Private Delmar Feb. 20,
Salyers Is Slightly 1945-
Wounded in Belgium

Private Delmar Salyers was slightly wounded in Belgium, February 1, his mother, Mrs. Nellie Salyers of Newton, was notified Monday by the War Department. A card from a hospital in France where he was under treatment stated that he had a finger broken and his hand cut up considerably.

Delmar was a Paratrooper with the Eighty-second Airborne division.

Jack Fiedler Is Wounded

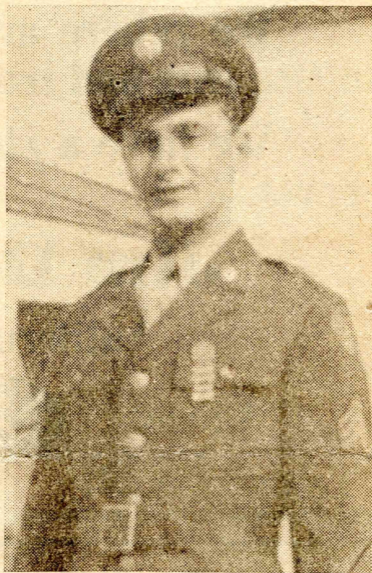
Private First Class John R. "Jack" Fiedler Jr. was wounded in Belgium on January 22, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John R. Fiedler of Effingham have been notified. He was a scout with an airborne division.

He had been overseas since August, 1944, spent Christmas day in France and was in the Belgian "bulge" when wounded.

Mr. and Mrs. Fiedler Sr. resided in Newton when Jack was small, supervising the construction of state highways leading out of Newton.

Forrest Alexander Promoted
