Course Description

College Composition II focuses on argumentation and the critical inquiry and use of sources and arguments. Course work entails analyzing others' arguments and writing a variety of well-researched and ethically responsible arguments. You will gain further practice finding relevant information from a variety of sources and evaluating, synthesizing, and presenting that information.

Student Learning Objectives & Goals

By the end of the semester, students should demonstrate the ability to:

- Apply the principles of argument—claims, reasons, evidence, assumptions, counterarguments, and counter-argumentation—in written documents
- Produce cogent written arguments that consider ideas, issues, problems, and evidence from multiple perspectives
- Evaluate primary and secondary source evidence, including quantitative data, to determine its credibility, appropriateness, and relevance
- o Integrate sources ethically, appropriately, and consistently in written documents
- Use data and create graphical elements in their writing
- Recognize how to transfer their writing processes, understanding of rhetorical principles, genre awareness, understanding of argumentative principles, and the research process to other writing situations
- o Present work in Edited American English

Attendance Policy

Generally speaking, attendance is required at all class meetings and individual conference appointments. If you have more than three properly verified absences, then your grade may be affected. Daily Procedures and Course Requirements

Each class, we will begin with a daily reflection. This will be written by hand, is graded pass/fail, and must be handed in after completion. **Daily reflections cannot be made up.** Sometimes the subject will be about our readings for the day, sometimes just about whatever you want to write—but you will be given the topic at the beginning of class, and a time limit to produce around 400 words. More on this later. Immediately after the reflection, I will take roll. You will be asked to discuss the readings or the daily topic, sometimes in class discussions and sometimes in small groups.

Writing Assessment Essay (in class)	5%
Two Source-based Papers (10% each)	20%
Panel Presentation	5%
Research Paper (all steps)	60%
Portfolio	10%

The Writing Assessment Essay will be written in class at the first meeting. This will be a kind of baseline for us both, so that you know where you stand in comparison to other students, and so I will know what talents are present in the classroom.

The Two Source-based Papers will utilize our readings. More about these later, but they will be at least 1200 words in length.

The Panel Presentation will require you to work with a group of your peers to present one of the selections from *Rereading America* to the class.

The Research Paper is a process project—we will grade the various parts over a period of several weeks, from topic proposal to final draft. Much more about this later, but the final draft will be 2700-4000 words in length.

Your **Portfolio** will include works chosen from all your writings for the semester and will require a separate short essay about how you chose the works included, why you chose to revise them or not, etc.

Grading scale: A= 90-100, B=80-89, C=70-79, D=60-69, F=59 or below

Electronic Writing Portfolio: EWP submissions for the fall 2022 semester are due by December 16. Any suitable documents written in our class (750 or more words of expository prose may be included. (https://www.eiu.edu/assess/ewpmain.php)
