MAO INITIATED INTO BGS

CHARLESTON, ILL. -- Ze Feng Mao, son of Zhu Degao of Chang Sha City, Hunan, was one of 39 students recently inducted into Beta Gamma Sigma (BGS) at Eastern Illinois University.

BGS is the honor society for collegiate schools of business. It is an international organization with 289 collegiate chapters and 345,000 alumni living around the world.

Chapters are established at schools and colleges of business in the United States and Canada which are accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business.

Membership in BGS is the highest scholastic recognition a student can receive in an undergraduate or master's degree program in business and management. To be eligible for membership, a student must rank in the upper 10 percent of the undergraduate class or upper 20 percent of the master's class.

Mao is a 1974 graduate of the Second Middle School of Chang De, China. He is currently working on a master's degree in business administration at EIU.
