**His Wife Receives Notice Friday
That He Was Injured in the
Fighting in Normandy July 17**

Mrs. Loren Heady of near Willow Hill received word from the War Department, Friday, that her husband, Private First Class Heady, was seriously wounded in France, July 17. He was in the Infantry and had been in the Army a year and overseas several months.

No information was given as to how or where he was wounded but it is supposed that his injuries were received in the battles in Normandy subsequent to the capture of Cherbourg.

He is a son of Mrs. Josie Hicks of Winterrowd vicinity and his wife is the former Mary Phillips, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Phillips of Willow Hill vicinity, formerly of near Newton. He was quite well known throughout Jasper county as a sheep shearer.

Wounded in Italy

Mr. and Mrs. Adolph Rudolphi of near Wendelin have been notified of the serious wounds received by their son, David K. Rudolphi, on the Italian front.

They have also received notice that their son has been awarded the Order of the Purple Heart. He is reported as making a satisfactory recovery and it hoped he will soon be able to return home on an extended furlough.

His father is the present supervisor of Pixley township, Clay county.
