VI. 01-29, SOC 2850, Classical Social Theory, Revised Course.

Dr. Foster and Mr. Hendrickson presented the proposal and answered questions of the Council. The motion passed unanimously.

This action approves the following to become effective Spring 2002:

This course replaces SOC 3520, The Development of Sociological Thought.

SOC 2850. Classical Social Theory. (3-0-3) F, S. CLASSICAL THEORY. The development of sociological thought will be traced from the earliest dialogues of social theory through the founders of the discipline. Special focus will be placed on a selection of primary contributors to classical sociological theory. Prerequisite: SOC 2710.

VII. 01-30, SOC 3250, Contemporary Social Theory, Revised Course.

Dr. Foster and Mr. Hendrickson presented the proposal and answered questions of the Council. The motion passed unanimously.

This action approves the following to become effective Spring 2002:

This course replaces SOC 4250, Contemporary Sociological Theory.

SOC 3250. Contemporary Social Theory. (3-0-3) F, S. CONTEMP THEORY. This course will build on the foundation of classical theory to focus on the construction and application of the major contemporary theories used in current social research. There is a special focus on theory application to other coursework in the major. Prerequisite: SOC 2850.

VIII. 01-31, SOC 3610, Statistical Analysis of Social Data, Revised Course.

Dr. Foster and Mr. Hendrickson presented the proposal and answered questions of the Council. The motion passed unanimously.

This action approves the following to become effective Spring 2002:

SOC 3610. Statistical Analysis of Social Data. (3-2-4) F, S. Soc. Statistics. Survey of statistical techniques used to summarize and describe the quantitative characteristics of social research. The course includes both descriptive and inferential statistics, using statistical software to analyze data.

IX. 01-32, SOC 3820, Environmental Sociology, New Course.

Dr. Foster and Mr. Hendrickson presented the proposal and answered questions of the Council. The motion passed unanimously.

This action approves the following to become effective Fall 2002:

SOC 3820. Environmental Sociology. (3-0-3) F. Enviro Sociology. Examines the interrelations between the natural environment, social organization, and social behavior. Attention is directed at both the social causes of and social responses to various environmental problems. Prerequisite: SOC 2710 or permission of the instructor.

X. 01-33, SOC 4820, Sociology of Health and Health Care, New Course.

Dr. Foster and Mr. Hendrickson presented the proposal and answered questions of the Council. The motion passed unanimously.

This action approves the following to become effective Spring 2002:

SOC 4820. Sociology of Health and Health Care. (3-0-3) S. Soc of Health. This course provides a sociological analysis of health, illness, and health care systems. Substantive topics covered include the social distribution of health and illness, the illness experience, the socialization and development of health care workers, and the social organization of medicine. Prerequisite: SOC 2710 or permission of the instructor.

XI. 01-34, Sociology Major (B.A.), Revision.

Dr. Foster and Mr. Hendrickson presented the proposal and answered questions of the Council. The motion passed unanimously.

ANT 2742 -- Change course title from: "Introduction to Physical Anthropology and Archaeology" to "**Human Evolution**" and change course description to read as follows: "**Study of the biological and cultural evolution of humanity. Includes study of primate form and behavior; the origins of the human biological family, fossil evidence showing human biological evolution and archaeological evidence of human cultural development. S1 903**" Effective: Spring 2002.
