Purpose and Sope

We will focus on a central motif in American life and literature -- the self-made individual. Given the vast reach of our topic, we will discuss works from the Colonial period through the first half of the 20th century. The works include autobiographies written about actual lives, as well as novels written about fictional characters. As we study the works, we will consider such questions as the following, while by no means restricting ourselves to them.

- Is the concept of a self-made identity a viable one?
- To what extent and in what ways does a preoccupation with self-development relate to narrativity and *vice-versa*?
- What relationships exist between identity formation and social milieus, philosophical assumptions, and gender and race classifications?
- What, if anything, do we learn about Americanness from the works?

Evaluation and Grading

When I evaluate your writing, I will consider content (depth, logic, evidence), coherence (organization, cohesion), style, grammar, and mechanics. Quality content counts most, but an essay can fail if it is radically deficient in any category or seriously deficient in two or more categories. When I evaluate oral presentations, I will consider degree of preparedness and thoughtfulness/usefulness of contribution. I encourage you to consult with me as you prepare assignments, as well as to ask me questions about your work after I return it.

For each assignment, I will record both a percentage grade and a letter grade based on a ten-point scale. For example, an 85% is a "B," an 88% is a "B+," and a 92% is an "A-."

Attendance and Grading

After three unexcused absences, there will be a 10% deduction from your overall grade. Each subsequent unexcused absence will result in a 5% deduction. For an excused absence, you must provide verification from Health Service, a doctor, or an appropriate university employee. In accordance with departmental policy, excused absences will not be granted for class observation and student teaching.
