EIU OFFERS COURSES IN EFFINGHAM

CHARLESTON -- Eastern Illinois University is offering several courses in the Effingham area as part of two undergraduate completion degree programs.

These two programs are the Bachelor of Science in Career Occupations and the Board of Trustees Bachelor of Arts.

The Board of Trustees degree was formerly known as the Board of Governors Bachelor of Arts (BOG/BA) degree program. Both programs allow individuals to complete an undergraduate degree by building on two years of community college credit with upper-division courses and credit for work-related experience.

Undergraduate-level courses being offered include "Telecommunication Issues Toward the Third Millennium" (EIU 4042C-116), an EIU course offered as a senior seminar. This course will give a panoramic view of the mass media in the twentieth century as culture and political-economy, and its effects on our high-tech society. This course will be offered from 7 to 9:30 p.m. Mondays, Jan. 12 through April 27, at the Kluthe Center.

"Selected Topics in History: Vietnam War 1945-1975" (HIS 4775-116) is a critical examination of America's engagement in the Vietnam conflict. In addition, the course will also

survey the impact of the war on American society and culture. This class will meet April 3-4, 17-18 and 24-25 at the Kluthe Center. Times will be 6 to 10 p.m. on Fridays and 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturdays.

Also offered on Friday evenings and Saturdays are the following classes: "Human Sexuality" (HST 3500-115), a study of the biological, psychological and cultural dimensions of human sexuality (Jan. 30-31, Feb. 27-28, and Mar. 27-28); "Counseling the Chemically Dependent Person" (PSY 4987-115), a brief study/overview of the symptoms and diagnostic criterion of addiction, basic assessment processes, and holistic treatment strategies regarding chemical dependency in adults (March 6-7); and "Silent Spring Revisited" (ZOO 4986-115), a study of how Rachel Carson's book, Silent Spring, contributed to revolutionary changes in government policy toward chemical pollution of the environment and was the driving force of the environmental movement of the 1960's (Jan. 16-17).

Another undergraduate course -- "Stress Management: A Wellness Approach" (PED 3985-115) -- will look at stress management from four perspectives: physical, mental/emotional, coping strategies, and relaxation techniques. Participants will explore how the whole person must be treated by working on both the causes as well as the symptoms of stress. "Stress Management" will be held from 6:30 to 9:45 p.m. Tuesdays beginning Jan. 13 at the Kluthe Center.

Only one graduate/undergraduate course will be offered spring semester. "Interdisciplinary Curriculum in the Middle-Level School" (MLE 5150-115) will focus on interdisciplinary organization of curriculum and instructional techniques appropriate for middle-level schools. Emphasis will be placed on instruction in multiple content areas appropriate for grades six through

eight including enhancement of instruction with available technology. Appropriate assessment measures which comply with current state mandates are also emphasized. This course partially fulfills the ISBE requirements for middle-level endorsement. This course will meet from 7 to 9:30 p.m. on Mondays beginning Jan. 12.
