King crowned as 1992 Miss Black EIU

An audience of approximately 400 parents and students watched the crowning of Rhonda King as Miss Black EIU 1992.

King, a sophomore zoology/physical therapy major from Canton, Ohio, was crowned by last year's Miss Black EIU, Karen Adkins.

The pageant was held Saturday night at the Martin Luther King Jr. University Union Grand Ballroom.

Runners up for Miss Black EIU were Michelle Henderson and Tamara Torrence.

Each contestant was judged in four categories: creative expression, African garment, talent and evening gown, and impromptu questioning.

For the creative expression category, the contestants performed skits that dealt with topics like frivolous spending and black history. In the African garment portion of the pageant, contestants dressed in African clothing they designed themselves and described what their African heritage meant to them.

During the talent competition the contes-

tants performed songs or choreographed dances and acted out skits, while in the evening gown and impromptu question categories, contestants answered questions ranging from minority quota hirings and Black History Month in general.

Between each category musical entertainment was provided by Adkins, The "Phunky Pheel One's" featuring the A-Lover, Verge, and a duet by Ray McElroy and Caprisha Smyles.

Other contestants were Shannon Ford and Deneeda Rivers.

The masters of ceremony for the 16th annual pageant were Ron Zimmerman and Kim Purham, and it was opened by Jonathan Collins, Jr. who sang the Black National Anthem, "Lift Every Voice and Sing." The judges for the contest were Judith Lyles, Priscilla Rice, Sammy Murini, Cedric Holt and Minabere Ibelema.
