CHARLESTON, IL--Faculty member Timothy Lane will perform his first recital at Eastern Illinois University on Friday, Oct. 17 at 7:30 p.m. in Dvorak Concert Hall.

He will be joined by pianist Celso Loureiro Chaves in playing sonatas of Paul Hindemith, Armando Albuquerque, Wallingford Riegger, and Bohuslav Martinu. There is no admission charge.

Lane, flute instructor, is a full-time doctoral candidate at the University of Illinois. He has played with the Cleveland Orchestra, the Ohio Chamber Orchestra, and the Sinfonia de Vera Cruz, Mexico.

Lane has also played with the San Antonio Chamber Players, the Arcadia Music Festival in Maine, and the Roundtop Music Festival in Texas.

Celso Loureiro Chaves is Assistant Professor in the Music Department of the Art Institute of the Universidade Federal do Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil. He has degrees in composition, architecture, and education. He is presently working towards a doctoral degree in Composition at the University of Illinois.

Chaves has written music for more than 20 theatrical productions and films. Among his orchestral works are: "The Airplane Ballad" for three violas, flute, double bass, and percussion; "Visitations" for double bass and orchestra; and "Giacomo Joyce: Page Six" for voice, English horn, vibraphone, timpani, and percussion. As a conductor, Mr. Chaves has made appearances with the Orquestra do Estado de Sao Paulo and the Orquestra Sinfonica de Porto Alegre. As a pianist, he has toured Brazil extensively both as an accompanist and a soloist.
