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
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Minutes of the College of Education Curriculum Committee
January 29, 1993

Minutes - The minutes of December 4, 1992 were approved by consensus.

Item 93-1 - Proposed New Course: EDA 6200 - Student Assessment

Dr. Bartz indicated to the members that he had consulted with Dr. Eberly regarding this course. After some discussion a few modifications were suggested for the course outline.

M. Dudzinski relayed to the COECC the Special Education Department's position on the proposed new course, EDA 6200. A motion was passed by the Department of Special Education's Curriculum Committee - "that this course be interdisciplinary and a course that is, at a minimum, cross-listed so that each department may teach the course as needed."

B. Findley called for the question. It was moved that EDA 6200 - Student Assessment be accepted as proposed with some minor modifications. The motion was carried with one abstention.

Item 93-2 - Secondary Certification Sequence - Professional Education Courses

Dr. Butt - Chair, Secondary Education & Foundations Department, addressed the Committee. He indicated that the Department believes that a course sequence is needed for the professional education courses. With 380 plus students in Secondary Education, cooperation with other programs will need to take place. Students will be assisted in planning their programs with effective advising. A checklist and handbook will also be developed for students.

In response to concerns of F. Summers, M. Butt indicated that the department would have enough sections available to satisfy the demand for the courses. This semester there are 14 sections of EDF 4450. ASEP students will not be affected and post baccalaureate students will be advised on an individual basis.

M. Dudzinski informed the members that the Special Education Department Curriculum Committee passed a motion as follows: "We do not believe a requirement of senior standing prior to taking EDF 4450 is in the best interest of any student. We believe all students need and deserve the flexibility of having three semesters in which the course may be completed."

D. Smith/F. Summers called for the question. It was moved that this proposed sequence of courses be approved. The motion was carried with one abstention.

Adjournment - The meeting adjourned at 10:50 a.m.
