PORNOGRAPHY LECTURE TO HIGHLIGHT WOMEN'S HISTORY AND AWARENESS MONTH AT EIU

CHARLESTON – A lecture and slide presentation, "Pornography and the Media: Images of Violence Against Women," will be the keynote event during Women's History and Awareness Month at Eastern Illinois University.

Gail Dines, Ph.D., an author and nationally acclaimed lecturer, will explore the relationship between commercially produced images of violence against women and real-world violence.

The free lecture is set for 7 p.m. Monday, March 7, in Roberson Auditorium, Lumpkin Hall Room 2030. Due to the graphic nature of the program, nobody under the age of 18 will be admitted.

Dines will compare the major themes found in pornographic magazines and X-rated videos with those found in mainstream magazines and MTV. There will also be discussion using the latest research conducted by sociologists, psychologists, feminists and media specialists.

The pornography industry grosses billions of dollars each year, and while many people view pornography, there are many others who are unaware of the content of pornographic films, magazines and Internet sites, said Diana Slaviero, coordinator of the Women's Studies Program at EIU.

"Pornography has always been a form of media that sparks heated debate and generates emotional arguments," Slaviero said. "The faculty involved with the Women's Studies Program decided to bring Gail Dines to EIU because we think that it is important to discuss the effects that the production and consumption of sexually violent pornography has on women in our society. In order to develop an informed opinion on the subject, one needs to be exposed to the material at the heart of the discussion."

Many other events are also scheduled for Women's History and Awareness Month. This year's theme is "Women and the Media." All events are free and, unless otherwise noted, on the EIU campus.
