IBHE official doubts '82-83 hikes for ISSC

An Illinois Board of Higher Education official said Tuesday it will be difficult for the Illinois State Scholarship Commission to receive a requested budget increase of \$19 million for next year.

IBHE Associate Director for Fiscal Affairs Paul Lingenfelter said the \$19 million request amounts to about a 20 percent increase in funding for the ISSC. Lingenfelter said he thought that was a large sum for the ISSC to hope to get approved.

He said the board had received the budget request from the ISSC, but that staff has not yet been selected within the IBHE to study the feasibility of obtaining the additional monies.

"Basically during the next several weeks and up to late December, the staff and the board (IBHE) will meet with the state scholarship commission to discuss scholarship requests," he said.

Lingenfelter said the staff will ask ISSC members technical questions such as the amount of students they hope to serve and how much of the student's expenses the additional monies requested for the 1982-83 school year will cover.

It was incorrectly reported in articles Wednesday's and Thursday's editions of The Daily Eastern News that the \$19 million being requested by the ISSC is for the 1981-82 school year. Eastern Associate Financial Aid Director John Flynn said Tuesday that the money is being requested for the 1982-83 school year.

The next step in the process of the ISSC's budget is for the staff to form a

recommendation to submit to the IBHE in January. The IBHE considers the staff's recommendation along with Gov. James R. Thompson's and the Bureau of the Budget's views on the money situation for the year before it makes a final decision.

After the IBHE has decided whether to seek additional monies for the ISSC, it will make a recommendation to the Illinois General Assembly, he said.

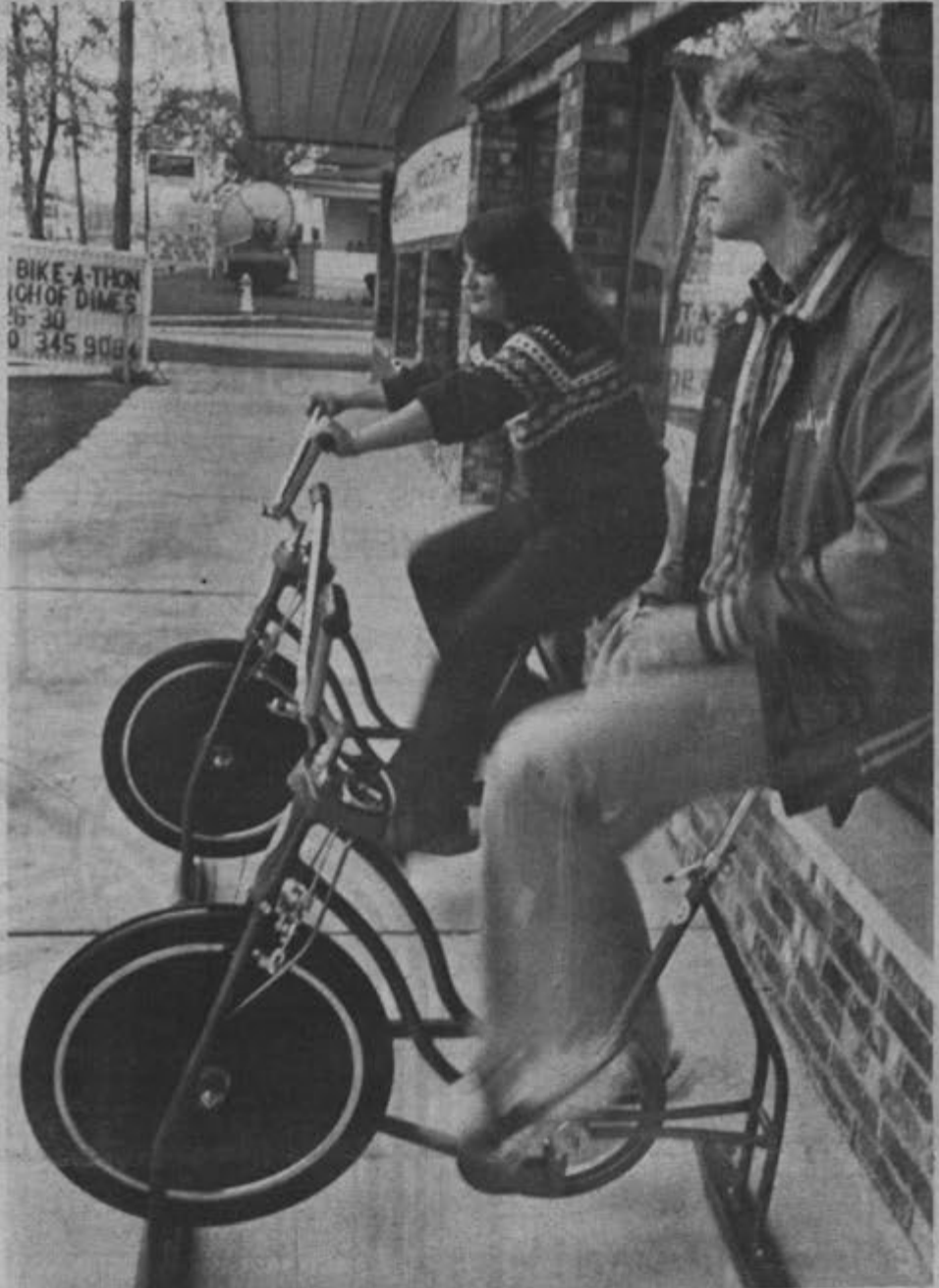
Lingenfelter said he did not know whether the ISSC's not asking for supplemental appropriations this year, as it has in the past, would make any difference on the outcome of the General Assembly's decision on the ISSC's budget.

Flynn said he does not think the ISSC's current \$91 million budget will be increased by \$19 million for next year. "The Bureau of the Budget already said no new dollars for next year."

Tom Mortenson, ISSC director of research and planning analysis, said earlier that without an extra \$19 million for next year, about 20,000 students would have to be cut from the program. He said 13,000 students who demonstrated financial need were cut from the program this year because adequate funds were not available.

Lingenfelter said that although he has not looked carefully at all the statistics available, he found it hard to believe that 20,000 awards would be cut without additional funding.

Flynn said that the ISSC was only given about a \$5 million budget increase for this year and "money was not as tight as it will be next year."

City Council votes against cable fees

The Charleston City Council in a special meeting Tuesday voted 3 to 1 against a proposed fee increase by Liberty Cable that would have included a plan to make the additional services of seven new channels mandatory for Charleston subscribers.

If the proposal had passed, subscribers would have received a basic fee increase, and in addition would have been charged for the seven new channels they automatically would have received.

The proposal would have raised the basic fee of \$7.50 for one TV to \$9.50, with a 50 cent increase for the present \$1.50 rate for each additional TV if the proposal was passed.

With the proposal defeated, the new services become optional, Brian Halsapple, the Charleston manager for Liberty Cable said. He added that because the service will be optional, the rates for the extra service would have to be higher because theft, vandalism, and blackmarket selling of the converters necessary for picking up the new channels will be more.

Liddy: Americans confused about reality

"I recommended that Anderson be killed," said convicted Watergate conspirator G. Gordon Liddy Tuesday.

The proposed assassination of columnist Jack Anderson was one of many controversial topics Liddy spoke to a packed crowd in the University Union addition Grand Ballroom.

Liddy, sponsored by the University Board, also discussed domestic and foreign policy. Fully one and a half hours of the lecture were devoted to discussing the role of the U.S. in the world.

"Americans are unable to comprehend reality," said Liddy. "We no longer have prisons, we have penitentiaries; we have no poor, we have underprivileged. You confuse what is reality with what should be reality."

Liddy spoke out against the all-volunteer army, Americans' unrealistic political views, but supported President Ronald Reagan's current policies.

Liddy compared the U.S. to "an old lady in a bad neighborhood at 2:30 in the morning."

The liberal policies of the Carter administration, and the American peoples unrealistic view of the world were to blame, he said.

As for President Ronald Reagan, Liddy had only praise, saying that the American people elected the solution to their problem, and must now support him.

"When you elect a president, you're not looking for a man with qualifications as a pastor," said Liddy. A realist is needed. "Ronald Reagan is a realist."

However, the issue of Watergate was not discussed until the question-and-

answer period.

"Were you connected with the Watergate break-in?" he was asked.

"I ran it," Liddy answered flatly. Explaining his conduct and that of his Watergate associates—specifically allegations that he engineered a plot to use a Cuban hit team to sabotage the Democratic convention headquarter's air-conditioning system, Liddy stated, "Miami was good old U.S. politics. That's the way things are done in this country."

During the course of the lecture, Liddy commented on other public figures—including Federal Judge John Sirica. "He can't help it—he was born stupid. He is also a hypocrite."

Liddy charged that Sirica did not interview jurors at Liddy's trial. Purportedly, he added, one of them couldn't even speak English.

Nevertheless, Liddy was convicted, and chiefly because of his refusal to incriminate superiors, was sentenced by Sirica to 21 and a half years in prison. He served seven.

While in the Danbury, Conn., penitentiary, Liddy said he and a select group of inmates engineered one of the first undercover spying networks in a U.S. prison. He broke into the warden's office, taking files and other pertinent information concerning the living conditions at the institution.

Israel opposed to U.S. sale of planes to Saudi Arabia

JERUSALEM—Israel remains opposed to U.S. sale of radar planes to Saudi Arabia, but had muted its criticism and taken steps to disclaim responsibility if the sale is blocked by the U.S. Congress.

With a slim majority apparently lined up against the deal, the Senate is to vote Wednesday on whether to approve the \$8.5 billion package, the largest arms deal in history.

Israelis believe the AWACS radar plans and offensive equipment for the F-15 fighter planes, though intended to defend the Persian Gulf, ultimately will be turned against Israel.

Panel of judges clears way for PATCO decertification

WASHINGTON—A three-judge panel cleared the way Tuesday for decertification of the Professional Air Traffic Controllers Organization as representative of federal air traffic controllers, Reagan administration sources said.

Details of the order by the U.S. Court of Appeals were not immediately available.

Solidarity goes ahead with nationwide strike plans

WARSAW, Poland—Solidarity defiantly went ahead with plans for a one-hour, nationwide strike Wednesday over food shortages and other problems.

The Polish Communist Party's Central Committee and the Soviet-led Warsaw Pact were reported preparing separate meetings.

Lech Walesa, leader of the independent labor movement, had been expected to hold talks with government officials Tuesday night, apparently in hopes of heading off the walkout. But union sources said he had not met any officials, and that the nationwide protest would go ahead as planned at noon.

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
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1981-82 campus phone books distributed this week

Fourteen thousand recently published 1981-82 campus telephone directories were distributed this week to students and faculty members, Harry Read, director of Eastern's office of information and publication, said Tuesday.

The directories include phone number listings of students and faculty and staff members, listings of community businesses and services, a directory of campus regulations and services, and a campus departmental directory.

Read said the Housing Office has distributed directories to residence halls, while directories for off-campus students and faculty were mailed Tuesday.

He added that students or anyone else who did not receive a directory should contact him.

"I assume we have everyone covered but there will be a way to get every student a directory. I haven't decided how to do this yet, because I didn't

think it would be a problem," he said.

Although many addresses and phone numbers may change next semester, Read said only one directory will be printed each school year.

"We really can't expect a new directory to be printed each semester so there is really no way to avoid the problem of listing changes," he added.

The directories were printed at no cost to the university because a local telephone company covered the cost, Read said.

Read said the Reuben H. Donnelley Company in Charleston compiled the directory in cooperation with Eastern's data processing department. The Illinois Consolidated Telephone Company paid for the directories, he said.

Eastern's data processing department compiled student and faculty names and phone numbers as soon as the names were available after registration and sent them to Donnelley and ICTC, he said.

"I'm not sure how long it took (data processing) to compile names and numbers, but I know they were on schedule and did it as quickly as possible," he said.

Read said Eastern has had an

agreement with the telephone company and Donnelley to print the directories for two years.

"In the past we worked with other companies and had problems with late delivery of the directories," he added.

Senate to vote on new policies

Several proposals regarding the academic dismissal policy, summer school admissions, a changed add-drop system and Student Senate bylaw changes about conference travel will be voted on Wednesday by the senate.

The Student Senate Academic Affairs committee has been working on two proposals which were both tabled at last week's meeting.

Committee members met recently with Eastern President Daniel E. Marvin and Samuel Taber, dean of Student Academic Services, regarding the proposed changes in the academic dismissal policy.

The other proposal to be presented

by the committee is a summer admissions policy for freshmen that would insure that students who enter Eastern during the summer would meet university requirements and standards for re-admission in the fall or spring.

In other business, Senator Marc Bruninga will present proposed bylaw changes regarding travel policies. The changes would require conference representatives to file a written report, including at least two new recommendations, within 15 days of the conference.

The senate will meet at 7 p.m. Wednesday in the University Union addition Arcola-Tuscola Room.

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Add-drop ideas need more input

Changes as important and wide-ranging as those for developing a new add-drop proposal need to be formulated by administrators and students and not just one person.

Dean of Student Academic Services Samuel Taber's plan for revamping Eastern's add-drop system represents a serious attempt to solve problems which arose within that system this fall. We believe, however, that such proposals should be based upon a broader consensus than Taber's recommendations alone.

Changes in the add-drop system began to be formulated shortly after the add-drop period this fall, during which business students bought and sold classes which were difficult to get into.

Taber's suggestions call for separation of the add-drop lines, a move which would have students making adds in the University Union Old Ballroom and drops in the Registration Office in McAfee gym.

Under the plan the drop cards would be processed at the end of each day and the closed courses would be posted the following day—to remain closed for the rest of the day.

Although Taber's plan will be implemented for

registration during spring 1982, Taber said the university would not be "eternally locked" into such plans.

As long as changes will be made in the spring registration, we believe the best plan should be implemented and not the one which has only Taber's input.

Taber's plan has met with disapproval from faculty and students who formed an ad hoc committee to study the problem.

Both Taber and the committee are dealing with a proposal which can have severe effects upon students.

However, the two are acting separately, rather than combining efforts to develop a system which would best benefit students.

Because of the nature of the add-drop system, it is imperative that student input be a big part of any decision made.

One person cannot have the answers to developing the best add-drop plan.

Administrators can offer their viewpoint because they have to work with the system, and students should offer their's because they're the ones who must go through it.

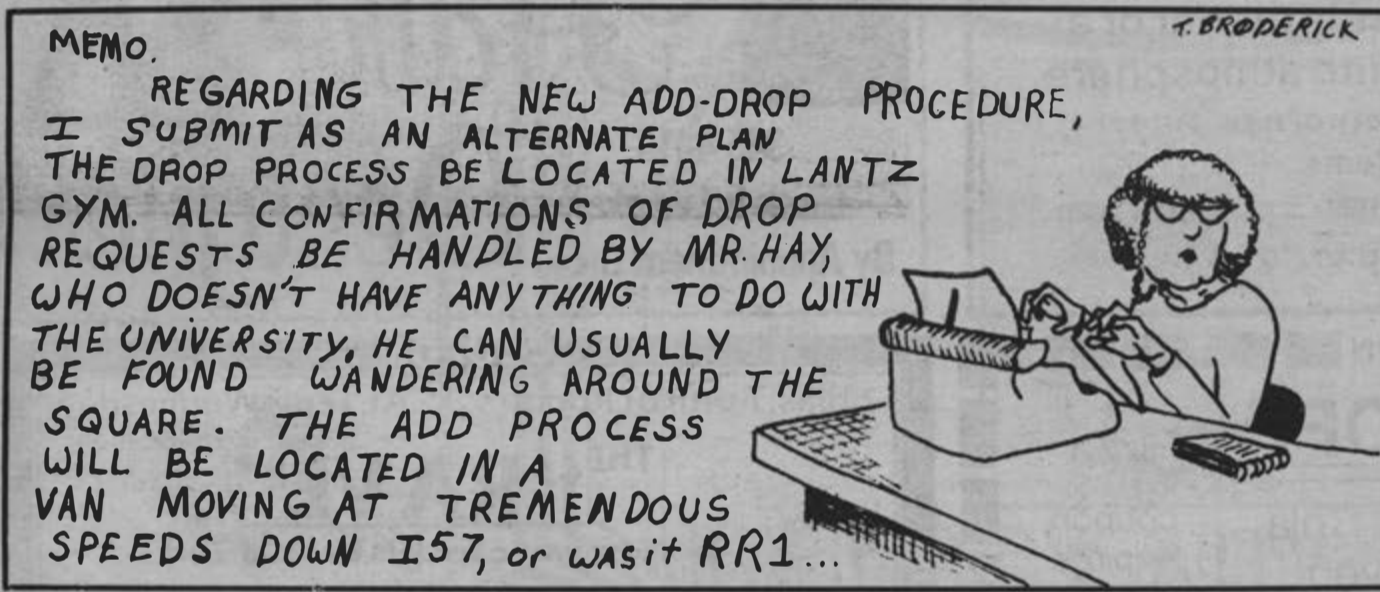
Correction

COTE asked to allow courses for teacher certification in BOG

Although no action was taken, members of the Council on Teacher Education were asked Tuesday to consider allowing teacher certification courses into the Board of Governors degree program.

Shirley Neal, Eastern representative for the BOG degree program, gave a slide presentation about the program at the request of COTE chairman Ronald Gholson.

Neal said currently the BOG program does not offer courses for students in the program wanting teacher certification.

"I feel so disappointed when an older person comes to me wanting to teach, and I have to say the BOG program won't help them one bit toward that dream," Neal said.

"We currently have 1,100 BOG students enrolled at Eastern," Neal said. "But we are going through a screening process to eliminate those students who are enrolled but aren't active in the program."

She said she realized that even though it might not be feasible to bring teacher certification into the BOG program because of the schedules of the students, allowing the courses into the program would at least help them toward teacher certification in the future.

"Bringing teacher certification courses into the program would give the students a head start. Then, after graduation they would have the option to continue school to receive certification."

Group aims at poll-day lobbying

About 300 signatures have been gathered on an "informational" petition seeking legislation from the Student Senate to end campaigning on election day, one petition circulator said Tuesday.

Carol Sample, a member of a group of about 10 students who are circulating the petitions, said she hopes to have 500 signatures by Wednesday's senate meeting.

Sample said Jeff Francione, a candidate for student body president last spring, will present the petitions to the senate for action.

The petition reads, "We the undersigned request prompt action by the Student Senate concerning

harassment by campaigners on election day. We request the senate pass legislation banning all personal campaigning on election day."


Sample said they have been circulating the petitions because "we felt that it's not our responsibility (to end harassment)—we're not the ones causing the problems."

The idea first came up, she said, following discussion of an Elections Committee proposal to stamp voters' hands following voting.

Elections Committee Chairman Bob Eric said at a recent senate meeting that hand stamping would end harassment by identifying those who had already voted.

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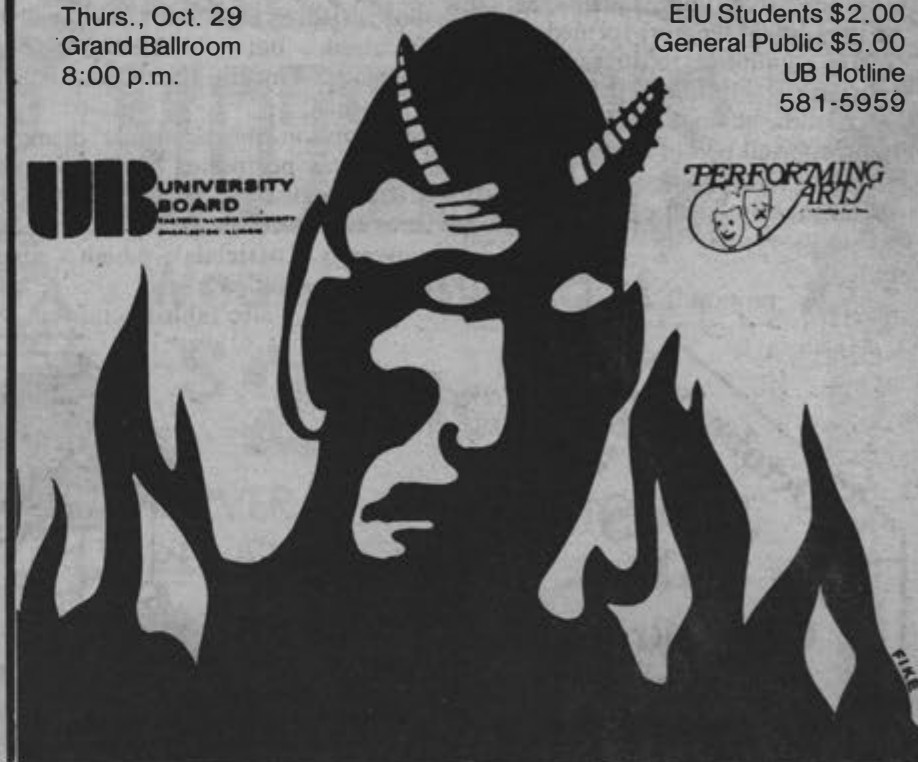

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Faculty Senate accepts add-drop plan

The Faculty Senate Tuesday clarified, then accepted an eight point add-drop plan proposed last week by an ad hoc committee formed to study the situation.

The senate clarified the part of the proposal dealing with graduate registration by stating that graduate registration be done by mail during pre-registration, not just by mail; at registration; or at the first meeting of night classes.

Because campus groups and students were opposed to add-drop changes outlined by Samuel Taber, dean of student academic services, the Council on Academic Affairs, Faculty Senate and the student senators formed a joint ad hoc committee to investigate the situation.

Part of the ad hoc committee's eight-point proposal is that registration and add-drops be conducted on a Thursday and Friday—into the evening hours if necessary—and classes would begin on Monday.

Taber's proposal, which will be

implemented during spring semester, will physically separate the add and drop lines by requiring students to place drop requests in a box outside the registration office.

Drop cards will be processed at the end of each day and the closed courses

would be posted the following day—to remain closed for the rest of the day.

Senate Chairman Lavern Hamand said the main objection to Taber's plan is the 24-hour delay in processing dropped classes.

Dismissal policy discussion set

The Student Senate Academic Affairs committee will discuss Wednesday revisions to proposed changes in the university's academic dismissal and summer admission policies.

Committee Chairman Julie Smith said revisions to both policies will be discussed, but "we're going to concentrate mostly on the (academic) dismissal."

Action on the academic dismissal policy was postponed by the Student Senate because Smith said last week the committee received input from several university officials which made revisions necessary.

The senate also tabled action on the

proposed summer admission revision last week. The proposal would increase requirements for students who enter Eastern during summer session and who seek readmission in a fall or spring semester.

Smith said last week the proposal is designed aimed at students who do not meet minimum admission requirements for fall or spring and enter during summer session when requirements are lower.

Smith said any student or faculty member who has any "input" to give the committee about the proposal should attend the meeting 6:15 p.m. Wednesday in the University Union Bookstore Lounge.

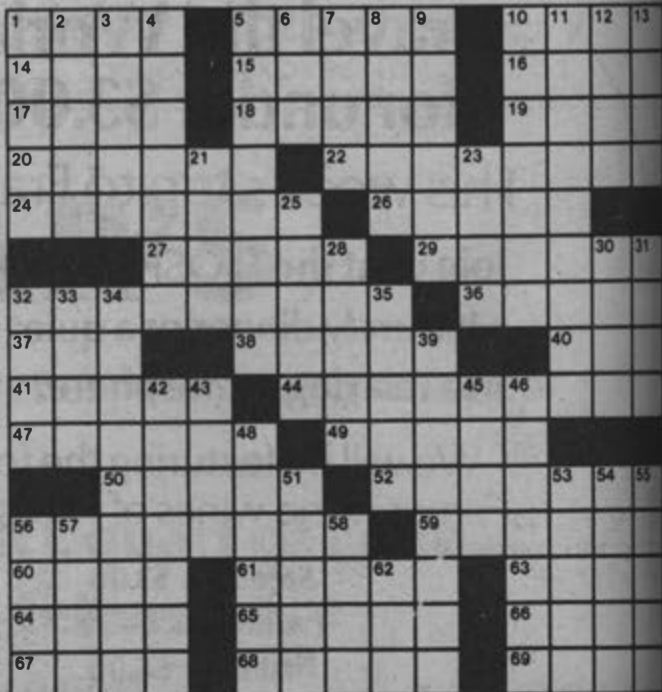

The NCAA faculty representative on the IAB will now also serve as the board's chairman, as stated in the new bylaws which the IAB unanimously approved.

In his regular report to the board, Athletic Director R.C. Johnson stated that the Panther Club's record 1981-82 fund drive total reached \$90,000 cash and \$52,000 in goods and services.

Johnson added he believes the club, which raised about \$75,000 cash last year, could reach its expected goal of

\$100,000 before the March deadline.

In discussion of winter sports schedules, Associate Athletic Director Ron Paap acknowledged two changes in the men's basketball slate.

In addition, Johnson also acknowledged that the cagers will compete in the Chaminade University Christmas tournament in Honolulu, Hawaii Jan. 3-4, 1983.

Beginning today individuals and/or teams may sign up at the Intramural Office in order to play full court basketball games during Intramural Free-Play hours. The Lantz main gym south cross-court will be available for full court games. Half court games are to be played on the baskets at the north end of Lantz. Sign up for Full Court will follow the same regulations as for Racquetball and Tennis Courts. The court can be reserved by signing up at the Intramural Office Monday through Friday beginning at noon and during Free Play hours on weekends. No telephone reservations allowed. An individual may place his name on the list every other day.

The sign-up sheet will be posted on the west bleachers of the south cross-court at 7:00 p.m. weekdays and 1:00 p.m. Saturday and Sunday by the Intramural Building Supervisor. This system is in effect during Intramural Free Play hours and does not apply for weekday daytime hours even if physical education classes or athletics are not using the courts — they have priority use of the facilities during those hours.

NOTE: if the next captain on the list is not present when a game is over, the following captain on the list will play and the first captain forfeits his/her place on the list.

- Settle indecisions at free throw line; one shot each player.
- No captain can pass his/her game to another player or group.

The Intramural Building Supervisor has final authority concerning control of Full Court games. Abuse of this policy and its enforcement could result in loss of free play privileges for individuals and/or teams.
