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No bats in belfry—but mice frolic about halls

The residence halls on campus may not have "bats in their belfries," but some of the halls have a different problem: mice.

The mice, which have been a problem in Andrews and Taylor halls especially, are described by those who have seen them as small and brownish-grey.

Barbara Busch, Andrews Hall counselor, said she first received complaints about the rodents "around Homecoming weekend."

Busch said traps were given to the girls who had the mice in their rooms, and "so far, I haven't heard of any more mice."

Jennifer Perry, eighth floor Andrews resident assistant, said that floor had "about six mice, and most of

them were in the quad."

"We set out traps, and I think that took care of it," Perry said. The traps are a lot cleaner than sprays, Perry explained, because if a mouse is killed by spraying, it is hard to find to dispose of.

"The mice are attracted by scraps of food," Perry said. She said she thought the mice came up the walls of the dorm, and through small holes in the rooms.

Pam Foli, a resident of eighth floor Andrews, said she and her roommates killed five or six mice in their room.

"I guess we had smart mice," Foli said, "because we put out traps with cheese and the mice would take the cheese, but leave the trap."

Foli said she and her roommates finally caught the mice by their tails,

put them into a bucket, and threw them out the window.

Another eighth floor resident, Kathy Kimball, said her roommate found a mouse on her pillow one night. They put out a trap and the mouse never returned.

Bob Zinn, Taylor Hall counselor, said mice were a problem on the lower floors of that dorm, but "the mouse traps have been very successful."

"There were about ten mice that I know of 'on the lower floors,'" Zinn said, "but I have had no complaints recently."

Zinn said the mice come in to the hall during the cold months and live in the heating vents.

Louis Hencken, director of student housing, said the problem of mice is not a major one.

"If the mice are just in a few rooms, I'm sure it's a problem to the residents, but it's not a major crisis," Hencken said. "I'm sure it probably happens just about every winter, but I never hear about it."

Hencken explained that every summer all campus buildings are sprayed for roaches, but there is no repellent used for mice.

In some of the other dorms on campus, mice have not been found.

Nancy Cobetto, Pemberton counselor, said there are no mice that she knows of.

Randy Brackensick and Nancy Nyland, two counselors in the Gregg Triad, said that they have not seen or heard about any mice.

Other hall counselors could not be reached for comment.

Private homes exempt from smoke alarms?

Three city administrators said a proposed ordinance requiring the installation of smoke detectors in most homes in Charleston will probably be amended to include only homes and apartments which are rented.

Olga Durham, public health and safety commissioner, said the ordinance, which was put on public file at the Oct. 25 city council meeting, will probably be voted on in about three weeks.

Terry Sharp, city buildings codes and zoning inspector, said the ordinance would probably be amended to eliminate the problem of enforcement.

Sharp said enforcing the ordinance in private homes would be difficult because it would mean that building inspectors would have to go through each individual family's house.

Sharp said tenants would probably have to call the City Buildings' Code

office if smoke detectors are not installed by landlords.

The city has police powers to enforce the ordinance if landlords do not comply, Sharp said.

"If tenants do not call up there is probably no way to find out if the ordinance is being obeyed," Sharp said, because it is not known how many houses and apartments in Charleston are being rented.

Sharp said he felt most tenants would call in.

Clancy Pfeiffer, accounts and finance commissioner, said the city council would probably also include a strong recommendation encouraging home owners to buy smoke detectors.

Melvin Taylor, city fire chief, said private home owners could buy a good smoke detector for \$15 to \$20.

The City Council hopes to have the ordinance implemented by Christmas, Durham said.

Dixon to speak on campus

Secretary of State Alan J. Dixon, Democratic candidate for the U.S. Senate, will be campaigning Nov. 7 at Eastern.

Dixon is coming at the invitation of Joe Connelly, Coles County democratic chairman and political science instructor at Eastern.

Along with Dixon, State Treasurer Jerry Cosentino and State Comptroller Roland Burriss will be on hand to speak at a Democratic fund-raising dinner on campus.

The dinner will be at 6:30 p.m. in the Union addition Grand Ballroom.

Tickets for the dinner are available to the public for a \$10 donation.

Also present will be state Sen. Terry

Bruce, state Rep. Larry Stuffle and Maurice Arbuckle, candidate for a 53rd district state representative seat.

Dixon will spend the entire day campaigning, starting by speaking to a class at 9 a.m. on campus.

He will then go the Lake Land College in Mattoon, tour drivers license facilities in Mattoon and Charleston and be the featured guest at a Democratic fund-raising cocktail party from 4-6 p.m. that afternoon in Charleston.

Dixon, the biggest Democratic vote-getter in the history of the state, will speak about "issues that concern students, and the use of coal for energy," Bill Houlihan, student body president, said Tuesday.

Marines repel leftist attack on embassy

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador—About 300 militant leftists attacked the U.S. Embassy Tuesday, firing guns and screaming "We will take the embassy!" authorities reported.

They said U.S. Marine guards and Salvadoran troops used tear gas to repel the invaders who climbed the embassy fence but were driven back before they could force their way into

the building. Two Marines were reported to have been slightly wounded.

"They surrounded the embassy building for a few minutes and they may have hurled a Molotov Cocktail on the western side of the building," said embassy spokesman Vitas Dambava.

In Washington, State Department officials said one Marine guard was

wounded slightly when a bullet grazed his ear. They said the Marine probably was saved by his helmet. No details were given about the second injured Marine, but officials said his wound was not serious.

The 45-minute attack occurred at midday, the Washington officials said, and Salvadoran soldiers responded quickly to help the Americans and fired on the attackers.

Byrne hops on Kennedy wagon

CHICAGO — Mayor Jane Byrne hailed Sen. Edward M. Kennedy as "the bright star of the Democratic Party" and formally endorsed him Tuesday for the party's presidential nomination.

The announcement came three days after Mrs. Byrne first said she would back Kennedy, D-Mass., and 15 days after President Carter spoke at a dinner to raise funds for her.

On Tuesday, before formally endorsing Kennedy at a news conference, she reached Carter by telephone, told him of her decision, and

apologized that he had not learned of it from her.

Ticking off problems such as inflation and soaring interest rates, Mrs. Byrne contended that the public "has lost confidence with the job done by the Carter Administration."

Carter had one request, she said, "that we would not hurt him with his fund raising." She said she would honor that wish.

At a meeting of the Union Board Clark said the union shows a loss of \$1,550 during the first quarter of fiscal year 1980, which began July 1. During the first quarter of FY79 the union showed a loss of \$13,000.

"This is an abnormal time. The bookstore earns more (because of student purchases of school supplies) and the recreation areas earn less because of decreases in attendance over the summer," Clark said.

Clark added that another reason for decrease in losses is the increase in student fees which are applied to the union operation.

Clark also said Douglas Osterheld, the consultant hired last spring to improve the union operation, will return to Eastern on Nov. 13-14 to further consider the union's condition.

News editor gives short(age) explanation

I'll make this short as possible to conserve space and paper. Both are major concerns of the Eastern News staff these days because a paper shortage has reduced the amount of available space in the Eastern News.

I feel that you, the readers, deserve an explanation of where the News stands and how it will be affected by the shortage.

First of all, the newsprint shortage is not limited to the Eastern News and was not caused by some bungling of a purchase order.

I worked last summer at the Decatur Herald. It and its sister publication, the Decatur Review, had a promotion in which the papers reprinted pages from old Decatur papers.

But the old pages were not reprinted many days because of the newsprint shortage. The two papers had to cut back, and the reprint pages were among the first to go.

Now the News faces a similar dilemma. Our supply of newsprint for eight page papers will run out within one week. If we don't buy or borrow newsprint before that, we won't be able to print the newspaper—it's simple as that.

We had to make decisions concerning how to best stretch our paper supply while keeping your interests in mind.

No way was I going to cut back the News to a three-, two-, or one-issue per week paper, as some people suggested. We and our predecessors have worked too hard to make this paper one of

only two or three dailies across the nation for schools in our size. I feel we would not be serving the best interests of the readers by depriving them of timely news events.

Our only other choice was to reduce to eight the number of pages in each paper which created other dilemmas: What should and should not be printed in the News?

My decision is to cut temporarily the entertainment page because it takes second place to stories which inform the reading public.

In addition ads, separated by border tape, will be placed on the editorial page to increase the news hole.

But that does not solve the problem. We have numerous dedicated photographers and reporters who continue to produce material for publication. Some of that material was not published when our news hole was double of what currently it is. Now, it

will be even tougher to pick the material which will be published.

This may be difficult for some persons and groups to accept, but our space limitations mean that some worthy stories about local events will not be published so that we can print stories which concern a greater number of readers.

Again, we are not doing this to make money or screw anyone. These measures result from a supply shortage much like gasoline rationing could follow a gasoline shortage.

Hopefully, the situation will improve shortly after Thanksgiving but I don't know. Anyway, even through his newsprint shortage, the News will try to keep the standards which make it an All American newspaper.

That's the long and short of it.

Cobb still climbing to more rushing records

Eastern's football team may be faltering lately, but Panther running back Poke Cobb has continued his relentless drive to the top of the national collegiate rushing record book.

By gaining 113 yards versus Northern Iowa last week, Cobb tied Michigan Tech's Jim Van Wagner for the

NCAA Division II mark of 25 games over 100 yards rushing and is just 188 yards shy of shattering the Division II all-time career rushing mark of 3,433 yards set by Panhandle State's Jerry Linton in 1959-62.

However, while breaking such marks are obviously an outstanding accomplishment, Cobb holds them in a secondary light.

"If we can get back into the playoffs and defend our national championship, I really wouldn't care (about the

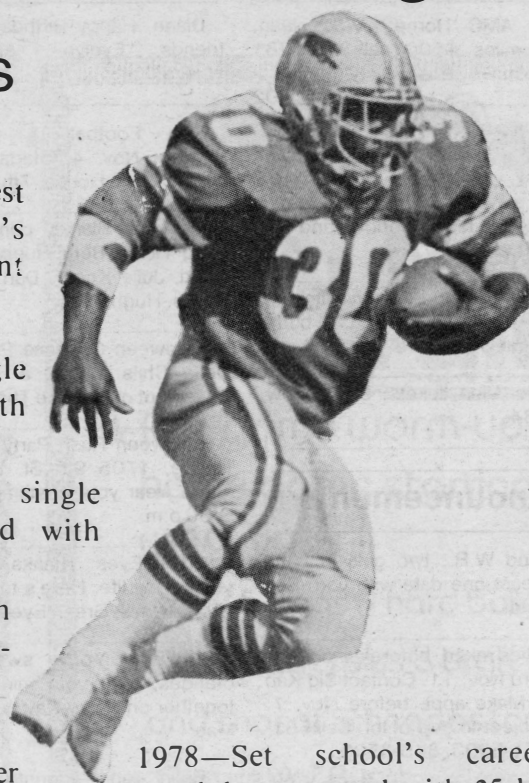

records)" Cobb said, adding that the "recognition I've gotten Eastern," is also equally important to breaking their records.

Nevertheless, Cobb indicated the significance of breaking the marks when speaking of how it has affected the attitude of his teammates on the offensive line.

"They know that if I break the record it's because they were block-

ing," Cobb said. "The offensive linemen want to get the record just as much as I do. It means a lot."

Panther head coach Darrell Mudra holds a similar view, saying that if Cobb needs extra playing time to break the records, he will give it to him.

"He always likes to play as much as he can, so I think that if they are important to him, they're important to us," Mudra said.

Mudra also said that he and the other offensive coaches assumed in the preseason that "if he stayed healthy, he'd get them (the records), although they are not as important as the hard work he has put in to develop his talent.

This hard work has apparently payed off, because Mudra said he believes Cobb is "the best running back I've ever coached."

Booters confident for last regular season game

Eastern's soccer Panthers will take on what coach Schellas Hyndman termed "not really that good of a team" as they travel to Blackburn for a 2 p.m. match Wednesday.

Looking ahead to the last regular season game, Hyndman viewed the final Panther pairing as an almost sure

win.

"Blackburn has a problem with recruiting players, because they have to compete with other St. Louis teams, and they're not able to get the better players," Hyndman said.

"I expect them to be playing a defensive game against us and we should win," the coach continued.

Taking the opposite approach, the Panthers have an offensive game planned. "We'll be playing with four forwards and two midfielders, so we can get some good shots off and get away from these tie games."

Coming off three consecutive tie games against three nationally-ranked teams, the booters were disappointed

Five hundred general admission tickets for Eastern's Nov. 10 football game at Illinois State are on sale for \$4 at the University Union and Lantz Building, Associate Athletic Director Ron Paap said.

Also available are 100 youth tickets, which sell for \$2.50 for high school and grade school students.

already sold out of reserved seats, Associate Athletic Director Ron Paap said, so east side bleachers will be used for general admission seating.

General admission tickets, \$5 for adults and \$1.50 for students, are on sale from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. in the University Union ticket office and Lantz Building, 9-12 a.m. Saturday morning in the Lantz Gym concourse and noon throughout the game at special gates on the east side of the field.

"We have approximately 2,500 bleacher seats available in the end zones and east side plus ample standing room in the end zones. We can accommodate everyone who wants to see the game," Paap said. "This will be general admission only."

The only entrance gates for these areas will be at the northeast corner of the bleachers plus the southeast corner by the scoreboard.

"There will be no ticket windows open on the west side - only a will call window," Paap said. Admittance to seating on the west side will be limited to fans who have purchased reserved seats, students with all-sports passes and spectators who previously purchased blue and green general admission tickets.

Students and general admission will be allowed to sit in the first 10 rows plus Sections A and G on the extreme north and south ends of the west side.
