## Cutoff date may not help curb fall enrollment

Eastern's enrollment next fall may reach 10,000 even with the institution of an application cutoff date.

No other Board of Governors university has found it necessary to implement a cutoff date.

Director of Admissions John Beacon said Tuesday Eastern's enrollment next fall will probably total about 10,000 students, although he stressed that it is

curate prediction.

Due to the economy and financial aid cuts, students are waiting until summer to make a commitment to a school, Beacon explained.

But based on past projections, he said he does not expect much difference between the fall 1981 enrollment, which was 10,016, and the fall 1982 enrollment.

A fall 1982 freshman class of about 2,000 should ensure a total enrollment

of about 10,000, he added.

Beacon explained that Eastern should not experience difficulties in receiving a freshman class of 2,000 since the admissions office received 5,056 applications for fall 1982 before the Feb. 3 cutoff date was instituted.

This is the second year in a row Eastern has had to institute a cutoff on freshman applications and Beacon said last year's cutoff may have convinced students to apply earlier this year.

The cutoff date was instituted in an attempt to bring Eastern's enrollment down to 9,400 students.

The Board of Governors requested two years ago that Eastern decrease its enrollment to 9,400 students in an attempt to bring the number of students in line with the amount of funding Eastern receives.

Although a number of state schools instituted application cutoffs last year, none of the four other BOG schools have done so this year.

Ed Wynn, admissions counselor at Western Illinois University, said the school has received more fall applications than ever before, but a cutoff date is not needed since the school has the facilities to handle more students than are currently enrolled.

He explained that Western can house more students than any other state school except the University of Illinois.

Wynn said 7,800 students can be housed on Western's campus.

"I would estimate that our enrollment could go as high as 13,000 or 14,000 and we could still keep the average class size at 25," he said.

Western will continue to accept fall applications "just so long as you can meet whatever dates you have to meet" in August before school begins, Wynn added.

He said it would be "impossible to tell right now" how many students will be enrolled next fall, since Western charges no application fee and many more students apply than actually commit themselves to attending the university.

Western's most recent report, dated Feb. 17, stated that a total of 6,740 fall

## 'Human capital' important in education—Stevenson

Although monetary capital is important when dealing with higher education, Democratic gubernatorial candidate Adlai Stevenson III said "human capital" also needs to be taken into consideration.

Stevenson, who was in Charleston Tuesday as part of his central Illinois campaign swing, attended a dinner and reception given by Coles County Democratic Committee Chairman Joe Connelly at the Connelly home.

Stevenson recently won the Democratic nomination for Illinois governor in the March 16 primary. His

running mate is Grace Mary Stern of Lake County.

Funding for higher education will be a high priority in his administration, Stevenson said, and added that Gov. Jim Thompson's proposed liquor tax increase which would allocate funds for education is "vague."

Stevenson also said he will not support Gov. Jim Thompson's tax increases because he is not convinced that tax increases are necessary.

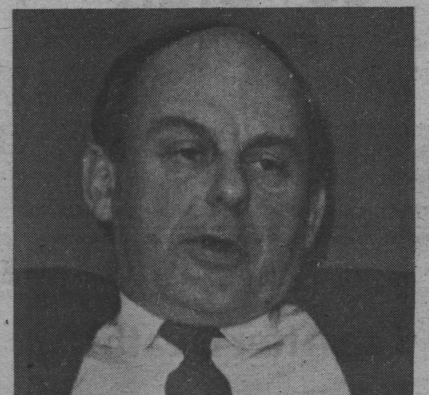
"Priorities have to be changed. Taxes should be collected that are owed before new increases are made," he said.

Besides trying to attain more money for higher education, a look must also be taken at the "human capital" of higher education, he said.

Curriculums need to be reviewed, Stevenson said perhaps there should be less physical education classes or health classes and in their place history courses and foreign languages.

Rather than a liquor tax proposal, Stevenson suggests funding education with monies used for penitentiaries.

Money should be kept out of penitentiaries, he said. Renovating penitentiaries and then closing them down is a system without planning.

## Counseling center offers help to victims of anorexia

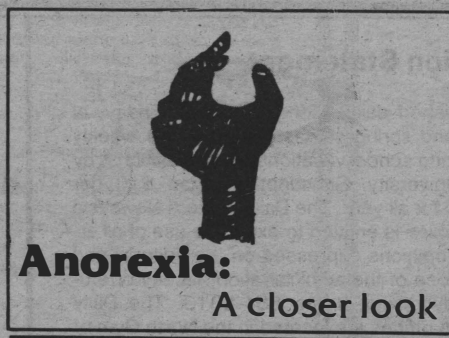
*Editor's note—this article is the first in a series dealing with eating disorders and the effects on both the victims and their friends and families.*

She is beautiful, witty, intelligent and agreeable. She is an achiever, pursuing a career to lead her to the top of her field.

But, she is starving to death. She has anorexia nervosa.

Genie Lenihan of the Counseling Center said recently that in relation to national statistics, there could be 100 to 300 women at Eastern with anorexia or a related eating disorder, such as bulimia.



The figure is a "conservative estimate," Lenihan added.

Although, 90 to 95 percent of the reported cases of eating disorders are

women, Lenihan said two young men with eating disorders came in for assistance a few years ago.

To help Eastern students combat the problem, the Counseling Center has developed group counseling sessions, which deal with victims confidentially, Lenihan said.

Anorexia nervosa is an eating disorder in which a person, usually a young woman, starves herself in an effort to achieve the "ideal body," Lenihan said.

As a result, the anorectic may psychologically deteriorate as the condition worsens.

An anorectic has no connection with

reality and will look in the mirror and see protrusions of fat which are actually bones, Lenihan added.

In some cases, the disease can lead to death.

Lenihan said about 10 to 15 percent of anorectics will die as a result. One Eastern student died four years ago from anorexia.

Lenihan said a possible cause or reason for the worsening problem is that there are conflicting social pressures expressed today that emphasize dieting and condone overeating.

## Associated Press News Round-up

### Flooded river claims life

PEORIA, Ill.—The Illinois River apparently has claimed its first life since rising above flood stage more than 12 days ago.

Tazewell County authorities and Illinois Department of Conservation police pulled the body of James Brown, 18, of North Pekin, from the raging river Monday. They continued their search today for the body of Brown's companion, Adolf Walters, 17, of Creve Coeur.

Meanwhile, the Army Corps of engineers and the National Weather Service had good news on two fronts for area residents. The corps said the Illinois River apparently crested Monday at 27.1 feet—flood stage is 18—and the Weather Service reported it has taken rain out of the forecast.

### Inflation held to 3 percent

WASHINGTON—Tumbling gasoline prices and the recession held inflation to a 3 percent annual rate in February, and economists said retail prices would continue their slow rise for several more months.

Prices for new cars and heating fuels also declined in February to offset substantial increases for some food products and limit inflation at the consumer level to the smallest advance since July 1980, the Labor Department reported Tuesday.

### Wage proposal dropped

WASHINGTON—President Reagan unveiled a package of tax breaks and eased government regulations Tuesday to lure new businesses and jobs to blighted inner city areas "left out of America's economic mainstream."

Notably missing from the proposed legislation was an idea strongly favored by business to waive the \$3.35 an hour federal minimum wage for young people employed in depressed areas.

### Astronauts find problems

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla.—Astronauts Jack R. Lousma and C. Gordon Fullerton discovered tile damage on the nose of space shuttle Columbia Tuesday, then used a remote "elbow" to assess the consequences.

Mission Control expressed little concern, and the astronauts spent much of the day wrestling with a more frustrating problem—a erratic video system that prevented more ambitious use of the ship's robot arm.

# Rabbi's defection ties vote of no-confidence for Begin

JERUSALEM (AP)—A right-wing rabbi defected to the opposition Tuesday and handed Prime Minister Menachem Begin's coalition government a tie vote on a parliamentary motion of no-confidence—a result Begin had said would force his resignation.

The vote in Parliament was mainly over the government's crackdown on Palestinian unrest in the occupied territories. The unrest, which has left two Arabs dead and more than a dozen wounded, continued for the fifth day Tuesday with Israeli troops firing teargas and bullets in the air.

Immediately after the 58-58 vote was announced by Parliament Speaker Menachem Savidor, Begin asked for the meeting to be closed. "I have to consult with my colleagues in the government," he said.

The 68-year-old Begin, speaking from his seat rather than the podium because of a hip injury,

looked subdued but smiled occasionally in the hubbub that broke out when the vote was announced.

Begin lost his majority because Rabbi Haim Druckman, a member of one of the coalition parties, rebelled over Begin's insistence on going through with Israel's withdrawal from Sinai next month.

Until the last moment it was not known how the bearded right-winger would vote. But when Savidor asked who supported the no-confidence motion, he raised his hand along with the Labor Party, the communists, the tiny Shinui Change party, the right-wing Tehiya faction and the right-of-center TELEM party.

Druckman belongs to the National Religious Party, which is a member of Begin's coalition. But Druckman quit the coalition a few weeks ago.

## Rebels replace regime in coup

GUATEMALA CITY (AP)—Junior army officers overthrew Gen. Fernando Romeo Lucas Garcia's right-wing government Tuesday and replaced it with a junta headed by a retired general who failed in a bid for the presidency eight years ago.

Named as junta leader was retired Gen. Efraim Rios Montt, who ran unsuccessfully for president in 1974 as the candidate of the center-right Christian Democrats.

Rios Montt told reporters at the presidential palace that President Lucas Garcia had been taken to the international airport for a flight out of the country.

He said he would dissolve Congress and rule by decree along with two other junta members, Gen. Horacio Maldonado Shad and Col. Francisco Gordillo.

Rebel troops had surrounded the presidential palace with tanks and troops in a swift move that encountered no determined resistance from forces loyal to Lucas Garcia.

In broadcasts over national radio and television, the coup leaders said the March 7 election

won by another conservative general, Angel Anibal Guervara, was fraudulent, and they promised to restore "peace and authentic democracy to Guatemala."

Guevara did not receive the required majority in the national balloting, but got more votes than any of the three civilian candidates and Congress elected him president at a March 14 session. He had been scheduled to replace Lucas Garcia on July 1 and begin a four-year term.

Creation of the junta was announced on radio and television by Col. Jaime Rabanales, the army's public relations chief. He said the junta would have five members and did not name Maldonado Shad or Gordillo as members.

There was no immediate explanation for the different reports by Rabanales and Rios Montt.

Downtown Guatemala City was cordoned off by troops and no bloodshed was reported, but there were reports of shooting near the military garrison in Quetzaltenango 120 miles west of the capital.

A power failure blacked out the capital, but the reason for it was not known.

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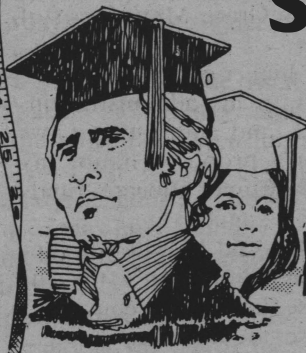

# Election petitions available

Petitions will be available Friday for students planning to run for student government offices in the April 21 election.

Petitions can be picked up at 8 a.m. in the Student Activities Office in the Union.

Five executive officer positions and 15 full-year Student Senate seats will be open. Also, two half-year senate seats will be open.

Executive officer positions include student body president, executive vice president, financial vice president, Board of Governors representative and administrative assistant for collective bargaining.

Petitions for executive officers require 100

signatures while petitions for senators require 25 signatures from the district the student is running in such as campus, at-large or off-campus, Elections Committee Chairman R.W. Monroe said.

Candidates will also receive an election packet containing the student government bylaws, constitution, financial statement and a grade release form.

Monroe said petitions must be turned in to the student activities office by 5 p.m. April 8.

A mandatory meeting for candidates is scheduled for 5 p.m. April 8 in the student activities office to determine candidate ballot position.

## Discussion of Faculty Senate fate is postponed until next meeting

Faculty Senate members Tuesday agreed to table until its next meeting a motion to abolish the senate.

Senator Fred Preston proposed abolishing the senate after reading five recent developments he said have taken away from the stature and effectiveness of the senate.

"It seems clear that many hours of faculty time are devoted to an empty enterprise; therefore, I move that the Faculty Senate abolish and dissolve itself," Preston said.

Preston's reasons for abolishing the senate include senate concern over the lack of faculty involvement and interest in the senate's proceedings and the senate's recent open declaration of its powerlessness.

Other rationale Preston cited for his motion is the senate's thinking "itself ineffective in dealing with

some administration" and the senate's "lost stature as parent committee for the major university committees."

Preston added that the American Federation of Teachers Union has taken responsibility for many of the previous functions of the senate.

Preston's motion climaxes a lengthy self-examination in which senate members have called the senate "toothless" and "impotent" and without recourse in dealing with university deans.

At the March 16 meeting, Senator Jerry Rooke brought out the fact that under the senate's revised constitution the senate no longer is the parent body of any elective faculty council.

Vice Chairman Scott Smith said at Tuesday's meeting the Board of Governors "removed the statement of parentage" when it approved the senate's constitution last year.

## Married students to express views on housing quality

Residents of Eastern's married student housing will have the opportunity to express their opinions this month concerning the apartments' quality through a Housing Office survey.

Mark Shaklee, director of married student housing, said the survey, which is similar to those conducted in the residence halls every semester, is being distributed for the first time to those living in the University Apartments.

The surveys ask residents for their impressions of the apartments and for improvement suggestions.

Of 154 apartments, the Married Student Housing Association received only 52 surveys.

Shaklee said the current survey is more likely to have a better return

because more questions are included.

"From all of the questions (on the survey), there is probably something they (University Apartment residents) want to express their opinion about," Shaklee said.

Apartment residents Tim Longfellow and Jan Easter, along with Shaklee, formulated the survey questions, using the residence hall surveys as a guide, he added.

Items on the survey include questions about the possible addition of cable converters, competence of maintenance personnel, study environment, security, formation of a welcoming committee and the addition of more services, which could possibly require a rent increase.

Survey results should be compiled by

the end of the semester, Shaklee said. Deadline for surveys to be returned to the Housing Office is Wednesday.

Shaklee said any action taken on the results will depend on residents' preferences.

## Senate to redefine position

He said representatives from schools throughout the state will be attending the conference, including four-year colleges and junior colleges.

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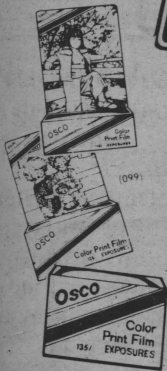

Magazines exemplify the double message conveyed so often through the media, she said.

"Ten years ago, if a psychologist saw one patient with an eating disorder in his lifetime (of practice) that was typical," Lenihan said.

"There has been an alarming increase in the last five years," Lenihan added.

"In terms of psychological illness, the eating disorders are at the top of the list," she said.

Although it is impossible to generalize for every situation, most women with eating disorders are success-oriented, display the qualities of a perfectionist and have some family difficulties.

She cited the best way to beat a eating disorder is with the help of others.

Clark's performance is being sponsored by Union programming.

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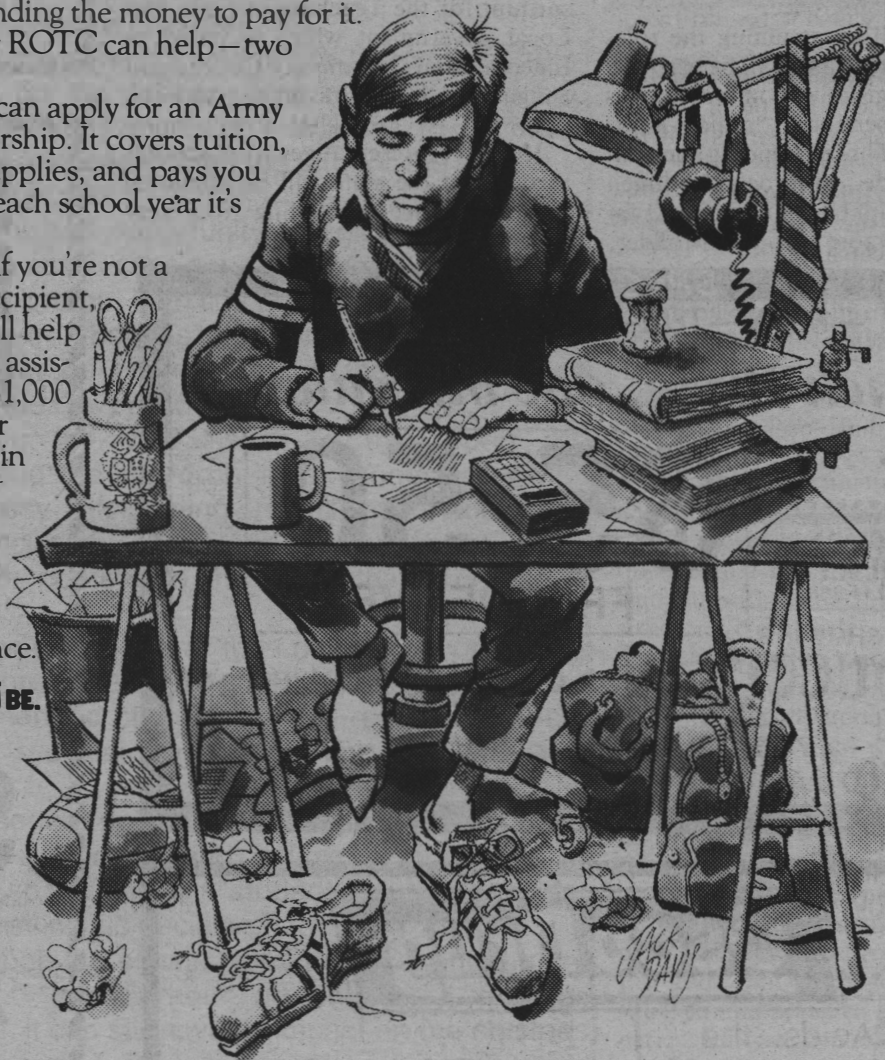

Registrar Dick Rainsberger, Governors State University, also said an application cutoff will not be instituted there.

He said he expected next fall's enrollment to be "maybe a shade higher" than last fall's enrollment of 5,017.

Rainsberger said a cutoff is not necessary since the school has never reached its total capacity.

"We get a lot of our applications very late, often from people who don't get into other schools," Rainsberger said.

He added that "only a handful" of fall applications have been received so far, since usually 75 percent of applica-

tions at Governors State are received in July and August.

Director of Admissions at Chicago State University Bill Holloway said the number of fall applications received so far is running ahead of last year. However, most applications will not be received until summer, since fall applications for commuter schools such as Chicago State are usually received later.

19 sports program budgets will be increased about \$26,000 to account for next year's proposed budget reduction.

Administration expenses, which will be cut next year, include such items as guarantees, administrative travel, office supplies and capital improvements.

The amount of a guarantee is based on the distance a team must travel. Since Johnson has scheduled geographically closer football and basketball opponents for next year, guarantees will total \$35,000 as compared to \$48,450 this year.

Capital improvement equipment such as a softball backstop and wrestling mat were purchased this year and

composed most of the \$21,300 capital improvement budget. But next year, similar items will not be purchased and the capital improvement budget has been decreased to \$8,800.

But the 19 sports programs will receive about a \$26,000 increase with the nine women programs budgeted a 10.1 percent increase while the 10 men sports were given a 5.2 percent increase.

The IAB briefly discussed the budget and called a special meeting April 6 to further discuss and approve the budget. It then will be given to Eastern President Daniel E. Marvin for approval.

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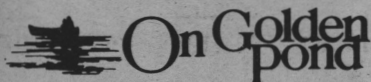

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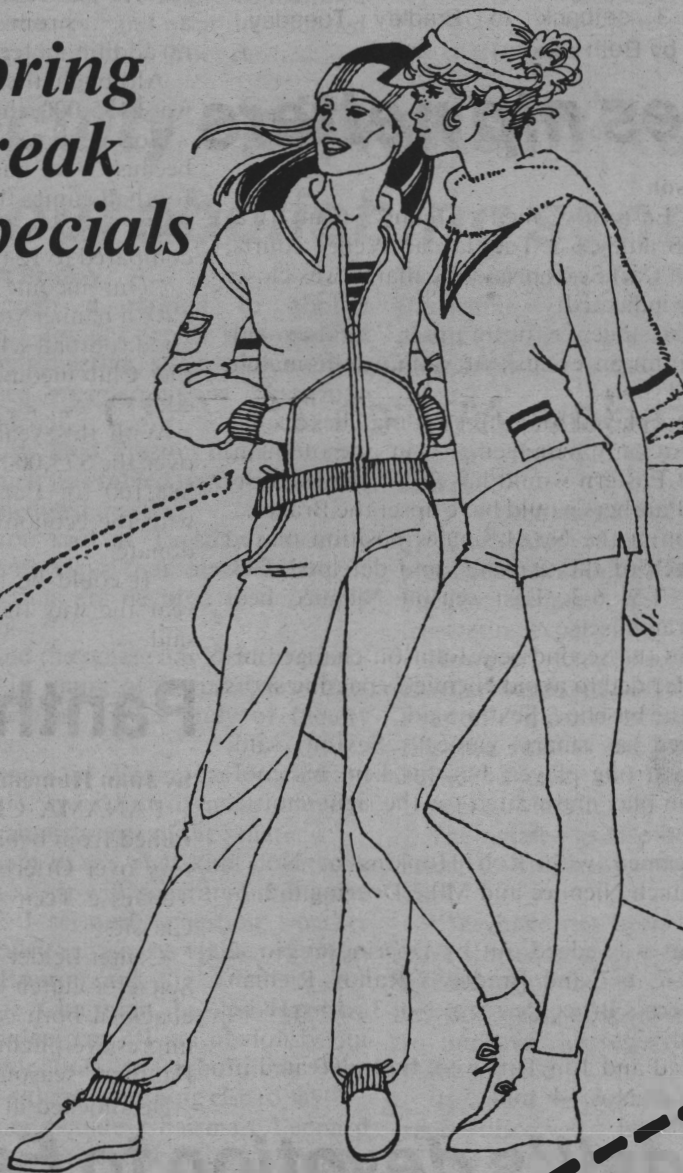

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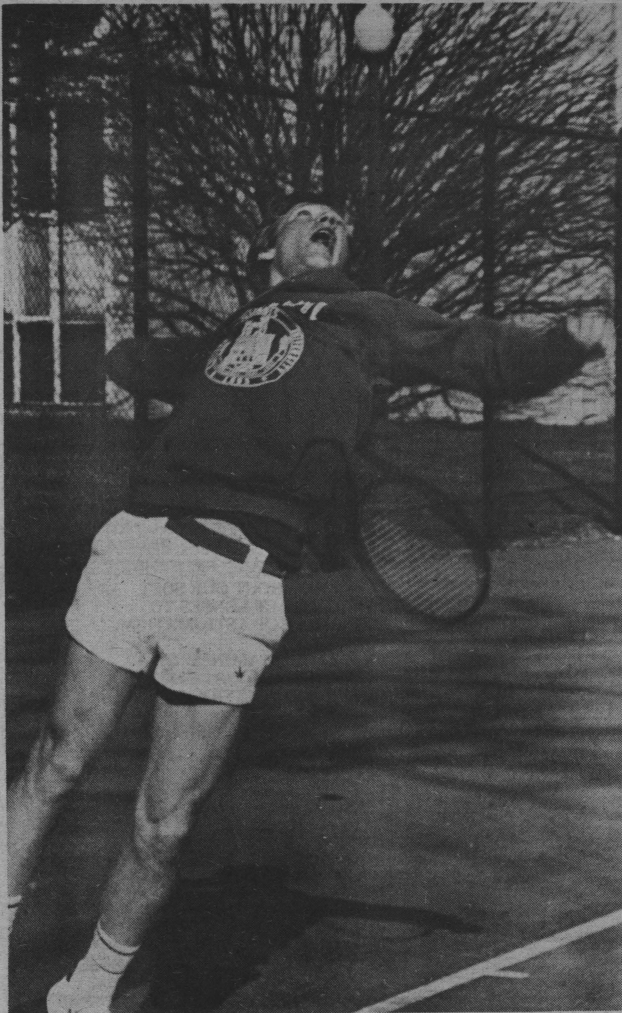

## Braves nip netters

Although Eastern's men's tennis team was defeated by Bradley 6-3 Tuesday at Weller courts, Panther coach Carl Sexton said the match was closer than the score indicated.

"We had the stage set for an upset," Sexton said. "We were within an eyelash of winning the match, but we just fell short."

The Panthers played four three-set matches against the Braves, but only managed to win one of them. Sexton said if Eastern would have won the three set matches, the Panthers would have upset the Braves.

Jay Johnson at the No. 1 singles position played his "best match of the season," and defeated Jack Niemiec 4-6, 7-5, 6-3. Last season Niemiec beat Johnson in straight sets.

Down 4-1 in the second set, Johnson changed his strategy and decided to avoid Niemiec's passing shots by staying at the baseline, Sexton said.

"Jay played a smart game," Sexton said. "Niemiec is a strong player, but Jay kept his cool, kept the ball in play and waited for the right shots," Sexton said.

Johnson teamed with Rob Hopkins at No. 1 doubles to crunch Niemiec and Mike Doering 6-2, 6-2.

But Hopkins was edged out by Doering at No. 2 singles 6-4, 5-7, 6-7 and Bradley's Randy Rieman snuck by Eastern's Bruce Perrin at No. 3 with a score of 2-6, 6-3, 6-4.

Scott Fjelstad and Jon Tuft were both defeated in straight sets at Nos. 4 and 5.

## Athletic budget decreased

Eastern Athletic Director R.C. Johnson submitted a \$641,850 proposed athletic operational budget for next year to the Intercollegiate Athletic Board Tuesday—\$1,100 less than this year's budget.

The reason for the decreased proposed budget is the lack of a fixed income increase and Johnson's fear of the economy.

"I'm scared to death about the future of our athletic program because of the state of the economy. We don't have any more money coming in from the students, gate receipts were down this year and we don't really know how much money the Panther Club will bring in next year," Johnson said.

Student fees, gate receipts and Panther Club funds are the three main sources of income fueling the athletic department's budget.

Student fees have been budgeted for \$331,000 next year, approximately \$5,000 less than the current student fee budget. Johnson said the decreased budget is proposed because the student fee towards athletics will not increase and enrollment is expected to decline.

Last year, students approved a \$9 per-semester (\$17.55 per-semester total) athletic fee increase, with a promise from Johnson that there would be no additional fee increases for the next four years.

Although the proposed budget for gate receipts was \$135,000, this year's total was only \$90,114.

For next year, Johnson has budgeted \$120,000 because "we had bad weather at some of our key football games this year which destroyed attendance. Plus, we've scheduled 16 home basketball games compared to 12 this year," he said.

"Our income figures are realistic. I think we'll have a banner year in gate receipts because we have a good football schedule. But I'm skeptical about Panther Club income because of the economy," he added.

With this year's Panther Club currently \$27,192 over the \$75,000 budget, Johnson has budgeted just \$88,100 for Panther Club income because he said with the economy, people may be more hesitant to donate.

"It could be hard to find people to donate next year the way the economy is right now," Johnson said.

## Panthers rally late to post victories

PANAMA CITY, Fla.—Eastern's baseball team rallied from behind twice Tuesday to post an 8-5 victory over Otterbein College and a 2-1 decision over Tennessee Tech in eight innings at the Gulf Coast Classic.

Center fielder Matt Cimo and third basemen Kevin Seitzer's clutch hitting sparked the Panthers' comeback in both contests and freshman Mick Freed's impressive pitching against Tennessee Tech lifted the Panthers' season record to 5-0.

But if the club does attain more funds than the budgeted \$88,100, Johnson said the surplus will cover any other debts incurred over the year, similar to the club's extra monies covering the unexpected gate receipt decline this year.
