## Four 'Quality' judges ousted from election

Four of the 10 students slated to be election judges in Wednesday's Student Senate elections were removed from their posts Tuesday evening because they formally endorsed the Quality Party.

Tim Taylor, campaign manager for the Priority Party, filed a campaign violation Tuesday morning citing that Executive Vice President Andrea Pyle, former University Board Chair Karol Klingel, and Senate member Tyra Ringsrud had violated student senate bylaws by working as election judges and formally endorsing the Quality Party in an advertisement paid for by Students for the Quality Party. The ad ran in Monday's edition of *The Daily Eastern News*.

Senate bylaws state "judges will assist the chairs in assuring a fair election and preventing or reporting violations of these rules at the polls," and that "the elections chairpersons and committee

members shall conduct elections in a fair, honest and impartial manner."

Elections Co-chair Martha Price also removed Senate Secretary Monica McAdams from an election judge post after learning that McAdams formally endorsed Patty Kennedy, the Quality Party's presidential candidate, on Wednesday's editorial page of *The Daily Eastern News*. Pyle also endorsed Jennifer Baldrige, the Quality candidate for Executive Vice President, in the same issue.

"We (the elections committee) felt that because a violation had been filed, we should deal with it before the election and not after," Price said. "I'm very sad about all of this, however, they did publicly endorse a party. To keep the chaos out of the election, I felt it was better to deal with it now than tomorrow (election) night."

Price added that she felt the four would have been competent judges and done their job fairly and impartially.

"I think it's sad that there is so

much competition in this election that its all come down to things like this," Price said. "It's just party politics that kind of got in the way."

Price said she was working with her newly appointed co-chair, Karl Johnson, to fill the four judge positions by Wednesday morning.

Quality candidate Patty Kennedy, who didn't learn of the complaint until late Tuesday afternoon, said the Elections Committee should have addressed the complaint itself before accepting the input of others who were not connected to the elections.

"In all my three years here, I have been an election judge in campaigns that I wasn't running in and I always formally endorsed a party," while serving as an election judge, Kennedy said, adding, she acted in a fair and impartial manner.

"Their decision, (the election committee's) I can completely rest with. I just feel that the way they went about it was completely unprofessional," she added.

## Bargaining continues on lecture

The University Board and the agents representing Joe Clark, who was featured Thursday in a University Board sponsored lecture, still have not come to an agreement on Clark's tardiness for the lecture - which resulted in about a \$3,000 loss for UB.

Clark, who was expected to draw a crowd of 1,500, gained national fame while he was the principal at Eastside High School

in Paterson, N.J.. Clark is known for his persistence in driving inner-city minorities to succeed and for patrolling the high school's hallways with a wooden baseball bat.

But Clark was almost two hours late for his lecture and only 200 students of the original crowd stayed to hear Clark speak.

Student Activities Director David Milberg said he spoke with Keppler Associates, based in Washington, D.C., on Monday and Tuesday and expects negotia-

tions to continue through Friday.

Milberg said the UB is seeking a number of options, including a reduced fee for the lecture, which carried a \$7,000 price tag. UB Chair Melissa Boehm said Monday that the UB may ask Clark to cover the \$3,000 loss and pay Clark only \$4,000 for the lecture.

However, Clark reportedly asked the UB to pay the full price for Thursday's lecture and offered to return in the fall for a free lecture.

## Where to vote

Students can cast their votes for the student body executive staff and for 15 and a half senate seats during Wednesday's student government elections.

Five polling places will be open from 7:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Students need to bring their student ID to vote in the elections. Election Committee Co-chair Martha Price said.

Polling locations are as follows:

- The Martin Luther King Jr. University Union
- The lower hallway of the Physical Science Building
- Coleman Hall
- Buzzard Education Building

In addition, Price said if the weather is nice there will be a voting tent set up on the Quad outside Booth Library so students have an additional place to cast their ballots.

## Clark leary of petition's timing

What started as an joke has been carried into a petition to impeach Senate Speaker Jane Clark.

And Clark, who is running for Board of Governor's representative on the Priority Party ticket, said she felt the timing of a formal petition to remove her from office is interesting since it came up a week before the election.

Last Wednesday, senate member Tim Denby, who is also running as an independent candidate to retain his senate seat, showed Clark the petition to remove her with his and senate member Tom Green's signatures on it.

Denby claims that he signed the petition at Green's apartment and said he would then go and get the other three signatures

needed to bring the petition to senate. Instead of getting the three additional signatures, he came to the conclusion the petition was being used for a smear campaign.

Green denied all involvement except the actual signing of the petition. He also claims that Denby approached him with the petition.

Junior Tom Kochevar, a friend of Denby's, said he went to the Delta Tau Delta fraternity house, 1707 Ninth St., and asked for a tour of the house. The fraternity member told Kochevar he was free to look around.

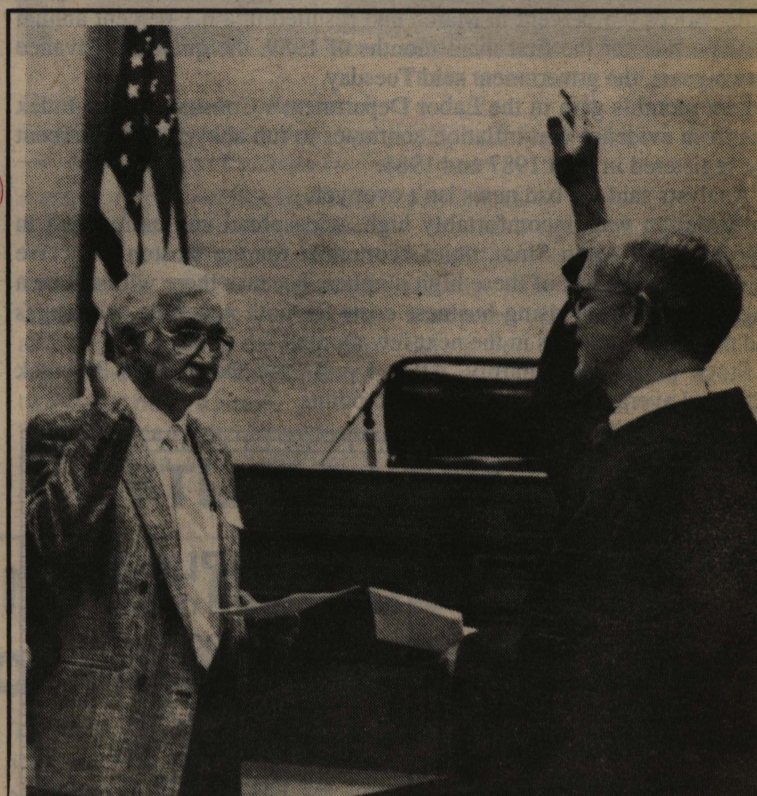
While Kochevar was looking around he said he saw a garbage can full of computer printouts, one of which was the rough draft of the petition that he then brought out of the house and to Denby. "Tim (Denby) had a theory that the draft may have come from

the house. I took a gamble, and it just so happened that it proved Tim right," Kochevar added.

Senate member Michelle Michals jokingly mentioned the idea of starting a petition to remove Clark after a recent senate meeting. The comments were made in the presence of several senate members, including Denby, Green and Bill Golden.

Student Body President Mike Riordan, Quality campaign manager and a Delta Tau Delta fraternity member, said if senate members have a problem with Clark he hopes they will take their problems to her.

"As for the legitimacy of the complaints raised against Jane (Clark), there have been some and the talk of impeachment has come up before. I would add though that the timing in this particular instance was inappropriate."

## Lanman takes oath

In an executive session following Tuesday's City Council meeting, the recently elected commissioners tentatively decided upon the seats they will occupy for the next four years.

Mayor-elect Wayne Lanman, who was sworn in prior to the meeting, said Commissioner John Winnett is 85 percent positive he will stay with the finance seat, while Commissioner Bruce Scism will probably remain with his position with water and sewage. Lanman added Dr. Roger Rives voiced intentions for the public properties position, thus placing Jim Dunn at the streets position.

Final choices will be

announced at the next council meeting on May 1, when the positions will be voted on by the new commissioners.

During the meeting, the council unanimously voted to approve the 1989-90 budget of approximately \$9.4 million, an increase of about \$137,000 from the previous budget.

Included in the budget were amendments for the Senior Citizen Center and the Coles County Council on Aging which increased the budget by a total of a little more than \$27,000.

In other business, the council approved a request by Robert and Leyla Waddell to zone a piece of property in the Lincolnwood subdivision as R-2, or two-family residential.



## Inflation rate jumps to 6.1

WASHINGTON (AP) - Higher food and energy costs boosted consumer prices 0.5 percent in March and resulted in a 6.1 percent annual inflation rate for the first three months of 1989, the quarterly advance in two years, the government said Tuesday.

Last month's gain in the Labor Department's Consumer Price Index was fresh evidence that inflation continues to run above the 4.4 percent rate registered in both 1987 and 1988.

Analysts said the bad news isn't over yet.

"Inflation was uncomfortably high, widespread and entrenched in March," said Allen Sinai, chief economist for the Boston Co. "We haven't seen the last of these high numbers because there will still be a rippling through of rising business costs for both materials and wages and rising energy costs in the next few months."

Stock prices rose sharply. After 4 p.m., the Dow Jones 30-stock industrial averages up to more than 36 points.

## U of I gears for 'Hash Wednesday'

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (AP) - College students of the 1960s used to chant "Let's get stoned," but their 1980s counterparts are taking a more business-minded approach to the fight for legalizing marijuana.

University of Illinois students said their 13th annual "Hash Wednesday" demonstration isn't an excuse to get high, but a way to promote the cannabis plant as a source of pulp for paper, fiber and medicine.

One of the organizers, Debby

Spindel, said smoking pot in the open or yelling obscenities at police would be discouraged.

Steve Hager, an Urbana native who is editor of High Times magazine, said if marijuana plants were used as a source of pulp "the Greenhouse Effect and deforestation would never be happening."

"The whole issue has shifted to the environment," Hager said of efforts to legalize the forbidden weed. "We're getting out of the whole drug thing, man."

Said sophomore Josh Sloan: "We're not there to break the law, we're there to change it."

A crowd of 2,000 was expected to gather at the campus demonstration, where speakers were to include the director of the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws.

Eleven people were arrested last year for offenses that included possession of marijuana, and campus spokesman Terry Shepard said the police would be on hand Wednesday.

## House endorses area base closings

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House voted overwhelmingly Tuesday to back a plan to close 86 military bases, including two in Illinois, and scale back five more despite complaints that the move will not save as much as advocates had promised.

By a vote of 381-43, the House rejected a resolution to disapprove the recommendations of the Commission on Base Realign-

ment and Closure, giving the green light for Defense Secretary Dick Cheney to follow through on the panel's proposals beginning in January.

Illinois lawmakers say the impact would be devastating on Chanute Air Force Base in Rantoul and Fort Sheridan, north of Chicago.

"It is incumbent upon all of us to make sure this base closing list

is implemented," the chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., said moments before the vote.

The commission's recommendations affect a total of 145 domestic military installations by closing some, reducing the operations of others and changing the missions of additional bases.

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# Eastern not alone in housing increase

Eastern students living in residence halls are not the only students in Illinois who will be paying more money next fall for room and board.

The Board of Governors, Eastern's governing board, approved a proposal by Eastern President Stan Rives to increase the housing rate by \$88 per year. The increase will bring the total housing bill to \$2,476, up from the current \$2,388 per year.

According to Rives, the increase is basically to keep in step with the cost of living. "The increase is at a rate of 3.7 percent," which is below the inflation rate of 4.7 percent, Rives said.

Housing Director Lou Hencken agreed with Rives, and said the increase is a result of inflation.

"There are anticipated increases in cable television, food service, salaries and telephone line costs."

Hencken also said it doesn't matter if students live on or off campus, they are going to be paying more for housing. "We believe you won't escape this no matter where you live, if it is on campus, off campus or in Chicago when you graduate."

There was also an increase of \$88 last year for the 4,500 students who live in residence halls at Eastern, Hencken said.

The only other BOG school that is increasing its residence hall rates is Western Illinois University in Macomb. However, Western students will be hit harder than Eastern students with an increase of \$159 per year.

The increase in room and board at Western stems from two reasons, according to John Maguire, director of university relations at Western.

"The first reason is strictly the increase in cost of living in terms of food service contracts," Maguire said.

"The second reason is due to university overhead like refurbishments such as carpentry and replacing carpet," Maguire added.

He said that the increase is also due to the updating of the campus computer system. Since some computers are in residence halls and used mostly by those students living in the halls the increase is felt there.

He said this year's increase which goes into effect next fall, is

close to a 6 percent increase. Western had an increase in housing fees last year that "was approximately 3 percent," Maguire said.

Western students currently pay \$2,445 per year, but with the \$159 increase, they will be paying \$2,604 per year.

The other BOG schools - Northeastern Illinois University, Chicago State University and Governors State University - are not increasing their residence hall rates.

Students living in residence halls at Illinois State University in Normal will also be shelling out more money after an increase of \$94 per year. According to Mindy Mangialardi, assistant director of residence hall life at Illinois State, students are currently paying \$2,404 per year, but with the increase, they will be paying \$2,498 per year.

"The increase is basically due to the increase of the cost of living," Mangialardi said. She said a study is performed during the fall semester each year by students in the Residence Hall Association to determine what the costs will be for the following year and how much the rate should be increased.

Students living in residence halls at the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana will also be paying more money to live on campus next fall.

U of I students will be paying \$3,426 per year after an increase of \$114 per year was approved by the U of I Board of Trustees last week, said Joe Miller, associate director of housing. Students there were also hit by a \$152 increase in housing last year.

And like the other universities, the U of I's increase comes from "increased costs in labor, maintenance, food and utilities," Miller said.

Although students at Western, Illinois State, the University of Illinois and Eastern will be paying more money next fall to live in residence halls, students at Southern Illinois University in Carbondale will be paying the same as they did last year.

Ed Jones, director of housing at SIU, said there hasn't been an increase since the 1986-1987 school year. "Students are currently paying \$2,624 per year, which has been the rate for the last two years," Jones said.

# Green Party member tells views

Eastern students and faculty experienced the unique flavor of German Green politics Tuesday after attending a lecture by a German Parliament member in Coleman Hall Auditorium.

**Rezzo Schlauch**, brother of Eastern history professor Wolfgang Schlauch and member of the Green Party since 1980 and a Parliament member since 1984, spoke on his party's views on environmental issues like acid rain and the increasing diameter of the ozone hole and the additional political "awareness" of political issues normally not faced by Germany's traditional parties.

Environmental issues should be addressed by industrial companies, Schlauch said. Acid rain, the ozone hole, toxic waste and nuclear weapons are contributors to the "society of risk - which threaten human existence."

He added that taxes should be raised on industrial companies with the hope of limiting the

number of toxic wastes Germany exports to third-world countries.

The realist Green's, which Schlauch is an active member, want to decentralize government and want to change the majority rule in the German Parliament to two-thirds majority rule.

Schlauch said the two-thirds majority rule will "legitimize any vote brought before the

parliament."

Women's rights and the rights of millions of guest workers, mostly Turkish and Southern Europeans brought into Germany during Germany's economic miracle of the 1970s and the recently released German citizens of White Russia and Poland due to perestroika, must be protected, Schlauch said.

# Faculty Senate discusses proposal for new handbook

The Faculty Senate met Tuesday to discuss the possibility of making a more detailed course description handbook for undergraduate students.

The senate was in favor of supporting the Student Senate's request for a handbook that would contain longer explanations of not only what classes are about; but also what teaching methods are used such as lectures, films and class discussions.

"Students want access to more information about courses," faculty senator Michael Loudon said.

The new handbook would also give students more choices when deciding which teacher to take for a course, he added.

The handbook would be produced by the English department and be distributed to departmental offices, the Student Advisement Center and Booth Library.

The senate agreed to put the proposal on the agenda and vote on it at a later date.

In other action, Luis Clay-Mendez gave the Council of Faculty's report about its most recent meeting.

Clay-Mendez said the tele-class program was the main topic of discussion at the COF meeting, and he thinks some of Eastern's

faculty should apply for a tele-class position.

The tele-class program is designed for undergraduate courses to be taught by an instructor on videotape. Using this method, students would not have a regular class meeting time.

"I think it would benefit people who are disabled or who just can't attend school at a regular time," Clay-Mendez said.

In other business, the senate announced that the Faculty Retirement Tea will be held from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. May 3 in the Union Addition 1895 room. Everyone is invited to wish this year's retirees luck.

I felt severely under-represented. I don't want that to happen again.

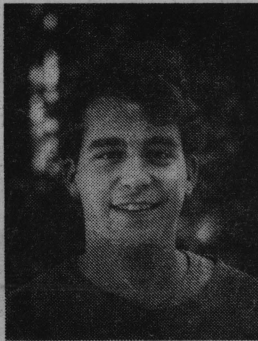

First of all, you said you based your endorsements on the forum. I was at the forum; and I didn't see any DEN staffers there. Who from the DEN editorial staff was there?

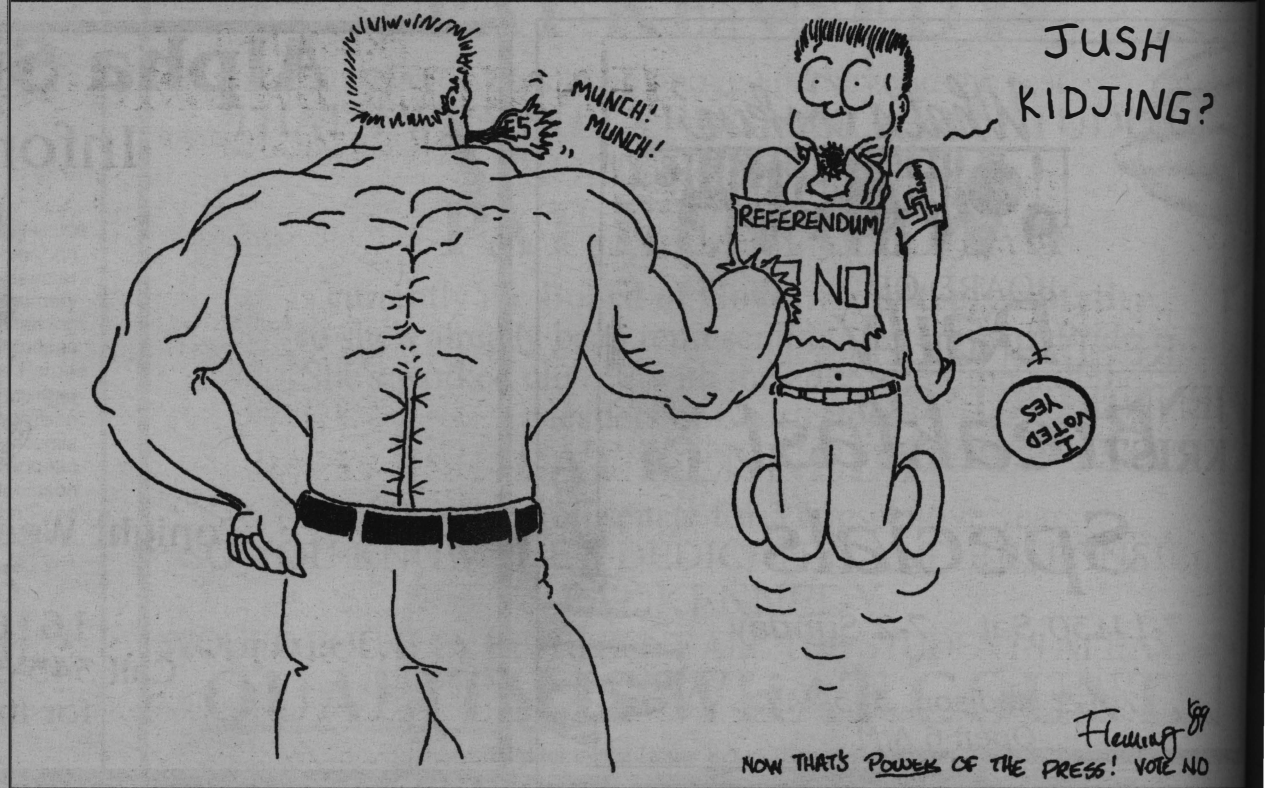
Secondly, are you basing your endorsements on what would be best for our campus and the students or are you basing them on what would be best for the DEN?

Terry's popularity grew as when he became a soloist for Duke Ellington's orchestra. Since then, Terry's popularity and reputation as one of contemporary music's greatest has heightened.

## Second AD finalist interviewed

### Expanding programs a priority

Southern Utah State Athletic Director Gary Gallup wants to market Eastern's athletic program.

Gallup Tuesday was the second of four finalists in the Eastern AD search to formally visit Eastern's campus and conduct a public interview. In that open forum, he noted the importance of promoting college athletics.

"My philosophy has basically been (college athletics) is more than a game," Gallup said. "Let's make it an event."

Gallup, 46, has considerable experience in the public relations facet of college athletics. Before his current position, Gallup was associate athletic director for radio and television at Southern Methodist University from 1983-87, where he also did play-by-play for Mustang athletic broadcasts.

He was director of media relations at the University of Wyoming starting in 1981 and was director of athletic promotions at the University of Texas-El Paso from 1977-81.

"Support of athletics has got to come from within before it will come from without," Gallup said. "We've got to have our students

involved."

Gallup favors cutting student admission costs for athletic events.

"I understand that there is a 50-cent fee to go to a ballgame (at Eastern)," Gallup said. "I can't come in here and say that I would change that, but if we reduce the cost to nothing, we may be able to double, triple or even quadruple attendance figures."

In 1987, SMU was the focus of enormous controversy when its football program was given the death penalty by the NCAA for recruiting violations and other athletic misconduct. And although Gallup was at SMU during that episode, he said that he was among many people whose reputation unjustly suffered as a result of the scandal.

"A lot of innocent people got caught up in that big mess," Gallup said. "I feel very fortunate that South Utah State judged me on my talents and my ability and not where I was coming from."

Actually, Gallup said that he benefited greatly from his tenure at SMU.

"I learned two things as an assistant AD," Gallup said. "One, I learned NCAA rules and compliances, and two, I learned fiscal responsibility."

Gallup said that he had not yet studied Eastern's athletic budget.

"I did get the feeling from

some of the non-revenue (sports) coaches that they would like more help," Gallup said.

"One goal is to generate some enthusiasm for non-revenue sports," he said.

Gallup, whose athletic teams are all Division I except for a Division II football program, said that he considers the Eastern AD spot a step up.

"I'm impressed with the amount of facilities you have," said Gallup, who was a sportscaster in Madison, Wis., at the same time that Eastern football coach Bob Spoo was quarterback coach at the University of Wisconsin. "I think they're (facilities) are excellent. I think they're adequate for everything you need here."

Gallup said that as Eastern's AD, he would promote cohesiveness throughout the entire athletic department.

"Nobody can do it by himself," Gallup said. "Everybody's got to work together; it's got to be a family."

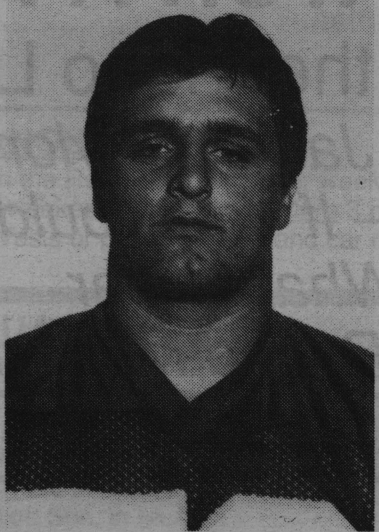

The odds of Jurkovic playing professional football may be stacked against him, but with the honors Jurkovic has gained, the possibility remains.

"I'm a little short, and I'm not the overall fastest," Jurkovic said. "I would list my strengths as desire, strength and a heart as big as a mountain."

But with those strengths, Jurkovic was only contacted by one school: Eastern. Determined not to let his brother, Mirko, come up short on the qualities the scouts look for, Jurkovic trained him to be what the scouts want, and it paid off.

"He's at Notre Dame now, with a championship ring on his finger," Jurkovic said. "It (being chosen by the Fighting Irish) was a happy moment for him (and) it was very satisfying for me."

But although Jurkovic was upset when he had to settle for Eastern, he looks back at his years as a Panther satisfyingly.

"What started out as a disappointing situation has turned into a positive experience," he said.

## Eastern to face Salukis in reunion of coaches

When the Eastern baseball team takes the field against Southern Illinois-Carbondale for a doubleheader starting at 1 p.m. Wednesday at Monier Field, the matchup will be a reunion for both coaches.

First-year Eastern coach Dan Callahan was an assistant coach for Richard 'Itchy' Jones at Southern for the past three years.

"I probably learned more in my three years at SIU than anytime before," Callahan said. "I wouldn't be where I am today if it wasn't for Itchy."

Callahan said he is looking forward to the matchup. "I know all the players and it will be fun playing against those guys."

Despite the reunion, Callahan said there has been a rivalry in the past between the two schools.

"It was a big rivalry before; coach (Tom) McDevitt got them up for the games before," Callahan said. "It will be fun, but we want to win."

Coming off victories in four of their last six games, the Panthers go into the doubleheader with a 17-13 mark. Eastern was rained out of a game with the University of Illinois Tuesday.

The Salukis are starting slower than usual, as they lost three of four to Bradley last weekend to slip to 18-17. Southern finished

Callahan said he has named Wednesday's starting pitchers, but added they would all pitch in to save arms for the weekend Association of Continent Universities matchup with Western Illinois.

The Panther pitching staff have to face hot-hitting Salukis center-fielder Doug Shields, who comes into the game with a .414 average.

Eastern will likely face Salukis pitcher Dale Meyer (4-4) and Sean Bergmann (4-3), but the Salukis are in the same position as the Panthers, with Missouri Valley Conference games with Creighton slated this weekend.

Catcher Dan Hargis leads the Panthers in average (.406), runs (nine), runs batted in (25) and runs (25). Hargis is followed by right-fielder Jeff Jetel and first baseman Dana LeBlanc (.319).

Four Eastern pitchers are on the team lead with three wins each. Jim Sweeney (3-2), Deese (3-4), Ryan Edwards and Darin Kopac (3-2) lead the Panther staff.

The Panthers are tied for second in the AMCU Gray Division with Southwest Missouri State 2-2, as they split four games with the Bears last weekend.

Eastern plays divisional games with Western Illinois in a four-game set this weekend.
