay in the Clinical Services building until the end of the spring semester, but it became clear they would all have to relocate because of the Doudna construction.

"It's been kind of an emotional roller coaster for some faculty," Foster said. "But we look across the street and realize good things are happening to our colleagues."

Some faculty are going to have to adjust to their temporary offices.

"The office space in Pemberton is created by cubicles, so it will be a different experience," said Foster. "It's going to be a real inconvenience because of the lack of privacy. There are some sensitive issues and discussions that take place with our students, and it will be hard to conduct those. We have some small offices for those conversations set up for us though."

Foster also said the students will also have to try to adjust to the new move.

"The majors in our department have created a nice culture here in the Clinical Services building," Foster said. "We are going to lose that, and Pemberton isn't the convenient space they want and need. We are all just going to have to make the best of it."





Free agent Johnson out to prove he's capable as starter or backup quarterback

LAKE FOREST— Former Tampa Bay free agent quarterback Brad Johnson worked out Thursday for the Chicago Bears.

"The great thing about the way I play, I still feel like I'm the same guy that played at 28," Johnson, 36, said.

Johnson also has visited Detroit to work out for the Lions and he left Thursday night for Miami to show off

his stuff to the Dolphins.

While most free agent quarterbacks come in and take a physical, Johnson also has worked out to erase doubts in some quarters that his passes no longer have their old zip.

It's a critique with which Johnson disagrees.

"They've (passes) all been on the money with a lot of zip, so it's funny



how one thing, it kind of snowballs you know, when something is said," he said.

The Bears are considering Johnson for the third quarterback slot, joining

Rex Grossman and Chad Hutchinson.

Johnson played four games last season for the Buccaneers before being benched. He wound up third string behind Chris Simms and Brian Griese and was released for salary-cap reasons.

Johnson has a career 84.0 passer rating and has completed 61.8 per-

cent of his throws (2,166 of 3,504) for 23,913 yards with 143 touchdowns and 98 interceptions. Last year, he was 65 of 103 for 674 yards with four touchdowns and four interceptions and a 79.5 passer rating.

"I still feel like I have it in me," he said. "If I didn't, I wouldn't do it to myself, wouldn't do it to an organization."

Favre to return for 2005 season

(AP) - Brett Favre is returning to the Green Bay Packers for the 2005 season, The Associated Press has learned.

Coach Mike Sherman told The AP on Thursday that he had a two-hour conversation with his quarterback on Wednesday night.

Favre informed him his wife is doing well in her cancer treatment, so he's planning to play at least one more season, maybe more if his own health holds up.

"It came down to his wife and she's doing well in her recovery," Sherman said. "She wants him to play. He said he's looking forward to playing _ hopefully without any off-the-field situations and 'enjoying the journey.'"

The three-time MVP said after the Packers' playoff loss to Minnesota in January that he wanted to reflect before committing to playing a 15th NFL season following a year of personal tumult.

His wife, Deanna, was diagnosed with breast cancer in October, a week after the death of her 24-year-old brother in an ATV accident on the quarterback's property in Mississippi.

And Favre was still dealing with the stunning news of Reggie White's death on the day after Christmas, which came about a year after the death of Favre's father, Irv, from a heart attack.

"After the season, he just needed to think about some things," Sherman said. "Any

man would have to contemplate his future when his wife is fighting cancer. It's not like he had to work to make money. He didn't want to be a part-time husband and a part-time football player. It came down to his wife. If she's not healthy, it's obviously a different ballgame. But now she's doing good. She wants him to play."

It never was a question of diminished ability because even at 35, Favre is still on top of his game.

He topped 4,000 yards passing last season and recorded his eighth 30-touchdown season, twice as many as any other quarterback in NFL history, and the Packers set franchise records for total offense and net passing yards in 2004.

Jose Canseco willing to tell all

WASHINGTON (AP) - Jose Canseco is willing to tell all before a congressional committee looking into steroids in baseball, but first he wants assurances he won't get in trouble for what he says.

Canseco asked Thursday for immunity if he's to testify fully, but a spokesman for the lawmaker who will chair the proceeding offered no promises. Canseco is among seven players summoned to appear at the March 17 hearing of the House Government Reform Committee.

Another House panel on Thursday held the first of what it said could be a series of hearings on the subject, with several congressmen chastising baseball for what one called its "extremely weak" drug-testing program. The subcommittee chairman said all major U.S. sports leagues should work toward uniform steroid penalties.

Canseco, the 1988 AL MVP, has admitted using performance-enhancing drugs and his best-selling book accuses several stars of steroid use.

"We've asked for immunity," said Canseco's lawyer, Robert Saunooke. "We hope they give it to us. We're still going to show up even if we have no immunity and offer whatever testimony we can that does not expose Jose to legal liability."

If immunity were granted, any prosecutor who wanted to charge Canseco would have to prove statements before Congress were not used as evidence. David Marin, a spokesman for committee chairman Tom Davis, said: "At this point, there are no plans to offer immunity to any witness."

Keady says goodbye after 25 years at Purdue

CHICAGO - Gene Keady was already on his feet when the final buzzer sounded, making his way to shake hands with the opposing team.

Less than a minute later, he was gone. And after 25 years, this exit was for good.

"I've had some place to be since the first grade. Think about it. And I don't have to be at any place tomorrow," Keady said Thursday after his career came to a disappointing end with Purdue's 71-52 loss to Iowa in the Big Ten tournament.

"I'll probably be an 'E.B.' Errand boy," Keady said, drawing laughter.

Keady left the floor to a standing ovation from fans of every allegiance, appreciation for all of his accomplishments. He finishes with a career record of 550-289 that includes six Big Ten titles and 17 NCAA appearances.

More importantly, he leaves having influenced everyone he's encountered, coaches and players alike.

"He had an impact on me 25 years ago and he's still having an impact," said Iowa coach Steve Alford, who faced Keady

when he played at Indiana. "He's done things the right way. That's always what coach Keady has been about. Great character, great integrity."

W. VIRGINIA 78, NO. 7 B.C. 72

NEW YORK - Mike Gansey scored 21 points and West Virginia hung on to upset No. 7 Boston College 78-72 in the quarterfinals of the Big East tournament Thursday, ruining the Eagles' bid for a final conference championship.

Kevin Pittsnogle added 17 points for the Mountaineers (20-9), who very likely wrapped up at least an NCAA tournament at-large bid with the surprising win over the Big East's top seed.

West Virginia, the No. 8 seed, improved to 3-8 in the tournament and advanced to its first semifinals.

Craig Smith scored 20 points and grabbed eight rebounds for Boston College (24-4), which leaves the Big East for the Atlantic Coast Conference after this season.

NO. 6 LOUISVILLE 85, TCU 61

MEMPHIS, Tenn. - Larry O'Bannon scored 18 points to lead five Louisville players in double figures, and the sixth-ranked Cardinals beat TCU in the quarterfinals of the Conference USA tournament.

The top-seeded Cardinals (27-4) never trailed in winning their seventh straight game, and 16th in their last 17.

NO. 8 ARIZONA 88, CAL. 63

LOS ANGELES - Channing Frye scored 22 points on 10-of-11 shooting and No. 8 Arizona routed California in the opening game of the Pac-10 tournament.

Frye was perfect until missing a 15-footer with 13:05 remaining in the game.

The game was all but decided at halftime, when they led 42-23.

Their comfortable lead allowed coach Lute Olson to give his starters a lengthy rest in the second half, when the Wildcats' lead ballooned to 30 points. to 3-8 in the tournament and advanced to its first semifinals.



Eastern duo ready for nationals

Thursday, two Panther wrestlers will make their debut appearances at the NCAA wrestling national championships.

Senior heavyweight Pete Ziminski and sophomore 174-pounder Kenny Robertson each took second at the NCAA west regional last weekend.

At the 2004 west regional tournament, Ziminski (16-7) and Robertson (34-10) each took third at the tournament and came just points away from quali-

fyng for the championships.

Despite this being the pair's first trip to nationals, Eastern head coach Ralph McCausland is confident his wrestlers are prepared.

"Kenny has wrestled virtually every nationally-ranked guy," McCausland said. "It gives him a good feel of the competition and has to set his mark."

In the regional 174-pound championship, Robertson, who has wrestled over 15 ranked opponents this season, lost 7-4 to No. 8 Eric Hauan of Northern Iowa. It was Robertson's third loss to Hauan.

"The same thing with Pete (as Robertson): he has wrestled identical competition," McCausland said. "Maybe not so much this year, but over the last two seasons."

When the NCAA championship kicks off Thursday in St. Louis, McCausland said that his wrestlers have good shots at bringing home a medal.

"Pete and Kenny each have a real chance of standing on the winner's podium," McCausland said.

Robertson will enter the championships ranked 16 in the nation, the highest in his career, after raising four spots from No. 20.

More tough competition on the way for Panthers

The Eastern baseball team is 1-6 this year, but that record is deceiving when factoring in the competition it has faced.

The Panthers have played Oklahoma (10-4), Mississippi State (8-0) and Olivet Nazarene (6-3). The combined record of those three opponents is 24-7, and now the Panthers travel to take on No. 19 Arkansas in a three-game series.

Arkansas is 13-1 this year and participated in the college world series last year.

This early in the season, Eastern is hard-pressed to find other teams from the north to play, unless it plays in a southern tournament that has northern competition.
