FACULTY SENATE
Minutes of March 8, 1988

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson North at 2:00 p.m. in the Martinsville Room of the Martin Luther King Student Union.

I. Minutes of the March 1 meeting were approved as presented.

II. COMMUNICATIONS:

- A. Received from Dean Laible materials concerning the 5 candidates for the Associate VPAA. The first candidate will be on campus interviewing this week (March 10 & 11). Faculty Senate may meet with the candidate from 2:00 - 3:00, Thursday in the BOG Room.
- B. Received from Charles Ross materials concerning the Tenth Decade Campaign.
- C. Received from Sam Taber notification that in August of 1988, appointments to the Textbook Rental Advisory Committee will expire from the CAA, Student Government, CGS and Faculty Senate.
- D. Received from Orlia Tate confirmation that Ron Messina will speak to the Senate on April 12 higher education and tax increase.
- E. Received from Kipp Kruse notification of his sabbatical starting next fall.
- F. Received from President Rives copies of his State of the University Address.
- G. Received from Dave Henard information concerning personal computers on campus. Including machines on order, there are 764; 325 are in labs for instructional use (including 19 on order); 56 for faculty research; 100-150 identified as office automation but available for faculty use.

III. OLD BUSINESS:

- A. Heyduck, Nominations Committee, provided Student/Faculty Board openings to be included in the minutes. He also noted that for faculty elections, 36 petitions; the deadline was March 7, and there is a shortage of candidates in a number of areas. Anyone interested in running for any of the following, contact Heyduck by phoning the Art Department and leaving a message: ACADEMIC PROGRAM, ELIMINATION AND REVIEW COMMITTEE needs candidates from Education, Booth Library and Counseling Services; UPC needs candidates from College of Education, Applied Sciences, Chemistry/Physics/Math, and Geology/Geography; FACULTY SENATE needs additional candidates; CGS needs candidates from the Business Education/Elementary Education/Education Administration group.
- B. Loudon, Faculty Morale Committee, reported that the draft report to be shared with the Undergraduate Study Committee on Faculty Concerns, Classroom Creativity and Learning Resources is complete and will be shared with the Faculty Senate following spring break.
- C. Goodrick reported that the Distinguished Faculty Awards Committee has nomination forms and information sheets available. The deadline is April 15, 4:00 p.m.

IV. NEW BUSINESS:

- A. Glenn Williams, Vice-President of Student Affairs, addressed the Senate. He noted that his area was a service/support area complementing the instructional effort. The past effort to increase minority enrollment has not been massively successful and more of a grass-roots approach is now being taken. Particular emphasis is being placed on recruiting those who have a high probability of successfully graduating. EIU's alumni linkage is being called on in Chicago and East St. Louis to assist in the effort. EIU continues to work with the students and faculty of Percy Julian High School in Chicago, and EIU is now

establishing contact with the Percy Julian feeder schools. Concerning EIU enrollment, Williams felt that there may be a 5% student increase in the fall of 1988. Cut-off dates for fall, spring and summer enrollments continue to occur earlier. With no tax increase, we can anticipate a tuition increase and an enrollment cutback. We now have 700 more freshman admissions this year than last year at this time; 32.8% of them will probably come to EIU. Concerning EIU's calendar, it is built on the previous year's calendar. There are no clearcut dictates for the length of a semester with respect to accreditation. It is not a matter of simply having an acceptable number of weeks, but of having an acceptable number of Mondays or Fridays since they are often missed as holidays. The 1989-90 calendar is currently being developed and now is the time to offer input. The calendar can be adjusted to facilitate a study week prior to finals, but concessions would have to be made elsewhere. The final calendar is set by the President's Council. Concerning registration, he noted that a touch tone telephone registration system is still several years away, but various pressures are straining the current registration system.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:30 pm. The next meeting will be at 2:00 pm, March 15.
