CHARLESTON, IL--Joan Embery, the "zoo lady of television" who will speak at Eastern Illinois University on Tuesday, July 22, is featured in the current issue of TV Guide. The three-page spread includes pictures of Ms. Embery with a cheetah and with a toucan.

Ms. Embery will lecture at 7:30 p.m. in the Dvorak Concert Hall, instead of in Booth Library as first announced. Her topic will be "Room In The Ark?--The Future Survival Of Wildlife."

In addition to the public lecture, Ms. Embery will direct a workshop July 21-24 on wildlife survival. There is no admission charge for the lecture. Her appearance is part of the Distinguished Visiting Faculty program of Summer School '86.

Ms. Embery is the International goodwill ambassador and official hostess of the San Diego Zoo and Wildlife Animal Park. She received last spring from Eastern the Board of Governors' Bachelor of Arts degree.

In her position with the zoo, Ms. Embery has appeared on the Johnny Carson show approximately 50 times. The article in TV Guide recounts incidents involving animals she brought to the Carson program, and the difficulties of traveling with elephants, wombats and orangutans.
