"Madam Tinubu" by Akinwumi Isola, adapted by Adeniyi Coker Jr., is a historical play detailing the frenzy which accompanied the British occupation and colonization of West Africa in the late nineteenth century. The play is set in Victorian Lagos, and it details the resistance of the British forces led by Madam Tinubu. Due to the brilliance and tenacity of her resistance efforts, the British dubbed her, "terror of Lagos." After several economic and military maneuvers, the British occupation became successful, but not without the banishment and exile of Madam Tinubu.
