OLLIE HOLLAND'S BIRTHDAY, by Sheryle Criswell, is the story of a 50-year-old woman suffering from terminal cancer, although she looks well and is in very good spirits. It takes place as her family gather together on what will probably be her last birthday. A family tradition dictates that the person celebrating the birthday gets to plan the day's activities and, as such, gets to set all the rules. Ollie (Olivia) has decided to role play with each member of the family in turn. She takes them back to their most memorable birthday which involved her in some way. As a psychologist, it is her attempt to get them each to move closer to accepting her death. During these "memory scenes" in Act II, some very interesting, poignant and even profound discoveries are made.
